**AMERICANS EVERYWHERE** are concerned about inflation, especially in the field of energy, and those in the Friona area are no exception.

While paying this month's utility bills, residents were painfully reminded as to the way our natural gas and electric costs have skyrocketed in the past few years. And at the same time, suppliers of both energy sources are seeking price increases in the not-too-distant future.

Our letter writer in last week's issue pretty well summed up the feeling of the average wage-earner. They are frustrated by what they see going on in our country today.

Just where this price spiral will end is anyone's guess. Did the major oil companies create the gas and oil shortage, in order to get their prices up? Some people think that they did, at least to some extent.

Now, other facets of our economy are also affected, such as interest rates. The high interest rate has practically stymied the home building industry, coupled with the increase in the cost of building materials.

We have seen the cost of gasoline more than double during the past six or seven years, and triple within a ten-year span. Interest rates likewise have been steadily climbing, until interest costs can no longer be considered just an incidental expense.

Some say that our nation had the luxury of "cheap energy" for a number of years, and this is probably right. But, there needs to be a happy medium, most people think. Prices need to find a level and stay for awhile.

This would give businessmen and industry an opportunity to try to make a profit, without having to keep a constant eye on the barometers which indicate that the economy is in trouble.

A little belt-tightening probably is good for our country, which has had virtually three decades where they have not had to watch their budgets very closely.

But with inflation in the "exploding" category, it is hard for most people to make ends meet simply by trimming off some of their unnecessary expenditures, or putting off purchases.

With inflation continuing in a double-digit manner, it is becoming hard for many people, especially those on fixed incomes, to exist, merely with the things they have to have, food, shelter, etc.

With the recent reminder as to the high cost of our home utilities, more people are beginning to turn their thermostats down somewhat, and may in turn leave the setting a little higher next summer. But when you have temperature extremes, there is just so much you can do, in order to keep your utility bills down.

The price of these things is not likely to go down, as long as the demand continues high. What we need to do to fight inflation is to try to curb our tremendous appetite for energy, and perhaps if our country as a whole could cut down its consumption of energy of all kinds, then we might see some type of price rollback.

Friona residents are invited to attend a hearing Monday evening to discuss the requested rate increase by Southwestern Public Service Company. If you are interested in this matter, and have an opinion one way or the other, it would behoove you to attend the meeting at the City Council Meeting Room.

## Resident Honored On 100th Birthday

Friona's oldest resident, "Aunt Della" Osborn celebrated her 100th birthday on Wednesday, March 5.

She was honored with a party by her friends and relatives at Prairie Acres. A nice crowd was on hand to help her celebrate the occasion.

"I feel just like a frog in a mill pond," Mrs. Osborn quipped, referring to all of the attention and picture-taking. The new centenarian is alert, and in reasonably good health for her age.

She was born Nancy Della King on March 5, 1880 in Fannin County, near Bonham, Texas. She was the daughter of Robert B. and Lucinda Osborn King. Robert King was a native of Alabama.

When she was three, Della's mother died, and the family moved to Mississippi. Her father re-married after about two years in Mississippi, and then returned to Texas with his new wife and children. The youngsters were Della, Will, Jim and Ella.

The Kings moved to Alba, Texas in Wood County. It was there that she met Frank Osborn during the

Christmas holidays of 1904. On September 6, 1905 the couple was married in Emory, Texas (Raines County). Although she was 25 at the time, Della had to take an oath at the court house that she was 21, and old enough to be married.

The Osborns lived at Alba, where they lived in a small house behind her parents' home, and later made moves to Cottle County, Hedley and Texico, N.M.

In 1927, the Osborns moved to a farm northwest of Friona, and in 1937, moved into town.

Although the couple never had any children of their own, they did have a hand in raising a pair of twin boys, who were left when her sister-in-law died. There were four of the boys to begin with, and the twins were eight years old at the time. They kept the boys for a number of years, until their father re-married, and took them back.

Della says she has been a Christian since she was 15 or 16 years old, having been a longtime member of the Methodist Church.

Her husband passed away on June 24, 1955. "Aunt Della" has been a nursing home resident for 11 years, first in Dimmitt and Hereford. She was Prairie Acres' first resident in 1976, at the age of 96.

She gave the information for this write-up herself, through her niece, Katie Osborn.

"If you talk to Aunt Della for awhile, you find out how alert she really is, and it might make you humble about your own memory. She is really 100 years young," Katie said.

Hosting the birthday party were Katie Osborn, Katherine Smith, Nora O'Brian and Lilah Gaye Gee.

