Principal To Retire At End Of Term

THE HIGHLIGHT of the recent Winter Olympics for most Americans was the win by the United States' ice hockey team over the Russians, and the subsequent win over Finland for the Olympic Gold Medal.

It is an established fact that the Russians have paid athletes who work full time readying for the Olympics, so that the Russians can make political hay out of the international competition. Their hockey team was no different.

Some compared the young American hockey team's win over the Russians as similar to a group of hand-picked all-star college football players getting together for a season, and topping off their effort by beating the Pittsburgh Steelers.

The win over Russia was especially sweet from the standpoint of the difference in the way the two countries choose their athletes and teams for the Olympic events. We would guess that America's method is close to that employed by the majority of the countries who take part in the Olympic Games.

You'll recall that it wasn't too many years ago that the "Winning by whatever means" ploy by the Russians even led to the sex tests for their women athletes, because the Soviets were sending men to enter the women's events.

President Carter recognized the magnitude of the recent Olympic win, and personally invited the Olympic team to the White House for special recognition.

There is no indication whether this achievement has caused the Administration to ease up any on its threatened boycott of the Summer Olympics. Russia completely ignored the president's deadline for pulling troops out of Afghanistan, in regard to the Olympic boycott.

It appears that such a boycott will do little to improve the country's status in the International Community, except to possibly serve as a protest to the Communists.

Wonder if Carter still thinks that Congress should approve the SALT treaty? We haven't heard much about this document since the recent surprise Soviet uprising. Now that the nation has been reminded of how the Communists are so trustworthy and like to play by the rules, it makes you wonder how such a treaty could have ever been drafted in the first place, much less have our nation's leader try to sell it to the American public.

IT WAS REFRESHING to see Ronald Reagan take the big win in the New Hampshire primary. For a while there, it began to look as though George Bush was about to run off from the pack in the GOP primaries.

Don't forget that Bush is the Trilateral candidate, or the "Rockefeller candidate." If he should manage to get the Republican nomination, and Carter the Democratic, there would be two Trilateralists running in November.

We believe that the voters deserve a little more of a choice than the above possibility. These Trilateralists have a lot of power, though, so don't be surprised at anything. As we indicated recently, they're not above risking war, and the death of thousands of our young people, in order to perpetuate their cause, and keep their candidate in office.

That's a pretty serious charge, but we feel that it is true.

Exhibition

Re-scheduled For March 10

The exhibition game between the Harlem Thrillers and the "Mean Red Machine," which was snowed out here in February, has been rescheduled for Monday, March 10, it was announced this week.

A school administrator whose name has become synonymous with Friona High School has announced his intentions to retire at the end of the current school term.

John Raymond (Ray) Cook, who has been employed by the Friona School District since September of 1949, has tendered his resignation to the school board.

"I have enjoyed working in my capacity. I still enjoy it. I just decided there came a time to make a change," Cook said.

Cook was first employed as a coach and math instructor in high school. "My first two years, I coached everything—girls basketball and all," he recalled. "Then my third year I had an assistant who coached the girls team," he related.

After serving six years as high school coach, Cook was made high school principal in 1955, continuing to teach math classes for a time.

Cook was employed for a year in the Levelland school system prior to coming to Friona. He had received his degree from Hardin-Simmons University, having his college interrupted for a three-year hitch in the U.S. Navy during World War II.

While in the Navy, Cook was stationed in the Philippines for a time.

He attended West Texas State College for three summers to receive his master's degree and become a certified administrator.

Cook has seen the local school system grow from a small, class B school with less than 100 in high school to the modern system of today. Beginning next fall, Friona will be a class AAA school in the UIL system.

"Up until about three years ago, we had experienced steady growth every year in our school system. It has leveled off since then," Cook said.

As far as changes he has seen, Cook says that society as a whole has

undergone a tremendous change in the 31 years he has spent in school work. "Years ago, students seemed to realize that it was important to do a job well...today there seems to be the attitude by some that it's not that important to do your work well. I am concerned by this attitude," Cook says.

"But as far as the capabilities of young people, we have young people today with as much ability as any we've ever had. But we may have 'spoon fed' our kids a little too much in recent years," he added.

"I have enjoyed working with young people. If I had not, I would have changed jobs a long time ago," Cook says.

The longtime principal said his retirement did not reflect his lack of enjoyment of the job, nor did he have any axes to grind.

