WE ARE A LITTLE PERPLEXED by the action by the United States government in recent weeks, in receiving the thousands of Cuban refugees in Florida.

In fact, one official was quoted this week as saying, in response to a question as to how many of the refugees that America would accept: "We'll take them until Fidel Castro is the last one left to grow cane in Cuba."

This "open door" policy to the Cuban refugees raises questions from a number of angles. For one thing, the national news last week told of a record number in the unemployment ranks. Why would we welcome unlimited numbers of refugees when we're already short on jobs?

Our nation, according to certain economists, is heading for a recession. Energy is in short supply. Is this the time to throw out the book on America's immigration laws?

For the last two decades, Americans have been told to cut down on the size of their families. In recent years, officials have even pushed the "zero population growth" theory, where a married couple is urged to have no more than two children, thereby merely replacing themselves in the reproductive cycle.

Did we cut down on our family size, conserve energy and all of the other things our government has asked us to do, so we could open our doors to these communist refugees.

An ex-military member also asks if our leaders are so sure that some of these refugees may not be combat trained, to infiltrate among our citizens and plot some communist scheme. Since we take them "carte blanche," we would be laying ourselves open to such a plot.

Receiving the refugees may be the Christian thing to do, but somehow we wonder if it's really fair to the law-abiding American citizen, who is finding it harder and harder to make ends meet, while complying with the wishes of big-brother government.

AN IMPORTANT DECISION is coming up which affects all residents of Parmer County.

It involves the new Parmer County Tax Appraisal Board, which is meeting Monday in Farwell to consider where to locate the new county office.

An offer has been made from an anonymous donor to pay for construction of the office—estimated at \$50,000, if it will be built in Farwell.

The board has considered locating the office in Friona, Bovina or Farwell.

Some residents with whom we have visited have indicated that the initial cost of the building is not as important a factor as the extra driving which would be required by county residents to visit the tax office, and urge a more central location, or one which would better serve the majority of county taxpayers.

If you have a thought on the subject, or wish more information, the board members are listed in the adjacent news article.

This is one of those tough political decisions which comes along, but one in which the majority of Parmer County citizens should be considered.

LAST WEEKEND'S DEMOCRATIC primary ended the term of office of County Democratic Chairman Hollis Horton, who held the term for the past eight years.

We would like to publicly thank Hollis for a job well done. This is one of those thankless, "freebie" jobs which someone has to do, and sometimes, finding someone to do the job and do it well, is a hard matter.

We appreciate the good work by Hollis, and for the fine way he always has supplied us with voting information, both before and after the elections. We'll look forward to working with Richard Collard in this capacity.

Area Gets Million-Dollar Rainfall

The Friona area received the best rain for 1980, in fact the most soaking rain in some nine months this week, with farmland logging more than two inches in parts of the area.

The week started off on the right foot, when a slow-falling, soaking rain fell during the late evening on Monday, continuing past midnight. The official measurement in Friona for that rainfall was 1.14 inches, and it was fairly general around the area.

A part of the Rhea area received some bad hail damage during the Monday night rains, but the damage was apparently limited. Damage was reported by the Potts families and Norman Taylor, although Jim Dixon, who farms to the east, said he missed the hail.

A cold front moved through the area on Wednesday, dropping temperatures and triggering more showers which were accompanied by some hail-bearing clouds.

The city of Friona had a light "storm" about 9 p.m. Wednesday, when marble-sized hail fell for a time, along with some rain.

Many residents were awakened just before 2 a.m. later that night by more hailstones, which fell for a short time and gave way to additional showers.

The official measurement of rainfall on Thursday morning was .47 inch, although farmers in the outlying areas indicated they received up to an additional inch of moisture from the Thursday morning thunderstorm, both north and south of Friona.

It had been reported that some golf-ball sized hailstones fell in the southeastern part of the area, but one Lazbuddie farmer reported only rainfall for the week.

The moisture should be a God-send for the young crops. Most of the corn and milo has been planted, and if not already up, the good moisture will get it up to a good start.

