Friona's Diamond Jubilee Slated Here Sept. 15 - 19

Friona's 25th anniversary Maize Days Celebration, which also marks the city's 75th birthday, will be held next week, September 15 through 19.

First official event on the week's schedule is the Little Miss Friona pageant beginning at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, September 15 at the high school auditorium, under the sponsorship of Progressive Study Club.

Former Maize Queen Laura Ellis, a contestant in the 1981 Miss Texas pageant, will serve as mistress of ceremonies. A total of 28 girls, five through seven years of age, have been entered in this pageant.

Areo Space Shows will open its run on Tuesday, and will continue through the week at the City Park. The carnival is once again under the sponsorship of the Friona Evening Lions, who will receive a portion of the sales, for use in their community charities.

On Thursday, September 17, the annual Maize Queen Contest will be held. The talent preliminary will begin at 4 p.m. at the high school auditorium, with admission of \$2.00.

The finals in the Queen's pageant will begin at 8 p.m. Thursday, also at the high school auditorium. All seats are reserved, and tickets are on sale at the Chamber of Commerce office at \$3.00 per ticket.

Mistress of ceremonies for the Queen's pageant will be Betty Agee Wetsel, Friona's first Maize Queen in 1957. Mrs. Wetzel has a piano studio in Midland.

Friday's feature will be a 4-H project fair, beginning at 1:30 p.m. at the Community Center.

Friona's Chieftains will play Seagraves at 8 p.m. in their first home football game for the football feature of the week.

Saturday's wrap-up day promises to be by far the busiest day, with a number of activities crowded into the schedule.

Starting the day's activities will be a breakfast, from 5:30 a.m.-8 a.m. at the high school cafeteria. The breakfast is sponsored by the Friona American Legion Post 206.

The Dixon Six Mile Marathon race will once again be run from the Anthony corner, six miles north of Friona, ending at the intersection of Highway 214 and Highway 60. All joggers and runners are invited.

The Maize Days parade will be held on Main Street, beginning at 10 a.m. The parade theme is "Happy Birthday, Friona--Diamond Jubilee."

The Maize Days barbecue will offer a new twist this year. The event will be catered by Johnny's Barbecue of Midland, and advance tickets are priced at \$4.00 per adult plate and \$2.50 for children 12 and under.

The menu includes sliced ham, beef, hot links, beans, potato salad and slaw.

Tickets are available at the Chamber of Commerce office on Main Street. There will be no waiting in line with an advance ticket.

The 4-H project fair continues at the Community Center, from 10:30 a.m. to 4:40 p.m.

An "Art for Heart" art show will be held from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the American Legion Building (Library), second floor.

More than 20 area artists will have their work on display. The work will be for sale, and a commission will be collected by the American Heart Association local chapter.

The annual pet show will be held at 2 p.m. on the public library lawn. Pets of all sizes, shapes and description are usually entered in this show.

A six-gun shootout will be held beginning at 12 noon at the City Park, with a 20-minute show presented every bour on the

The shootout will be performed by the McKenzie Gunslingers of Lubbock, which includes two sons of Friona patrolman Rex Williams, Ronnie and Dewayne Williams. This group does a lot of gun exhibitions in the Lubbock area.

Children of all ages are invited to come see the mules, which will be in a corral at the south end of Main Street.

An open barrel racing and steer roping will be held at 6 p.m. at the rodeo grounds, the final event on the schedule.

All in all, the annual celebration seems to feature "something for everyone," and residents are urged to take part in this Diamond Jubilee celebration.

Wheat Growers Log 47 Years Of Growth Here

By JUNE FLOYD

In the forty-seven years of the existence of Friona Wheat Growers, Inc. the storage capacity has been increased from 30,000 bushels to 4,709,000 bushels.

The corporation was formed early in 1934 when a group of local farmers got together in an effort to solve some of their marketing problems during the middle of the Dust Bowl Days Depression.

At that time the facility was owned by the Oklahoma Wheat Pool Association, which bought wheat from the farmers. Most of the time a farmer was advanced 15° per bushel at the time of delivery. Then, if the Association was able to sell the wheat for a profit, each farmer received a share of the profits.