One factor that prompted his retirement, Cook said, was the constant school activities and demands from a "night life" standpoint. "I have tried to attend all school functions, or at least those here at home. I feel that it's important that you do so in the capacity as principal," he says.

Cook has seen a number of "second generation" students of his come through Friona High School.

Among some of his first-year students, who remained in the area and sent their children to school here are:

As far as highlights of his school career, Cook says the big thing from his coaching career was when his 1953 track boys set a new record in winning the state mile relay trophy. Members of the team were D.O. Robason, M.C. Osborn, Ben Wayne Jordan and Darrell Robbins.

"I thoroughly enjoyed coaching, and would have stayed in it, because I enjoyed my association with the young people. But we liked Friona

The public is invited to join the congregation in the celebration of the dedication of the new building.

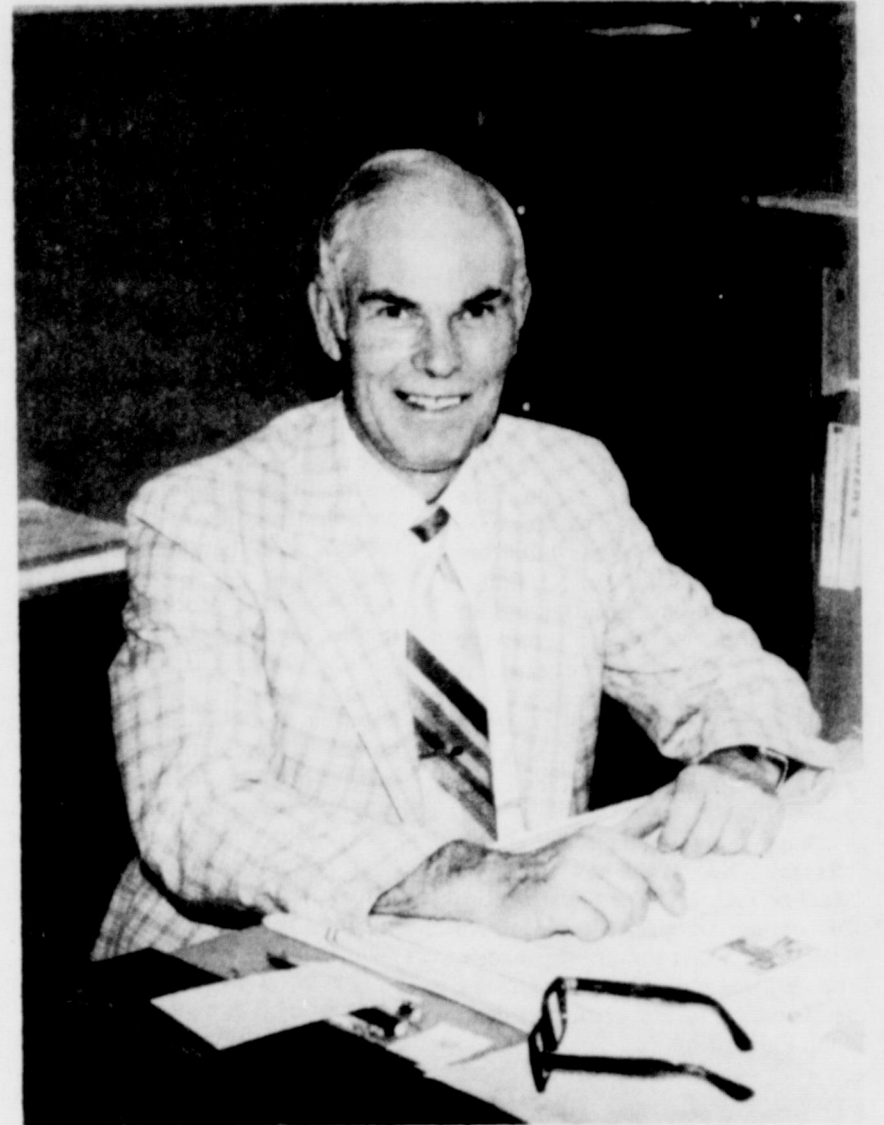
Rev. James Tomasek Jr., conference minister for the South Central Conference of the United Church of Christ, will speak at the 11 a.m. worship service.

I picked up a copy of the Amarillo Daily News, Tuesday, Feb. 26 to read before going to work.

In the middle of the front page I read the following headline: "Citizens Stung By Oil Firms for \$286 Million?" Underneath, you read that the Carter Administration has charged 11 major oil companies with price mark-ups at the refinery level (which I doubt will ever be proved, so don't sit up waiting for your refund).

