Porter Roberts Is County Judge

CONGRESSMAN KENT HANCE had some interesting comments at his "Town Hall" meeting in Friona last Saturday on the situation concerning the hostages in Iran.

We wish more county residents could have heard Hance. We think he is off to a good start in representing our district in Washington.

Hance says that occasionally you hear the statement, "Why don't we just give the Shah back to them?"

"You just can't do that. If we do, we open ourselves up to blackmail from every terrorist group in the world. This would cause us severe problems from now on," Hance explained.

Hance reviewed the history of Iran, explaining to the group that the Shah and his father before him had been supported by the United States for the past 25 years, and that the Shah had been a consistent, strong supporter of the U.S. for all of that time.

"During the six-day war, he was the only leader in the Middle East who did not threaten to cut off our supply of oil. In recent years, he also was the only one not to 'jab' us on oil prices," Hance pointed out.

"The fact is, he was our friend for 25 years, and you just don't turn your back on your friends that quickly," he continued.

The Congressman stated that in his opinion the United States has to continue to harbor the Shah until such time as arrangements can be made for him to go to another country.

"Mexico threw us a real curve (when they announced that the Shah's visa would not be renewed). This was something we were definitely not expecting. Now we have to work something out which will be suitable to the Shah, the United States and the other countries," Hance said.

Possibly alluding to President Carter's ultimatum which was issued on Monday, Hance said he believed the fact that the religious holidays are coming to a close in Iran might indicate that something could be worked out within the next ten days.

President Carter Monday announced that if the hostages were not released within ten days, the U.S. would begin serious bids to overthrow the Khomeini government.

"If the people of Iran have a complaint against the Shah, they can go to the world court and file suit against him, to recover their money, if in fact he took any illegally," Hance stated.

"There is only one issue involved in the matter, and that is that 50 people are being held illegally, immorally and unethically; and it is against all types of law, domestic and international. To make a lot of talk about anything else is to divert attention from the main issue," Hance said.

The congressman said he had been proud of the way Congress had stood together, basically, during the crisis. He was critical of Senator Ted Kennedy's remarks concerning the Shah, saying they were completely out of line.

"When you have a national crisis, you have to unite behind your leader. Now, we may disagree considerably when we have closed-door sessions, but when we walk out those doors, we have to act as a team," Hance remarked.

The Congressman said that there was the possibility that one thing good had come out of the situation in Iran. "For the first time in 30 years, there is unification in America. I think we'll see a tougher foreign policy, and an increase in defense spending. This may work out to be a blessing in disguise, especially if we get the hostages out unharmed," he concluded.

Porter V. Roberts of Friona was appointed Monday as acting County Judge by the County Commissioners, and will replace Judge Paul Fortenberry beginning January 1.

Roberts said it also was his intention to file for the final two years of Fortenberry's term, to be filled by the 1980 election. The appointment is to run until the next general election is held.

Roberts was one of three formal applicants for the position. The other two were Elsie Jo Buchanan and Gil Patsche.

"Either one of the other applicants would have done a fine job, I am sure, but since I was fortunate enough to have been appointed, I will do my best," Roberts said Monday.

Judge Fortenberry has promised to work closely with the new appointee through the end of the year, hoping for a smooth transition.

Roberts has been a resident of Parmer County for almost 20 years, coming to Friona early in 1960 from Post. He was in the furniture business for four years, spent 13 years as tax

assessor-collector for the Friona Independent School District, and has been employed by Cook Oil Co. in Friona the past two and one-half years.

Especially active in civic work, Roberts at one time served as manager of the Friona Chamber of Commerce. He is working on his 18th consecutive year of perfect attendance in the Friona Evening Lions, and serves on the Lions' Hi-Plains Eye Bank board of directors.

The new appointee has been a volunteer fireman for 14 years and is a member of the First Baptist Church in Friona.

He was president of the North Plains chapter of the Texas Association of Assessing Officers, and was a member of the American Legion for a number of years.

Roberts is married to the former Jean Tugwell, and they have two children, a son and a daughter.

"We seem to have an excellent group on the commissioner's court, and I look forward to working with them," Roberts said.

Clements Plugs For Energy Production

"I'm familiar with the problems of farmers. My dad and grand-dad were farmers in Kaufman County," Governor Bill Clements told a group of area residents at Hereford Country Club Wednesday.

Clements was the special guest of

the Struve and Welch families, and had come to the Panhandle for the opening week of the pheasant season. He spoke to a group of invited friends at a luncheon at Hereford Country Club.

"The only answer to the nation's

energy problem is the production of energy. Mr. Carter's program on energy conservation won't do the job. We need to turn loose our farmers and producers, and not hold them back," Clements said.

