Jerry Hinkle Wins Contest

THE YEAR 1980 is a census year, we were reminded this week by a piece of mail from the Bureau of the Census, which carried the slogan "We're counting on you... Census, '80."

Among the things which the every-ten-years head count is expected to show will be an increase in the population of the state of Texas of roughly 16 per cent. Texas is expected to show to be one of the leaders in population growth, perhaps topping the rate of the "sunbelt" states of California and Florida.

Certain sections of the country, such as the upper midwest, are expected to show population increases of less than five per cent. New York City, once the fastest-growing city in the nation, is expected to show a decline of less than one per cent.

For instance, the bracket for those aged 19 and below is expected to have declined by as much as 7.7 per cent between the two census figures.

Those in the 20-29 age bracket may have increased by 31.6 per cent, and those between 30-39 should be up by 33.1 per cent.

The 40-49 year bracket is expected to be in the "decline" column, by around 6.2 per cent, but those in the 50-64 age group will have increased by 11.2 per cent, and those 65 years of age and older are expected to have grown by a whopping 24.2 per cent.

So, the new census will probably confirm what population specialists have been predicting all along—that the "average age" of Americans is steadily increasing due to a number of factors.

THE COVER STORY in the current issue of *Texas Monthly* gives some unusual facts about things in our state which are not so big. The article points out that the current era of limits—dwindling oil reserves, devalued dollar and shrinking candy bars—seems to put a premium on things small, rather than large.

And Texas is ready for the switch, the article points out. For instance, the University of Texas claims the world's smallest zoo, which contains almost 300 species of fruit fly.

Horticulturist Ernest Williams of Dallas has developed over 300 varieties of miniature roses, such as Popcorn, Sugar Elf and Toy Clown, which only grow to a height of three inches, the article points out.

Rockwall County, the state's smallest county with only 147 square miles, has the highest percentage of arable land, 67 per cent, while Loving County, the "wee one" in terms of population, provides the smallest drain on the national treasury. "Loving County receives no federal aid, but gets along just fine," says the magazine.

The piece recognizes famous folks who have come from small hamlets in Texas, such as Bob Lilly (Throckmorton), Bob Wills (the mag says Koose, we thought he was from Turkey) and Gene Autry (Tioga).

It also points out that a number of our famous products have been short in stature, such as Willie Shoemaker (5-0), John Tower (height not given), Audie Murphy (5-7), and Ima Hog. The bit calls current governor Bill Clements the shortest Republican governor in the past century (5-9). Political experts will recognize that he wins this honor hands down.

IF YOU HAVE NOT noticed, you will be pleased to note that the "Community Christmas Tree," which was transplanted last year at this time by City of Friona employees in the City Park, has made it right well through its first year, and appears to be thriving.

The tree has been appropriately decorated this week, and will once again have a role in the Christmas activities.

A tip of the hat to city employees for their work in keeping the tree alive.

Jerry Hinkle won the grand championship of the Friona Star's annual football contest, pulling away for a four-point win. Hinkle was awarded \$100 in cash for his efforts.

Hinkle scored 15 correct games during the final week of the contest, to post a score of 209. Richard Wilson, who finished in second place, had a 13 for the week, and finished at 205. Wilson received runner prize of \$25.

Steve Clark captured third place with a score of 205, posting a score of 14 for the week. That placing earned him \$15.00.

Hinkle thus became a repeat winner, having claimed a co-championship with R.L. Blakely of Hereford in the 1977 contest. He also set a new point total record with his score of 209, the highest yet achieved. He and Blakely had scores of 208 in 1977. Hinkle's correct ratio came to 73.1 per cent, which would qualify him as "expert" in the field of predicting.

Finishing in a tie for fourth place, three points behind Clark and eight points off Hinkle's pace, were David George, Kenneth McLellan and Ron Smiley.

Clint Mears had an even 200 score, making a total of seven contestants to score 200 or better.

Hinkle went into the final week

with a two-point lead over Wilson. In the final analysis, he and Wilson had only two differing games on the slate of 22 contest games, and Hinkle won the title by correctly picking those two games: St. Louis over San Francisco and New York Jets over Baltimore.

Scores in the weekly contest were about the lowest of the entire contest period. David Gowens won first place with a score of 17. Gowens was the

McFarland Wildcat At 7200 Feet

Drilling on the wildcat oil well on J.G. McFarland's land northwest of Friona had reached 7200 feet this week, it was learned by the Star.

