WE THOUGHT THE "Meet the Candidate" night sponsored prior to the election by the Friona Chamber of Commerce was a good idea.

The event was well-attended, due to the large number of candidates who ran in the recent election. The candidates themselves showed their interest, as most of them attended the event.

The good field of candidates in the city and school election made for an interesting election, and a record turnout of voters. This is good for the electoral process. We really should have a thousand voters turnout every time there is a question to be decided.

It was tough luck for seven of the candidates in the school election, since only two members were to be elected.

We would hope that these who did not make the board, as well as other qualified candidates, will consider serving when election time comes around again next year--and the next. This type of interest will make for better members on our school board and city council.

ONE OF THE AREAS which is currently under the knife of President Reagan's budget cutting program is the Legal Services Corporation, which funds such organizations as the Texas Rural Legal Service.

The original idea of providing legal services to the poor may have been a good one. It was established some 15 years ago by Lyndon Johnson's Great Society, to give the impoverished sector their "day in court."

But in the meantime, the legal aid program has become a fly in the ointment, and like so many government programs, national leaders have wondered why it ever was created in the first place.

One of the problems is the fact that the young attorneys and workers in the legal services office do more on "ideology" than they do on "necessity."

The legal-services lawyers, in most cases, are young idealists, perhaps out to make a name for themselves as "defenders of the helpless."

Backing up our charges that the young "lawyers" are attempting to make names for themselves, rather than helping the poor is the fact that they break the laws of legal ethics by sending news releases pertaining to their pending actions, not only to the local news media, but also to the metropolitan news media. This makes us question the true motives of the TRLA.

Their "do good" attitudes and campaigns have often done more harm than good in certain communities. A good case in point is the TRLA office in Hereford, which has been the center of controversy virtually since it opened.

Again, we emphasize that some of the work done by these offices is good, and well-intended. But much of it has mostly stirred up trouble, mainly between the Hispanics and their Anglo neighbors.

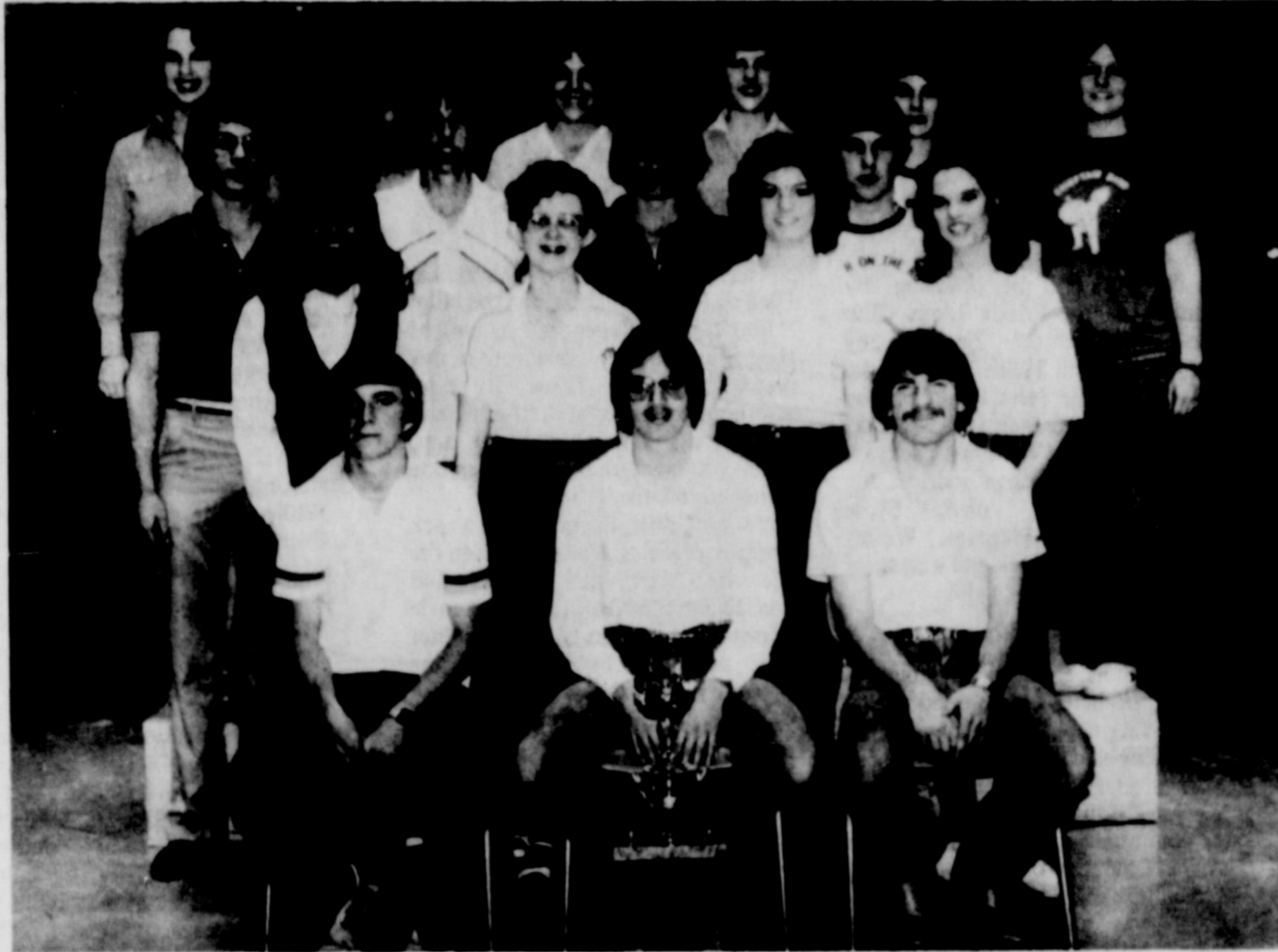
At one point, about a year ago, a resident of Hereford told this writer about the trouble being stirred up by the TRLA office, and the problems it was creating.

