THE EARLY DATE FOR Maize Days for 1979 may create a few problems for this year's celebration.

The dates for this year's celebration are September 3-8, and whether you realize it or not, that is just around the corner.

Particularly in need of attention is the Maize Queen's contest, whose deadline for entering is now less than a week away--August 24.

Those businesses or organizations who plan to sponsor a girl in the contest are urged to ask their entrant right away, so they may be working up their talent act for the contest.

And those who may have already asked a contestant but have not turned their entry in to the Chamber office are urged to do so at once, so the various forms may be completed, and arrangements can be made for photographing the queen entrants.

It seems that for a number of years, the dates for Maize Days have been getting earlier and earlier, until this year, the deadline for entering girls in the queen's contest actually comes before school classes begin.

This is likely to affect the number of girls who are entered in the contest, since daily reminders of the deadline cannot be made.

Also apt to suffer is the parade, where the classes and organizations, who are annually asked to enter floats in competition will not even have a full week to make plans, design and build their floats. Class sponsors are not even elected until after school begins.

The early date may also make a dent in the number of bands who appear in the parade, since it will cut by at least a week the amount of time the various bands will have to practice their marching and music.

For a number of years, the date for Maize Days has been determined by one factor--the week that the carnival company schedules to come to Friona.

In the early years, when the celebration was getting started, it was hard to attract a carnival, and Maize Days officials had to grab whatever they could get in this regard.

While scheduling of the carnival may still be a problem, it would appear that Maize Days should have a sufficient name that chamber officials could schedule the event for the week THEY preferred to have it, and then put out feelers for a carnival which could come at that time.

Otherwise, if we keep having the dates moved up a little at a time, we're going to be having it during the summer months (it almost falls that way this year), and folks don't tend to get down to a routine until a few weeks after school starts.

Meantime, please realize the earliness of this year's celebration, and help by getting your various entries in as soon as possible.

WE WERE IN PERRYTON this past weekend for the "Miss Wheatheart of the Nation" contest, and got to see first hand some of the problems presented by the record wheat crop in that area, which caused tons of wheat to be dumped on the ground, in the streets, etc.

By now, the biggest part of the wheat had been picked up, although there were still a few piles. And the rains of recent vintage had caused some spoilage, so that when the wind was just right, there was a pungent odor in town that would rival that of a rendering plant.

AT PRAIRIE ACRES

Clayton Lauds Work Of Friona Citizens

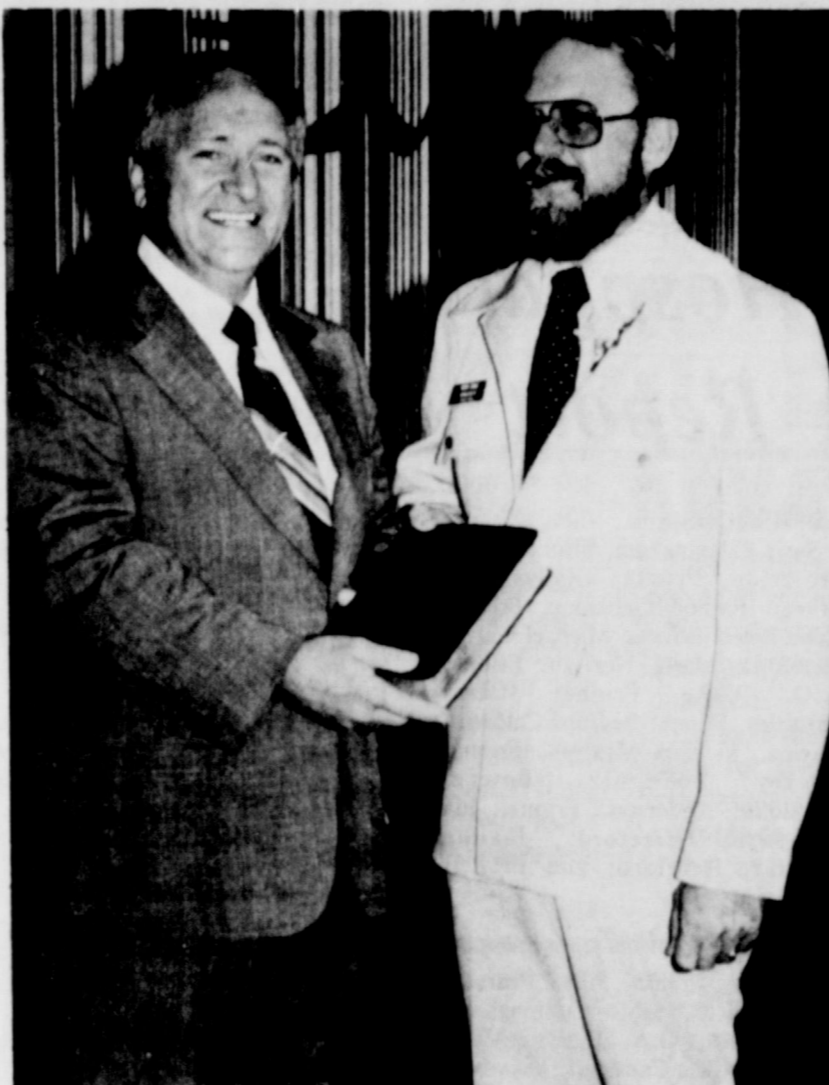
"It does my heart good to see something like this happen in a community like Friona," said Representative Bill Clayton during his remarks celebrating the third anniversary of Prairie Acres last Sunday.