## Gen. Telephone Laying New Toll Cable

General Telephone has started construction on a new toll facility between Bovina and Friona. "A new buried cable will replace the present pole and wire line which has been in service since about 1920," stated O.D. Hearn, Brownfield Division Manager.

The new facility will include the latest design in electronic circuitry and will provide for present as well as future needs. While the new facility will certainly improve the quality of toll service into and out of Bovina, there are other benefits which will be realized.

Hearn went on to say that reliability will be greatly improved because of reduced exposure to the hazards of high loads, hunters and severe weather. At the same time, everyone will recognize the ecological improvement which buried facilities make possible.

"We are extremely pleased to be able to make this announcement," the spokesman added, "as both our customers and the company will be the immediate beneficiaries of the project which is tentatively scheduled for completion by June 1, 1980."

## Planning Set For Highway

Rhea Bradley, Resident Engineer, State Highway Department, Littlefield, will hold a meeting at 10 a.m. Tuesday, March 11 at the City Offices (old Bank building), 623 Main Street, Friona, for all interested parties relative to removal of the median on Highway 60 through City of Friona and City of Bovina and resurfacing of Highway 60 from Summerfield to Farwell.

## Buske Will Run Again

Mayor B.K. Buske filed as a candidate for re-election on Wednesday, March 5, to give the Friona City Council the minimum number of candidates for the city election April 5.

Only the two incumbents on the council, Clarence Monroe and Mike Chaney, have filed for the seats which are expiring.

## School Race Has Minimum

Wednesday's deadline passed with only two candidates filing for the Friona Independent School District's board of trustees.

Jerry Hinkle and Jerry London, the two incumbents whose terms are expiring, were the only candidates to file for the April 5 election, according to Superintendent Tom Jarboe.

## Pheasant Hearing Is Scheduled March 11

A hearing regarding the establishment of the 1980 pheasant season will be held at the Court House in Farwell beginning at 10 a.m. on Tuesday, March 11.

Jack Patterson, county commissioner and president of the Parmer County Game Management Association, urges all interested landowners to attend the hearing.

State Rep. Bill Clayton says that sportsmen from throughout the 74th Legislative District should pay particular attention to public hearings scheduled by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission in all seven counties.

"The Parks and Wildlife Department is considering several changes in the hunting, fishing and fur-bearing animal regulations for 1980-81.

"These changes could affect the dates for quail and pheasant seasons in our counties and other changes could take place that our hunters and fishermen need to know about. I would urge that those interested in game laws attend the hearing in their area," Clayton said.

Most area residents were opposed to the month-long pheasant season

which was held in 1979. Anyone who is interested in the pheasant season is urged to attend the hearing.

## Area Group Has CA Jaguar Hunt

Four residents of the Friona area returned recently from a trip to Belize, Central America, where they spent a week hunting and fishing.

Clyde Woodard, Kenneth Hall, Otis and Annie Elder went by plane from Lubbock to Belize. Elder had sold a number of hunting dogs to Mary Ann Boggess, who lives on a ranch in Central America, and she invited the Elders down for a visit and hunting expedition.

The group left the Lubbock airport at 8:45 a.m. January 15 and arrived in Belize, 2300 miles away, at 3:30 p.m. the same day. The Boggess ranch is located 62 miles from the airport.

The next day, the group went fishing on the beautiful New River which joins the Boggess ranch and empties in the Caribbean Sea. They also visited the Maya Indian Ruins, which are approximately 4,000 years old.

The second day, the group loaded five long-eared hounds, seven men (including two guides) into a four-wheel drive pickup and drove some 30 miles into the jungle for a jaguar hunt.

A guide had to cut a trail with a machete knife so the pickup could follow.

The group hunted three days. On the third day they spotted a big jaguar, which walked out in the road in front of the pickup. They released the dogs, and they chased the cat

about 40 minutes, treeing the animal.

They got this animal, and then went after another. In all, the dogs treed two jaguars and one lion.

The group were guests of Mary Ann Boggess and Bader Hanson. "They were very cordial, and we appreciated everything and enjoyed our trip very much. It was a dream come true. I can't believe it really happened," said Elder following the trip.

The group returned home January 22.

# FRIONA FLASHBACKS

### 50 YEARS AGO--MARCH 14, 1930

Postmaster J.A. Guyer received word this week from the post office department in Washington, D.C. that the application for a new rural route out of Friona to the northwest had been granted by the department, and that the service will begin on July 1 this year. The route will be a little less than 62 miles, and will be carried just three times a week, on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.

