LAST WEEK WE REPORTED some of the winners of Senator William Proxmire's "Golden Fleece Awards," which are tongue-in-cheek awards by the senator for the best job of wasting tax money during the year.

The examples we reported in our last column were bad enough—but they just skimmed the surface. If you feel like getting mad again, try some of these examples on for size:

The government, during 1978, awarded \$2,500 to a county in Virginia, to find out "Why people are rude, and why they cheat and lie on the local tennis court." (Apparently this county did not have a golf course, so that saved us some tax money.)

And then, the Department of Agriculture was awarded the tidy sum of \$46,000, to "Discover how long it takes to cook breakfast." Included in this in-depth study was to be the revelation of such little-known facts as how long it takes to crack an egg, etc. Senator Proxmire calls this grant "The \$46,000 hoax."

Another bargain conjured up by our government spenders was a grant of \$27,000 to study why inmates want to escape from prison. "It all came down to the fact that when you're in prison, you want to get out. This was utterly ridiculous," Proxmire said.

The Federal Energy Administration was awarded \$25,000 for its administrator to spend ten months jetting around the country in a chartered aircraft urging businessmen and civic groups to economize on their energy resources—not to take unnecessary trips, etc. In the course of the travels, the agency official used some 19,000 gallons of gas. His actions spoke much louder than his words.

If that wasn't bad enough, the Department of the Navy was awarded \$191,000 to fly 1334 officers to Las Vegas for a private reunion, during the height of the energy crisis. This soaked up a whopping 347,000 gallons of fuel (sorry your gas will cost more for your trip this summer).

The government doled out \$57,800 to the Federal Aviation Administration to "study the body measurements of stewardess trainees." Here again, many of us would have volunteered for the job, and perhaps paid our own way, in the interest of saving tax money.

The National Science Foundation was given a tidy chunk—\$500,000, to discover "Under what conditions rats, monkeys and humans bite and clench their teeth." (They need to add another condition, now). The cost turned out to be a cool million bucks.

The perpetrator of this fiasco sued Sen. Proxmire, saying that this was "a very serious study." We imagine that for a million dollars, you can get pretty serious. We could.

A grant of \$38,174 was made to the Environmental Protection Agency to show that "Runoff from open stacks of cow manure in Vermont causes pollution of open streams and ponds." We could have verified this for the EPA, without even going to Vermont. (That's just a lot of B.S.)

We subsidized a total of \$102,000 to the National Institute of Alcoholism Abuse to study the effect of gin and tequila on the behavior of sunfish. I suppose the study will tell you if a sunfish that drank gin was more aggressive than one who drank tequila. That's probably a piece of information our entire country will be waiting to get.

We also paid out \$84,000 to the National Science Foundation (one of our favorite charities), to do a study on "Why people fall in love." This has been the mystery of the ages, and if they pin it down, even for \$84,000, it's going to make interesting reading.

Many of our legislators are joining Senator Proxmire in attempting to crack down on these ridiculous expenditures of tax money. But many others still have the idea that this is "federal money" (not yours and mine). If you agree with the senator that something needs to be done,

