FOR YEARS, Friona and Parmer County area has been one of the most inexpensive spots you could choose to live.

But times are changing. Just this week, for instance, we learned of proposed increases in our city water rates and our county taxes. Not just token increases, either, but sizeable ones.

Part of the problem is that we have taken our resources for granted. In the beginning, residents were urged to use as much water as they wanted to use on their lawns and gardens, to encourage a green, well appearing city. Special summer water rates were adopted, so that residents could use a virtual water tower full of water, if they wanted to.

This practice was stopped as the cost of pumping water increased, and now, city officials have gone the complete circle, and plan to not only discourage the watering of lawns, but in essence to penalize you for it.

We recognize that there is a problem with our water supply. It hasn't been that long since we turned on a faucet and heard it spitting and spouting more air than water.

But if drastic measures are necessary in order to solve our water deficiency, we say, make the changes. And if a bond issue is necessary, then float a bond issue.

A good water supply is something a city can ill afford to be without. And if the residents are going to be penalized by way of exorbitant rates for watering their lawns and gardens, then we're apt to lose some residents, if they can get city services elsewhere at a more reasonable price.

Many of our residents, particularly the older ones, enjoy growing gardens each year. In fact, we would say that this is one of the more popular hobbies among our residents.

But if water has to cost \$1.00 per thousand gallons, then many of them are likely to have to forego their gardens. Home grown vegetables, especially from a garden in town, have not been economically justified for some time, but most gardeners still like to grow a few crops, just for the "home grown" flavor.

Our water supply is a problem. We know that, and realize that it may be expensive to dig additional wells and pipe them into our system. What would it amount to in a tax increase, spread over a number of years? Personally, we'd like to see the comparison and then make the choice.

For one thing, real estate taxes are deductible expenses off your federal income tax returns each year. Water bills, the last time we checked, are not deductible.

By paying for the needed water supply in taxes, if the increase costs you \$500 or \$600 a year, at least that would be an amount you could deduct from federal taxes. If you paid that amount in extra water bills, it would just be a dead expense.

## Water Rate Hike Proposed By City

It's going to cost you more to use water in Friona, if the ordinance proposed by the Friona City Council is passed.

The city's future water supply was a main topic of discussion by the

Friona City Council at its regular meeting this week.

The council even went into an executive (closed) session to discuss aspects of the water problem. Then, they proposed a sweeping change in the water rate structure, which would reward those using very small amounts of water, but prove costly to those who use considerable amounts for lawns or gardens.

In the past, the rate structure has been based on a "descending scale". That is, the more gallons used, the cheaper the rate per gallon.

Under the proposed rate change, the opposite would be true. The more water used, the higher the rate per gallon, or thousand gallons.

For example, if a person used 70,000 gallons of water for a month under the old rate structure, he would pay \$25.10 for his water. Under the proposed ordinance, the same

amount of water could cost \$70.75. This would be an increase of 182 per cent in the case cited.

For customers who use up to 25,000 gallons of water, the per cent of increase is less, and in some cases where the amounts of water used are very small, the water bills may actually decrease in size.

"This is an attempt to get our residents serious about conserving water, and also to raise some revenue through the sale of water, and hopefully keep from having to have a tax increase," said Mayor B.K. Buske.

Buske quoted from a report completed for the city which showed that with the declining water table, there would only be water enough for the city of Friona for about 14 years.

"We need to assure ourselves of a water supply beyond this point," the mayor said.

## New Students Are To Pre-Register

New students entering the Friona Schools who were not in Friona at the end of the past school year are encouraged to contact their respective principals to pre-register during the week of August 11-15, according to Tom Jarboe, superintendent of schools.

This request is being made so schedules and teacher assignments can be made and will save

considerable delay for new students when school begins.

New students in grades kindergarten through fourth should contact Freeman Melton, Jr., elementary principal at the elementary building. It is not necessary for kindergarten students who pre-registered last spring to report early, but those who did not pre-register in the spring will need to report, Jarboe said.

