## Friona Industries To Acquire Ohio Packer

Friona Industries, Inc. has entered into a letter of intent to acquire all of the stock of Village Packing Company of Columbus, Ohio, it was

announced this week by Ron Davenport, president, and Dick Falter, president of Village Packing.

Under the arrangements of the proposed transaction, Friona would exchange 635,000 shares of its common stock for the Village Packing capital stock, all of which is held by Dick and Chuck Falter. Friona's common shares closed Friday on the American Stock Exchange at \$9.50 per share.

The acquisition must be approved by the Falter and majority of the Friona shareholders. Friona management anticipates postponing the Company's annual meeting of shareholders from the regular date of November 7, 1979, until mid-December in order to have sufficient time to submit detailed information on the proposed acquisition at the annual meeting.

Village Packing would become a wholly owned subsidiary of Friona. The management, including Dick Falter as president and Chuck Falter as vice president, and employees of Village Packing would remain intact and the subsidiary would continue to be headquartered in Columbus, Ohio.

Village Packing is the largest single supplier of hamburger meat to the Wendy's International, Inc. chain of more than 1,600 fast food restaurants.

Village Packing has sales in excess of \$50 million annually with plants in Columbus, Ohio and Atlanta, Georgia. The Company also has an interest in a plant in San Antonio, Texas.

"We consider Village Packing to be a natural adjunct to our agribusiness operations," commented Davenport. "There is excellent potential for additional expansion of Village Packing's operations."

Friona Industries is an agribusiness firm primarily engaged in the

manufacture and sale of commercial cattle feeds, the retail marketing of animal health supplies, custom cattle feeding and the sale of company-owned cattle.

For its fiscal year ended June 30, 1979, the Friona company reported record net income of \$4 million, or \$2.53 per share, on revenues of \$91.1 million. This compared with net income of \$2.6 million, or \$1.66 per share, on revenues of \$67 million in fiscal 1978, which had been the previous record-setting year.

### Events Scheduled

The annual Maize Days parade will be held at 10 a.m. Saturday, followed by a Six-Gun shootout, and a barbecue in downtown Friona, as the city's 23rd Maize Days celebration heads into its final day.

### Electrifying beef promotes tenderness

COLLEGE STATION — Six hundred volts of electricity jolt the beef carcass 15 times over a one-minute period. The result is pure tenderness. The cost is 25 cents a steer.

Called electrified beef, the process tenderizes meat without chemicals, says Dr. Gary Smith, a Texas A&M University animal scientist. Smith is a member of a team of Texas A&M researchers who developed the meat tenderizing process.

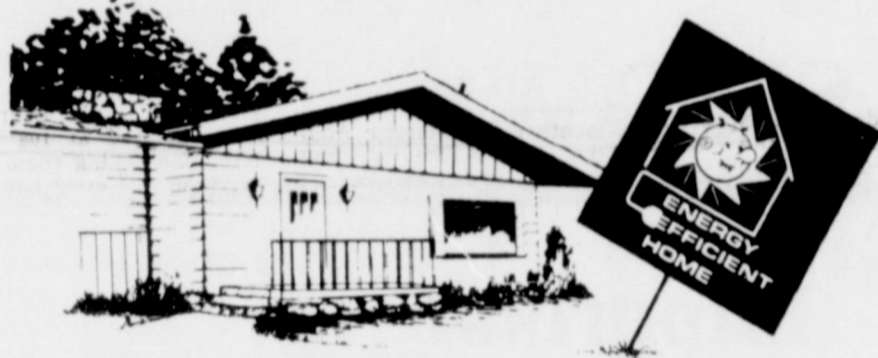
Smith notes the electric shocks change the acid base of the muscle tissue, which makes up 60 percent of the total carcass. Under normal conditions, the muscles shorten as the beef cools, and short muscles mean tough meat. If the shortening can be stopped, the result is tender meat.