Roberts Scores Win

Porter V. Roberts, who was appointed as Parmer County Judge in late 1979 by the Commissioner's Court, was elected to fill out the final two years of former judge Paul Fortenberry's term in the Democratic primary last Saturday.

Roberts actually won the Democratic nomination, but will have no Republican opponent in November.

The Friona resident won eight of the nine voting boxes in the primary vote, as his opponent, Jo Buchanan, won only her home box in the Lakeview community, 26-8. This is unfortunately for the challenger, the smallest voting precinct in the county.

Roberts had a big lead in Friona,

383-162, and Buchanan's only other threat for a precinct lead was at Black, which went to Roberts, 21-19. He also won the absentee box, 30-11. The final tally was 857 votes for Roberts (62.5 per cent) to 515 for Buchanan (37.5 per cent).

Friona and Parmer County gave a large victory margin to Bill Sarpalius in the race for the state senate nomination. Sarpalius received 395 votes (73.7 per cent) to 141 for Gerald McCathern (26.3 per cent).

McCathern's only bragging rights came at Lazbuddie, where he carried the box, 82-34, and tied Sarpalius, 20-all at Black. Sarpalius received 867 votes in the county, or 64.5 per cent.

Building Decision Set

In a meeting Monday night, the newly-organized Parmer County Tax Appraisal Board withheld a decision on accepting the anonymous donation of a building to house the board. The board will meet again Monday, May 12, to make the decision.

Parmer County Commissioners Court met in a special called meeting Wednesday, April 23, to consider the donation of the building. The decision of the Commissioners Court was to consider the acceptance of the building contingent upon the approval of the Tax Appraisal Board.

According to Judge Porter Roberts, the vote to consider the acceptance of the building is not legally binding.

"After the Tax Appraisal Board makes its decision on the building, the Commissioners Court will meet in a legally advertised meeting to make

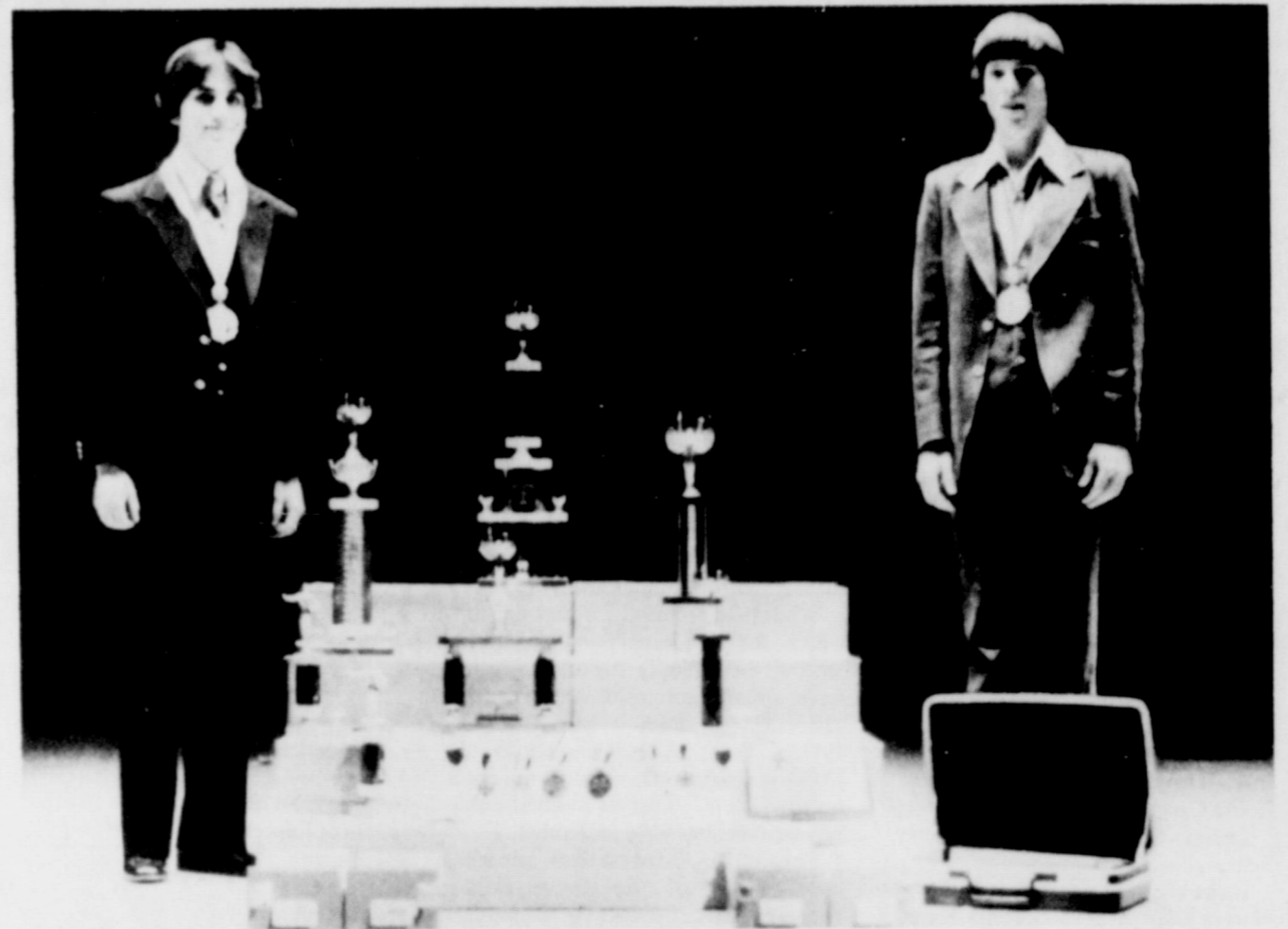
the final decision. We will take the decision and desires of the Tax Appraisal Board into consideration when making our decision," said Roberts.