"People who have been friends and neighbors for years are now suspicious of each other. Just the fact that you are an Anglo and he is Hispanic has suddenly become a barrier," the spokesman said.

This type of results from the TRLA program is unfortunate, particularly in our area, which has a high percentage of Mexican-American population.

Probably the most controversial work done by the legal services is its class-action suits. Then, there are others which made opponents of the program "see red." That was when the legal service took a client who wanted a state-funded sex-change operation.

Such "services" as those discussed above have caused the Reagan administration to take a long look at legal services, and they probably will get a deserving ax when the final budget is proposed.

## Court OKs Money Deal; CDs Bought

Parmer County Commissioners Court met in a called session on March 30, to discuss the legality of a transfer of money from the Right-of-Way Fund to the Farm-to-Market Fund.

County Attorney Johnny Actkinson had mailed a written opinion based on Texas Constitutional law, which states "Any county may put all tax money collected by the county into one general fund, without regard to the purpose or source of each tax."

After the opinion was given, on motion by Commissioner Archie Tarter, approval was granted to transfer \$100,000 from the Right-of-Way Fund to the Farm-to-Market Fund, divided equally among the four precincts.

Also, the commission voted to invest General Fund money as follows: \$100,000 in a certificate of deposit to mature July 1, 1981; \$25,000 in a C.D. to mature May 8, 1981; \$25,000 in a C.D. to mature June 5, 1981; and Right-of-Way funds, including \$50,000 in a C.D. to mature June 30, 1981, and \$8,000 in permanent improvement funds in a C.D. to mature on June 30, 1981.

After discussion concerning the need of equipment in Precinct 4, a motion was approved unanimously to allow Commissioner Raymond McGehee to borrow \$22,000 from Friona State Bank to finance the new maintainer recently purchased for his precinct.

After discussion of other items of interest to the county, the county adjourned.

## School Asks For Names

Freeman Melton, Friona Elementary School Principal, is asking for assistance in his efforts to contact all parents of children who will be kindergarten age for the 1981-82 school year.

A kindergarten enrollment is planned for later this spring and school officials are presently compiling a list of students to be included in the plans.

Letters have been sent home by students who are currently enrolled in school, but this will not assure officials that all eligible children will be contacted.

