**IS THERE REALLY** a gas shortage? Or is there really just a plot to keep vacationing Americans at home this summer and thus help to curb inflation? If this is the case, we don't think it will work.

Americans will find a way to go on their annual vacation trips if they have to crawl to the resort spots on hands and knees. Travel has been important to Americans for our entire 200 years, and we can put our trust in American ingenuity to find a way to make it all possible.

The United States became a great nation because our ancestors believed in growth and progress...scientific, industrial, technological, etc. If the government can keep hands off and not put the lid on this natural growth and progress, American ingenuity will find a way to overcome the problems of energy shortage, if, in truth, it actually exists.

Within our borders, the United States has the following reserves of energy resources based on present rates of consumption: enough crude oil to last for 84 years, enough natural gas to last 400 years, enough coal to last for 600 years, enough oil shale to last 300 years, enough uranium to last 120 years and enough geothermal energy to last for 200 years.

There are enough underground deposits of methane to supply the U.S. with gas for 500 to 1,000 years. According to geologist Paul Jones of Louisiana State University, it is necessary to separate the methane from the liquid in order for it to be used as natural gas. Jones says "we have the technology available to do this."

Our greatest natural resource, human ingenuity, will never be "depleted." We predict that Americans will not stand by and accept the notion that we must content ourselves with a lower standard of living simply because the residents of certain Middle Eastern countries are unable to get along with each other.

Less than half (40 per cent to be exact) of our country's oil was shipped to the U.S. before the Mid-East Crisis arose. There should be no need for our country to depend on foreign sources for this amount of oil if our energy production at home is quickly beefed up. This, in itself, should help to ease the burdens of inflation by creating more jobs.

Once again, the solution to the problem is simply to let nature take its course in the natural cycle of things, preferably without governmental intervention.

If private industry can cut down somewhat on the cost of producing gasohol, (or if the price of gas continues to increase), then this may be one of our ultimate solutions to our fuel supply.

And, as we have stated before, this would "kill two birds with one stone" as far as our immediate area is concerned, since extra agricultural products would be needed to furnish material for making this proposed new fuel.

The Texas Legislature is making moves to secure federal money to assist in constructing gasohol plants in our state. It is to be hoped that such plants will develop in our state and area at an early stage, so as to benefit the farmers of our area more quickly.

Miss Rector has been an outstanding member of the Chieftain Band, where she was all-regional four years, and entered the state solo and ensemble contests four years.

She served as a twirler for four years, and was the feature twirler her senior year. Donna has been a member of the National Honor Society three years, was on the Band Council three years, was in the Student-Faculty Congress, and served as editor of the school newspaper her senior year.

The class valedictorian has also been active in outside activities such as rodeoing, twirling, dancing and gymnastics. She attends Friona United Methodist Church, and plans to attend Texas Tech University this fall, but is undecided on her major.

## Sales Tax Rebate Is Increased

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday said local one per cent sales tax rebates to Texas cities for April were up over the same month last year.

Bullock said city allocations statewide for April totaled \$34.9 million, compared to \$20.1 million during April of 1978.

The 1979 payments to date to cities reached \$135.2 million this month, compared to \$121.6 million over the same 4-month period last year.

Houston will receive \$7.6 million in rebates this month, compared to a \$4.6 million monthly payment last year.

The sales tax is collected by merchants and other tax permit holders along with the state sales tax and is rebated monthly to some 916 Texas cities in which it is collected by the Comptroller's Office.

The City of Bovina received \$1,313 for the allocation period, and the City of Friona was rebated \$4,744.

## Size Restrictions Set

"Use up your small and undersized envelopes and cards before July 15," Postmaster Richard Wilson reminds customers. That is the date when the Postal Service's new size standards become effective.

The Friona postmaster said that after July 15, envelopes and cards measuring less than three and one-half inches high or five inches long will be returned to the sender if mailed.

Postmaster Wilson said that because the envelope and greeting card industries have had more than three years to prepare for the new standards, few retailers should still be selling undersized pieces.

"Many customers, however, are likely to still have smaller envelopes and cards in their supply of stationery," Wilson said.

The regulations also prohibit flimsy cards. In the future they must be at least seven-thousandths (.007) of an inch thick. An official postal card, for instance, has a thickness of

nine thousandths of an inch.

For more information, the postmaster suggests customers check with a post office window clerk.

# Friona Flashbacks

.....from the files of *The Friona Star*

## 50 YEARS AGO—MAY 10, 1929

J.A. Wimberly acted as master of ceremonies at a called meeting of the Oklahoma-Texas Wheat Growers Association here last Thursday afternoon.