A spokesman for McFarland said that it was planned to go to at least 9500 feet on the well, and that the last 2,000 feet would be the critical stages as far as discovering oil was concerned.

It is the first wildcat oil exploration project in the area in quite some time. The drilling is being done by American Petrofina, and is styled "J.G. McFarland No. 1," featuring Baker and Taylor Drilling Co., Rig No. 9. It is located 14½ miles northwest of Friona, just across the county line in Deaf Smith County.

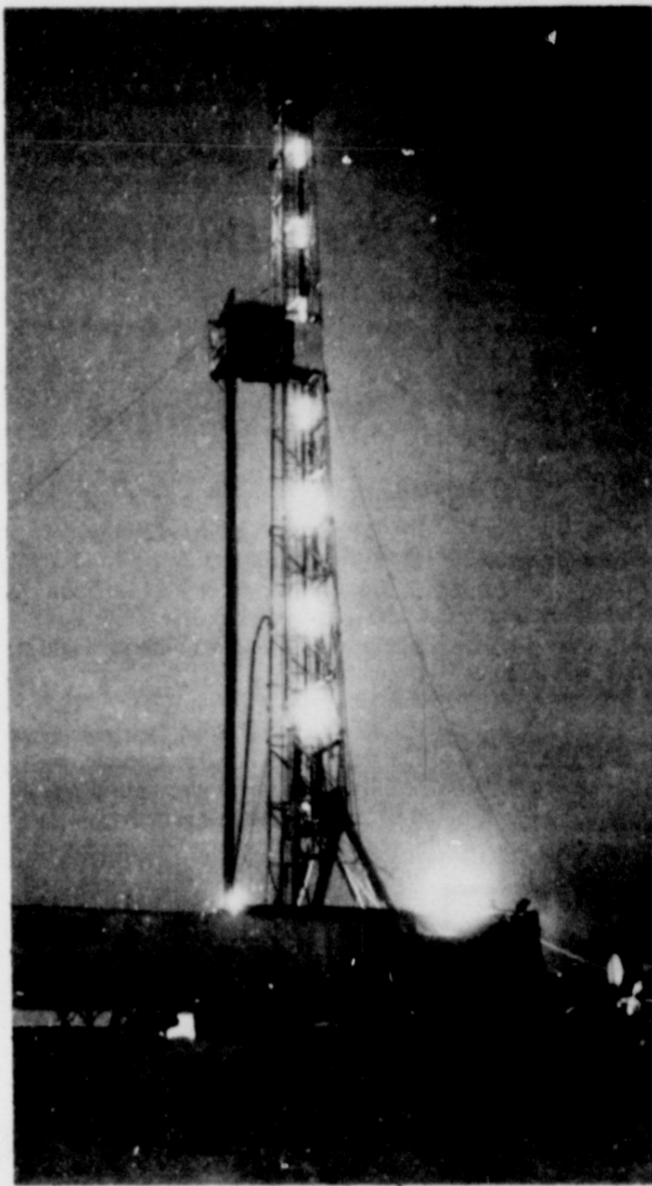
According to the drilling pace, the project should reach its scheduled depth within another week or ten days.

The company considers the project a "closed hole," which means that it does not put out any official information as to findings.

