Lazbuddie Sweeps **Top Show Honors**

Last Friday's results in the championship judging in the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show could have been termed an "Orange Crush.'

The outcome definitely had an "orange" flavor, as Lazbuddie exhibitors swept championships in all three divisions of the show, and added to their already impressive list of honors won at the county livestock

Scotty Windham, vo-ag instructor at Lazbuddie, said it was the first time since the grand champion sheep award was re-instated that exhibitors from Lazbuddie had swept all three of the championships awarded in the

Vandi Tarter captured the most competitive championship--the barrow award, with a 244-pound Duroc entry which was champion of its breed. There had been a total of 312 entries in the barrow show, a record number, and judging took a total of eight hours, from 8 a.m. Friday until 4 p.m.

Miss Tarter's win gave her community its 18th barrow title in the past 20 years, and 21st in 33 county shows. The win by the Duroc knotted up the standings once again for individual breeds. Durocs and Hampshires have each won eight county titles.

Reserve champion barrow was exhibited by Mark Petchinsky, Friona FFA member, who had the champion crossbred barrow.

The judge, Marcus Phillips of Hereford, complimented the Parmer County showmen on their projects. "I tried to evaluate each animal in the show. You have all done well,"

Phillips said. He indicated his final choice was a close one between the Duroc and the Crossbred barrows.

Sean Mason of Lazbuddie exhibited the grand champion sheep, a medium wool entry which had earned breed champion honors in preliminary judging.

Reserve champion lamb was exhibited by Tim Garner of Bovina, whose 126-pound lamb had been reserve champion in the medium wool division behind Mason's animal.

Phillip Jesko gave Lazbuddie their "sweep" in the show, when his 1156pound Angus was tapped for Grand Champion honors in the steer show Friday night

Jesko's animal had earlier won the ligth heavyweight class in preliminary judging.

Keeping the honors in the family, Jeff Jesko won the reserve champion honors with a 1217-pound Hereford Cross steer.

Other class winners were Holly Tatum of Friona and Doug Roming of Bovina.

Other breed champion honors in the barrow show were won by Tommy Mesman of Farwell, Yorkshire; Matt Howell of Bovina, Chester White; Sharlet Johnson, Bovina, Berkshire; Russell Windham, Lazbuddie, Hampshire, and Sherrie Seaton, Lazbuddie, Poland China.

In the sheep show, Guy Ellis of Friona had the champion fine wool cross, Brian Glover of Lazbuddie had the champion fine wool lamb, and Sheldon Mason of Lazbuddie had the champ Southdown.

A near-capacity crowd attended the Bill Clayton appreciation dinner Monday night at the Friona High School cafeteria. The event was sponsored by Clayton's friends in Parmer and Bailey counties.

Clayton presented a patriotic-type speech, and thanked those attending

"I can reflect back over the last number of years, and relate to you a lot of things which have happened in Bailey and Parmer Counties, of which we have been a part. And it has been good," Clayton said.

"We have seen during the past two decades a great change in this area of the state. We have seen a change in the entire state, but I feel that there has been more accomplished in this area of the state in the last 18-20 years," Clayton said, pointing to the

progress. "I would like to say that I have been pleased to have been a part of this area of the state, and to have been friends and neighbors of those who inhabit this land we call ours. I am particularly grateful to you tonight, who have given me the opportunity to serve you in Austin as your state representative, and to have been a part of the area; to see industries spring up and jobs become available, to see people happy and optimistic.

Grain Reserve Program Changes

Following the January 7 suspension of grain shipments to the Soviet Union, changes were made in the Farmer-owned Grain Reserve. These changes affect entry, loan rates, storage payments and release and call levels.

For Grain Entering The Reserve After January 7, 1980

Only good quality corn, wheat, grain sorghum, and oats produced on participating farms is eligible.

1979 national average loan rates per bushel are: corn-\$2.10; wheat-\$2.50; barley-\$1.71; oats-\$1.08; and sorghum-\$3.57 per hundredweight.

Interest is waived for the second and third years of the three-year reserve loan agreement. In addition, the first year interest will be waived for the first 512 million bushels of corn to enter the reserve.

Annual payments for storage per bushel are now 20 cents for oats and 261/2 cents for other grain.

The release levels (when the producer may repay the reserve loan and sell the grain without penalty) for grains entering the reserve after January 7, 1980 are:



Friona Gets Sales Tax Rebate Check

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday said Texas cities will receive more than \$36 million in February in rebates from the optional one-percent city sales

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Bullock said the February allocation is about \$11 million more than cities received during the same period last year.

He said more efficient deposit procedures in his agency have resulted in larger rebate checks to cities during the past few months. Friona's share in the current rebate was \$6,341.96, which compared to \$5,179.43 for the same period a year ago.

Dallas will get a check for \$4.6 million, bringing that city's total for 1980 to about

Houston's rebate for this month will be \$7.3 million, compared to \$5.4 million during the same period last year. Houston's 1980 rebates total more than \$12.4 million.

San Antonio will receive a February check for \$1.8 million, raising that city's 1980 payments to date to \$3.2 million.

Fort Worth's check will be \$1.5 million, bringing the city's 1980 payments to date to \$2.4 million.

The city sales tax is collected by merchants and businesses along with the state's four-percent sales tax and is rebated monthly by the Comptroller's office to cities where it is collected.

Farmers To Be Polled On Hauling

Texas grain farmers have a unique opportunity to be heard on grain transportation issues through a poll announced recently by Pioneer Hi-Bred International, Inc. Polling will continue until about March 20th.

The "Pioneer Poll on Grain Transportation" is being conducted in 16 major agricultural states. According to Jim Lindsey, president of the company's Southwestern Division, the poll is designed to gather farmers' opinions on the current grain transportation situation.

"The purpose of this poll is to find out exactly how serious our current transportation problems are," Lindsey said. "We want to know how these problems are affecting farmers in various regions of the country and what farmers think should be done."



Several Burglaries Reported By Sheriff

A number of burglaries are under investigation in Parmer County, according to a report this week by County Sheriff Charles Lovelace.

Among the items listed as missing were a cook stove, refrigerator, heater, and furniture. Approximate value of the missing items was reported to be \$1800.

Larry Scott reported that several hundred dollars worth of tools, saddles, and saddle tack had been stolen from a boxcar located three miles northeast of Bovina. Electrical tools, bench grinders, cutting torches, log chains, as well as the saddles and tack, were listed as missing from the box car. Sheriff Lovelace reported that a lock had been cut from the boxcar to gain entry.

Woodrow Lovelace of Lovelace Oil Company in Farwell reported that approximately 15 to 20 gallons of gasoline had been stolen from an overhead tank belonging to Junior Snider. Investigation by the sheriff's department showed that a lock had been cut to enable the theft.

Charles Peace of Friona reported that he had lost a license plate while in Mexico, but according to Lovelace, because of the location of the loss it was out of Parmer County jurisdiction.

John Sanders of Muleshoe reported to the sheriff's office that "someone scraped his car between Farwell and Muleshoe," but investigation shed no light into the matter as to who may have been responsible for the incident.