The matter of building or buying an elevator at Friona was discussed at length by the leaders and farmers present. F.W. Reeve was elected president of the group; Harvey Nailon is vice president; F. N. Welch is secretary-treasurer, with L.F. Lillard and Mr. Whitefield as directors.

## 40 YEARS AGO—MAY 12, 1939

The people of the local Pentecostal Church have recently installed their new church home in the west part of town.

The building was purchased some time ago, from the disbanded Baptist Church organization at Black, and was moved here and placed on its foundation about two weeks ago. Rev. E.E. Houlette is the pastor, and invites the public to attend each service at the church.

## 35 YEARS AGO—MAY 12, 1944

Mr. Leo Potishman, owner of the Santa Fe Grain and Elevator Co., has

donated \$1500 to be used to concrete two tennis courts. In a telephone conversation with Carl Maurer, spokesman for the school board, Mr. Potishman stated that he was happy to make the donation. Location of the courts has not been decided upon.

## 30 YEARS AGO—MAY 6, 1949

The Frio Draw, which has not been out of its banks since May of 1941, was on another rampage last Wednesday, May 4, 1949. A flash flood in New Mexico is believed to be the cause of the water rising. Although this rise of the draw was not as bad as in 1941, people in this part of the country were reminded of that disastrous day when the Friona Consumers Co., the Hicks Building and the Santa Fe Depot as well as many farm homes were either destroyed or damaged by the water as it rushed down the draw and out of its banks.

## 20 YEARS AGO—MAY 7, 1959

Dale Smith and Nancy Outland were named the top graduates in Friona High School for the graduating class of 1959 by High School Principal Raymond Cook this

week. Smith was named valedictorian for the class, with a grade average of 91.31, followed closely by Miss Outland's 91.04 average.

Despite competition from cotton planting early in the morning and blowing dust and rain in the afternoon, members of the Friona Lions Club broke all local records in selling a total of \$1700 worth of brooms and other items to residents of Friona and the surrounding territory Friday.

## 15 YEARS AGO—MAY 7, 1964

Tom Lewellen, candidate for reelection as commissioner for Precinct one, was given the Democratic primary nomination, and Nelson Welch won his job back as county Democratic Executive Committee chairman in the Democratic Primary last Saturday.

 1 C sugar 1 tsp butter  
 1/2 C white corn syrup 1 tsp vanilla  
 1 C raw peanuts 1 tsp baking soda  
 1/8 tsp salt  
 In a 1 1/2 quart casserole, stir together the sugar, syrup, raw peanuts, and salt, mixing well. Microwave at High for 6-9 minutes until light brown. Add butter and vanilla and stir well. Microwave at High 1-2 minutes more. Peanuts will be light brown and syrup will be very hot. Add baking soda and gently stir until light and foamy. Pour onto lightly buttered cookie sheet. Let cool 1/2-1 hour. When cool, break into small pieces.

 1/2 C water 2 tsp baking soda  
 3 C raw peanuts 1 tsp vanilla  
 Boil sugar, syrup, and water until thread spins. Then add peanuts and stirring constantly, cook until the mixture turns a brownish gold. Remove from heat, add butter, salt, vanilla, and soda. Quickly pour onto buttered cookie sheet. Let cool and break into serving-sized pieces. Sprinkle with salt when cool.

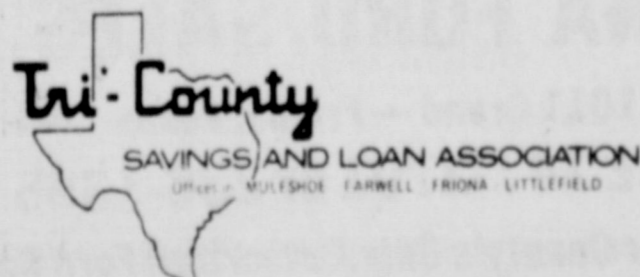

## Leslie White Makes Austin; Relay Edged

The Friona Chieftains will be represented at the state track and field meet in Austin by just one member of their team—senior half miler Leslie White.

White was the only team member to qualify for the state meet at last weekend's regional meet at Lubbock. Leslie ran the 880 in 2:00.0, to finish second in the event.

The next best chance for a state berth was by the mile relay team, which finished third, and missed the trip to Austin by one place.

One consolation for the relay team was the fact that the foursome broke the oldest track record on the books, that held by the 1953 state championship mile relay team of D.O. Robason, M.C. Osborn, Ben Wayne Jordan and Darrell Robbins, by over two seconds.

White ran a near perfect 880, and it was needed for him to gain the state meet. No preliminaries were held in this race, and all 16 regional qualifiers ran in the finals, making a large and bulky field.

Although running a 56.5 for the first lap, Leslie was running fifth at the completion of the first half of the race, and had found himself "boxed in" somewhat by some of the other contestants. On the last curve, White decided to move to the outside, in order to be able to make his finishing kick.