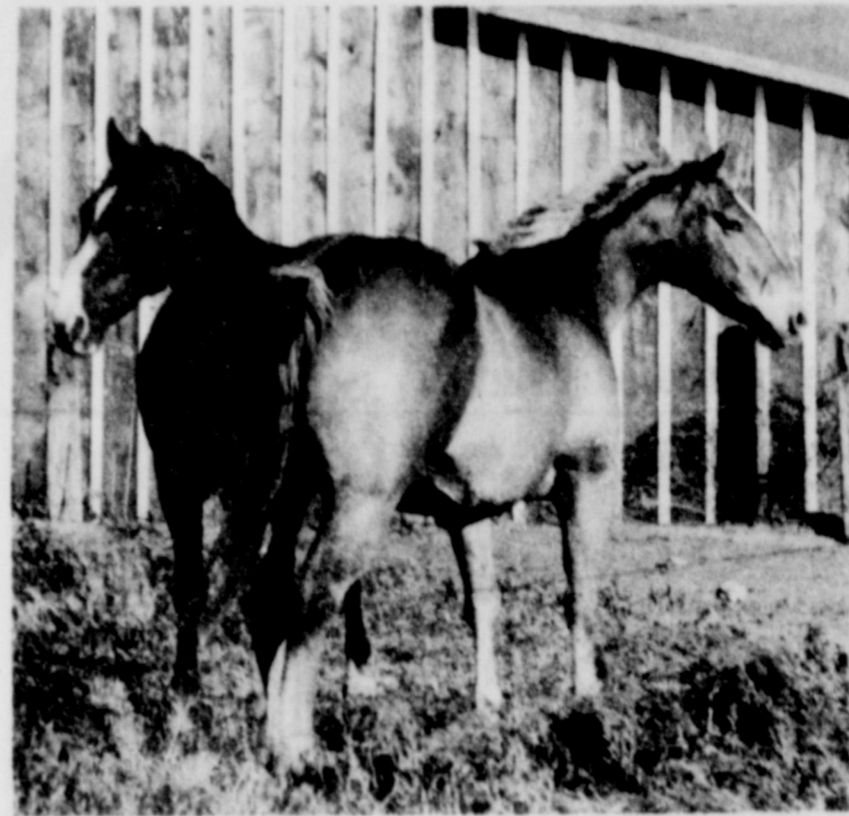

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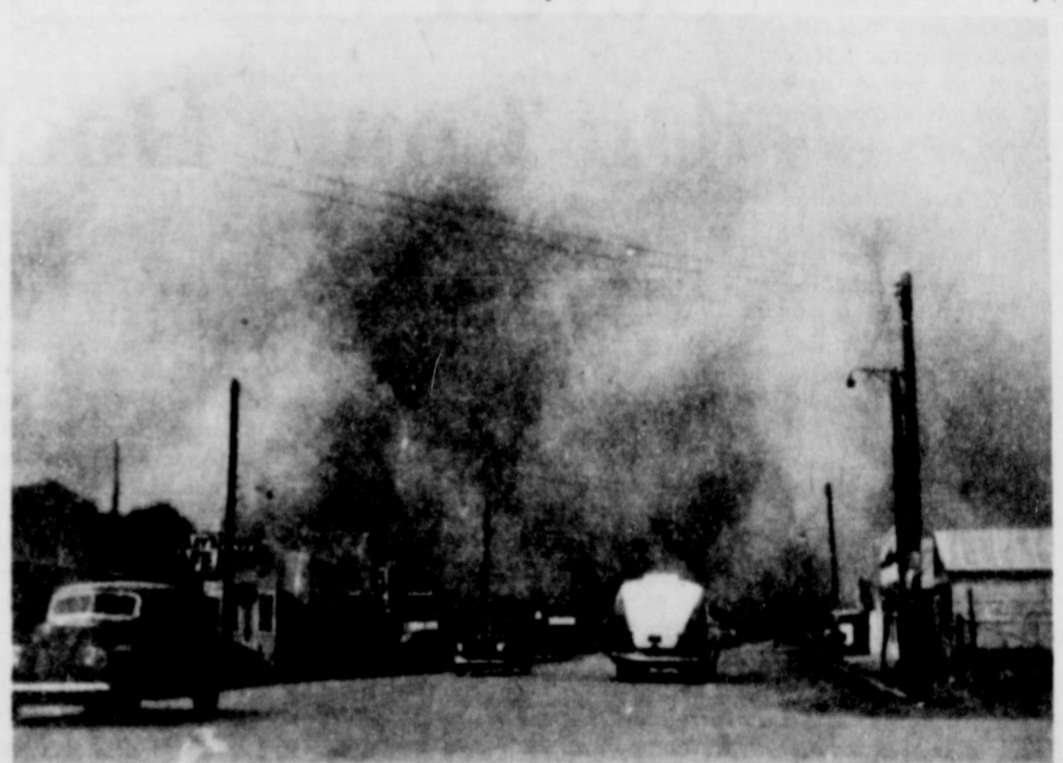

Producers To Hold Election

Grain sorghum producers in a 29-county area of the Texas High Plains will elect four members to the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board on September 15.