A little upset, I turned the page and on Page 3-A of the same paper I found a full, page-length (104 column inches, I'm told), from Chevron, telling us they made a "nickel on a dollar in 1979, but will be investing a dime (on energy development)." This was just one of many such ads which have appeared recently under the sponsorship of the large oil companies.

This advertisement was bought by a national advertising agency at a cost of \$927, and was just one ad in one newspaper for one day. The oil companies also have prime time commercials on national television.

Upon receiving my gas bill from Pioneer Natural Gas Co., I find a brochure urging me to install gas air conditioning NOW, to conserve energy later (which energy is supposed to be in short supply).

I'd like to know how ignorant the big oil and gas companies think the average American citizen has become?

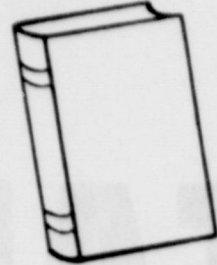

Book Talk

A computer terminal in Amarillo can help get you almost any book you want...free of charge. If your own library, the Friona Library, does not own the material that you want to read, you can ask the librarian about a service called interlibrary loan.

Interlibrary loan is a service funded through the Texas State Library in Austin and is free of charge to users of Texas public, academic and special libraries. You can get books, magazine articles, government publications and answers to almost any question through interlibrary loan.

About 200,000 book titles are published per year in the United States alone--at an average cost of \$18.03 per hardback book, it becomes obvious that no one library can ever hope to have everything. One of the goals of Texas librarians is to share library resources as much as possible. Interlibrary loan is one of the best ways that has been found to do that.

The way it works is relatively simple. Say you want to read a book and the Friona Library doesn't own it. All you have to do is ask the librarian to see if the book can be borrowed from another library. You will probably need to give the librarian as much information about the book as you can, including title, author, approximately when it was written, where you heard of it, and anything else that might be helpful in identifying and locating the book.

The librarian will then call the Interlibrary Loan office, located in the Amarillo Public Library, and tell them what you want. They will check the Amarillo Public Library to see if it is owned; if owned, it will be sent to the Friona Library.

If Amarillo doesn't own it, the book's "vital statistics" will be typed into a computer terminal. That terminal hooks Amarillo up with approximately 2,000 other libraries in the United States. The main computer for this network of libraries, known as OCLC, is located in Ohio and contains records of about six million books.

Not only can the terminal operator in Amarillo find out in which libraries the book is located, but by typing in the right code, he can also ask them

to loan the book to the Friona Library. If the book is on their shelves and they are willing to loan it, they will send the book to your library. The librarian will call you and you can check out the book or use it in the library. When you are through with it, the librarian will mail it back.

If you contemplate using interlibrary loan, there are some things you need to know:

(1) It takes time--an average of two weeks--to get materials. So plan ahead. If you have a deadline date, let the librarian know.

(2) Not everything can be borrowed. Best sellers, inexpensive paperbacks, new, rare, very old and reference books will not be loaned by most libraries.

(3) Not every request can be filled; most of them are, but some things just can't be found.

(4) It's easier to find books or magazine articles on a particular subject than it is to find a specific book. So unless you specifically want a particular title, request "information about..." when talking to your librarian.

So the next time you can't find what you need in the Friona Library, don't give up! Interlibrary loan's motto is "If we haven't got it, we'll try to get it."

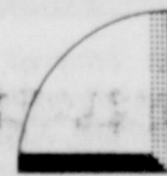

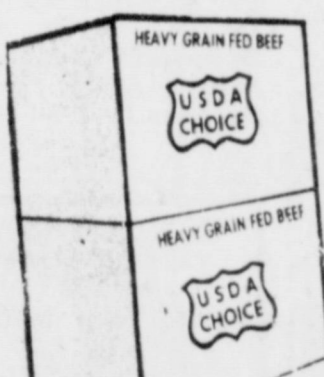

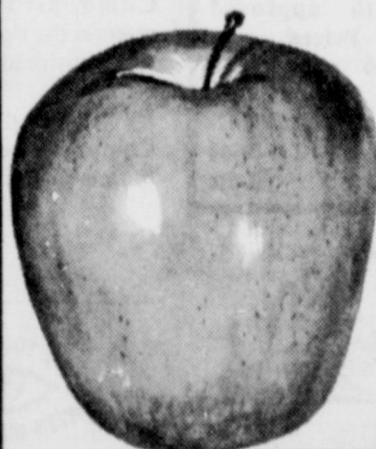

On The Farm In Parmer County

By SETH RALSTON

To get the most fuel efficiency from a tractor, tune it up, don't run it too cool, and don't use a tractor that's too big for the job, says Seth Ralston, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

A tractor engine that's operating poorly may be wasting up to 30 per cent of its fuel. That means a 180-horsepower diesel tractor could be sending \$20 to \$30 up the exhaust stack in a 10-hour day.