When local farmers learned that the Association was on the brink of bankruptcy, action was taken and the formation of Friona Wheat Growers, Inc. was the outgrowth of their decision.

The incorporating officers were Floyd W. Reeve, president; and Clyde V. Goodwine, secretarytreasurer. Goodwine served the organization in this capacity until his retirement from the board of directors in June of 1966.

Other board members were F.N. Welch, Elmer Euler and E.B. Whitefield. All the original incorporators are deceased except Goodwine, who lives about one half mile south of town.

Following the death of E.B. Whitefield, T.A. O'Brian Sr. was selected to serve on the board. Later E.L. (Hap) Fairchild and his son, Larry, served on the board at different times. They are the son-inlaw and grandson of T.A. O'Brian

At the time Friona Wheat Growers purchased the assets of its forerunner, local farmers invested \$2,000. Capacity at that time was 30,000 bushels. One wooden elevator

held 20,000 bushels and another held 10,000 bushels. The original elevator was later sold to Carl Schlenker, who moved it to his farm in the Rhea Community, where he still uses it for grain storage.

O.H. Curtis from Texhoma, Oklahoma was the first manager. He stayed one year. At that time most of the firm's business was selling salt, coal and hay, which was shipped in from Oklahoma. For a few years the drought was so bad and such poor crops were produced that it was impossible for the firm to pay its taxes and interest. Total net worth dropped to a low of \$1200.

Old timers remember that 1937 was a good year. In fact, it was the first year since the firm's beginning that a good wheat crop was made. It was during this wheat harvest season that Arthur Drake, son of a pioneer family, who had just returned to Friona after serving in the United States Army, became associated with Friona Wheat Growers.

When harvest was over, his services were not needed, so he sought other employment. Early in 1938 a paving project on Highway 60 between Summerfield and Farwell began. Arthur remembers that he was very happy to get a job on this project. His job was time keeper and gasoline pumper. He fueled all the gasoline burning vehicles on the job with a hand operated pump. His pay was

He recalls, "I was well pleased with my job and my pay. Laborers on the project were only allowed to work 40 hours per week and were paid thirty cents per hour.'

Early in June of 1938, Guy Bennett, another Oklahoman, was employed as manager of the struggling elevator. After being informed that Arthur had worked for the elevator the wheat harvest before, Bennett, contacted him about returning.

The paving project was completed

at Farwell June 7, 1938, and Arthur went to work for the elevator the following day. Bennett stayed on as manager until 1943. Then Arthur was made manager. He held this position until 1965, when he resigned to become a full time farmer. Following his resignation, Bill Raybon was made manager. Then, three years later Raybon resigned and Drake returned as manager, a position he held until his retirement April 30,

During the early forties the elevator's operations began to show a profit and by 1946 the corporation was out of debt. Ever since that time financial reports have indicated that a profit was made each year.

About that time additions were made to existing facilities and the

total capacity was increased to 190,000 bushels. The first concrete tanks for grain storage were built in 1949. The original storage buildings were replaced with concrete tanks in 1955.

When Drake retired in 1973, storage capacity had been increased from 30,000 bushels to 3,170,000 bushels, and negotiations were underway for purchase of the facilities of Santa Fe Grain, which was owned by Leo Potishman of Fort

Following completion of this transaction, more storage was added on Santa Fe's location to increase the total capacity to 4,709,000 bushels.



PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION

NOVEMBER 3, 1981

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution al amendment that would allow the legislature to authorize cities, towns and other taxing units to grant exemptions from ad valorem taxes on an unproductive, underdeveloped or blighted area in order to encourage its de velopment. The amendment would also allow the legislature to authorize a city or town to issue bonds or notes to finance this development and to pledge future increases in ad valorem tax revenues from the property in such areas to repay these

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and other taxing units to encourage the ment, or redevelopment of certain areas through property tax relief and the issuance of bonds and notes.

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 117 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize a person to receive a patent to land from the Commissioner of the General Land Office under certain conditions. Application for the patent must be made within five years from approval of the amendment. The land must be surveyed, public free school land not previously patentable. The person must have a properly recorded deed to the land, which he acquired without knowledge of the patent defect and which title he and his predecessors in interest have held for at least 50 years. The person and his predecessors in interest must have continuously claimed the land and paid the taxes for at least 50 years.