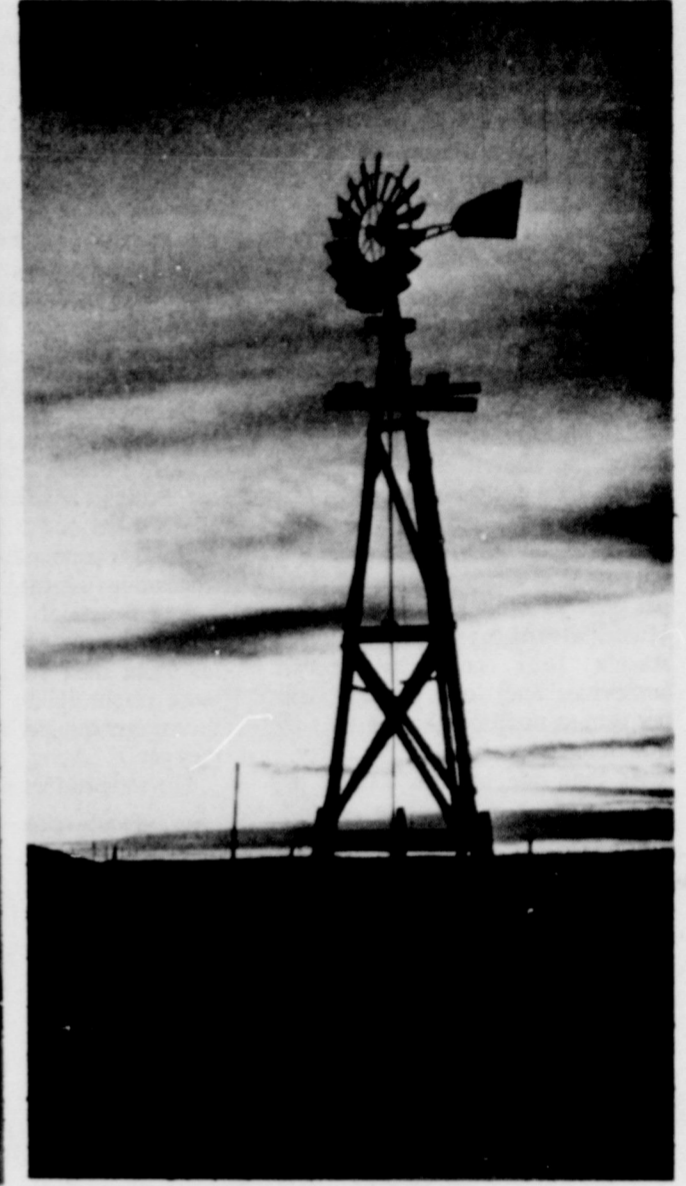
December 15 Is Deadline

Hance Sets Town Hall Meeting Sat.

Congressman Kent Hance will be in Friona on Saturday, December 8 for one of a series of "Town Hall" meetings in the area. The meeting will be held at the Showbarn/Community Center, beginning at 1 p.m.

The Congressman is anxious to visit with residents of Parmer County about their problems, according to a spokesman for his office.

Cong. Hance will speak briefly, giving an update on the situation in Iran and how it affects the country, as well as a rundown on legislation facing Congress. He will then open up the meeting for questions and answers.

Everyone interested is invited and urged to attend the meeting. The meeting will last approximately an hour, according to the spokesman.

Appointment Of New Judge Set Monday

Parmer County commissioners are scheduled to appoint a person to fill the County Judge's office at their regular meeting Monday, December 10 in Farwell.

Paul Fortenberry, who has resigned the position effective December 31, says he understands that several interested parties had visited with the various commissioners concerning the office.

The appointment will be made at 11 a.m. Monday, and any person interested in the position will have until that time to apply, either to Fortenberry, or to one of the commissioners.

Any man or woman can apply for the position, which currently pays \$13,000 per year.

Fortenberry pointed out that whoever is appointed will need to file with his political party chairman by February of 1980 if he or she wishes to run in the May primary. Any other person may also file to run in the primaries. The appointment will be for one year only, and the 1980 election will name someone to fill out the remainder of Fortenberry's unexpired term, which runs through 1982.

Fortenberry expects to train the new appointee before leaving office the last of December.

Duties of the county judge include presiding over civil cases where the amount sued for is under \$500, and over criminal trials for all misdemeanors.

The county judge also serves as probate judge and handles such items as wills, serves as juvenile judge on cases involving children under 16, and as commitment judge for institutionalizing the mentally retarded.

The judge presides over the county commissioners' meetings, serves as the emergency welfare officer for the county, serves as go-between for the county and such organizations as the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.

Response Is Needed In Light Event

Friona residents and business people are reminded that the deadline for entering the Friona Chamber of Commerce's Christmas decorating contest is December 10.

Linda Hubbard, Chamber secretary, said this week that entries have come in very slow to date. Dear Bill:
In 1961 state government turned to the sales tax as a means of getting out of the property tax business.

The tax has proven to be a strong backbone for state government's financial operations. It can continue to be our strong suit--so long as we don't abandon the state's right and ability to turn to it when needed.

But we will abandon that right and that ability if we let the cities, the schools and the counties saddle the sales tax with every increase and every new sales tax proposal they are making.

As Mike Kingston said in the Dallas Morning News, we would be facing the highest sales tax in the nation. I am enclosing a copy of Mr. Kingston's article.

Even if you ignore the schools and the counties, a city sales tax of three per cent as proposed by the Texas Municipal League (along with the state's four and the transit authorities' one) would put us at eight per cent--a number matched only by that financial genius New York City.

At that rate we lose forever the

ability of the state to turn again to the sales tax, and we lose the ability of Texas business to compete with our neighboring states, the rest of the Sunbelt and all other major industrial states--all of whom have lower sales taxes.