Clements said in regard to his promise to reduce the state's bureaucracy by 25,000 in four years, that he had currently reduced the number of state employees by 4,000, and expected the number to double, to 8,000 by the end of the next fiscal year.

Open House Set For Tri-County

An open house has been scheduled by Friona's Tri-County Savings and Loan Association branch, at the new location on Highway 60.

B.K. Buske, manager, invites residents of the community to visit the new office this coming week, December 17-20, and register for \$300 in cash to be given away after the final day of the four-day promotion.

Visitors will also be treated to coffee and refreshments during the week.

The new office facility was constructed by Ray Dean Fleming, local contractor.

Tri-County Savings and Loan Assn. with headquarters in Muleshoe, has branch offices in Friona, Littlefield and Farwell. The association has total assets of over \$34 million.

Don Harmon is president of the association and chairman of the board. "We are proud of the growth of our Friona branch in the five years it has been open, and feel that our customers in that area will be proud of this new office facility," Harmon said.

Tri-County S&L opened its Friona office in December of 1974. Friona was its first branch office.

"When we reach the figure of 8,000 reductions, this will amount to a yearly savings of \$175 million. We will end up with less bureaucracy, and less government, but better government," the state's chief executive said.

Clements explained that the reduction in the number of state employees had been accomplished mainly through attrition (not hiring replacements when someone quits or retires). There is a big turnover in state employees, he explained.

On the subject of energy, Clements said this was probably the single most important topic for us as Texans and Americans. "It is a national and an international problem, and has an

50 YEARS AGO--DEC. 20, 1929

Six Friona citizens, H.L. Vance, J.B. McFarland, E.B. Whitefield, L.F. Lillard, F.N. Welch and F.W. Reeve, motored to Tulsa last Friday to attend a meeting in interest of the Wheat Growers.

County Commissioner D.H. Meade reports that the stretch of road leading south from Friona to The Hub is now in prime condition, he having just completed thoroughly grading it.

45 YEARS AGO--DEC. 21, 1934

Quite a number of people were in Amarillo on Thursday of last week, representing the various communities and towns of Parmer County at the big Chamber of Commerce meeting that was called at that city on that date. The principle speaker for the occasion was A.D. Skinner of Washington, secretary of the United States Chamber of Commerce. Those attending from Friona were Mayor F.W. Reeve, George A. Heath, T.J. Crawford, Howard Morris, Otho Whitefield, Milford Alexander and County and District Clerk, V. Rushing and County Judge Elect, Walter Lander.

40 YEARS AGO--DEC. 22, 1939

Last Thursday, Friday and Saturday, one of the best basketball tournaments ever held in the Friona gym was staged. There were ten boys' teams and eight girls' teams entered. In all there were twenty-three basketball games played. Many of the visitors expressed their views that they had never been to a better tournament. Mr. Ezell and Wilbur Meade said that they had never officiated in a tournament where more sportsmanship was shown. Dimmitt won first place, Canyon second and Springlake third in the boys' division. Lazbuddie won first place, Dimmitt second and Oklahoma Lane third place in the girls' division.

35 YEARS AGO--DEC. 22, 1944

J.H. Hinds has announced that he will open his new grocery store in the Warren building on Sixth Street, to be known as "Friona Food Market," on Friday, December 22. Mr. Hinds is experienced in the management of grocery and food stores, and has his

store furnished with all modern equipment. He will have a meat market in connection with his regular grocery business. He has lived in Friona for several years and was formerly employed with the Cashway Grocery and Market here.

25 YEARS AGO--DEC. 16, 1954

Over 15,000 bales of cotton had been ginned late yesterday by the three gins in the Friona vicinity. This was not counting several hundred bales still waiting in the yards. Gimmen reported that they were only a day or two behind in most instances, and the cotton harvest seemed to be nearing an orderly completion.

Jackie Rule and Jimmy Norwood were hospitalized early this morning after the car in which they were riding plunged into a highline pole just north of Hub. Neither of the boys was believed injured seriously. Norwood suffered two broken ribs and both had numerous cuts and bruises. Investigating officers believed a blowout might have caused the Norwood car to leave the pavement. The impact of the vehicle on the pole broke an insulator allowing wires to touch, throwing Friona out of electricity for some three hours after the 4 a.m. collision.

20 YEARS AGO--DEC. 17, 1959

With temperatures tumbling from Sunday's high of 68 degrees in Friona to the low 20's Monday a cold front moved into Parmer County spreading damage to rural utility lines and leaving an estimated 1,000 persons without electricity Tuesday morning. The front brought snow to this area which in places drifted to several feet in depth and covered the ground with an estimated fall of about four inches up until late Monday night.