The question concerns the anonymous offering of a building to house the Tax Appraisal Board. The building will cost the county nothing except for the expense of the pavement around the building.

The construction of the 30'x40' all-brick building will cost approximately \$50,000 and take about 75-90 days to complete.

There is only one stipulation attached to the building: that it be constructed on the northwest corner of the Parmer County jail.

The new Tax Appraisal Board consists of E.A. Parham, Lawrence Jamerson, David Grimsley, D.C. Herring and Gilbert Kaltwasser.

SHARLA TAKES THIRD

'Blank & Zank' Win State In Debate!

Three members of Friona High School's Speech and Drama Department concluded a very successful year for the department by bringing home a state championship in debate plus a third place medal in prose reading.

Mark Blankenship and Mark Zachary, known by most of their SPRAMA teammates and opponents across the region as "Blank & Zank," had a great tournament in the debate division, winning all four of their matches, and brought home the coveted gold medals from the state UIL tournament. Sharla Duggins won the third place medal in prose reading.

It was the first-ever debate championship for FHS, and the first gold medal in the speech UIL events since 1970, although Friona has brought home other medals in the meantime.

Blankenship and Zachary downed the team from Field High School of Orange in the first round, and then polished off Midlothian in the second round.

In the third round, they downed Kyle Hays. This was an important win, because it earned the team the state finals round.

In the finals, they were up against Kermit, the team which had scored a decision over Friona in the regional finals earlier. The FHS duo evened the score with the Kermit team, when it counted the most.

"Blank and Zank" drew the negative position for each of their rounds, and say they feel more comfortable arguing negative side. In the second, third and fourth rounds, they were up against regional champions.

The Friona team's 4-0 record in the state tournament put the cap on an ultra-successful year in which the FHS number one debaters won five championships, four second places and one third in 12 outings.

During the course of the year, the FHS duo compiled a 56-7 record, winning 88.9 per cent of their matches. Four of their seven losses came in tournament finals, where they still earned the silver medals.