This amendment does not apply to beach land, submerged land, or islands. An applicant may not use this provision to resolve a boundary dispute. This amendment will not apply to land which has been determined to be state-owned by a court of competent jurisdiction or that has a productive state mineral lease on the effective date

of the amendment. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the ommissioner of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school fund land held in good faith under color of title for at least 50 years as of November 15, 1981."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution

38 proposes a constitu-

tional amendment that would enable the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the authority to manage state funds. Funds constitutionally dedicated to specific purposes would not be subject to committee management. The committee would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, Chairman of the Senate State Affairs Committee, and the Chairman of the House of Representatives Ways and Means Committee.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to grant to a state finance management committee the power to manage the expenditure of certain appropriated funds."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that one-half of the surplus tax revenues

provided by Article VIII, Section 22, of the Texas Constitution would be placed in a Water Assis-

above the spending limit

tance Fund to be used as provided by law, includng projects for water development and conservahancement, and flood control purposes or any combination of these pur-

The amendment also provides \$500 000;000 of the general credit of the state to guarantee bonds issued in commercial markets by local political subdivisions, including cities, counties, and special districts. The amendment allows amounts to be established to decrease or retire state debt, which is defined as that debt secured by the full faith and credit of the state. The amendment would raise the interest that could be paid on authorized, but unissued, bonds guaranteed by the full faith and credit of the state from 6% to 12%.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the use of a portion of the excess revenues of the state for water development, water conservation, water quality enhancement, and flood control purposes; authorizing the use of the state's credit, not to exceed five hundred million dollars, to guarantee the bonds of cities, counties, towns, and other units of local government in the financing of projects for such purposes; increasing the interest rate that may be paid on previously approved, but unissued, state bonds; and authorizing a program to retire

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

state bonds."

House Joint Resolution 49 proposes a constitution al amendment that would exempt livestock and poultry from taxation. Currently, farm products in the hands of the producer and family supplies for home and farm use are exempt.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for the inclusion of livestock and poultry with farm products as exempt from taxation."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

81 authorizes the governing body of a county, city, school district or other political subdivisions to exempt from taxation a portion of the market value of homestead. The portion exempted may much as 40% for 1982 1984; 30% for 1985-1987. and 20% for 1988 and after. The amount of an exemption may not be less than \$5,000 unless the legislature by general law prescribes other monetary restrictions on the amount of the exemption. An eligible adult is allowed to receive other exemptions applicable provided by law. An exception is made where ad valorem tax has previously been pledged for the payment of debt.

The amendment further directs the legislature to require that notice be given to property owners of a reasonable estimate of tax on their property in certain situations.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing a political subdivision to provide property tax relief for owners of residence homesteads and changing certain property tax administrative procedures."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell an additional \$250, 000,000 in bonds increasing the Veterans' Land Fund's total bond issuance authorization from \$700,000,000 to \$950,000,-000. The amendment would increase the maximum interest payable by the state on these bonds from 6% to 10%, and permit an even higher rate, if specified by the legislature.



Although Carol Williams Zetzsche was born in Chicago, she has lived in the Lone Star State so long that she feels like a native Texan. She moved to Fort Worth as a very young child and grew up there.

Texas Highway Patrol Devoted To Courtesy, Service, Protection

As most anyone would perceive, the life of a Department of Public Safety officer is not for the faint-hearted, or for those who wish to sleep on a more regular basis--for these people who protect the highways of our state are not accustomed to life quite as we know it.

The Texas Department of Public Safety has had a long and illustrious past, from their beginning in 1935, when the Legislature passed a law creating the Texas State Police. The DPS motto of "Courtesy, Service, and Protection," most aptly illustrates the belief of the DPS, and when most officers are asked why they chose a life in service to their state, they will reply, "because I wanted to do something to help others."

To become a DPS officer, one must take an 18 week long training session at the DPS Academy in Austin, and this involves a rigid exercise program, which would tire out most any Army Drill Sergeant.