15 YEARS AGO--DEC. 7, 1964

Ground was broken and the foundation poured this week on a building which will house the Friona Star and Graphic Arts Printing. The building, which is to be located between Southwestern Public Service Company and Production Credit Association, will be ready sometime early in 1965.

Wayne Clausen, chairman of the United Fund drive in Friona, this

week requested all captains to turn in their money and prospect lists to him by Monday, so that a "clean-up" campaign may be begun. A total of \$3100 had been raised toward the goal of \$7,000 as of Tuesday.

10 YEARS AGO--DEC. 18, 1969

Friona's outstanding citizens for 1969 were honored last Saturday night at the annual Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture banquet. Louis Welch was honored as the Chamber's "Man of the Year." Mrs. Robert Alexander was chosen "Woman of the Year," and Mrs. Cleo Gauna, of Gib's Cleaners was cited as "Most Courteous Employee." The committee which selected the "Teacher of the Year" from the Friona School system came up with a novel choice when both Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Hodgson were chosen.

5 YEARS AGO--DEC. 15, 1974

Five new directors have been named, plus officers for the 1975 Friona Chamber of Commerce. Elected in recent mail balloting by the Chamber members for two-year terms on the Chamber's board of directors were Jerry Brownnd, Gary Cook, Jay Beene, David Lee Carson and Jim Johnston. Selected to lead the 1975 Chamber as president was George Rushing. Jerry Brownnd will serve as vice president, and Jim Johnston will be secretary-treasurer. The 1974 Project Christmas Card will attempt to raise around \$3,000 to purchase an anesthetic machine for use by Parmer County Community Hospital, it was announced this week.

The fact that a foreign country can hold 50 American citizens hostage, and blackmail the United States for their release, is contrary to everything upon which this country was founded. They are not only holding 50 of our citizens hostage, they are holding hostage our ideals of freedom and liberty.

The American people are action-oriented people and I'm sure that most people feel as I do--they wish there was something they could do to help this situation.

I have been told that the American people can write letters to the Iranian Embassy in Washington--to let the Iranians know that the American people support the President in this situation and want the hostages home safe and sound--but will not stand for blackmail.

I think that it would be helpful if you could publish this address in your paper. I also understand that many people are writing to the hostages in Iran. What better Christmas present could the citizens of Friona give to the 50 hostages, than for each citizen of our town to write a letter to the Embassy in Washington, or to the hostages, and let them know that we support the American President and the American ideals of freedom and liberty.

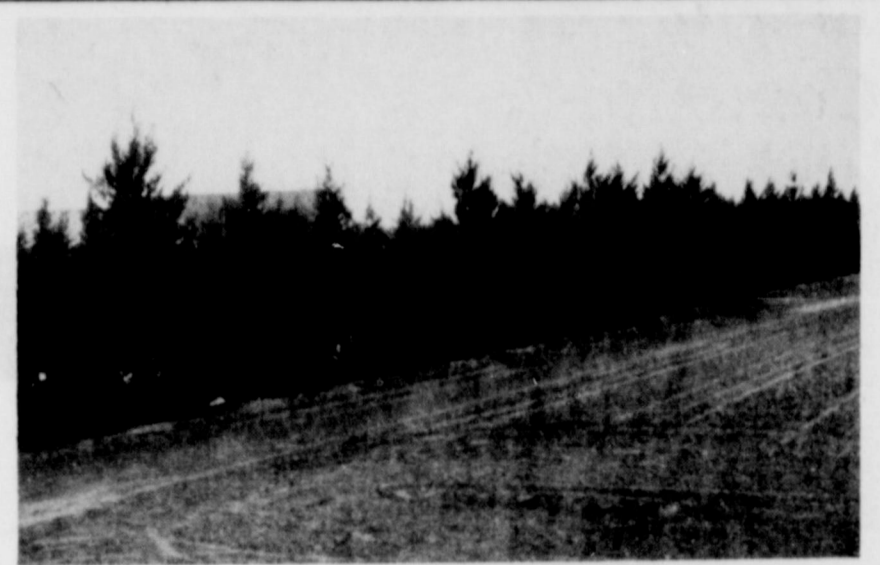

SCS Makes Tree Offer

Savings on the annual household fuel bill can be expected where an effective wind barrier is present. Windbreak trees are available through the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District to establish a wind barrier.

To be eligible for windbreak trees, one needs to have at least two acres of rural land and agree not to use the trees for ornamental or landscaping purposes.

When windbreak trees are ordered through the Conservation District the

cost for potted trees are \$15 per 30 trees or \$20 for 100 barerooted trees.