Terms of four current board members expire at that time. They are E.C. Witten of Edmonson; A.W. Anthony, Jr., of Friona; John Gilbreath, Hart; and Don Nelson of Tulia. All incumbents are eligible for re-election to the 6-year, non-salaried position as long as they are bona fide grain sorghum producers.

Any person in the 29-county TGSPB area who produces grain sorghum and is subject to the board assessment is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers. Any person eligible to vote is also eligible to make nominations for director.

Qualified persons wishing to have their name placed in nomination for membership on the board may do so by application to the organization, signed by himself and ten others who are also eligible to vote.

All nominations must be filed by August 15, at the TGSPB office, 1708-A 15th, Lubbock, Texas 79401 to allow time for adding their name to the ballot. Forms are available at that office.

Ballots will be mailed to voters and must be returned to the TGSPB office by September 15. Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot by September 2, may obtain one at his local County Agent's office.

Area Report

A report just published by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 reveals that High Plains ditch irrigation farmers may be losing from \$2,747 up to \$13,255 each year to the high cost of deep water infiltration and evaporation loss inefficiencies. The Water District has just released its study tabulating statistical data in a report titled "Cost Analysis of Irrigation Ditch Losses."

Field tests for irrigation ditch losses over the years have verified these financial and water drains. This report documents the substantial volume of water which may be lost each year in open ditch irrigation through both decreased efficiency and higher irrigation costs; and it is one of the first studies to statistically analyze these findings.

The report examines three approaches in order to determine the dollar value of the quantities of ditch irrigation water lost in different soil types, the lost water's potential for yield increases, and the economic feasibility of replacing irrigation ditches with alternative irrigation distribution systems. Findings indicated these losses are indeed expensive, not only in decreased irrigation efficiency which then requires added pumping, but in added fuel costs for the additional pumpage. The water lost due to infiltration and evaporation from irrigation ditches becomes more costly yet if its potential for converting additional crops to irrigation is figured.

Also examined is the economic feasibility of replacing open irrigation ditches with underground pipeline systems, plastic or aluminum pipe. Tables evaluate the breakeven point (years required to recover cost of investment) for installing such systems. Replacement systems are financially justified as the cost of water conveyed to the furrow without loss is converted into potential savings.

The study concludes it is hard to justify the revenue losses of open ditch irrigation considering the high cost of production to the irrigation farmer, especially when that cost might be directly translated into a "net" column.

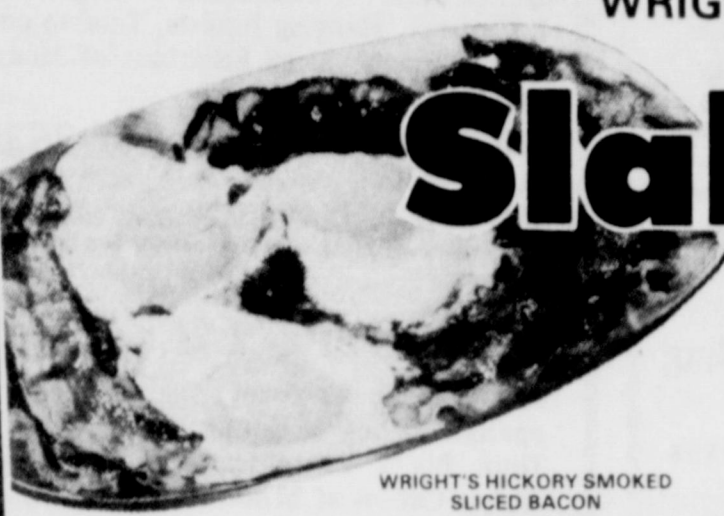

Lower Valley Grows Most Texas Citrus

AUSTIN--Around 80 percent of all grapefruit grown in the Lower Rio Grande Valley during 1977-78 was raised in Hidalgo County, according to figures recently released by the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown said Hidalgo County growers produced 9,650,000 80-pound boxes of grapefruit out of a total of 11,900,000.

The county also produced 5,435,000 85-pound boxes of oranges. Total orange production amounted to 6,100,000 boxes.

Cameron County was second with 1,950,000 boxes of grapefruit and 400,000 boxes of oranges. Willacy was third with 280,000 boxes of grapefruit and 245,000 of oranges.