Other qualifications which an entrant in the academy must meet include being between 20 and 35 years of age, having had 60 credible college hours, and have vision no worse than 20/200 correctable to 20/20 with contact lenses. Also a candidate must have height and weight proportional and have never had a criminal record.

They must also be willing to accept assignment in any uniformed service anywhere in the state.

Up to 80 per cent of the persons who enroll in the academy never make it to graduation. As many as 200 applicants per year drop out due to the rigorous training program, but this is what it takes to handle the tough situations out in the field.

Approximately 115 to 125 persons enter the academy each year, with about 90-95 graduating.

The average years of service in the DPS is 8-10. This is due, mainly, to the fact that in 1967 to 1973, the DPS

underwent extensive growth in which the service almost tripled in size. So, many of the Troopers have been in for their entire eight year term while others have retired who were in for longer stints.

However, it is no secret that many Troopers are seeking jobs in other professions, such as safety advisors in the oil industry, and the pay is very lucrative.

Schooling troopers costs approximately \$500,000 per school, and there are usually two schools per year, one in June and one in January.

Many of the officers who are instructors are people who you might know from your own county, as instructors from all over the state are invited in at various times to tell their bit of expertise on a particular subject.

There are two major areas in the DPS: the Traffic Law Division and the Criminal Law Division.

The highway patrol, drivers license, licensing and weight division, and inspection division all come under the traffic law division.

In the criminal division, the investigation of narcotics abusers is handled by the drug agents and also, it is the division in which the Texas Rangers operate. It also deals with auto theft and intelligence.

There is also one other area in the DPS which we have failed to mention, and that is the Safety Education Service, which is the service which secured for us these facts.

Just because a person wants to be a trooper does not mean they will be selected to be one. There will be only a certain number of persons assigned to trooper service, while others will be assigned to one of the other areas already named above.

When a trooper graduates from the academy, they are assigned a place to serve by the state. They will be on probation for a year, and will ride with a senior officer during that time. After that time, they will then be

eligible to ride with a rookie trooper.

After his first year, the trooper is known as a Trooper I, and then after passing a proficiency exam and a period of time the trooper will be elevated to the status of Trooper II. However, a trooper, after two years, can take an exam to be accepted into the criminal law division to, say, work as an undercover drug agent, and if he passes, he will be re-assigned in that field.

The highest rank which a DPS officer can hold is that of Colonel, which is presently held by Col. James Adams, who succeeded Col. Wilson Speir.

To become a member of the narcotics force, a trooper must pass a test and have two years of experience, and in order to be in either the auto theft or intelligence division, a trooper must have had at least five years experience and pass a test. For a trooper to make it in the Texas Rangers, he must have been in the service for eight years and pass a test.

In the Safety Education Service, a trooper will deal with the news media and will also work with schools, civic organizations, and clubs, giving talks on law, safety, drug prevention, and many other things.

In fact, there is a drug education program which will be held in Bovina on September 29 at 7 p.m. in the school. This is a free service of the DPS and it is open to the public. Speaking for this program will be Officer Paul Hoff of the Amarillo Regional DPS office, who has been in the Safety Education program for the past year.

Hoff is a native of Hereford, where he attended school and then earned a degree in criminal law from WTSU.

He is 37 years old, and has been a DPS officer for the past 13 years. Paul served two years in Matador and has served the remainder of the time with the Amarillo office, and was a highway patrol trooper for 12 years.

He is married and he and his wife of 19 years, have two children, a

daughter, 13 and a son, 11.

Hoff is deluged with calls for speaking engagements from all types of schools, private and civic organizations, and his schedule keeps him on the road a lot.

He spends some 20 hours weekly covering the Panhandle, speaking to grown-ups, and answering questions.

One of the many questions Hoff encounters often is whether or not the DPS has a "quota."

The Department of Public Safety does not get any of the money they take in when they write a ticket. All the money, if collected by a County Judge, goes to that county for road and bridge funding, or to the county law enforcement fund. The only objective the DPS has when writing a ticket is to "detect and apprehend any and all persons who violate the law, as can be safely handled."

One of the major headaches of the DPS officer is the enormous amount of paperwork which is involved. For every ticket a trooper writes, about 15 minutes must be spent doing paperwork.