The District encourages land owners to plant effective wind barriers to protect buildings, cropland, feedlots and for erosion control.

Orders for these trees should be in by January 15 to assure your individual order.

If you are interested in the windbreak trees, contact the Soil Conservation Service in Friona or call 247-2220.

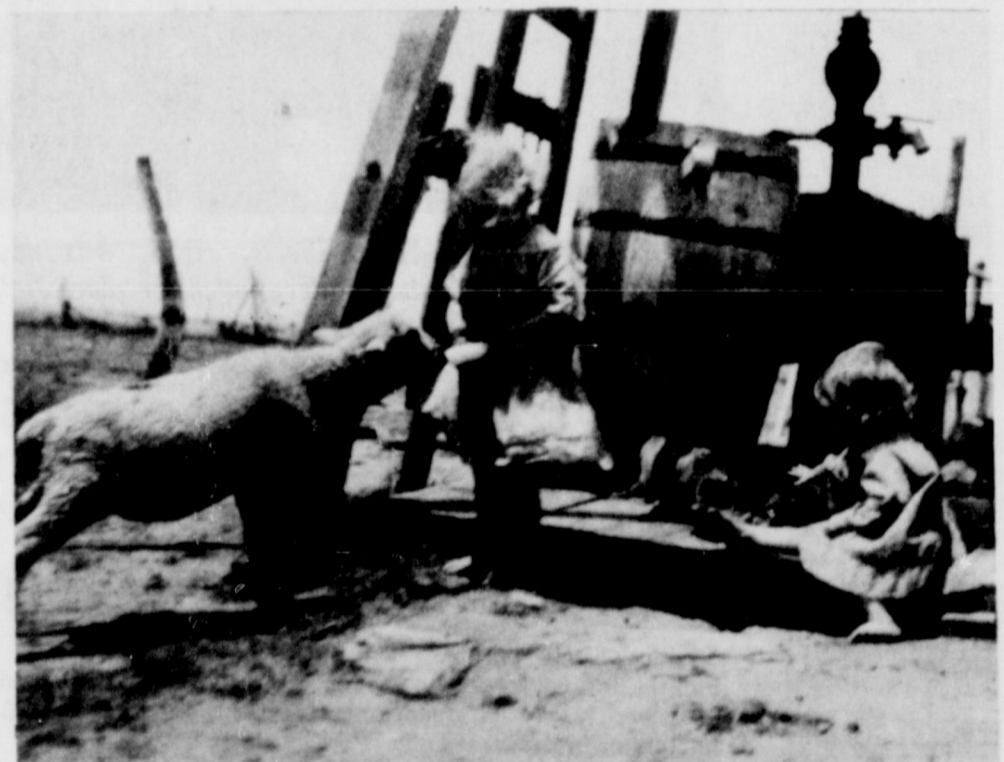

Chiefs Win Trophy In Tulia Tourney

The Friona Chieftains won the consolation championship of the Tulia tournament. A heart-breaking overtime loss to the host Hornets in the opening round cost the team the possibility of being in the championship finals.

Friona led the host team for most of the game, before the Hornets finally tied it up and sent the game into overtime. Tulia then outscored Friona, 10-6 in a three-minute extra period, for a 51-47 win.

The Chieftains rebounded for a 60-55 win over Lockney on Friday, and then took the measure of Slaton, 55-43 in the consolation trophy game.

Jerry Harrelson scored three baskets and a free throw to pace Friona to a 13-8 lead over Tulia after the first quarter of the opening game. The second quarter was a defensive gem for both teams, but Friona went to intermission with a 23-18 lead.

The third quarter was a frustration for Friona, as Tulia went to a press. The Chieftains failed to score a field goal in the entire quarter.

But the Chieftains' defense wasn't letting the Hornets score either, and Friona remained ahead, 28-25.

But Tulia caught up and sent the game into overtime, which proved to be Friona's downfall. Harrelson scored 21 points, a season high mark in a gallant effort for the Chiefs.

After a sluggish start against Lockney, Harrelson's four baskets and Tony Jackson's outside shooting powered the Chiefs to a 19-point second quarter and a 28-22 halftime lead.

Friona's scoring was balanced and their defense adequate during the last half of the game, as the Chiefs recorded their fourth season win. Harrelson's 18 points were tops, backed by Randy Kerr's 12 and Kyle Barnett's 10.

The game with Slaton was close for the first half, until some good third quarter play by the Chieftains began to put some daylight between the two teams. Friona stretched a 23-19 halftime lead out to 34-23, and won the game going away.