Should that come about, there is no doubt that we would ultimately be looking at a state income tax. It has already happened in 45 other states.

Our neighbor Louisiana is a good example. Louisiana's local governments depend on their three per cent sales tax for 42 per cent of their local tax income. By comparison, Texas cities get 8.8 per cent of their local tax income from the sales tax. Hand-in-hand, the state of Louisiana has an income tax and leans on it for 19 per cent of the state's tax income.

But most of all, I can't believe the taxpayers of Texas are willing to take on such a drastic increase in the sales tax. Business pays some 58 per cent of all sales tax and I don't believe the business community wants such a tremendous increase.

And I certainly don't believe that 350,000 people who collect the sales tax from their customers want any more responsibility in this area for the meager one per cent handling fee they get.

The state can be a helpmate to the

cities, but it can't be everyone's Sugar Daddy with the sales tax. There are other options open to the cities, hard though the decisions may be.

The sales tax may look like an easy way out, but it is a shortsighted solution. We would be trading short-term benefit for long-term damage in a state throttled with an income tax and unable to compete in the national marketplace.

FRIONA FLASHBACKS

50 YEARS AGO--DEC. 13, 1929

Beginning last week the post office at Friona receives and dispatches mail four times daily. The regular morning west bound mail and the noon east bound mail will remain as they have been for several years, but instead of these constituting the only mails received and dispatched, there will be an out-going mail in the evening, at six o'clock, and be received by the west bound train that passes here at night, and carried as far as Clovis, where it will be sorted and all east bound mail will be transferred to the east bound train and forwarded to its destination.

45 YEARS AGO--DEC. 21, 1934

The Friona Star trusts that all our readers will read each and every advertisement in this issue of the Star, as many of our business people are expressing to you their appreciation of you as patrons and friends and wishing for you a very Merry Christmas and Happy New Year, as well as calling your attention to the many nice things they have to help you solve your Christmas gift problems.

40 YEARS AGO--DEC. 15, 1939

Emergency crop and feed loans for 1940 are now available to farmers in Parmer County, and applications for these loans are now being received at Farwell by Carl Hill, Field Supervisor of the Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Section of the Farm Credit Administration. This early opening of the loan program in Parmer County is part of a plan recently announced by the Farm Credit Administration whereby emergency crop and feed loans are being made available immediately in all areas where farming conditions are seriously affected this year by drought.

35 YEARS AGO--DEC. 15, 1944

Bills are out announcing the sale by J.T. Gee of his entire herd of high quality dairy cows and milking equipment, at his home in the northwest part of Friona, this Saturday, December 16. There will be at least 29 head of good cows, heifers

and calves, and 12 head of registered hogs, and many other desirable articles.

25 YEARS AGO--DEC. 9, 1954

The Texas Highway Commission has announced from Austin the first step which will set up a new program of work in Parmer County for the calendar year of 1955. E.H. Thornton, Jr., chairman of the Texas Highway Commission, stated that the funds for this program are being derived from state sources. Mr. S.C. McCarty, District Engineer of the Texas Highway Department in Lubbock, Texas, has stated that the following State highways and roads in his area are scheduled for work under this program: Seal Coat on U.S. 60 from Farwell to Castro County Line, a distance of 27.0 miles; Seal Coat on FM 690 from U.S. 84 to 0.5 mile East of FM 299, a distance of 16.7 miles; Seal Coat on U.S. 84, from New Mexico State Line to Bailey County Line, a distance of 10.7 miles.

A new feed, seed and fertilizer firm is to be built in Friona soon, according to announcement this week by E.H. and Doyle Cummings who are planning the operation. The plant will be located across the corner southeast of Houlette's Laundry, the Cummings men announce. They are selling their farm equipment this week, leasing the farm and plan to start immediately on the Friona enterprise.

20 YEARS AGO--DEC. 10, 1959

Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 p.m. for David Randall Price, 13, known to his friends as Randy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Price of the Black Community from the Sixth Street Church of Christ in Friona. Young Price was killed immediately in a one car accident about 7:30 p.m. Monday night as he and a friend, Ricky Bob Coon, 12, also of the Black Community, were returning home from a Boy Scout meeting at the Black Community House. The two boys were going west on a dirt road that parallels Highway 60 after leaving the regular Monday night

scout meeting. According to investigating officer Charles Skinner of the Texas Highway Patrol, the car, driven by Coon, went out of control and skidded down the road overturning in a barrow ditch. Coon was thrown from the car and wasn't seriously injured.