Then, if the offender wants to take the ticket to court, the trooper must then appear and testify in the case and this is even more time-consuming. Most troopers still have to go to court occasionally anyway so they can find out what happened to the people they have ticketed in the

On the average, each trooper spends about 8-10 hours a week on paperwork. On reports dealing with criminal law, one report may take as long as one to one and a half hours to fill out. And, almost every report

must be typed.

Most of the troopers do their paperwork after their shift is up, and a few do theirs when they first come on their shift, before things get busy. But, few have any extra time in which they can spare in order to do this necessary task.

There are about 86 troopers and 10 supervisors in the Panhandle of Texas and four of these officers reside and work in Parmer County.

Art Lopez and Steve Talkington of Friona, and Jim Bishop and Craig Hunt of Farwell, serve the residents of Parmer County very well. They perform, as do their counterparts in other areas of the state, a very difficult job with a great deal of courtesy and service. And, most of the time they are spending time out on the road away from their families so we can be assured of safer highways.

The supervisor for the area is Sgt.

Scott of Hereford, and the officers who serve Parmer County are under his command.


Of the utmost importance to all troopers is the cooperation they receive from other law enforcement agents, such as the city police officers and the sheriff's office. Without this cooperation, the DPS could not effectively do their job. I am sure that neither of the other two agencies could do as good a job without the aid of the DPS.

Having been organized in 1935 by an act of legislation, the DPS has served this state long and well. There is no citizen of the state who has not been affected by the job the DPS does. We all are indebted to this organization for all of the things they do and services they provide for us.

Their very presence commands respect and when in trouble, any Texan knows that the DPS will lend a hand.

J.T. Gees Travel Abroad Following His Retirement

For more than forty years J.T. and Lilah Gaye Gee have lived in the 900 Block of Summitt Avenue in Friona. Their first home on Summitt was at 911. Then, many years later they built a new home across the street at 906. During the years they lived at 911 they made plans for a new home and collected things for it.

Their back door step at 911, originally served as the cornerstone of the first brick school building in Friona, which was erected in 1911. This cornerstone is a patio stone at their new home. Some bricks from the "Old Red School" were collected and used on the patio and hearth in their new home.

Several pieces of furniture in their present home are also relics of schools of the past. One teacher's chair, which Mr. Gee has refinished, was removed from the first school he attended -- a two teacher rural school at Center Point, which is south of Carbon, Texas. A cane bottom chair from the same school survived a fire and was refinished.

J.T. son of Henry L. and Leona Bettis Gee, was born near Dublin, Texas, August 10, 1906. He attended rural schools in Eastland County until he was ready to enter high school, then transferred to Gorman High School because the high school at Carbon was not yet affiliated and he wanted to attend college.

He worked his way through Texas Tech University, from which he holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Animal Husbandry and a Master of Science degree in agricultural

Before acquiring requirements for his degree, which took him three years and two summers, he taught agriculture at Sudan. One of his pupils, Elvin Johnston, now lives in Friona and farms in the Rhea

Gee's first Parmer County teaching

experience was at Bovina, where he was the high school principal, ag teacher, math and science teacher. and boys basketball coach--for an annual salary of \$900.

Lilah Gaye Rodgers, daughter of Toy F. and Fannye Thompson Rodgers, was born near Gorman, Texas, August 5, 1911. A Mangum, Oklahoma High School graduate, she moved with her parents to Lubbock in 1928. She attended Texas Tech and received a bachelor of science degree in home economics in 1932.

While she was a student at Texas Tech, she took out one year to teach at Challis, a two room school seven miles northeast of Brownfield. Then, she returned to Texas Tech and graduated with her class in 1932.

She taught in the Bovina schools for three years--1932-1935--for an annual salary of \$765. At that time the Bovina school had a policy of not hiring two persons in the same family, so she and J.T. had to secure permission to get married and keep their teaching positions from the school board.

They were married June 2, 1934 in First Methodist Church in Lubbock. The following spring they were able to secure jobs in the Friona schools with substantial raises in their pay. His salary was increased to \$1600 and hers to \$900 per year.