Harrelson, 15, Barnett, 12 and Joe Malouf, 11, were the most consistent scorers for Friona.

On Tuesday at Farwell, the team had to go into overtime to subdue the Steers, to post their seventh season win against the pair of losses to Tulia.

The Chiefs had a 14-6 lead after a quarter, and saw Farwell take a 24-21 lead to the dressing room. A 16-point surge put Friona back in front in the third quarter, but Farwell held Friona to five points in the fourth to force an overtime.

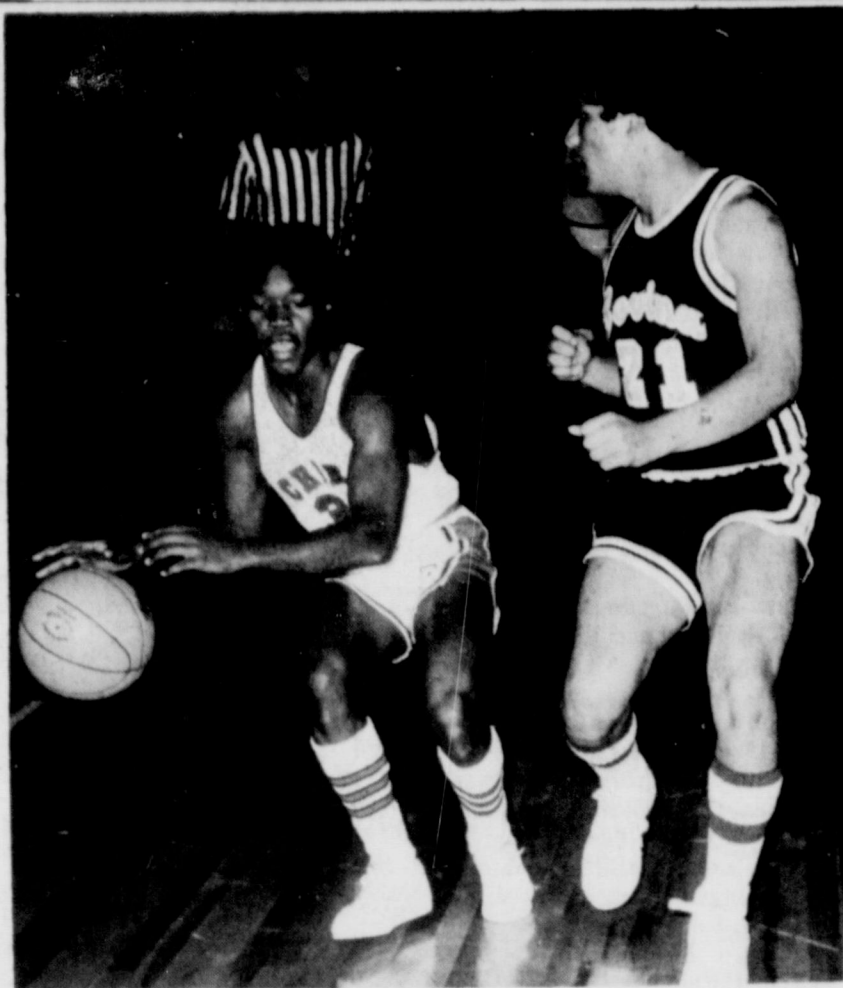

impact on our national security," he said.

Clements said that he had been working closely with Speaker of the House Bill Clayton trying to find a solution to the water problem for this area. The solution depends a lot on other states, Clements said, and he has begun discussing the issue with leaders of some of the neighboring states.

The governor, who was a former defense chief under President Nixon, said the current situation with the hostages in Iran is by far the greatest national crises America has faced in recent years—possibly since World War II.

"The Middle East is without question the most sensitive of any area in the world today. The

implications of the Iranian situation are horrendous. There is no government, as we know government, in Iran at the present time, and the situation is likely to get worse before it gets better," Clements warned.

Clements explained the three issues which he has discussed with the president of Mexico: illegal aliens, energy and drugs. "I feel we're making progress on the issue, but on the alien situation, I seriously doubt that this will come up for serious debate next year, since it is an election year.

"I'm encouraging gasohol every way I know how," Clements said. He said that the state's experiment stations, in the Texas A&M program, were studying gasohol, and he

promised to look into this potential for relieving the energy crunch.

"I'm not sure what other problems might be created, if we increase the price of grain through the making of gasohol, but I feel it's worth looking into," Clements said.

The governor said this part of the state was not entirely foreign to him, as he spent considerable time in Amarillo during World War II. "I helped build the old prisoner of war barracks here in Hereford," he pointed out.