Most fuel waste originates in ignition systems of gasoline tractors and in fuel systems of diesel tractors.

Dirty air filters, bad carburetion, incorrect timing and worn spark plugs are other fuel guzzlers. On diesel engine tractors, worn fuel injectors can cause unnoticed losses of fuel efficiency.

Check fuel filters and replace them regularly, at least as often as the operator's manual suggests, and maybe more often under difficult conditions. If fuel filters are doing the job they are designed to do, they will eventually plug up or start passing sediment into the fuel. That could mean costly repair bills as well as lost fuel efficiency.

What about running a tractor too cold? Most tractor operators concern themselves with engine temperature only when the water temperature gauge is on the hot side. But a tractor engine will wear out faster, develop less horsepower, and use more fuel when it runs

too cold.

Today's tractor engines work most efficiently when the water temperature is somewhere between 165 and 180 degrees. So, a faulty thermostat that allows the tractor to run too cool is almost as bad as one that causes the engine to overheat.

Another minor tuneup item to check regularly is the fuel tank cap. It should be sealed tightly to keep out dirt, but at the same time be properly vented to allow fuel to flow freely.

Regarding spark plugs, check them on a regular basis, even if you don't think they need it.

You can't always tell by looking at a spark plug when it's going bad. The time-proven test of firing a spark plug outside the cylinder doesn't tell the whole story.

How do you select the right tractor for the job? If you select one that's too big, you're simply burning excess fuel to produce unused power. You may be wasting nearly a third of the fuel you're buying.

Most engineers say the best way to drive a big tractor pulling a light load is to "shift up and throttle down." This maintains ground speed while keeping the engine working efficiently.

Slippage also wastes fuel, but you have to have a certain amount. On most soils with most tractors, optimum slippage is about 15 per cent. Less means you're pulling too light a load. More means horsepower is probably being wasted.

dimes--are diverted into the jars.

Some people empty their pockets at the end of every day and put all change into a jar.

Family members may race to see who can fill a jar the fastest.

Sometimes labeling a jar, such as "Summer Vacation Money" or "Color TV Fund" helps the whole family join in the project.

Here's another idea: change a debit to a credit--or a debt to a savings.

"Crash Saving" is another tactic.

Pick a time period during which nothing is spent that isn't absolutely necessary.

Be sure to set limits to the time--say two months--and mark it off on a calendar.

During this time, cut out movies, "eating out," babysitters, sales, beer, cigarettes--and feel like a hero for the time involved.

You can learn about yourself during this time, and probably you'll save a great deal.

One advantage to this plan is that you may like the new lifestyle and make savings a permanent habit.

Finally, there's the kick-a-habit savings idea.

Save all the money you spend for coffee breaks or cigarettes or desserts or telephone calls, for example.

In general, remember, it is possible to save--even in inflationary times--if saving is your goal.

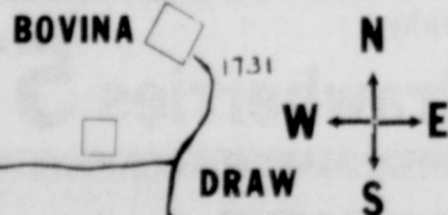

The schedule for Lazbuddie tracksters was printed in last week's edition of this paper.

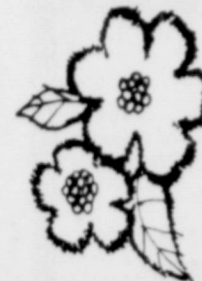
If all things go well, Lazbuddie should be able to compete for the district track crown again this year.