Leslie had to fight off a challenger during the last 30 yards, but did so with a gutsy finish that earned him the silver medal, and the coveted trip to the state meet.

"I was a little worried when I found myself boxed in, but I decided to go outside, and it worked out fine," White said about his race.

The mile relay foursome of David Fleming, Rod Owen, Robert Alexander and Chitto Caballero lacked one place of qualifying for the state meet, finishing third in the time of 3:25.1.

Fleming ran the leadoff leg in 51.9,

but was in about fifth place at the end of the first lap (although the stagger gave two teams advantages over Friona).

Rod Owen brought Friona up to second place during his lap, timed in 51.6, but although Robert Alexander ran a 51.0 on the third leg, Friona was in third place.

Chitto Caballero ran a 50.6 anchor lap, but just could not gain the ground needed to send the team to the state meet.

Caballero had already run in the open 440-yard dash and 120-yard high hurdles, Fleming had run in the 440-yard relay and 440-yard dash, and Owen had run in the 330-yard intermediate hurdles and broad jumped.

So, the team was not as rested as it might have been. Along this line, the Slaton team, winner of the mile relay, pulled one of its two qualifiers out of the open 440-yard dash, in order to make a better run for the relay medal, and it apparently worked.

Chuck Nichols cleared 13-0 in the pole vault on a gusty, windy day on Friday, to tie for third place in this event. This also tied Chuck's school record set early in the season.

Scott Fangman jumped 5-8 in the high jump but did not place. Saturday morning, Owen had a little trouble in the broad jump, and was pulled out of competition when a muscle tightened somewhat.

Owen ran a 40.0 in the 330-yard hurdles, qualifying for the finals, and Caballero ran a 15.2 in the high hurdles to also gain the finals. However, both ran last in their finals, so qualifying for the finals in these events may have been a dubious honor, since they both had their relay race to run.

Owen did break his own school record with a 40.0 in the hurdles preliminaries, and Caballero did likewise with a 15.2 in the highs.

The 440-yard relay team placed fifth in the regional finals, touring the lap

in 44.5. Team members were David Fleming, Robert Alexander, Rod Owen and Mike Hubbart.

Fleming was filling in for Michael Govens, who pulled a muscle while running in the 220-yard dash, in which he had qualified for the regional meet.

Fleming placed fourth at 51.0, and Caballero fifth with a 52.2 in the open 440-yard dash finals, in which Friona had two of the field of seven regional finalists.

As a team, Friona scored 35 points in the meet, fourth behind Post and Colorado City, co-champs with 47, and Frenship, which had 38 points.

## Oldest FHS Record Falls

Records are made to be broken, someone once said. But in this case, it must have been a good record, because it stood up for over a quarter of a century.

When the Friona Chieftains recorded a time of 3:25.1 in the finals of the regional track meet, they shattered the oldest record on the school's track record book.

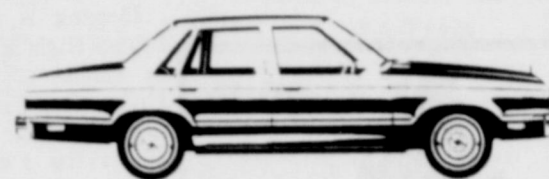
The previous mark of 3:27.6 had been set by D.O. Robason, M.C. Osborn, Ben Wayne Jordan and Darrell Robbins, in winning the gold medal at the state meet in 1953. Robbins also placed first in the open 440-yard dash at that state meet.

Most of the other individual events had seen new school records set in recent years, but the mile relay record had held up until last weekend when the foursome of David Fleming, Rod Owen, Robert Alexander and Chitto Caballero first recorded a 3:26.5 in the preliminaries, and then cut another 1.4 seconds off in the regional finals.

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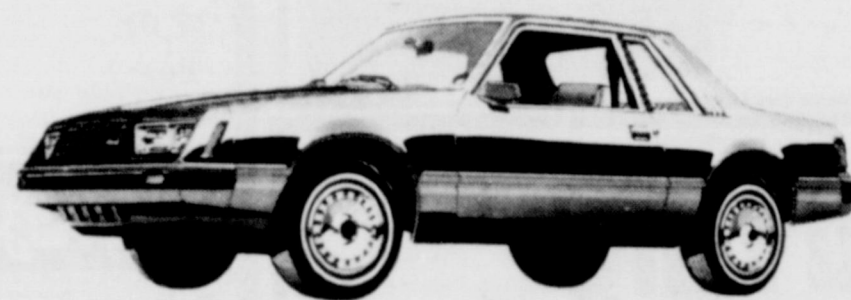