Anyone who has a child that will be 5 years of age on or before September 1, 1981, is asked to contact the principal's office or phone 247-2240 so their name can be included on the mailing list.

## Record Turnout For Elections

A record turnout of voters elected two members to the Friona School Board, and three to the city council in the annual elections conducted here April 4.

A total of 859 ballots were marked in the school board election. This turnout was termed "extremely heavy" by Superintendent Tom Jarboe, and is thought to be a record. The turnout was 220 voters more than voted in the \$1 million school bond issue here last September 30.

The 640 voters who marked ballots in the city election also set a record for the turnout "at least as far as I know," said A.L. Outland, city manager for the past 19 years.

Elected to the school board were Mrs. Pat Fleming, who led the ballot with 446 votes, and Philip Weatherly, with 300 votes.

The new board members and city council members were to be sworn in at the current month's regular meeting of their respective organization.

## Snyder Charged In Beating Case

Charles Snyder was arrested last Friday by the Parmer County Sheriff's office, and charged with "aggravated assault with serious bodily injury," stemming from an incident involving his estranged wife, Cora Snyder, on March 24.

Snyder was in custody in the Parmer County jail, and is being held on \$10,000 bond.

He has been charged with the beating of his wife, Cora, who was hospitalized in Amarillo and

underwent surgery following a beating sustained early the morning of March 24.

Parmer County Sheriff Bill Morgan said that Snyder apparently went to McAllen and brought his estranged wife back to Friona in his car at gunpoint, and just before arriving at their destination Snyder allegedly beat Cora about the head with the weapon after trying to shoot her.

"It appears that when he tried to shoot her, the gun wouldn't go off, so he hit her with it," Morgan said.

Morgan said that it also appeared that Snyder took an overdose of sleeping pills after beating his wife. The two were found in his automobile south of Friona by an investigating officer.

Snyder was unconscious and slumped over the steering wheel of his car when they were found, and Mrs. Snyder was in the back seat of the car.

The two were taken to Parmer County Community Hospital by Friona Ambulance, and later Mrs. Snyder was transferred to an Amarillo hospital for surgery. She was released last Friday.

The gun allegedly used in the incident was described by the sheriff as "a replica of an old cap and ball pistol."