Accompanying the governor were Texas Secretary of State George Strake, president of Hughes Tool Co., Jim Lesch of Houston, and former Houston mayor Louie Welch, a cousin of the hosts for the luncheon.

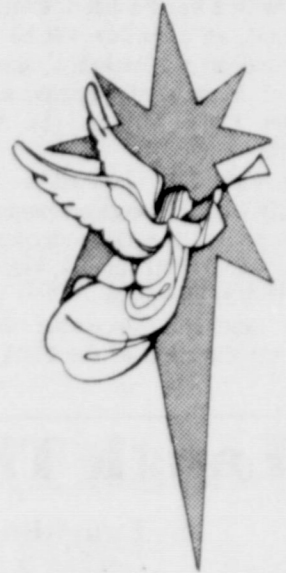

Chiefs Win Trophy In Tulia Tourney

The Friona Chieftains won the consolation championship of the Tulia tournament. A heart-breaking overtime loss to the host Hornets in the opening round cost the team the possibility of being in the championship finals.

Friona led the host team for most of the game, before the Hornets finally tied it up and sent the game into overtime. Tulia then outscored Friona, 10-6 in a three-minute extra period, for a 51-47 win.

The Chieftains rebounded for a 60-55 win over Lockney on Friday, and then took the measure of Slaton, 55-43 in the consolation trophy game.

Jerry Harrelson scored three baskets and a free throw to pace Friona to a 13-8 lead over Tulia after the first quarter of the opening game. The second quarter was a defensive gem for both teams, but Friona went to intermission with a 23-18 lead.

The third quarter was a frustration for Friona, as Tulia went to a press. The Chieftains failed to score a field goal in the entire quarter.

But the Chieftains' defense wasn't letting the Hornets score either, and Friona remained ahead, 28-25.

But Tulia caught up and sent the game into overtime, which proved to be Friona's downfall. Harrelson scored 21 points, a season high mark in a gallant effort for the Chiefs.

After a sluggish start against Lockney, Harrelson's four baskets and Tony Jackson's outside shooting powered the Chiefs to a 19-point second quarter and a 28-22 halftime lead.

Friona's scoring was balanced and their defense adequate during the last half of the game, as the Chiefs recorded their fourth season win. Harrelson's 18 points were tops, backed by Randy Kerr's 12 and Kyle Barnett's 10.

The game with Slaton was close for the first half, until some good third quarter play by the Chieftains began to put some daylight between the two teams. Friona stretched a 23-19 halftime lead out to 34-23, and won the game going away.

Harrelson, 15, Barnett, 12 and Joe Malouf, 11, were the most consistent scorers for Friona.

On Tuesday at Farwell, the team had to go into overtime to subdue the Steers, to post their seventh season win against the pair of losses to Tulia.

The Chiefs had a 14-6 lead after a quarter, and saw Farwell take a 24-21 lead to the dressing room. A 16-point surge put Friona back in front in the third quarter, but Farwell held Friona to five points in the fourth to force an overtime.