Brown said Texas was second nationwide in citrus production. The fruit is produced mainly in the Lower Rio Grande Valley, but a scattering of groves are located in South Texas.

The West Texas Junior Tour Event was held Wednesday, June 13, at the Friona Country Club golf course.

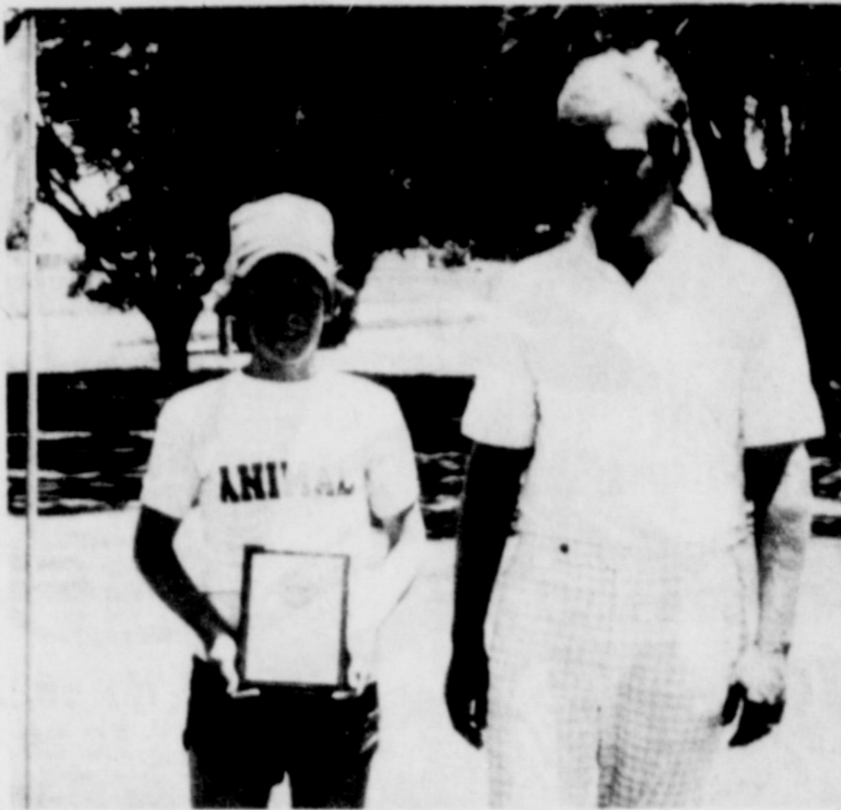

Around The House

Bridal fashions for spring-summer '79 are traditional laces, contemporary soft, flowing fabrics, or a combination of both.

Traditional gowns are the most popular with antique laces, high Victorian necklines, tiered skirts, empire waist and princess styling.

Other popular styles include thin straps on bare shoulders with a lace or chiffon camisole, often covered with a soft capelet or blouson bodice. Soft, floaty skirts continue the feminine mood.

Bodice interest is often created with capelet collars, big smocks over, flowing dresses, or chiffon blouses over Venise lace camisoles.

Popular traditional fabrics include soft chantilly lace or Venise appliques and intricate alencon laces. Soft, flowing styles are created with shiny light-weight knits, satin, moire, chiffon, silk and velvet.

Current styling for bridesmaid gowns are flounced skirts, capelets,

tiered skirts and gathered shoulder. Important colors are violet, mauve, banana and dusty peach.

Recent studies have shown that 98 per cent of today's brides have formal weddings with a white or ivory dress. Most choose floor length gowns with a chapel train. Most brides buy their gowns ready-made spending an average of \$230. The 16 per cent who make or have their gowns made spend an average of \$100 to \$150, including fabric, trim, lace and notions. Current pattern books feature a number of bridal fashions enabling today's bride to create a totally individualistic look.

Go creative! Blend old furnishings into new decorative schemes.

In the case of upholstered furniture, slipcovers offer an ideal solution for recycling the couch or chairs.

Wood furniture also will integrate into a new scheme with some ingenuity—and a touch of boldness. Heirlooms we inherited from our parents will not give us decorating trouble, but those first purchases we made as newlyweds probably will. That blond wood dining set, for instance, or that dark wood Mediterranean bedroom suite, need special boldness.