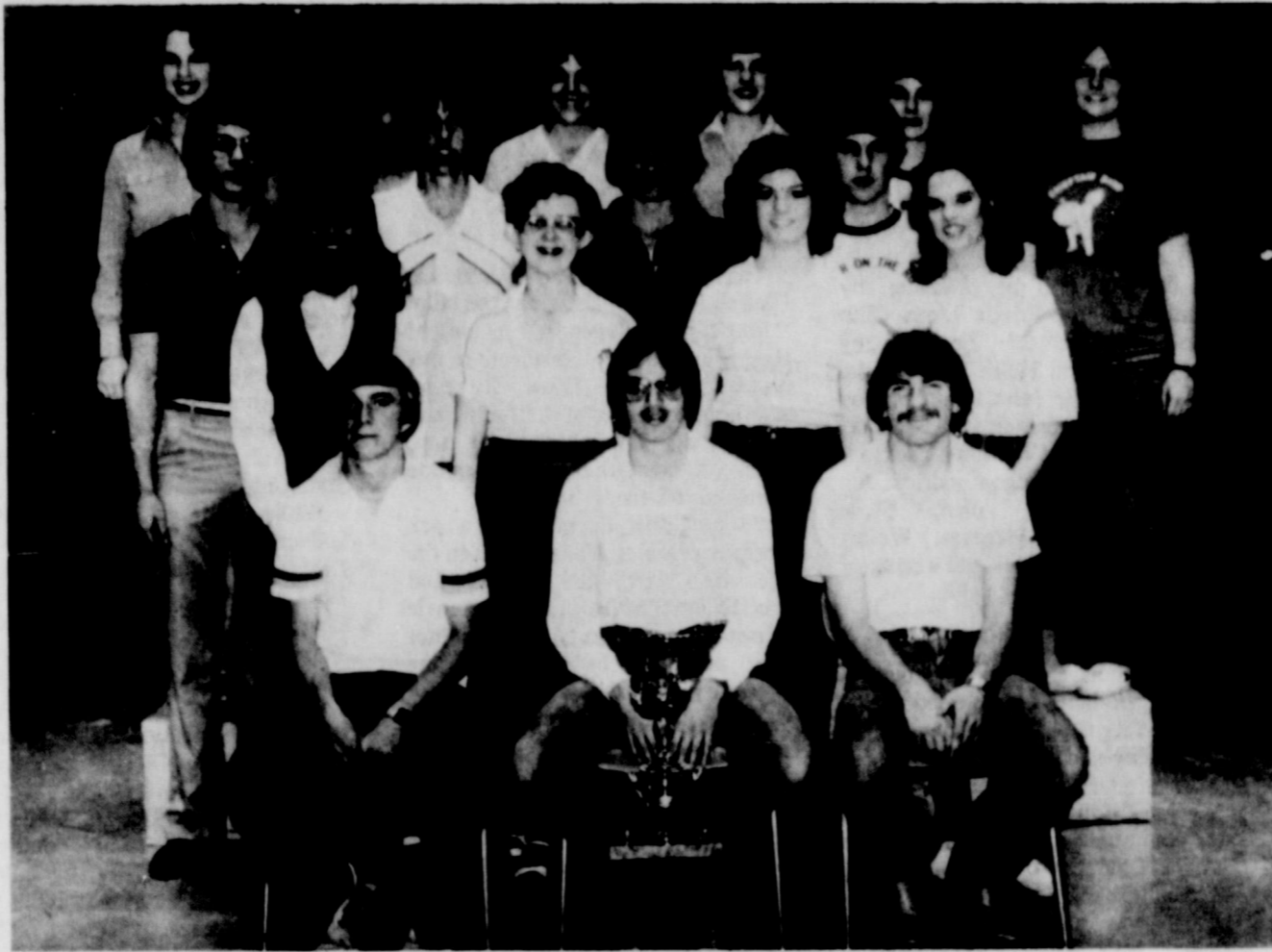

## Miller Is 1980 Man Of Year

Dr. Roy V. Miller, Chairman, Agriculture Department at Southwest Texas State University has been selected by the Comal-Hays-Guadalupe Soil and Water Conservation District as Professional Man of the Year.

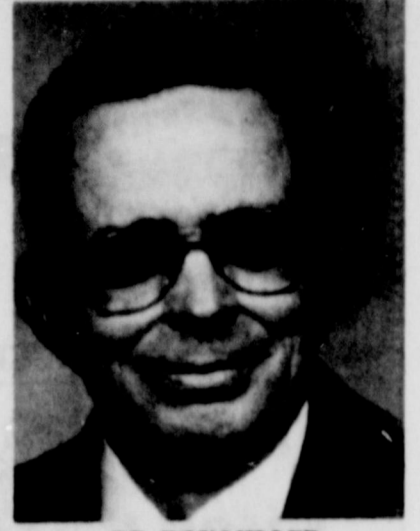
This honor has been bestowed upon Dr. Miller for rendering the greatest unself service to aid the cause of soil and water conservation.

Dr. Miller grew up on a farm in Friona, Texas, where he and his brothers assisted their father in operating their family farm. He entered Texas Tech University and received a B.S. Degree in Animal Husbandry in 1953. He served in the United States Navy from 1953 to 1957. From 1957 to 1966 he was on the Experiment Station Staff as Range Conservationist at Colorado State University.

While at Colorado State University, he received his M.S. Degree in Range Management in 1960, and Ph.D. in Botany and Plant Ecology in 1967. From 1966 to 1969, he developed the Range Management Program for Chico State University. From 1969 to 1974, he was Area Range and Brush Control Specialist for the Extension Service at Vernon, Texas.

In January of 1974, Dr. Miller was selected Chairman of Southwest Texas State University Agriculture Department, and currently holds this position. Since arriving at SWTSU, he and his staff has judged all of the Soil Conservation Essays and Posters for the Comal-Hays-Guadalupe Soil and Water Conservation District.