New students in grades five through eight should report to Cecil Maddox, junior high principal, at the junior high building. High school students should report to Hal Rateliff, high school principal, at the high school building.

Official registration for students in grades 9-12 will be held Friday, August 22. Students in grades 11 and 12 should report at 9 a.m. and 9th and 10th grade students are to register at 10:30 a.m. on August 22. All high school students should report for this registration to receive their schedules, locker assignments, and all other information necessary so that they will be ready for a regular schedule on Monday, August 25.

The first day of school will be Monday, August 25 and busses will run their routes on Monday. School hours will be 8:45 a.m. until 3:45 p.m., same as in recent years.

Students in grades K through eight will not need to report until 8:45 a.m. on Monday, August 25 for the first full day of school. Students in grades one and two are to report to the primary building, grades K, three and four to the grade school building, and grades five through eight to the junior high building. They will receive instructions and information there regarding where they should go.

Patrons are reminded that Texas law require all Texas school students to be immunized for Polio, rubella, rubeola, diphtheria and tetanus. Also, mumps vaccine is required for all children under nine years of age. The school will definitely enforce laws requiring immunizations and parents are strongly urged to have these updated prior to school opening.

The cafeteria will serve lunches commencing the first day of school. The breakfast program will not begin until Tuesday, August 26. Lunch prices will remain at 75¢ for grades K-4, 80¢ for grades 5-8, and 90¢ for high school students. Breakfast prices are 30¢ for students in grades K-8 and 35¢ for high school students. All students are encouraged to pay for meals monthly, purchasing 20 meals in advance.

**Speaker To Extoll U.S. Common Law**

Cliff Turner, author, lecturer and constitutionalist, will conduct a lecture Saturday night, August 9, at the Friona Community Center at 8 p.m.

Turner will lecture on the subjects of common law juries, common law courts, and related subjects. An admission charge of \$5 will be made to defray expenses.

Sponsored by the Parmer County Law Enforcement Research Committee, Turner will show that the ultimate power in the United States resides in the people, under God, governed by the undeniable principles of common law.

Turner is president of the Citizens Tax Council of Soda Springs, Idaho. The organization is currently operating in nine states.

All material to be presented is documented by experience in the courts, and under scrutiny of attorneys.

The next public meeting scheduled will be on September 20 or 21 in this locality, when the committee will sponsor the original attorney who overthrew the Federal Reserve Act.

The public is invited to attend this meeting.

## Residents Face Increase In Tax

Residents of Parmer County are facing a 66-2/3 per cent increase in their county taxes, it was learned this week.

County officials blamed the increase on the inflation spiral of recent years, plus the fact that the county has not changed its tax appraisal ratio in a number of years.

County tax assessor-collector Hugh Moseley points out that evaluations have not been changed on property owners, but the assessment ratio has been revised upward.

For example, "number one" farmland, which has been taxed at \$15.00 per acre in the past, will be taxed at \$25.00 per acre under the new assessment ratio.

County Judge Porter Roberts pointed out that salaries of county officials and employees were needing to be raised badly. He pointed out that virtually everything the county uses in the way of supplies and equipment has had significant price raises in recent years.

"The county has always had a reserve fund, but we have had to dip into this fund during the current year. If we're going to stay in business, we had to raise our taxes," Roberts said.

But the two county officials admitted that the proposed increase may not be based on the actual dollar needs of the county government.

**50 YEARS AGO--JULY 25, 1930**

The report to the effect that Friona State Bank has changed ownership was verified here Wednesday morning, and came as a surprise to the people of Friona. The new owners, who took control of the bank on Wednesday, are Bruce McLean and Ester Nobles, both of Dimmitt. McLean will assume the presidency of the bank, and Nobles will be vice-president of the institution.