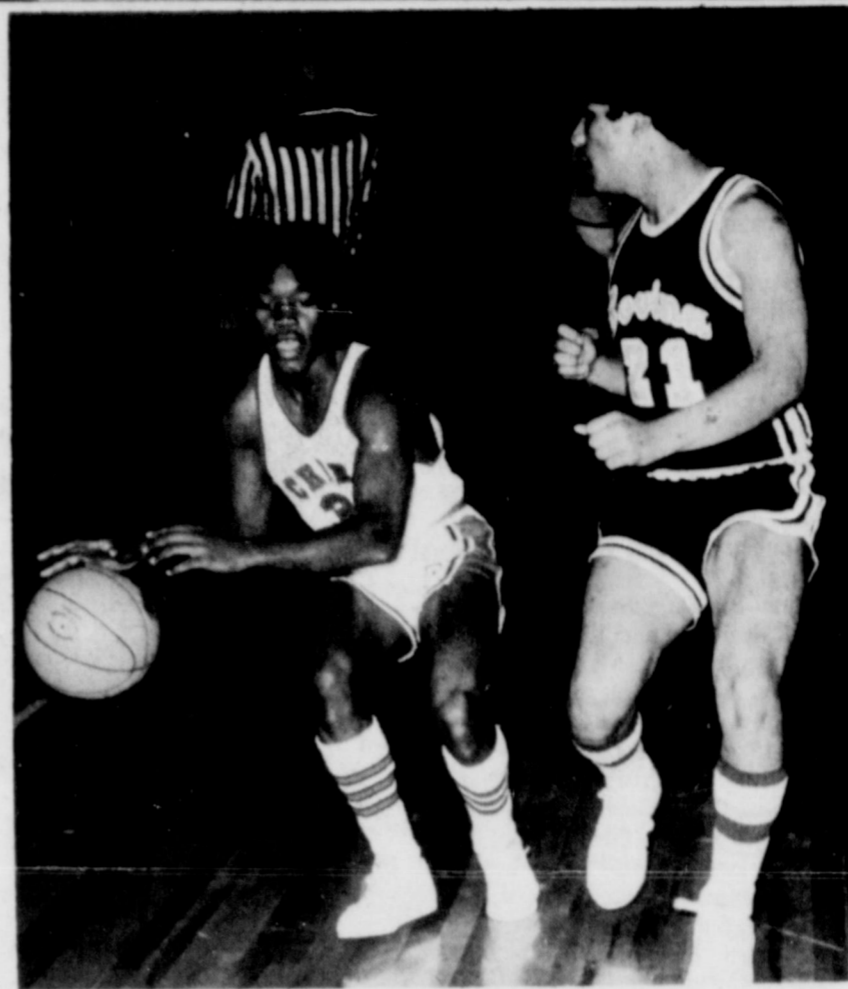
Squaws Have Rough Luck Week

impact on our national security," he said.

Clements said that he had been working closely with Speaker of the House Bill Clayton trying to find a solution to the water problem for this area. The solution depends a lot on other states, Clements said, and he has begun discussing the issue with leaders of some of the neighboring states.

The governor, who was a former defense chief under President Nixon, said the current situation with the hostages in Iran is by far the greatest national crises America has faced in recent years—possibly since World War II.

"The Middle East is without question the most sensitive of any area in the world today. The

implications of the Iranian situation are horrendous. There is no government, as we know government, in Iran at the present time, and the situation is likely to get worse before it gets better," Clements warned.

Clements explained the three issues which he has discussed with the president of Mexico: illegal aliens, energy and drugs. "I feel we're making progress on the issue, but on the alien situation, I seriously doubt that this will come up for serious debate next year, since it is an election year.

"I'm encouraging gasohol every way I know how," Clements said. He said that the state's experiment stations, in the Texas A&M program, were studying gasohol, and he

promised to look into this potential for relieving the energy crunch.

"I'm not sure what other problems might be created, if we increase the price of grain through the making of gasohol, but I feel it's worth looking into," Clements said.

The governor said this part of the state was not entirely foreign to him, as he spent considerable time in Amarillo during World War II. "I helped build the old prisoner of war barracks here in Hereford," he pointed out.

Accompanying the governor were Texas Secretary of State George Strake, president of Hughes Tool Co., Jim Lesch of Houston, and former Houston mayor Louie Welch, a cousin of the hosts for the luncheon.

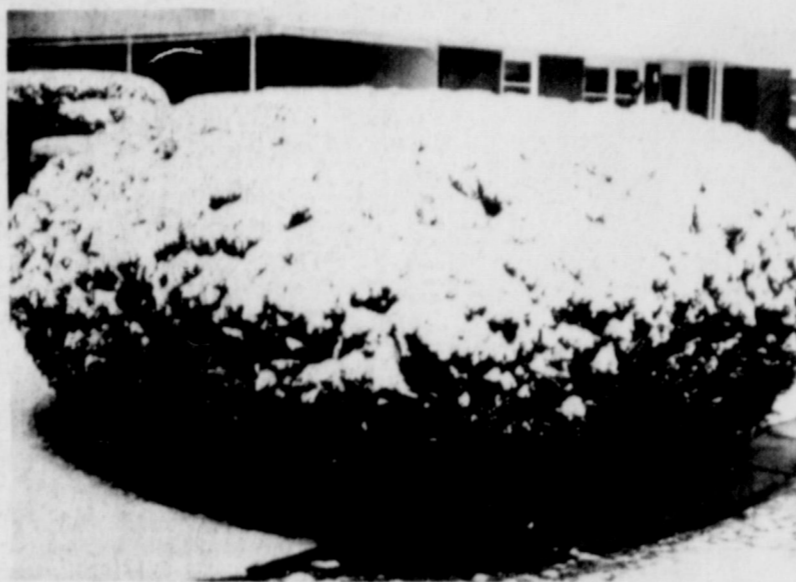

Around The Firehouse

The Friona Fire Department suggests these tips for a safe Christmas:

*Be certain all lighting sets are UL-approved.

*Test each light set before mounting lights on your house or tree.

*Don't overload electrical circuits, and use only proper fuses.

*Hang your lights only with the clips provided or tie with wire. If they have to be tied, be sure the lights do not touch any flammable surfaces.