To play down blond wood—in the dining room, for example—try a bold wall color of red, charcoal brown or emerald green. This makes the furniture secondary in importance. Also, a new lighting scheme can remove emphasis from the furniture.

For the darker woods of the past, such as a Mediterranean bedroom set, try a "total" decorating scheme based on printed fabrics—new bedspread, draperies and carpet. They may transform the room into that "all-fresh-and-new" look.

If the furniture is not valuable for re-sale or for sentimental reasons, another idea takes daring, too: paint it, stencil it, or antique it. There is nothing to lose with this approach, and the furniture pieces may become important parts of the new scheme after all.

Reusing carpet is difficult—but not impossible—with today's selection of wall-paint colors and fabrics. Dyeing carpet is not successful, however, and it is quite expensive.

1978 '79 UIL Program Reaches Record High

Participation in the athletic, literary and academic, and music programs reached record highs in 1978-79, reinforcing the long-standing contention that one of two graduating seniors in Texas has taken part in a UIL activity during his high school career.

"Certainly, the UIL has had its problems the past year, with the numerous court cases and occasional one-sided press coverage," said Dr. Bailey Marshall, League director. "But I would be remiss to emphasize the negative and overlook the positive aspects of our programs."

"More students were involved in UIL activities this past year than ever before and this participation by students on a fair and equal basis has been and remains our ultimate goal: This is the reason the UIL exists," he added.

Across the board, participation by schools remained stable, with the exception of girls' basketball, which increased by 55 schools. Football, girls' volleyball, boys' basketball, swimming and track and field remained on a per-school participation basis near their 1977-78 marks.

Individual participation, however, continued its upward surge, with more than 42,000 playing football, 30,000 and 23,000 in boys' and girls' track respectively, and 23,000 and

19,000 in boys' and girls' basketball respectively.

Elsewhere, participation in boys' baseball neared the 16,000 mark, while more than 20,000 took part in boys' and girls' tennis. Approximately 8,000 participated in boys' golf and 4,000 in girls' golf. Swimming figures reached 3,500 for the boys' and 2,500 for the girls', while cross country boys' and girls' totals sped near the 600 plus mark.

In the UIL music program, some 71,000 took part in choral competition while 40,000 participated in the solo and ensemble contest, and a whopping 215,000 joined bands and orchestras in UIL contests.

"The University Interscholastic

League embraces more than a half-million participants and anytime you're working with a program having the scope this one has, you must operate under a system of uniformly enforced rules and regulations," Dr. Marshall said. "The school administrators and educators of Texas have voted for and support rules governing inter-school competition. To abandon these rules would be detrimental to the educational benefits of the overall program."

"It is wise to keep in mind that Texas school people, with the support and counsel of their local patrons, have built the UIL into the most outstanding organization of its kind."

Water Import Bill Sent To Governor Clements

West Texas Fun Map Available

West Texans are invited to find out what's in their own backyard as they explore the variety of scenery and things to do in the region, according to the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Ray McLaughlin of Alpine, chairman of the WTCC Tourist and Travel Development Committee, is urging all West Texans to obtain a free copy of the chamber's "Wonderful West Texas" Fun and Adventure Map, that they might discover new leisure-time destinations within easy driving distance.

The publication contains a road map showing lakes and National Parks, along with information on 79 attractions and areas of interest in the Western 60 per cent of Texas.

Included in the publication are camping and fishing areas, pageants and festivals, museums and colleges, and things to see and do in cities both large and small throughout the region.

Now in its sixth edition, the Fun and Adventure Map is more popular than ever, according to McLaughlin. Demand for the publication reached a new high last year both for out-of-state and in-state requests, and the regional chamber anticipates even more interest this year.

To obtain free copies of the Fun and Adventure Map and any other literature on West Texas, contact the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, P.O. Box 1561, Abilene, Texas, 79604.

A benchmark has been reached by the Texas Legislature toward the goal of bringing water to West Texas. The legislature has passed a bill which establishes a method for creation of the Ogallala Water Import Authority for the High Plains of Texas.