**45 YEARS AGO--JULY 26, 1935**

Whether it is generally known by the majority of our citizens or not, it is nevertheless a fact that our city commission has levied what it calls a street tax on all citizens between the ages of 21 and 60 years, of \$1.00 each. Purpose of the tax is to make an

effort to keep our streets and gutters in passable and presentable conditions. It is also provided that this tax may be paid in labor if the citizen so desires, rather than cash, and the rate of pay shall be \$2 per day, so that a married man may pay for himself and his wife with a day's labor.

**40 YEARS AGO--JULY 26, 1940**

The political rally and pie supper at the grade school building last Thursday sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary was pronounced a successful affair, except that the attendance could have been better.

Five of the candidates for Congress were present. They were Louis Goodrich, Deskins Wells, Henry S. Bishop, James O. Cade and Lewis Fields. The three candidates for state legislature also were present and spoke.

**30 YEARS AGO--JULY 21, 1950**

Announcement of construction of a 200,000 bushel elevator addition to the local Santa Fe Grain Company was made jointly in Fort Worth and Friona Tuesday morning. The new unit, comprised of six bins, will raise the capacity of the local elevator to 715,000 bushels, and will be built just to the east of the present elevator. G. Preach Cranfill is the local manager of Santa Fe Grain.

**25 YEARS AGO--JULY 22, 1955**

The Mabry Building, now under construction at 901-903 Main, will house five office buildings, according to James D. Mabry, owner.

Second polio shots for Parmer County's first and second graders will be available next week, with Dr. Paul Spring having announced the times and dates for these shots.

**20 YEARS AGO--JULY 23, 1960**

Interested farmers in the Hub community have set a meeting to discuss possibilities of a community or co-op gin in that area. All interested parties are urged to attend.

**10 YEARS AGO--JULY 23, 1970**

Plans for a new post office building for Friona, to more than double the floor space at the present office, were announced this week by Postmaster General Wilson M. Blount. No decision has been announced concerning the site as the official release from the Post Office Department stated that a 22,400 square foot site was being sought.

**5 YEARS AGO--JULY 20, 1975**

A raise in school taxes was approved for the Friona Independent School District for 1975-76, due to the new Public School Financing Law and the reduction of the assessed evaluation of district property for the current year. The board, after much study and discussion, voted to raise the ratio on real estate from 37.5 per cent of the evaluation to 50 per cent, and reduce the tax rate from \$1.80 to \$1.55. This would bring about an increase in real estate taxes of approximately 14 per cent, it was pointed out.

Deposits at Friona State Bank set a record for mid-year, it was revealed this week. The bank's June 30 statement revealed that Friona State Bank had deposits of \$20,842,645.42. This was a healthy 12.5 per cent increase over the total of \$18,526,573.11 which the bank had on deposit at the same time a year earlier.

## Anthony's Have Second Boy

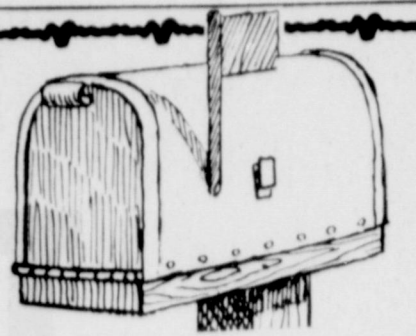

## Applicants Sought For Patrolman

The Texas Department of Public Safety is accepting applications for the position of state trooper. Applicants selected will enter training at the DPS Academy in Austin and classes will begin January 12, 1981.

Major C.W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Department, said, "General qualifications are: applicants must be 20 through 35 years of age, good moral character, a citizen of the United States, good physical condition, and have at least 60 hours of college."

The student officer will participate in and study a variety of law enforcement subjects while in training. Upon completion, the graduate will be qualified to enter the following DPS fields: (1) Driver

License, (2) Highway Patrol, (3) Motor Vehicle Inspection or (4) License and Weight.

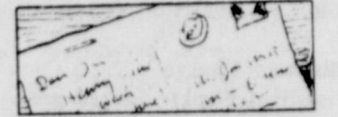
Each uniformed service has its own appeal and assignments will be made according to the graduate's aptitude, desires and the Department's needs.