"It's a greater struggle for a smaller community to gain a facility such as this. It's harder to get people to contribute money--although it probably is easier to gain volunteers. So, I guess one probably offsets another."

"You've done a remarkable job here. I hope that other towns throughout this area of the state will look at Friona, as to what you have here, and will try to build

accordingly, facilities for those in need."

"We sometimes pass the buck when it comes to those in need, expecting the government to take care of them. But I'm thankful that my Bible teaches me that we're to take care of our own--and that's what you practice in Friona by putting your own dollars, your own time, and your own effort into Prairie Acres," Clayton continued.

"I'm proud of you for it. I'm proud to be a representative of people such as you in my district who are involved in such a noble effort. I hope someday, before my tenure as a legislator is over, that we'll be able to bring legislative committees who talk about problems in the areas of licensing facilities such as this and others to these areas, so that they can see that we could do a better job on the state level, if we could curtail some of the red tape, and consider the human needs," Clayton continued.

"The program that you observe here, 'To God be the Glory,' could not have been a better one," Clayton said.

"I commend you this afternoon, on your third anniversary, and say that it has been a job well done, but this does not, by any stretch of the imagination, mean that the work is over. It is really just beginning.

"We live in a relatively young area in the High Plains of Texas, when you consider the age brackets, but we realize that some of our number are growing older, and there will need to be facilities like this of taking care of them.

"I see that you were foresighted enough to provide additional acreage, where there would be room for expansion, and you know, it wouldn't surprise me at all, to come back in three or four years, for your sixth, or seventh or eighth anniversary, and see your facility again, and find that there were additional dormitories or facilities that you had built.

"Your interest is going to be maintained in that facility, because you're proud of it, and I'm proud of you for it. I hope that you do expand, and continue to expand, and take care of the need in that area.

"As long as we as citizens of our respective communities will take an effort to take care of those who are in need, then we have a right to say that we are a concerned people, and we will take care of our own, and that we prefer to do it OUR way," Clayton said.

The representative said that as he travelled across the state, he would use Prairie Acres as an example as to what could be accomplished, and as to the type of people we have in our district. I'm proud of you, I appreciate you, you're doing a terrific job, and I know you're going to keep on keeping on," Clayton concluded.

In his remarks, Rev. C.H. Murphy spent some time praising the administrative work of Merv Noah at Prairie Acres. "There is a spirit that prevails when you enter Prairie Acres that is different from most nursing facilities, and that is because the philosophy of the home is not to make it a 'money making' scheme, and because its administrator is called into a ministry of serving people," Murphy said.

Rev. Murphy also commended the community for its expression of faith, and the sense of hope that it has extended. "Certainly Prairie Acres is an expression of Christian faith," he said.

"I also commend you for the example of your love, through Prairie Acres," he continued.

Murphy also extended a challenge to residents of Friona, that they "continue to do the work of Jesus until he comes again," pointing out that a part of this work, as expressed in the Bible, is to care for those less fortunate than ourselves.

Also as a part of the program, musical numbers were presented, by Geary Brogden, the Sixth Street Church of Christ women, and the Summerfield Quartet.

A large crowd of people attended the program at the Friona Community Center, and many of them also visited Prairie Acres during the afternoon.

Details Given For Beginning Of School

School will start in the Friona system on August 27, with pre-registration for high school students on Friday, August 24, according to Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe.