The measure will enable residents of the 42-county area overlying the Ogallala Formation the opportunity to vote to create a water import authority with the power to bring water to West Texas. House Bill 2205 was sponsored by Representative Bob Simpson of Amarillo, and Senator E.L. Short of Tahoka, who handled the tough job of securing their colleagues' votes.

This was the third attempt to pass water import legislation in Austin. Proposals were presented, but not enacted, during each of the last two legislative sessions, for lack of concurrence among local interest groups. Water leaders decided this year to take a different approach to drafting a water import bill. They worked with all local entities to develop a single draft acceptable to all area residents, prior to the convening of the legislative session.

A notice of intent to file was published in the local and area newspapers and hearings in Lubbock and Plainview were conducted to receive comments from all interested parties. Suggestions for modifications to the bill from local, city and county governments were considered and the result was a piece of legislation acceptable to most area residents and presentable to the legislature.

The bill got its first airing by the House Natural Resource Committee who, in their wisdom, added a number of amendments, the most significant being one to exclude Crosby, Dickens, Borden and Garza counties from the water import authority's delineation.

In the committee meetings, representatives heard both appeals and objections to Simpson's "first step" legislation to allow people in this area to solve their water problem. Lubbock's High Plains Underground Water Conservation District General Manager, A. Wayne Wyatt, testified that this region is "mining its groundwater," and said he hoped the current six-state Ogallala study and others would identify a source of water which might be transported to the High Plains.

Wyatt testified that imported water was needed for all water-use segments of the High Plains including agriculture, industrial and municipal users. "We have a few small

municipalities in dire need of water right now," he reported.

Supporting Wyatt's testimony were statistics from Dr. Herb Grubb, Texas Department of Water Resources Planning Director. He stressed the importance of the Ogallala area's contribution in oil, gas and food and fiber production. Grubb noted that some six million acres are under irrigation in the area, producing 2.5 billion dollars in products annually.

Water shortages will mean decreased production and increased consumer prices. Also testifying in support of the bill were James McCray, President of the Board of

Directors of the Panhandle Groundwater District at White Deer and Jerome Johnson, President of the Board of Directors of Water Inc.

Representative Simpson argued that the basic purpose of this bill was "to try to add to our dwindling water supply because the High Plains faces a critical water shortage within ten to 20 years." But some argued that the bill "put the cart before the horse" and wanted the Representative to present the House with a specific import plan before passing the bill.

Proponents of the measure indicated Arkansas appears to have surplus water beyond all of their future requirements. These surplus

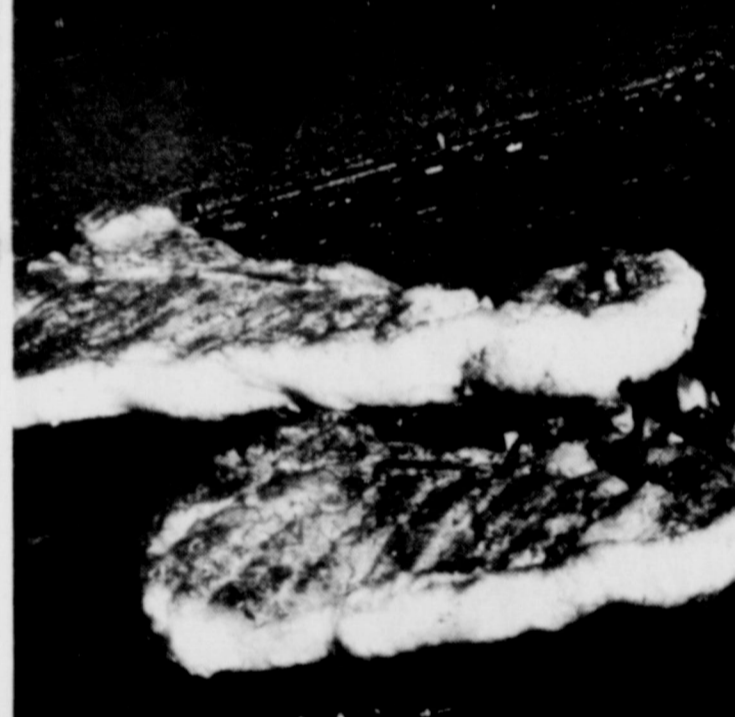
waters appear to be more than adequate to meet the needs of the High Plains, and that water could be transported in canals to Texas through Oklahoma. Simpson told House members there was no definite water import plan as yet, but Arkansas River water imported through Oklahoma was a possibility.