15 YEARS AGO--DEC. 10, 1964

A feature of the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet was the naming of Friona's outstanding citizens. Honored as "Man of the Year" was Frank A. Spring, president of Friona State Bank. Mrs. H.K. Kendrick was named "Woman of the Year." Mrs. R.L. Bates was chosen "Teacher of the Year," and Stanley Bengue was named "Most Courteous Employee." Bengue has worked for Parmer County Pump Company since 1957.

10 YEARS AGO--DEC. 11, 1969

Building permits issued by the City of Friona rang up the register for construction estimated at \$135,400 for the month of November. The total brought the calendar year's total estimated construction in the city a healthy \$923,400 and renewed prospects of a yearly total in excess of a million dollars for the second straight year.

5 YEARS AGO--DEC. 8, 1974

Roy Smith, a junior at Friona High School, was the grand prize winner in the Friona Star's annual football contest. Mary Priest was the grand prize runnerup winner. Joy Morton and Charlie Clark tied for third place in the final standings of the contest, and were awarded duplicate prizes after their tie-breaker scores matched.

Grant Teaff of Baylor, who is top candidate for Coach of the Year honors in the Southwest Conference, has been signed to speak at the Friona High School athletic banquet, scheduled for March 14.

The pheasant season in Parmer County will kick off next Saturday, December 14, and run for three weekends. This year's season runs December 14-29. Usual limits will be in effect.

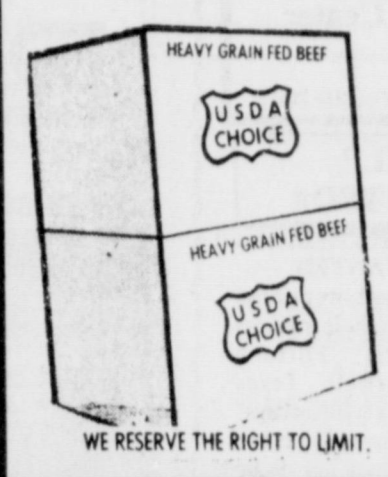

The City of Friona, Texas, desires to submit an application to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) for a Step 1 construction grant to study the City's wastewater collection and treatment system. Step 1 is the first of a three step program aimed at providing the most suitable and environmentally sound treatment facility to meet the future needs of the City. Preliminary indications are that the present treatment plan will need to be upgraded in an effort to increase both plant capacity and treatment efficiency. The citizens of Friona are encouraged to participate in all phases of the planning.

The purpose of this grant application is to analyze the condition of the existing wastewater treatment facilities, develop a preliminary plan for the proposed facilities, and assess the impact on the environment by both existing and proposed facilities. If the study indicates that modifications or improvements are necessary, Friona will proceed to Step 2 to prepare detailed construction plans and specifications, and then to Step 3 grant, which is the construction phase.

A recent study by the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission indicates that Friona will experience an increase in its present population of 3,565 to a population of 4,700 in the year 2000. The existing sewage treatment plant is limited to an average discharge of 210,000 gallons per day, or an equivalent population of 2,100. The increased population will result in increased overloading of the present facilities.

The proposed plan of study for the Step 1 project is available for review from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, at Friona City Hall, 623 N. Main Street. The plan of study and the proposed application will be discussed with interested persons at the December 10, 1979, City Council Meeting. The public is invited to attend and provide written or oral comments. Written comments and suggestions may be sent to: Arley L. Outland, Public Participation Liaison, P. O. Box 595, Friona, Texas 79035.

Lists of interested persons, groups, and organizations will be maintained throughout the project period. Everyone on this list will be notified prior to all significant project activities to ensure ample opportunities for citizen input.

Expanded Pheasant Season To Kick Off

An expanded pheasant season will be kicked off in Parmer County Saturday morning, December 8. This year's season will span five weekends, and ends January 6.

This is the longest season since the first one was held on a one-weekend basis in 1964. The season was expanded first to a week encompassing two weekends, and then to three weekends for the past five years.

The 1979-80 season marks the 16th annual pheasant season for hunters in Parmer County.

According to observations, a good pheasant crop should be in store for the hunters.

More than 2,000 pheasants were released in Parmer County by the Parmer County Game Association in 1962 and 1963, with the population growing steadily since that time.

The more colorful male pheasant is the only legal game for hunters with the hens being protected by state laws.

The "bag" limit is the same as it has been for the past several years: two cocks per day, with four in possession. The season and rules are set by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission.