### 40 YEARS AGO--MARCH 15, 1940

Dr. Mann will be here during the Easter Holidays, and will repeat the tonsil clinic such as he conducted in December. The work done here during the Christmas holidays resulted in 16 tonsilectomies and four or five circumcisions. Fees are \$15 for a tonsilectomy, and \$5 for a circumcison. The work is sponsored by the health committee of the Parent-Teachers Association.

### 35 YEARS AGO--MARCH 16, 1945

The Friona Squaws district basketball champions for the past two years, won third place in the girls' state tournament at Hillsboro last week, chalking up three victories to one defeat.

G.B. (Pete) Buske lost some fingers on his right hand last Friday while grinding feed for his stock. He was taken to the hospital at Clovis for surgical treatment and is reported as getting along all right.

### 30 YEARS AGO--MARCH 10, 1950

Friona State Bank was open for business Monday in its new \$50,000 quarters for the first time, after celebrating a most successful open house last Saturday. Frank A. Spring, cashier and director, said that more than one thousand visitors trekked through the new building on Saturday. The moving of the bank from the old two-story building on Fifth Street marks the passing of another era of Friona history.

### 25 YEARS AGO--MARCH 11, 1955

Development of the Whiteway

in addition Northwest Friona as an immediate housing project was assured this week by an Amarillo developing group and W.H. Flippin, Jr., who is selling the property to them. To operate here as Friona Building Company, the concern is headed by K.S. Reynolds, Roy Hunnicutt and E.E. Warnick. The property to be developed is north of Highway 60, between the highway and 15th Street, and to the north and west of Parmer County Community Hospital.

### 20 YEARS AGO--MARCH 10, 1960

Unleashing a torrid attack that could not be repelled, the Friona Squaws defeated both opponents in the regional tournament held in Chapman Field House in Lubbock Saturday, to win a berth in the Class AA state championship playoffs beginning Friday night in Gregory Gymnasium in Austin. The Squaws will meet the Bowie High School girls Friday at 7:30 p.m.

### 15 YEARS AGO--MARCH 11, 1965

This weekend the Friona High School Squaws are competing in the state basketball tournament for the

fourth time in six years, and tenth in all. However, this trip will be a new experience for the Squaws, who are for the first time making the tournament appearance as defending champions. Friona downed Spearman, 54-33 and Granbury, 49-45 to gain the state meet.

### 5 YEARS AGO--MARCH 9, 1975

Landowners who will be involved in needed right of way for the widening of the middle portion of State Highway 214 between Hub and Clay's Corner will meet with District Engineer Rhea Bradley of the Texas Highway Department and the Parmer County Commissioners Monday. Construction continued full pace on the overpass which is spanning Santa Fe Railway south of Friona on Highway 214. Pre-stressed concrete beams were laid to span the bridge this week.

Dedication ceremonies for Friona's second historical marker will be held at 2 p.m. Sunday, March 9, commemorating the site of Friona's first church building, the old Union Congregational Church. Claire Kuehn, archivist at the Panhandle-Plains Museum Library, Canyon, will deliver the dedicatory address.

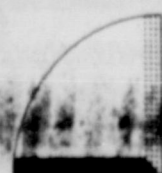

### Beferendum

#### Vote Fails

Indications are that cattlemen voting in the beef referendum program throughout the nation have rejected a move to spend \$40 million to promote the beef industry.

Cattlemen throughout the country have been voting since February 19 on the "beferendum." Ballots were sent to county offices of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service last Wednesday. Although final results have not been tallied, indications are that both Texas and New Mexico as well as many other states failed to pass the referendum.

Parmer County had 142 cattlemen to vote on the referendum, with 85 voting against and 57 voting for. In the State of Texas approximately 75 per cent of the cattlemen voted "no" on the referendum.

Curry County cattlemen were just as much against the proposal with a vote of 82 for and 129 against. Out of the 2,295 cattle owners who registered to vote in New Mexico, only 1,880 cast their ballots; 1,218 against and 662 for.

Early polls indicated that only about 40 per cent approval in such states as Oklahoma, Nebraska, Iowa, Kansas and Missouri, with slightly higher percentages in Arkansas and Colorado. Montana and Mississippi appeared to be strongest in favor with percentages of nearly 60 per cent.

Initially, the program would have permitted the cattle ranchers to contribute 20 cents per \$100 of beef sold to use toward the purpose of beef research, promotion and foreign market development. The United States Department of Agriculture estimates about \$40 million would have been raised had the referendum passed.

Since the referendum received such unfavorable support it is highly unlikely that the matter will be carried any further in the near future, according to ASCS officials.