Major Bell said, "The pay during the training period is \$1,034.00 and increased to \$1,179.00 upon graduation. After twelve months of service, the pay will increase to \$1,346.00. Uniforms, vehicles, weapons, and related equipment are furnished in addition to life insurance, hospitalization insurance, paid vacations, state holidays, sick leave, and Social Security benefits. The State Employees Retirement System provides for retirement of law

enforcement officers after 20 years of service at age 50."

The Department of Public Safety is an equal opportunity employer and is recruiting qualified female applicants as well as persons from minority groups.

Bell stated that those who are interested may contact any DPS office and receive an application plus complete information about the benefits and employment procedures.

### ORDINANCE No. 454

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CITY ORDINANCES #87, 1 Dec '52; AND ORDINANCE #95, 2 Nov '53; and ORDINANCE #323, 3 Jan '61; AND ORDINANCE #343, 3 Jan '61; AND ORDINANCE #424, 7 July '69; PROVIDING FOR A NEW CONSUMER WATER RATE; ESTABLISHING A NEW WATER SERVICE DEPOSIT FEE; PROVIDING FOR A NEW WATER SERVICE TAP FEE; DOUBLING THE CONSUMER WATER RATE FOR CUSTOMERS OUTSIDE THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY; PROVIDING PENALTIES IN ANY AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED TWO HUNDRED (\$200.00) DOLLARS, AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE AFTER PUBLICATION.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FRIONA, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That Section 1 of Ordinance #424, 7 July, 1969, is hereby revoked, cancelled and rescinded and said section 1 shall henceforth read as follows:

Each water consumer shall put up a meter deposit at the city office in accordance with the following rates or schedule, to wit:

Renters of residential properties - - - - - \$25.00  
Leasees of Commercial properties - - - - - \$50.00  
Owners of residences or commercial property - - - - - No Deposit

The above deposits may be applied to the payment of any unpaid bills and when so used the deposits shall be restored to the original amount. Any unused portion of the deposit shall be refunded at any time the account or service is discontinued.

SECTION 2. That Section 2 of Ordinance #424, dated 7 July, 1969, is hereby revoked, cancelled and rescinded and said section 2 shall henceforth read as follows:

"The following uniform monthly rates shall be charged all persons firms, or Corporations for City Water service within the Corporate Limits of the City of Friona, Texas:

SECTION 3. A water tap fee is hereby established in the amount of One Hundred, Ten (\$110.00) Dollars for a standard 5/8"x3/4" inch sized service. The fee shall be payable with the building permit for a new installation and/or at the time of the request for service.

The charge for the installation of an oversized (larger than the standard size above) water service shall be the actual cost of the meter, parts, and labor for making the service.

SECTION 4. That from and after the publication and effective date of this Ordinance any person, firm, partnership, association of persons, or corporation, or any agent or employee thereof, who shall violate any of the rules, regulations or provisions of this ordinance, or any part of it or portion thereof, by any act either of omission or commission or cause the same to be done, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine in any amount not exceeding \$200.00 for each and every such violation. Each violation or each part or any part of this Ordinance shall be and constitute a separate offense and where such violation is a continued act, each day such violation is continued, or permitted to continue shall be and does constitute a separate offense and be punishable accordingly.

SECTION 5. The effective date of this Ordinance shall be after its approval, publication thereof, and upon the 1st day of October, 1980.