The later season for hunting pheasants has proven popular, especially with college students. Although a large number of hunters will be in the fields throughout the



season, most of the hunters will be stalking the colorful bird the opening weekend of the season.

Tailfeather contests will be conducted in Friona, Bovina and

Farwell again this year with three cash prizes offered for the longest tailfeathers.

The hunter turning in the longest feather in each town will receive a \$15 cash prize with second place awarded \$10 and third place \$5. The hunter with the longest tailfeather in the county will receive an engraved plaque from the Parmer County Game Management Association.

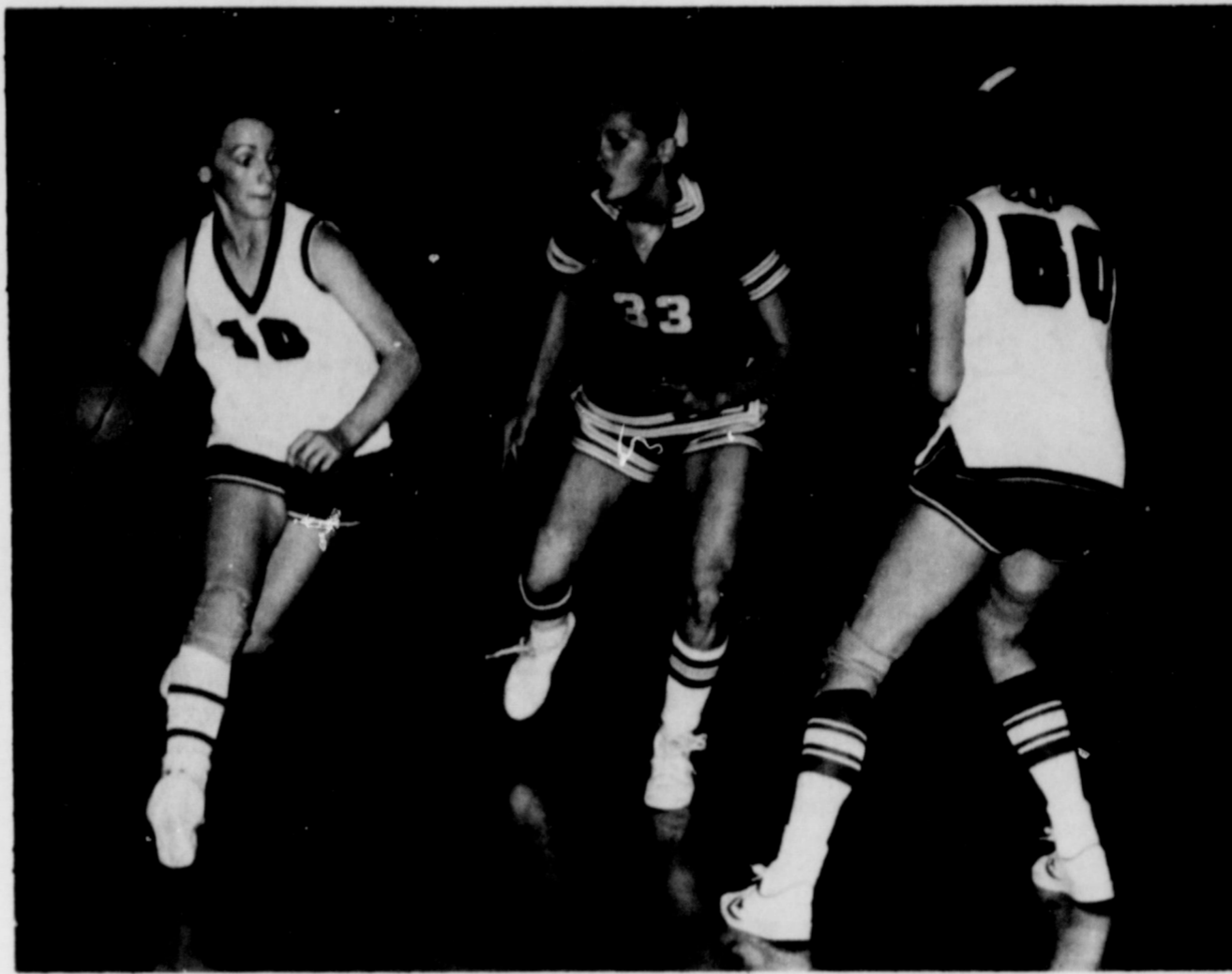