*Test all outdoor lights inside and away from any damp or concrete surfaces.

*Use only insulated staples or screw in hooks for hanging outdoor lights. Bare staples could crack the insulation and cause a short.

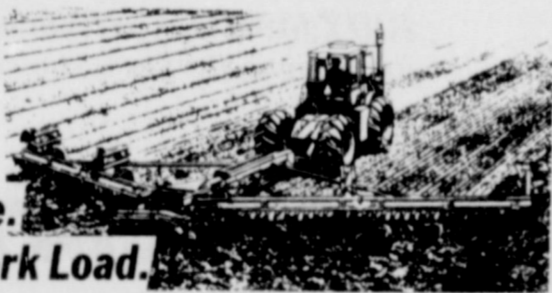

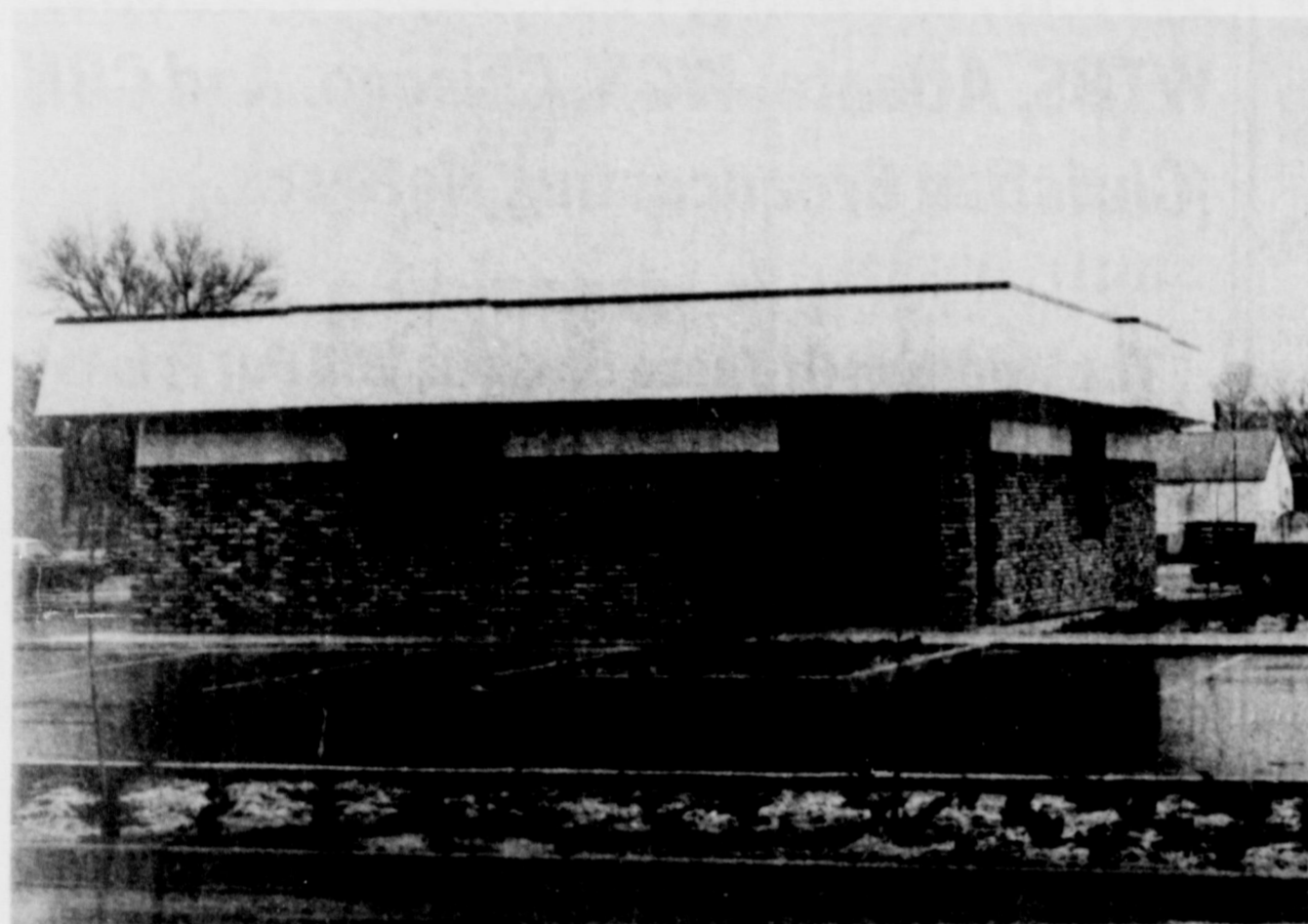