He has assisted the Soil Conservation Service on many occasions. He recently hosted the

SCS Prescribed Burning Training Seminar at the University for the Austin and Fredericksburg areas. He has also assisted the SCS in range, brush and wildlife management. The SCS participates annually in the University's Range and Soil Judging Contest. Part of the annual Soil Conservation Tour was held at SWTSU's Horticulture Center in 1980.

Since coming to SWTSU, he has added Agriculture Journalism and a Graduate Program for agriculture students, along with The Horticulture Center.

Dr. Miller has encouraged Soil Conservation Service personnel to talk to his students, and arranged several field tours each year to show students conservation practices applied to local farms and ranches.

Each year, he teaches a course in soil conservation, and all of his students actually visits local ranches and develop soil and water conservation plans. He has also developed a Farm Beautification Committee to enhance beautification and conservation on the University Farm.

Dr. Miller is a member of the First Baptist Church of San Marcos, the Balcones Kiwanis Club, and the Society for Range management.

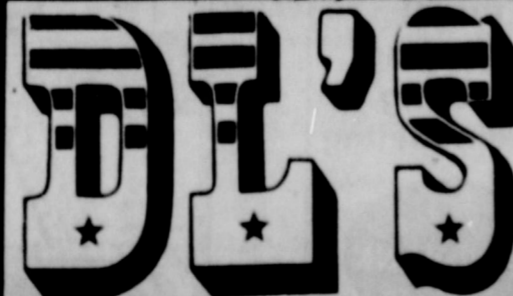

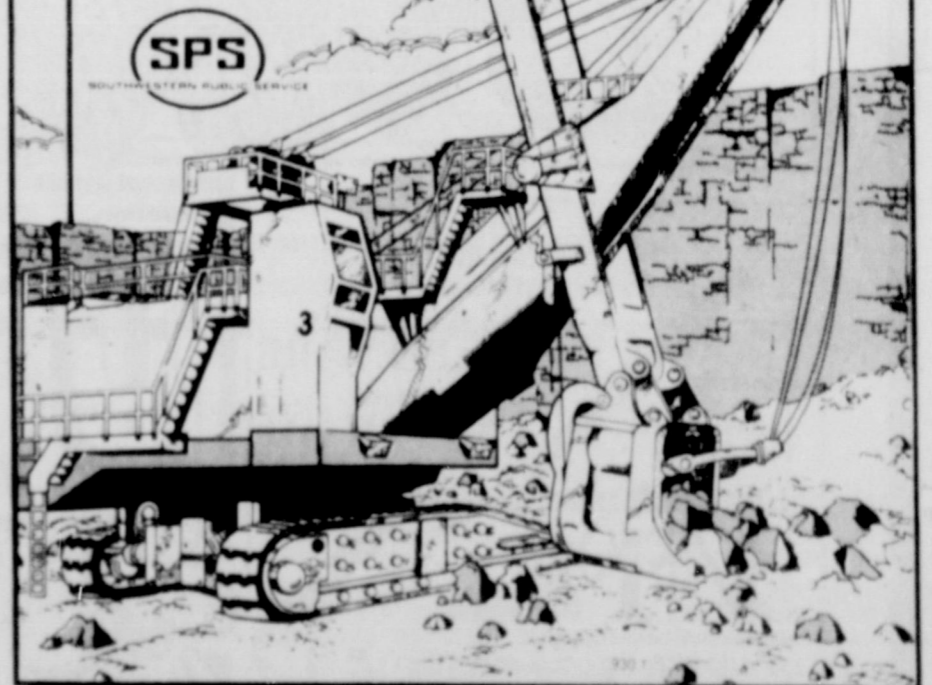

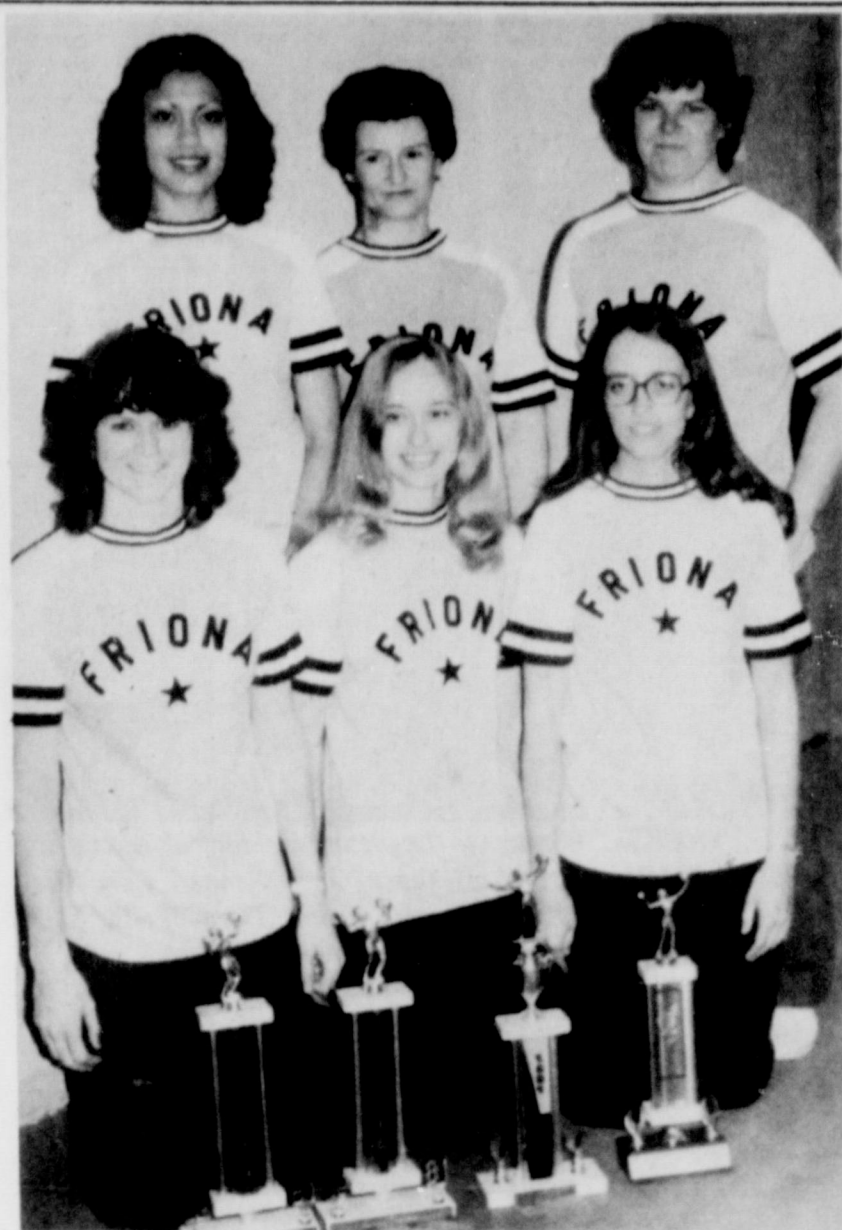

## Friona Woman's Brother Dies

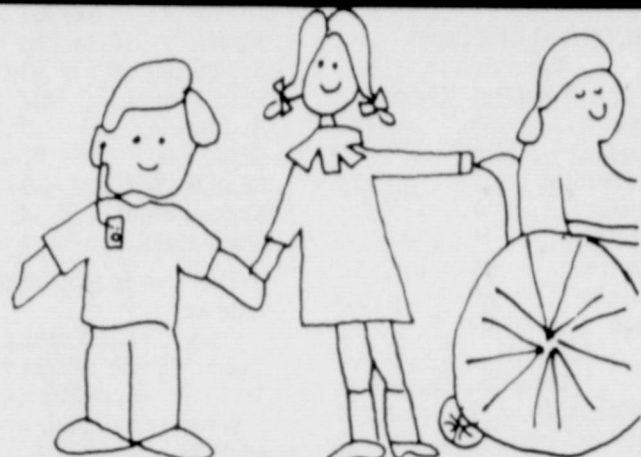
Graveside services for Ray Jimenez, 51, of Olton were held at 10 a.m. Wednesday at Olton Cemetery.

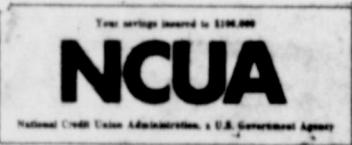
