Now, other facets of our economy are also affected, such as interest rates. The high interest rate has practically stymied the home building industry, coupled with the increase in the cost of building materials.

We have seen the cost of gasoline more than double during the past six or seven years, and triple within a ten-year span. Interest rates likewise have been steadily climbing, until interest cosis can no longer be considered just an incidental expense.

Some say that our nation had the luxury of "cheap energy" for a number of years, and this is probably right. But, there needs to be a happy medium, most people think. Prices need to find a level and stay for awhile.

industry an opportunity to try to make a profit, without having to keep a constant eye on the barometers which indicate that the economy is in trouble.

A little belt-tightening probably is good for our country, which has had virtually three decades where they have not had to watch their budgets very closely.

But with inflation in the "exploding" category, it is hard for most people to make ends meet simply by trimming off some of their unnecessary expenditures, or putting off purchases.

With inflation continuing in a double-digit manner, it is becoming hard for many people, especially those on fixed incomes, to exist, merely with the things they have to have, food, shelter, etc.

With the recent reminder as to the high cost of our home utilities, more people are beginning to turn their thermostats down somewhat, and may in turn leave the setting a little higher next summer. But when you have temperature extremes, there is just so much you can do, in order to

keep your utility bills down. The price of these things is not likely to go down, as long as the demand continues high. What we need to do to fight inflation is to try to curb our tremendous appetite for energy, and perhaps if our country as a whole could cut down its consumption of energy of all kinds, then we might see some type of price rollback



Beeferendum Vote Fails

Indications are that cattlemen voting in the beef referendum program throughout the nation have rejected a move to spend \$40 million to promote the beef industry.

Cattlemen throughout the country have been voting since February 19 on the "beeferendum." Ballots were sent to county offices of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service last Wednesday. Although final results have not been tallied, indications are that both Texas and New Mexico as well as many other states failed to pass the referendum.

Parmer County had 142 cattlemen to vote on the referendum, with 85 voting against and 57 voting for. In the State of Texas approximately 75 per cent of the cattlemen voted "no" on the referendum.

Curry County cattlemen were just as much against the proposal with a vote of 82 for and 129 against. Out of the 2,295 cattle owners who registered to vote in New Mexico, only 1,880 cast their ballots; 1,218 against and 662 for.

Early polls indicated that only about 40 per cent approval in such states as Oklahoma, Nebraska, Iowa, Kansas and Missouri, with slightly higher percentages in Arkansas and Colorado. Montana and Mississippi appeared to be strongest in favor with percentages of nearly 60 per cent.

Initially, the program would have permitted the cattle ranchers to contribute 20 cents per \$100 of beef sold to use toward the purpose of beef research, promotion and foreign market development. The United States Department of Agriculture estimates about \$40 million would have been raised had the referendum

Since the referendum received such unfavorable support it is highly unlikely that the matter will be carried any further in the near future, according to ASCS officials.







Telephone Company Files For Increase

General Telephone Company of the Southwest Monday (February 25) filed its first statewide request for new revenues with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC), seeking \$58.3 million of which the company would receive \$29.7 million after

General Telephone, the largest independent (non-Bell) telephone company in Texas, serves over 1.2 million telephones in 291 exchanges across the state. Major cities served include Garland, Irving and Plano in the Dallas/Fort Worth area, Baytown and Dickinson in the Houston area, Texarkana, San Angelo and Bryan-College Station.

F.E. Hightower, vice president-revenue requirements in the company's four-state headquarters in San Angelo, said: "Continued erosion of earnings through customer growth and requirements for services, rapidly changing technology, the need to improve and expand service and services, and unprecedented high levels of inflation make our request necessary.

"We have been able to defer a request for new revenues through programs to improve efficiency, to reduce expenses, and intensified marketing efforts," he said.

"Rates now in effect were established on a city-by-city basis prior to the establishment of the PUC in September 1976. As a result, rates vary greatly. Our filing seeks to make rates for services and 'bands' uniform."