Students who will be new to the Friona school system in 1979-80 are asked to report to their principal this next week, if they have not already, in order to pre-register.

High school students will pre-register on August 24 at 9 a.m., reporting to the high school auditorium.

Students in kindergarten through the eighth grade need not pre-register, unless they are new to the Friona system.

The faculty reports on Tuesday, August 21, for four in-service days.

The school day will run from 8:45 a.m. to 3:45 p.m., although kindergarten through second grade dismisses at 3 p.m. Kindergarten will again run for those five years old by September 1. These students will be dismissed at 12 noon during the first week, and parents

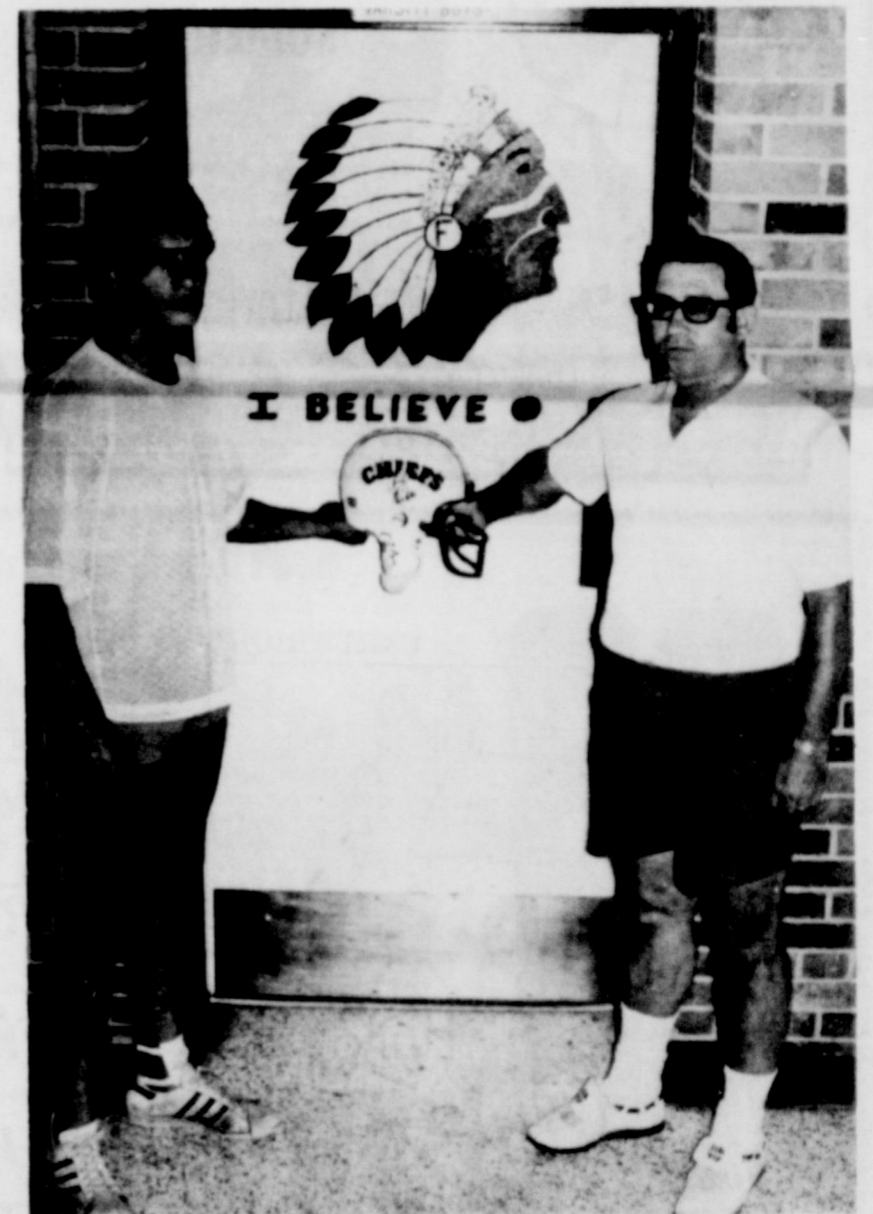
need to make arrangements to pick them up.

Buses will run for the first time on Monday, August 27. The cafeterias will serve lunch on Monday, but the breakfast program will not begin until Tuesday, August 28.

Jarboe announced that due to inflation, there would be a ten-cent increase in the price of lunches this year. High school students will pay 90 cents per lunch; junior high will pay 80 cents, and kindergarten through the fourth grade will pay 75 cents. The breakfast cost will be 30 cents per meal. Extra milk will be sold at ten cents per half pint.