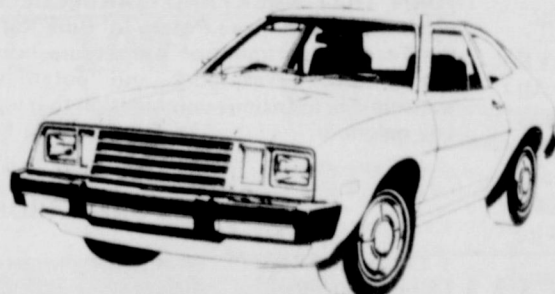

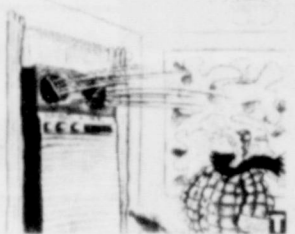

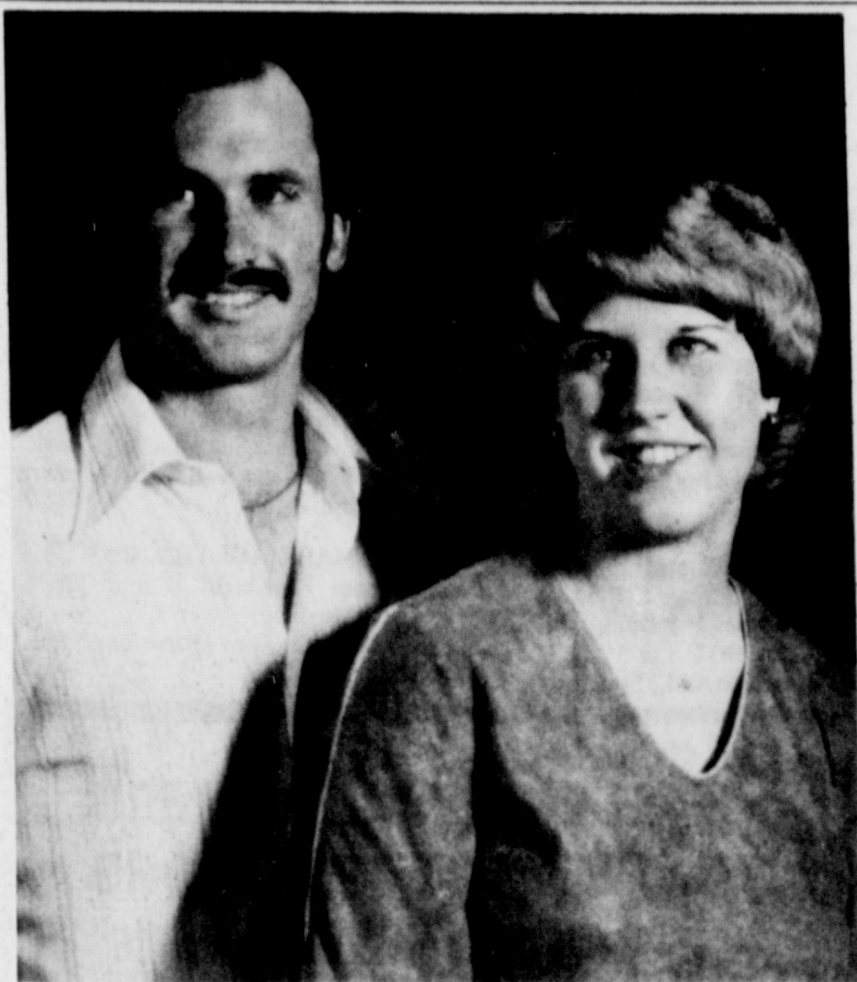

renewed by congressional action, but local officials are afraid to depend upon Revenue Sharing as a source of income. Revenue Sharing has generated around \$70,000 per year in recent years.

Roberts also said that the Lateral Road Fund, which has previously been administered by the state, has been terminated. This will cut out approximately \$30,000 per year from county receipts.

"If we see we have accumulated a surplus at the end of the next year, the commissioner's court may pass a resolution to lower the tax ratio for the succeeding year," Roberts said.

Moseley pointed out that the current tax hike was the first such increase for county taxes since 1959.

"Heretofore, our natural growth, such as in feed yards, cattle feeding, new homes, etc., has paid for our additional needs in tax money each year. However, during the past year, this type of growth has just about stopped," Moseley says.

Moseley indicated that county officials had wanted to raise the tax ratio in 1979, but ran into a problem with the time limit involved.