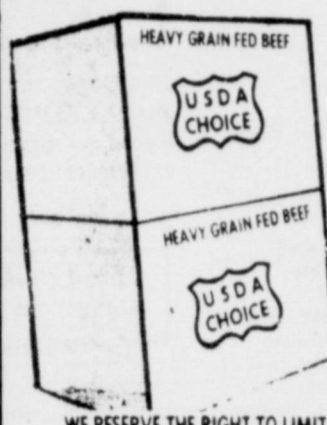

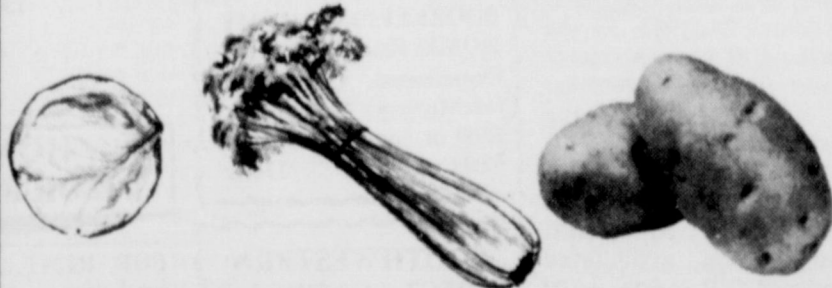

# Telephone Company Files For Increase

General Telephone Company of the Southwest Monday (February 25) filed its first statewide request for new revenues with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC), seeking \$58.3 million of which the company would receive \$29.7 million after taxes.

General Telephone, the largest independent (non-Bell) telephone company in Texas, serves over 1.2 million telephones in 291 exchanges across the state. Major cities served include Garland, Irving and Plano in the Dallas/Fort Worth area, Baytown and Dickinson in the Houston area, Texarkana, San Angelo and Bryan-College Station.

F.E. Hightower, vice president-revenue requirements in the company's four-state headquarters in San Angelo, said: "Continued erosion of earnings through customer growth and requirements for services, rapidly changing technology, the need to improve and expand service and services, and unprecedented high levels of inflation make our request necessary."

"We have been able to defer a request for new revenues through programs to improve efficiency, to

reduce expenses, and intensified marketing efforts," he said.

"Rates now in effect were established on a city-by-city basis prior to the establishment of the PUC in September 1976. As a result, rates vary greatly. Our filing seeks to make rates for services and 'bands' uniform."

The filing seeks to equalize local monthly basic service rates by grouping cities by bands based on the number of primary telephones that can be called without a long distance charge, and to apply charges for all services more nearly relating to the cost of providing those services, according to Hightower.

Hightower said the company proposes ten rate bands similar to those already approved by the commission for other telephone companies. Rates would increase from band to band in proportion to the increase in primary telephones which can be called in each band.

"While the proposed rates are uniform within the respective bands, present rates vary so widely that it is impossible to project a meaningful average per cent change," he explained.

## Friona Industries Votes Dividend

The Board of Directors of Friona Industries, Inc. at a meeting in Atlanta, Georgia, Friday, February 29, voted a quarterly cash dividend of ten cents per share on the Company's common stock. The dividend is payable May 1, 1980 to shareholders of record as of April 18, 1980.

Friona Industries, headquartered in Friona, recently reported net income of \$1.8 million, or 82 cents per share, on revenues of \$92.9 million for the six months ended December 31, 1979.

Friona's common stock is traded on the American Stock Exchange under the symbol FI.

The Company is engaged in the processing and packaging of ground beef for distribution to more than 570 Wendy's fast food restaurants, the manufacture and sale of commercial cattle feeds, retail marketing of animal health supplies, custom cattle feeding, the sale of Company-owned cattle and operation of grain facilities.

### On The Farm In Parmer County

Since most crops have diseases that are carried through the non-growing season on crop residue, farmers should practice residue management along with crop rotation to reduce the chances of diseases in next year's crop.

Populations of disease-causing organisms build when a susceptible crop is present and conditions are favorable for development. Most rotation programs will lower pathogen populations. However, under intensified production when the same crop is grown year after year, special steps have to be taken to avoid organism buildup, often at a high cost.

In minimum tillage systems, crops are usually rotated, and this helps keep certain disease organisms at a low level. However, a few have the ability to span more than one crop or to live in organic matter that comes from most any crop.

Most disease-causing organisms require oxygen for survival. When crop residue is on the surface, they have no difficulty staying alive. Once crop residue is buried deeply, organisms that require little oxygen for survival go to work while disease-causing organisms soon die.