"Our cafeteria showed about a \$3,000 deficit during 1978-79. We have taken some cutbacks in the area of cafeteria workers, but will strive to continue to put out high quality food," Jarboe said.

All parents and students are also reminded that the immunizations specified by the state law will be required before students will be accepted in Friona schools.

85 Players Report For Grid Work

Eighty-five candidates for the Friona Chieftains' football team have been going through two per day workouts this week, in preparation for the 1979 football season.

"This is the biggest turnout we have had since I have been at Friona. This is up from about 60 players who reported for the first week last year," said head coach Lonnie Phillips.

Phillips said he was well pleased with the physical condition of the players, as well as their mental attitude. "We have been stressing mental conditioning perhaps more than physical. The kids have a real positive attitude, and we are proud of that," he said.

The Chieftain head coach said that the 1979 Friona team would be basically a senior outfit, as there are 25 seniors out for the team.

He said there would be some changes in the team's offense and defense for 1979. "We will run from the wishbone offense, with a veer off the wishbone and will use a tandem set for power. Our defense will also have a new look. We think the kids will like it," he said.

After another full week of workouts, the team is slated to hold a scrimmage session against Boys Ranch on either next Thursday at 4:30 p.m. or Friday at 7 p.m.

Phillips said the team would need to be improved over 1978, because it looked as if each of the District 3-AA outfits would have better teams this fall, and in addition, Friona's non-conference slate could also be tougher.

Friona meets Tulia, Lockney, Vega, Farwell and River Road in non-district games, and follows up with games against Muleshoe, Morton, Littlefield, Olton and Dimmitt in 3-AA.

Increase Set For Fees

Fees for soil and irrigation water tests conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service soil testing laboratories will increase September 1.

The increase in fees is necessitated by the increase in the costs of chemicals, equipment and labor, said Dr. Dale Pennington, soil chemist in charge of the soil testing laboratory at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center here. It is the first fee increase in several years, Pennington said.

Beginning September 1, the Extension laboratories will charge \$4 for each regular soil fertility test, which now costs \$2. A test of soil fertility plus testing for zinc, iron and manganese will cost \$7 instead of \$5. Testing for soil salinity, which now costs \$4, will increase to \$7. Irrigation water tests will cost \$8 instead of \$5.

The new fees will be charged by the Extension laboratories at College Station and Seymour as well as Lubbock, and the labs at Stephen F. Austin University and Wharton Junior College, said Dr. Uel (cq) Stockard, state Extension agent, College Station. Kits and instructions for collecting soil samples continue to be available free of charge at county Extension offices.

Even with the fee increase, these tests are still a good investment for the farmer, rancher and homeowner, Pennington said.


Showers Help Cool The Area

Thundershowers in the Friona area helped dent the hot, dry spell somewhat this week, and helped farmers to some extent as they tried to stay abreast of their irrigation programs.

Rain measurements by Jake Outland, Friona weather recorder, were .36 inch Wednesday evening and .27 inch Thursday. A shower on Monday evening had added .06 inch to the month's total.



New Rule Change Should Benefit Grain Farmers

Farmers who grow corn and sorghum will no longer have to dry the grain to become eligible for government farm-stored loans under a program announced August 3, 1979, by Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland. This is in response to requests initiated in 1977 by Grain Sorghum Producers Association.

In the original request for this provision, Elbert Harp, GSPA's Executive Director stated that drying was an unnecessary and expensive procedure, both in money and fuel for farmers. Until this provision, farmers had to dry grain to acceptable levels in order to be eligible for government loans. Bergland said this decision would save farmers both energy and money.

Any producer in compliance with feed grain program provisions will be eligible to apply for such corn and sorghum loans. Loan applications and program details are available at county offices of the department's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Under a pilot program begun last October, farmers in 28 counties in 10 states have been eligible for these loans. This action expands the program nationwide.

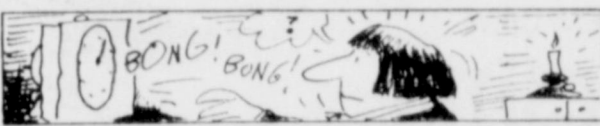
Farm-stored loans on high moisture corn and sorghum will be issued at the loan rate in effect for the county where the crop is stored. However, for every one per cent that the moisture level exceeds the department's "dry grain factor," loans will be reduced 1.2 per cent.