There are now 25 electrical beef tenderizing machines in operation in the United States, with seven of the largest in Texas. Smith says, however, that the number should soar to some 300 in this country and by an equal number abroad once the machine is officially cleared by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration, which began an investigation of safety features on the machine in April.

### SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1979

#### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 108)

House Joint Resolution 108 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution relating to the appointment and terms of notaries public. The proposed amendment would:

—Require the Secretary of State to appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for the state; and

—Authorize terms of office of Notaries Public of not less than two years nor more than four years.

—To provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department;

—To prescribe conditions for rules to take effect;

—To provide for suspension, repeal, or expiration of rules;

—To prescribe procedures; and

—To delegate powers to either or both houses or to committees of either or both houses.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for legislative review of

the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds called "Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds" of the State of Texas not to exceed 10 million dollars. All money received from the sale of such bonds would be deposited in a separate fund with the State Treasurer and administered by the commissioner of agriculture without further appropriations. These funds would be used to guarantee loans for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate. The commissioner of agriculture would use these funds, under provisions to be prescribed by the Legislature for the purpose of guaranteeing loans used for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate, to acquire real estate mortgages or deeds of trust on lands purchased with guaranteed loans. These funds would also be used to advance to the borrower a percentage of the principal and interest due. The Legislature may also authorize the commissioner of agriculture to sell at foreclosure any land acquired in the manner authorized by this amendment. The commissioner of agriculture would be required to charge at least 6 percent interest on such loans. The proposed amendment appropriates an amount that is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that mature or become due during the fiscal year less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans for purchase of farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers by the sale of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas."

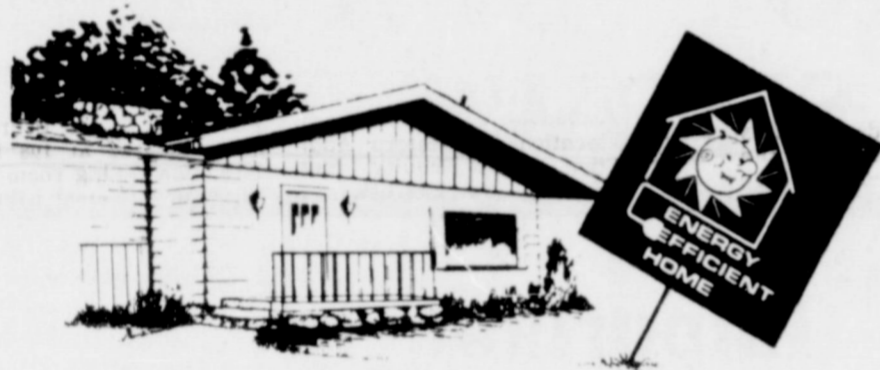

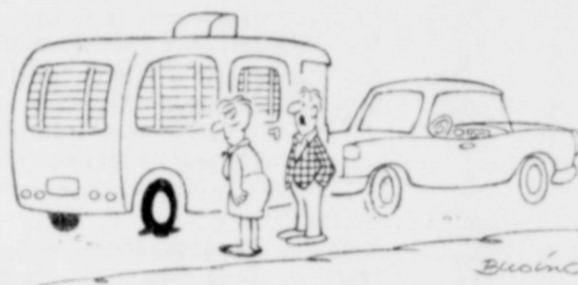

"La enmienda constitucional para autorizar a la Legislatura para que provea una garantía para que las personas calificadas puedan obtener préstamos para la compra de bienes raíces agrícolas y ganaderas."

## Church Observes New Building Service

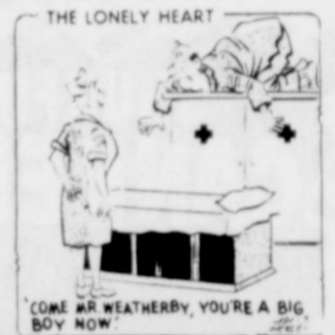