Some producers like to maintain a certain amount of crop residue on the surface as a mulch for water conservation and wind erosion control. This works satisfactorily if residue is kept out of the seed furrow at seeding time. Otherwise, seedling diseases may be more severe.

There is no one "best way" to handle crop residue under all situations. It depends on the crop involved and expected growing conditions. Growers should keep in mind, however, that diseases may be more or less severe depending on how they handle residue from previous crops. Diseases are generally less severe when practices are used that hasten decomposition of crop residue.

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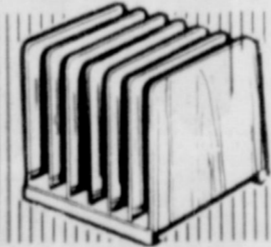

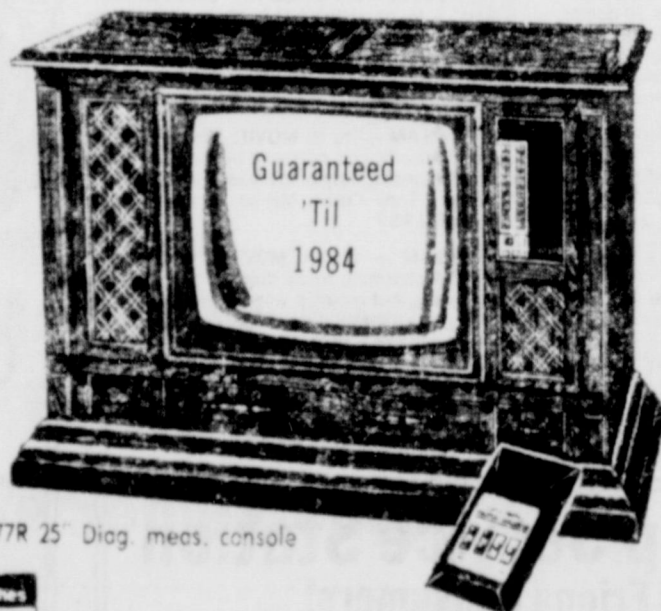

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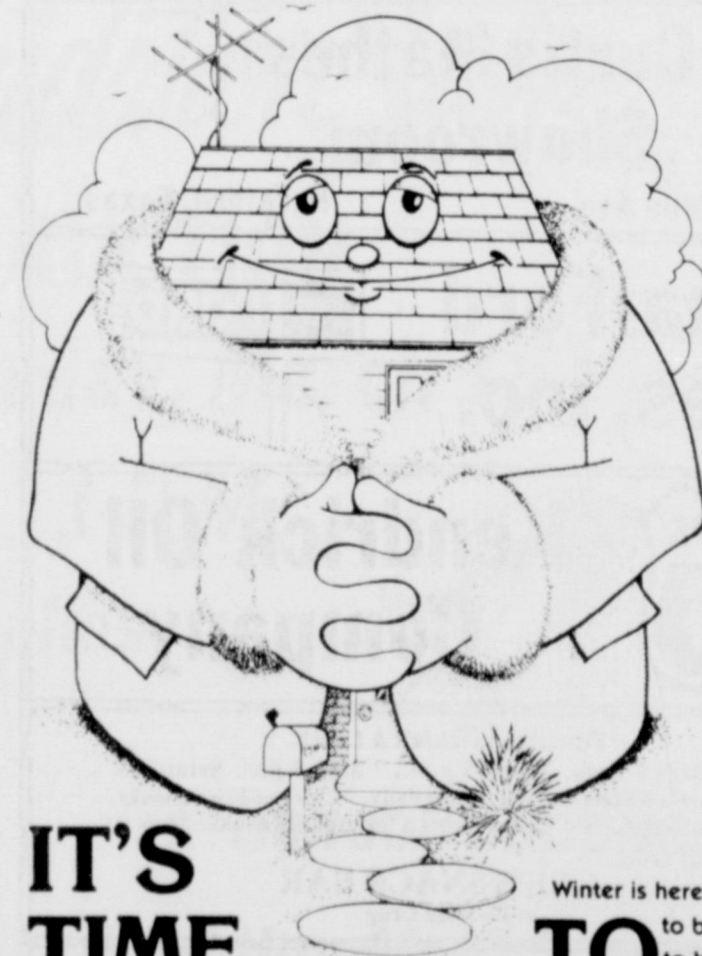

Named Lacy Marie, the new arrival weighed two pounds, fifteen and one-fourth ounces and was 16 1/4 inches long.

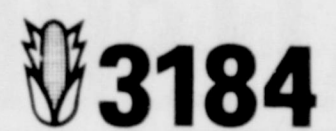