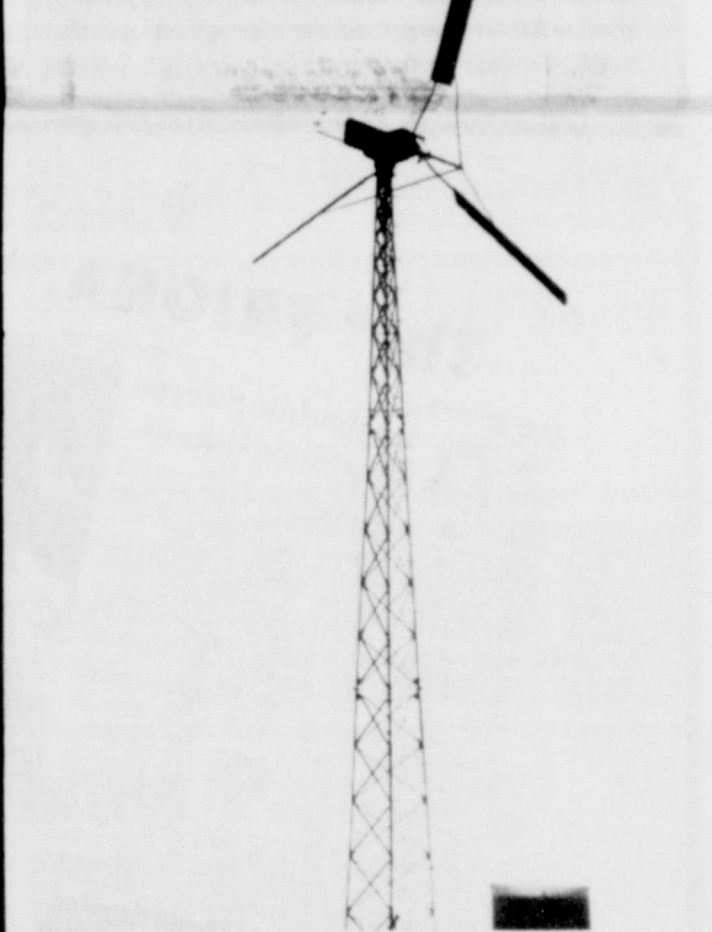

By Federal law, only you and census employees sworn to secrecy have access to your answers on the 1980 census questionnaire. Not once has the Bureau been prosecuted for releasing personal information.

Cracking Down On Cornvicts

Farmers' enemies Numbers One and Two in the corn-producing areas of the U.S. are quackgrass and johnsongrass.

Each is a menace to farmers who grow corn for a living and so help us all live better, but fortunately each can be controlled through proper use of chemicals.

The tenacity of quackgrass, which yearly invades more than 11.5 million acres--mostly in northern and northeastern states--is legendary.

Johnsongrass affects fewer acres--about 4.5 million--but in the southern and southeastern regions of the U.S., it's the most severe weed pest regarding yield loss.

The answers? Here's advice:

Quackgrass--Grow corn on infested acreage for three years, using high rates of atrazine herbicide. However, if you wish to rotate corn acreage as a market hedge, Eradicane, a biodegradable

herbicide, can suppress quackgrass while leaving planting options open for growers.

Johnsongrass--Nicknamed "bankruptcy" grass by old-timers, the method of control recommended by the Stauffer Chemical Co., includes a preplant incorporated application of Eradicane and appropriate cultural practices.

Instructions concerning herbicide rates and application techniques differ, depending on soil types and geography, but certain basics prevail. These include following specific tillage recommendations, careful herbicide application and timely planting.

and wanted to settle here, and it seems that coaches who stay in one place for any length of time are few and far between," Cook says.

In addition to the track success mentioned, Cook had one district championship football team and a co-championship during his coaching career, something of a rarity at Friona.

He said he felt one of the biggest improvements in the high school has been in the area of speech and literary activities.

"We have seen a lot of changes in the theory of what we should do in educating our youngsters. They used to say, teach them four years of science to get them ready for college, for example. The curriculum has bounced around considerably.

All of the school's physical plants have been built or rebuilt during Cook's association with the Friona schools. When he joined the system, the high school was located in the present junior high building, except that it was only about half as large, and the elementary school was in the old two-story red brick building,

which was torn down during the 1960s to make room for new classrooms.

"We've had a lot of experiences, during our school career at Friona, and most of them have been good," Cook says. "A person tends to blot out the bad experiences.

Cook's wife Iona has taught in the local school system for some 19 years.

Their children, Kathy and Carroll, went through local schools. Kathy was born in November after Cook took the job here, but he was not able to move his wife and baby here until after Christmas, because "we couldn't find a house."

Kathy is now Mrs. Mike Wooley, and lives in San Antonio and has two children. Cook's son Carroll is married to the former Cindy Lundy, and is engaged in farming in the area.

"I'll probably help Carroll some on the farm. I'm not one to sit down and do nothing. I'll still be around Friona," Cook says.