The FHS debaters scored wins in tournaments at Brownfield, Tascosa, Levelland and West Texas State University, in addition to the state meet. The two debaters are juniors, and have been paired as a debate team since their freshman year at FHS.

"Lady luck is always important in achieving success, however dedication and hard work are necessary to win the race," said Joy Morton, speech and drama coach.

Miss Duggins, who had been the silver medal winner at the regional meet, read a pair of James Thurber selections, "The Bat Who Got The Hell Out," and "The Bragdowdy and the Busybody," in her preliminary rounds at Austin. In the finals she read "The Lonely One" by Ray Bradbury.

All three readers from Region 1 made it to the finals. There were 12 students in the event.

The last UIL state title claimed by a FHS student was by Skip Sirnic (Mohr), who won the gold medal in extemporaneous speaking in 1970. Sirnic is now the pastor of Friona's Union Congregational Church. Crista Evans won a gold medal in poetry reading in 1968.

In 1974, Friona's debate team of Trip Horton and Mickey Harrelson battled to the state finals, only to lose a controversial 2-1 decision, having to settle for the silver medal. In last year's state meet, Kipi Fleming won the third place medal in headline writing.

Sheriff's Report

Parmer County Sheriff Charles Lovelace reports that his department is investigating the theft and vandalism of a pickup and a tractor at Bovina early this week.

A 1976 Ford pickup belonging to Bovina Pump Company and a John Deere tractor belonging to Tom Beauchamp were reported taken Sunday night and were discovered near Bovina Monday morning. Sheriff Lovelace said that both vehicles received damages amounting to thousands of dollars. The tractor had been left with its motor running and it was missing one rear wheel. Much damage had been done to the vehicles and to the road where the tractor had plowed through it.

One person has been arrested in the case and is being held in jail at Canyon, and two other persons are expected to be arrested in the case, Sheriff Lovelace said.

In other activities sheriff's officials are investigating the theft of some \$150 from the agriculture department at Bovina Schools. Entry was made by breaking a window and the money was taken from an unlocked filing

cabinet. Sheriff Lovelace said that the filing cabinet can be reached by a person at the window and said that this was the second time in only a few months that a theft of this nature had occurred at this ag room.

The Co-op Gin south of Friona reported that some \$200 worth of

batteries had been taken from tractors on the gin yard.

Zenon Gutierrez of Friona has been picked up in Phoenix, Ariz., and will be returned here as soon as he signs extradition waivers. He is wanted here for violation of probation the sheriff said.

Test Scores Available

School administrators announced this week that they have received the results of the new system-wide testing program adopted by the board of education for the 1980-81 school year.

Results are now being evaluated and plans have been formulated to get the information in the hands of teachers, parents, students and other interested parties.

The school board adopted a plan to test students in achievement during grades K, 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 7, 9, 11 and to evaluate school ability in grades 3, 5, 7, and 9.

In addition to the board-adopted program, Texas schools were

required by law to test grade 5 and 9 with an instrument known as the Texas Assessment of Basic Skills.

The grade 5 test is designed to check to see how many of our local students have mastered the objectives for that grade level.

The grade 9 test is designed to see how many ninth graders have already mastered the minimum competencies for high school graduation. The TABS test measures achievement in reading, writing and math.

Parents are encouraged to call the school for appointments to discuss the test results on their child.

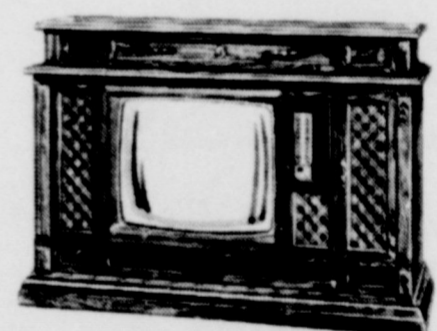

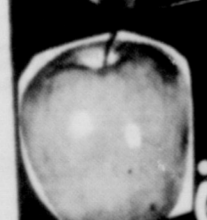

It will be the last interscholastic competition for FHS this school year, and will end the varsity careers of four of the five athletes.