The measure earned its 112 to 28 vote of approval by the House, with Speaker Bill Clayton behind it, but not before opponents of the authority's unlimited power of eminent domain won an amendment to confine, to within the authority's boundaries, its power to condemn and expropriate private land.

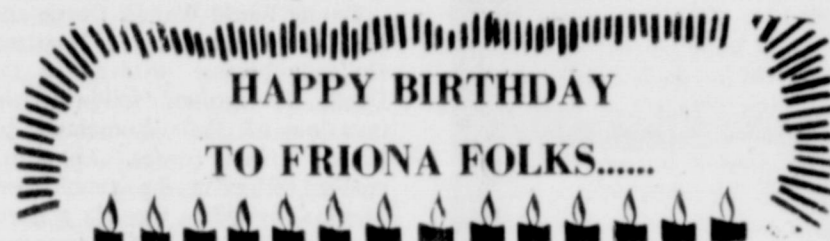

A new color motion picture honoring the life of Corrie ten Boom will be presented at First Baptist Church, Sixth and Summitt Streets, Friona. Entitled "Corrie: The Lives She's Touched," the film, produced by World Wide Pictures, will be shown on Sunday, June 17, beginning at 6 p.m.

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LEARN TO READ YOUR ELECTRIC METER AND SAVE!!!

It will let you determine how many kilowatt hours you use in a given period of time — an hour, a day, a month or a year. That's how electricity is measured — by kilowatt hours (kwh) used.

Your residential electric meter will have either 4 or 5 dials.

Electric meters are easily read from right to left as you look at the meter. If the pointer on a dial is between two numbers, write down the smaller number. When the pointer is directly on a number such as one (1) (see center dial above) then read it as 1. If the pointer on the next dial immediately to the right has passed zero (0). However, read it as zero (0) if the pointer on that dial to the right has not reached zero.

The dials above read from left to right: 9-3-1-1-5. If however, the pointer on the second dial from the right above was between 9 and zero then the center dial would read as a zero.

Now let's read the same meter 24 hours later:

The meter reading is 9-3-1-3-8. Subtracting the first reading, 9-3-1-1-5, from the new reading of 9-3-1-3-8 — the answer is 23. Thus you would have used 23 kilowatt hours in the 24 hour period. Each kwh costs approximately five cents.

When you learn to read your electric meter, you will be able to see where your energy dollars go — then learn to use energy wisely & save!

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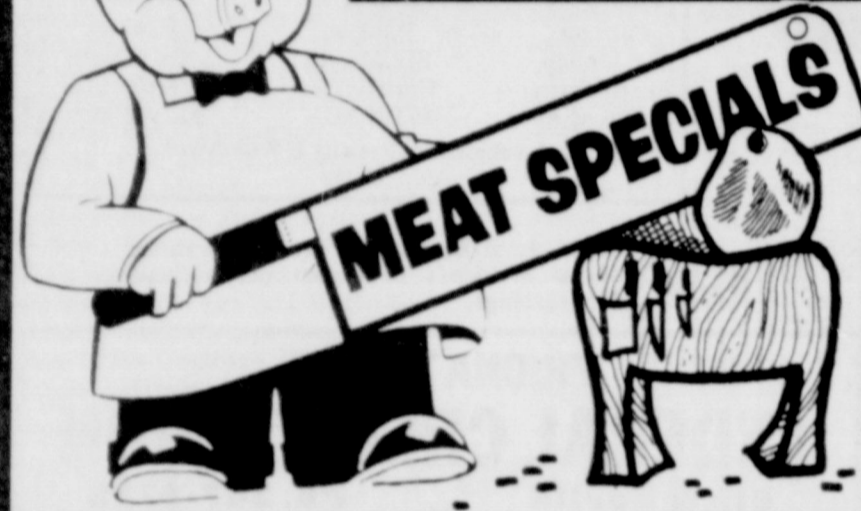