The filing seeks to equalize local monthly basic service rates by grouping cities by bands based on the number of primary telephones that can be called without a long distance charge, and to apply charges for all services more nearly relating to the cost of providing those services, according to Hightower.

Hightower said the company proposes ten rate bands similar to those already approved by the commission for other telephone companies. Rates would increase from band to band in proportion to the increase in primary telephones which can be called in each band.

"While the proposed rates are uniform within the respective bands, present rates vary so widely that it is impossible to project a meaningful average per cent change," he



On The Farm In **Parmer County**

By SETH RALSTON

Since most crops have diseases that are carried through the non-growing season on crop residue, farmers should practice residue management along with crop rotation to reduce the chances of diseases in next year's crop.

Populations of diseasecausing organisms build when a susceptible crop is present and conditions are favorable for development. Most rotation programs will lower pathogen populations. However, under intensified production when the same crop is grown year after year, special steps have to be taken to avoid organism buildup, often at a high cost.

systems, crops are usually rotated, and this helps keep certain disease organisms at a low level. However, a few have the ability to span more than one crop or to live in organic matter that comes



Most disease-causing organisms require oxygen for survival. When crop residue is on the surface, they have no difficulty staying alive. Once crop residue is buried deeply, organisms that require little oxygen for survival go to work while disease-causing organisms soon die.

Some producers like to maintain a certain amount of crop residue on the surface as a mulch for water conservation and wind erosion control. This works satisfactorily if residue is kept out of the seed furrow at seeding time. Otherwise, seedling diseases may be more severe.

There is no one "best way" to handle crop residue under all situations. It depends on the crop involved and expected growing conditions. Growers should keep in mind, however, that diseases may be more or less severe depending on how hey handle residue from practices are used that hasten



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

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
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Arnie Vail To Give Art Classes Locally





General Telephone Files For First Statewide Rate Changes Since 1976; New Rates Should Be More Equitable

For the first time since the Public : Utility Commission of Texas began regulation of Texas telephone companies. General Telephone Company changes designed to produce about? \$58 million in additional annual local revenues. Because this case is being filed on a statewide basis, adhering to statewide rate making principles. there is no "average" increase we can quote for an "average" customer. Increases will vary from community to community. Rates for all General Telephone customers in Texas with be affected, but there will be no changes in long distance rates. Here is our case:

Phone service is a good buy

have gone up. But the price for phone service hasn't gone up as much as you may think. In fact, you may easily spend more on coffee for coffee breaks than you do for a month of basic local service. Contrast that with the prices you pay for shoes and sugar or gasoline and hamburger, Or contrast it with what we pay for poles, wires, cables, etc. We can't sell 1980 service at 1976 prices...and stay in business.

We're facing facts

America's investor-owned utilities are fighting to stay financially sound and we're in the middle of that fight. As part of on-going good management, we constantly work to improve the efficiency of our operations. We've even gone to the length of redesigning truck bodies ourselves because we needed a less expensive lighter weight, more fuel efficient model and automotive engineers weren't interested in the small (to them) number we'd purchase. We've managed to avoid the rate increase arena for nearly four years through efforts like these but they aren't enough any more. We don't intend to become a financial burden to anyone...and we can face facts. So let's face this one: it's either a rate increase or some other alternative.

What alternatives? . Downgrade customer service.

2. Defer plant and equipment 3. Let our shareowners'

nvestment deteriorate. 4. Ask our employees to give up justified wage increases.