The "dry grain factor" for corn is 15.5 per cent; for sorghum it is 14.0 per cent.

Drying grain with conventional fuels—liquid petroleum gas and natural gas—uses large amounts of energy. Since much of the corn and sorghum stored on farms is fed to

livestock, drying of these grains is not essential as the moisture does not adversely affect the commodities for feed purposes. Making loans available on high-moisture or acid-treated corn and sorghum eliminates the drying requirement, resulting in a less energy-intensive alternate technology that still preserves the

crop for the feed use intended. The program is part of the department's overall effort, coordinated through the Office of Energy, to use existing agencies and authorities to encourage the conservation of fossil fuels by using renewable sources of energy or alternative energy-conserving technologies wherever possible.



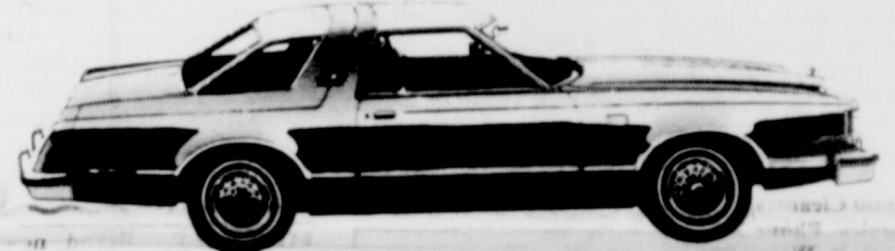

Doug Massey Gives Report

When the American Legion called to tell me I had been selected to represent Friona at Boys State I was very pleased, because my Dad (Leon) had told me about his experiences while there in 1957. It didn't really become a reality for me until I met with over 90 boys from District 18 in Amarillo on May 26 for orientation. Not all of the districts have a meeting such as this so we had an advantage over some of the others as to what to expect.

On June 6 we met again at the airport to fly to Austin to begin a very busy, educational, and fun-filled week. I was just beginning to realize what a privilege it was to be selected to attend Texas Boys State.

After we were signed in we were assigned to a city, a district, and a political party. I was in Hill City, Brown District, and was a member of the Nationalist Party. We stayed in Buford Jester Hall on the University of Texas Campus.

Each boy had a roommate of the opposing political party and usually one from the opposite side of the State. The purpose for this is for each boy to try to win over the other boy to his party and to vote for him at election time.

I decided before I left home to run for a seat in the House of Representatives. I started campaigning on the plane on the way to Austin as did several of the other boys for the position they wanted to be elected to.

I continued to campaign in my city

and district all week to gain votes for the office I sought. I was elected and helped draft one of the three bills that passed when Texas Boys State Congress convened. We set a record of passing more bills than any other Boys State Congress before us. The bill I helped to draft was to set up an orientation program for all of the districts.

Boys State was not all meetings, speeches, and hard work, even though we had political party meetings daily, rallies at night and lots of speeches with each. In addition to the thorough political learning process we had organized sports. Each city had a football team and was entered in a tournament.

Hill City was in the playoffs, and ran a little late one day in getting to the flag-lowering ceremony. Since we couldn't get there for it we watched it, and took pictures from the 10th floor of our dormitory. It was very impressive to see about one thousand boys, all dressed alike, in perfect formation standing on the patio as the flag was lowered for the day.

Besides athletics, some of the boys took their band instruments and formed a Boys State Band that played at the political rallies. It was a very exceptional band.

My Dad told me about a boy that made a campaign speech when he was there and started it by saying, "Well, let's face it, we're all the cream of the crop or we wouldn't be here." I don't say that for myself, but the guys in the band, would certainly fit into that category.

Our trip to the capitol the last day we were there was another highlight.

We held our sessions in the great halls where the actual leaders of our state hold their meetings. I tried to find Congressman Massey's seat to sit in but couldn't find it in the time we had allotted to be seated.

We heard several speeches from different Senators and Representatives including Bill Clayton and Governor Clements. You can't help but be impressed by all of these people, even if you don't always agree with some of their political views and ideas.

As I said good-bye to some of the boys from District 18 when we landed back in Amarillo on June 12, I realized I would never see many of them again, but some I have seen or talked to since then.

Robin Ryan from Dimmitt and I were teased a lot about being school rivals, but became good friends, at least until we meet on the football field here on November 16.

One of the speakers said that Boys State was one of the most worthwhile things that the American Legion sponsors. I agree, and thank them for the experience.