At that time community responsibilities for home economics and ag teachers included serving Chamber of Commerce dinners seven times, one Chamber of Commerce banquet; running contour lines for farmers (the government paid farmers 50 cents per acre for plowing on contour lines), butchering hogs and doctoring cows, since there was no vet in Parmer

Mrs. Gee remembers, "It was so nice to have a salary increase. Then she adds, "Our having received vouchers instead of checks when Bovina Schools finances failed in the

depression days, is funny now."

When asked about some of her early Friona students, she replied, "I remember vividly how Edith Moseley (now Mrs. Herschel Johnson) looked the first time I saw her and what an outstanding student she was."

Three children were born to the couple. They were Linda, Karen (deceased) and Tom. Linda is a 1958 graduate of Friona High School and holds a bachelor's degree from West Texas State University, Canyon. She is married to Owen Houston, also a graduate of Friona High School and West Texas State.

The Houstons, who live in Lubbock, have two children: Robin, a graduate of Coronado High School, has completed three years at Texas Tech, during which time she was employed by Methodist Hospital, and is currently attending the Nursing School of the University of Texas at Austin. Jay is a senior at Cooper High School.

Linda has been teaching second grade at Hardwick Elementary School in Lubbock, after teaching two years in Amarillo and one in Morton. Owen taught Industrial Arts several years before becoming associated with Homestead Realty.

Tom was a member of Friona High School's 1963 graduating class. He attended Texas Tech University and Amarillo's Northwest Texas Hospital School of Nursing. He also attended Ashford Medical Center, San Juan, Puerto Rico, and is now an anaethetist at Kaiser Hospital in San Francisco, California.



Friona State Bank To Feature Photo Exhibit

A traveling exhibit of 34 photographs taken by W.D. Smithers depicting more than 30 years of the rugged western frontier of Texas will be on display at Friona State Bank during Maize Days September 14-18.

In 1910, at the age of 15, Smithers vowed to record all the special events he witnessed in his life. Setting up shop in San Antonio and then moving to Alpine, Texas, Smithers took thousands of shots of the harsh Big Bend terrain-Texas' most distant frontier--and its determined settlers.

The exhibit includes pictures of Will Rogers, cattle drives, Mexican curanderos (healers), and one of Smithers photographing a rattlesnake at extremely close range. Also, there is an exciting series of five photos which reveal an authentic ambush by U.S. Border Patrol officials on liquor smugglers crossing the Rio Grande from Mexico.

Smithers' adventurous career included riding with a pack mule train during a stint with the U.S. Army in Big Bend. He photographed the U.S. Mexican border from Brownsville to the Pacific for the border patrol, and also participated in several cattle drives during the 1930s.

As a teenager he photodocumented the birth of military aviation at San Antonio and its subsequent employment in Gen. John J. Pershing's campaign against Pancho Villa. The exhibit includes a photograph of "the Army's first aeroplane" at Ft. Sam Houston in San Antonio.

Since 1974, Smithers has lived quietly in El Paso, writing about the

The traveling photo exhibit was secured through The Institute of Texan Cultures in San Antonio. The photos are on loan to the Institute

from the W.D. Smithers collection at the Humanities Research Center of The University of Texas at Austin. The center owns more than 12,000 of Smithers' pictures, along with 1,207 pages of typed manuscript he has written since 1976 about his adventures as a photographer in west

Hazel Weir Is Longtime Parmer County Resident

One year after Friona was established, Hazel Butcher moved to Farwell with her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. J.S. Butcher. She was born June 15, 1902, at Woodward, Oklahoma. She attended Farwell schools and was graduated from high school in 1920. At that time Texas schools had only eleven grades.

The following year she was married to Scott Weir and they moved into a school house, which had been abandoned, five or six miles north of Friona.

Scott was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. B.C. Weir, who lived on the Old Ewing Homestead, which was later purchased by the late Ford Welch and his wife, Lucy, who presently lives at Prairie Acres.

When the Weir family moved from Kentucky to Parmer County, Scott rode on the freight train. The family's household furnishings were in one side of the box car and their livestock was in the other end

Scott later returned to Kentucky for awhile. Then worked at Cincinnati, Ohio, before returning to Friona and enlisting in the United States Army near the close of World War I in the early fall of 1918. He was stationed at Camp Mabry, which is near Austin, and took pneumonia before the War's end.