Alternative 1: Downgrade customer

You expect phones to work as close to 100 percent of the time as is possible and when phone service is out, you want it fixed. Fast. We agree. And you don't want to wait to get service to begin with, no matter how fast Texas grows. We also agree. Therefore, we can't let service deteriorate simply because costs of providing it increase. In fact, from our point of view, service in some spots could stand improving ... and we ought to know: we've been in this business a long time. But improvements cost

Alternative 2: Defer plant and equip-

We've already done that ... or as much as we possibly could. Texas

has been experiencing unprecedented growth and that's nice. because growth is healthy. The trouble is we have had to spend (and bor row) unprecedented amounts of money (at unprecedented interest rates) to provide the facilities to meet that growth. And the dollars we spent in 1979 and will spend in 1980 don't buy as much as they used to. They tion't even buy as much as they did the last time we had increases in rates - 1976. We've had customers tell us. "Look, my service is fine. Let it stay the same until 1999, just leave the rate's alone." Sounds great, but it's not that simple. Even if it were possible, we'd still be spending millions each year just to maintain what's but there now. Practically speaking, however, we can't stand The rules under which we operate say we must meet all reasonable service requests in a timely manner. Telephone equipment is complex and it can't be put in over night: With the way Texas has been growing and the way inflation is rampaging, some days it seems as though it will take all the running we can do and all the dollars we have just to stay in the same place. The engineering and construction work we do (and pay for) today determines the quality and quantity of service

Afternative 3: Let our shareowners'

investment deteriorate Everyone loves this answer ... ex cept the shareowners...and they may be you directly, or indirectly, if you have a pension plan, life insurance or own mutual fund shares. Realistical ly, however, shareowners have to earn a reasonable return on their in vestment. Otherwise, they don't invest. Would you? It was yesterday's investment money which bought the equipment serving you today and today's investment money is needed to buy the equipment to serve you tomorrow

Afternative 4: Ask our employees to give up justified wage increases

Our employees are skilled and dedicated and we need them. To cut costs by denying them justified ingreases would be counter productive. We must pay competitive wages and benefits to attract and hold employees with the skills and pro ductivity we need. As Texas grows. we'll need even more. If we lose or scan't find quality employees, your service could suffer.

That's pretty obvious a rate increase. But it won't happen right away. It's not that simple and it isn't automatic. Most businesses, if their costs go up, simply raise their prices for drop the service. We are a eregulated utility and even when we aren't receiving enough money for service, we must continue providing it and keep on doing so until we can

prove to the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) that we're in financial need. Only then can we plead our case for a rate increase. What's more, it takes time before we receive authority to increase rates By then, inflation may have lowered the buying power of the dollar enough so we're right back where we started or worse.

The tax collector wins

We're asking for about \$58 million in additional annual local revenues. half of which will go to increased taxes. Just about half of any increase we ever get goes to increased taxes.

About those varied increases

We can't give you an "average" in crease for an "average" customer. Increases are going to vary, literally, all over the map of Texas. The chief reason is a shift from city-by-city ratemaking to statewide rate-making. When this shift is completed, you will be paying rates based on the number of telephone numbers you can call without a long distance charge. We think you'll find this system fairer to

No increase is popular We know you aren't going to like an increase in phone rates. In today's economic climate, we don't blame you. We don't like it, either. We also didn't like the astounding increases in electricity, gasoline, telephone equipment, taxes, interest rates, etc., we've faced over the last few years ... but we've had to pay them.

We're consumers ourselves

We're trying to be as open and aboveboard as we can. There's nothing hidden about our operations and we aren't some giant out to gouge the consumer. We're consomers ourselves and we're doing our best to protect you and your phone service...and to keep the rates for it within everyone's reach.

We'll talk and listen

So, there it is. We've got to earn more money and raising rates is our only choice. If you have questions about your individual service rate. call your local business office or your division manager. Division managers are listed in the front of your phone book. They'll even help arrange speakers for your club or organization. We're all people you can talk to...and we want to keep you talking.

Kipi Fleming's second place in prose reading was the best showing by the members of the Friona High School Forensics team, at the Hereford Invitational Tournament



Next tournament for the FHS team will be the West Texas State University small schools tournament on March 22. The District 3-AA Literary meet will be held March 28 at



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
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
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