Joe Malouf was to get the competition underway for the Friona contingent in the long jump, which was to begin at 2 p.m. Friday.

The mile relay foursome of David Fleming, Robert Alexander, Rod Owen and Chitto Caballero, will compete in the last event on the day's schedule, slated for 9:15 p.m. Friday night.

Also accompanying the team to Austin as an alternate was sophomore Nelson Jackson. All of the team members competing are seniors with the exception of Caballero.

"I feel like we have a good chance to win a medal in the meet," said Coach Robert Mears this week on the eve of the state meet.

He pointed out that one of the class AA teams entered in the state meet had run the mile relay in something like 3:18, compared to Friona's regional winning time of 3:22.6.

"But I feel that when we get down to Austin, in the lower climate, we may be able to cut another four seconds or so off our time," Mears said.

Two Longhorns At State Meet

Two members of Lazbuddie's regional championship track and field team are competing at the state meet this week in Austin.

Russell Windham, son of Mr. and Mrs. Scotty Windham, is competing in both the 300-meter intermediate hurdles, an event he won at regional, and the 110-meter high hurdles.

Reggie Treider, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Treider, will compete in the high jump. Treider won the event at regional, and has a season best of 6-5.

Treider is a senior and Windham is a junior.

Malouf is going as the regional champion in the long jump, with a 22-8 1/4 jump to his credit, achieved while he was somewhat ill.

"I think Joe will be at his peak for the state meet. If he is, he should be able to get off a great jump. Since he hasn't felt tops for the last couple of weeks, there's no telling what he can jump if everything clicks," Mears said.

The team competed in a tune-up meet for state qualifiers at Texas Tech last Saturday.

The best showing--and that really hurts--was by Friona's 400-meter relay team. The foursome blazed the lap in 42.6, to erase their own school record.

The sprint relay team won't be competing in Austin, in spite of having one of the top times in the event this spring in the state, due to a dropped baton at the regional meet. The boys were invited to the state qualifiers meet, however.

They responded with the above-mentioned time, second in the event to Lubbock Estacado, which goes to state in class AAA. Friona's time beat that of Frenship and Electra, who will represent this region in the event at Austin.

Lap times by the team members included: Michael Gowens, 11.45; Mike Hubbard, 10.35; Rod Owen, 10.53 and David Fleming, 10.19.

This past week the slippery baton bothered the mile relay team, as leadoff man Fleming had the rascal slip out of his hand while touring the first lap. This cost Friona several seconds, but they recovered to still finish fifth with a time of 3:30.1.

Times clocked by the team members included 51.9 for Alexander, 50.0 for Owen, 50.8 for Caballero and 57.4 for Fleming, which indicated his extra-curricular activities during the lap.

Malouf did not have one of his better days in the long jump, going "only" 21-7, and placing fifth.

Owen and Fleming also entered the

open 220-yard dash preliminaries, with Owen running a 23.0, and Fleming a 22.9. They did not run in the finals in the event.

Accompanying the team to Austin were Coaches Mears and Lonnie Phillips, in a van provided for the trip by Reeve Chevrolet-Olds.

All of the bands will perform, from the 5th grade band to the Chieftain Concert band, which was a sweepstakes winner in the state UIL contests this school year.

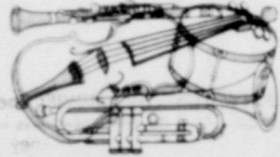

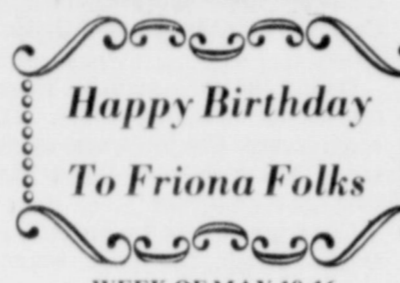

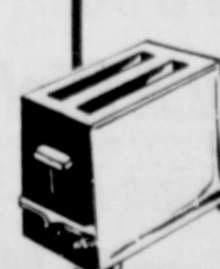