Soon after he returned to Friona, he and Hazel were married and he rented the farm on which the abandoned school house was located. The first year the couple raised pinto beans.

Hazel recalls, "Scott went to Mountain Air, New Mexico and bought a mechanical bean harvester, but we had to thresh the beans by tromping them out on a wagon sheet and winnowing them by hand."

She went on to say, "We then sacked them in 100 pound gunny sacks and sold them to T.J. Crawford, who operated Crawford's General Store, and he retailed them."

Mrs. Weir also remembers that the second year they farmed they planted maize and pinto beans, but didn't hervest anything

harvest anything.

She reported, "It rained so much in

the fall that the maize rotted in the field and the beans sprouted on the

The couple then moved to Friona and opened a cafe in a building on the west side of Main Street on the vacant lot between Allen's Jewelry and Shara Lookingbill's Beauty Shop. This building was the original home of Friona's First Baptist Church.

For the next eighteen years Scott and Hazel operated the Pioneer Cafe in this building, which later housed Scott's Second Hand Furniture Store. The back part of the building later burned and the front part was sold to Pedro Haas, who moved it to a location on Ashland and converted it into a residence.

In 1947 and 1948 Hazel was employed by Herman Dorsey, who owned the drug store at the corner of Seventh and Main. When the store was sold to Wright Williams and the late O.J. Beene, Hazel went to work at the post office. For the next seven years she was employed as substitute clerk and carrier on the rural routes.

Later she was employed as Plains Hardware's sales lady. For about ten years, she courteously and smilingly served the store's customers in whatever capacity she was needed. Since her retirement in 1964, Hazel has been a full time homemaker.

Scott was ill about sixteen years before his death in 1976.

Hazel and Scott moved to the present Weir home at 204 East Eleventh in 1945. At that time, the right-of-way for Highway 60 wasn't as wide as it is now and there were no other buildings in the locality.

"Everything has changed since then," Hazel remarked.

The Weirs had two children. Both of them grew up here. Their son, Sam lived at Seminole many years and died soon after his Dad's death.

Their daughter, Eunice, graduated from Friona High School. She is married to Babe Jeffers and they have lived in Aurora, Colorado, many years.

A long time member of Friona's United Congregational Church, Hazel is active in different phases of

church work as well as being a member of the Women's Fellowship organization.

"We used to call it Ladies Aid," she remembered.

Then added, "It seems that

Then added, "It seems that nothing is the same any more."

When asked about her hobbies, Hazel replied, "Well, I really don't have any. I used to do a lot of things, but any more it seems that time passes too fast."

However, even a casual observer would notice that she grows a lot of flowers, tends her yard, makes centerpieces from natural materials, and makes a lot of pictures.

She has done a lot of travelling and loves being outdoors. She's an avid picture taker and always comes home with enough scenery pictures to fill several pages in her album.

Also, she crochets some, takes a part in activities of the Friona Senior Citizen's organization and enjoys playing "88."

Her only sister, Mabel Huber, lives in Texico, New Mexico.

Hazel says, "I'm not a native of Parmer County, but I've sure been here a long long time."

She's one of the few people around who annually seek out the beauty spots of the town in the winter, spring, summer and fall and makes pictures of them so that she can enjoy the different seasons of the year in her own arm chair.





Pat Fallwell Spends Fifty Years In Friona

One of Friona's busiest Senior Citizens lives in a modest home at 613 Pierce. She has lived here more than fifty years and spends most of her time and energy helping local relatives and friends with one project or another.

Her goal for many years has been to make the world a better place in which to live by beginning in her own home and going from there. Somewhere down the line she must have adopted the motto: "A better world begins with me."

Sarah Pipkin was born in Hale County, Texas, near Abernathy, where she grew up. She was the fourth of nine children born to the late Mr. and Mrs. A.E. Pipkin, pioneer residents of southern Hale County

She attended high school at Abernathy and Canyon before enrolling in the prep school there. While a prep school student, she met her future husband and acquired the nick name, "Pat," which she has been known by ever since. In fact, if a stranger came to Friona and made inquiry about "Sarah Fallwell," most anyone would refer them to Buddy and Frances Fallwell, whose oldest daughter was named for her grandmother.

W.E. (Fat) Fallwell was born at Mangum, Oklahoma and moved to Castro County with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. W.C. Fallwell, in 1903.

Later the Fallwells traded their Castro County farm for a wagon yard and ice house in Hereford. Then, in 1929, the W.C. Fallwell family moved to Friona.

Pat and Fat were married February 18, 1925 and made their first home on a farm near Bellview, New Mexico. Later they moved to Hereford and from there to Friona in 1930.

Seven children were born to the Fallwells. They were Buddy, Beulah Ruth, Joe, Glenn, LaNora, Jimmie Sue and Tommie Lou. All of them except the two older sons are graduates of Friona High School.

During World War II Buddy

volunteered for duty in the United States Armed Forces, and Beulah Ruth was married to Jeff Booker before she finished high school. She later completed requirements for high school graduation in Oklahoma, so that she could qualify for a Civil Service examination.

The Bookers farmed near Headrick, Oklahoma, many years and their three children grew up there. Beulah Ruth was employed by the post office there a long time and more recently was appointed postmaster at Cash, Oklahoma, where she and Jeff now live.

In the early nineteen fifties Pat went to work for Welch-Blackburn Hardware, where she was employed for the next nine years. At that time the store was sold to Mrs. C.L. Vestal Sr. and Loyde Brewer and the name was changed to Vestal-Brewer Hardware and Furniture. Pat continued to work for Loyde, who operated the store, about three years.

During these years the children grew up, graduated from high school and were married. LaNora attended San Jacinto School of Beauty in Amarillo then returned to Friona and purchased Charm Beauty Shop from Anna Jo Blackburn. The shop was located where Taylor's Barber Shop is now.

Following her marriage to O.T. McElroy of Tulia, she sold the shop to her mother, who had decided to take a beautician's course to enable her to operate it.

While Pat was attending San Jacinto Beauty School in Amarillo, she leased the shop to different operators. Then upon completion of her course, she returned to Friona, moved the shop into a new building

just north of her residence and

opened it for business.

From early spring of 1958 until April of this year Pat operated the shop at this location, while continuing to live next door. She offered much more to her customers than hair care. Many of them were older women who didn't drive. Pat was never too busy to go after them or to take them home if necessary.

She is a long time member of Friona United Methodist Church and a charter member of the local Rebekah Lodge, in which she has held every office and is currently serving as treasurer and deputy; and a charter member of Friona Senior Citizens Friendship House, Inc.

She's also a part of the Green Thumb program and is genuinely interested in the welfare of others. As director of Friendship House, she puts in hours upon hours informing older people about various programs and going far beyond the call of duty to assist anyone who is in need.

Four of her children, Buddy, Joe, Jimmie Sue Gibson and Tommie Lou Boeckman, have lived in Friona most of their lives and have raised their families here.

One of the daughters recently remarked, "Mother keeps so busy all the time that we almost have to make an appointment to visit with her."

One son, Glenn, who has retired from the United States Air Force, and his family live in Tucson, Arizona. LaNora died a few years ago.

Pat is very proud of her family, which includes thirty grandchildren and twenty-six great grandchildren.

Her hobbies are painting and all kinds of handwork, but she can put all of these aside long enough to lend a helping hand if a need arises.

Miss Evans attended West Texas State, Canyon, one year before her marriage.





Reeve Chevrolet Employs Fourth Generation Of Family

When Reeve Chevrolet first opened for business in Friona, it was located on West Fifth Street, where Conny Dodson now has his body shop. This was in 1938 and the owners were the late F.W. Reeve and one of his sons, Glenn E. These two had done some trading with the late G.B. (Pete) Buske, who was the former Chevrolet dealer.

The next year the firm moved into a 40 x 60 building on the east side of Main Street between Fifth and Sixth Streets. In the beginning the two owners were assisted by three employees. Reeve Chevrolet gradually grew until it was necessary to add onto the building and J.H. O'Rear, who was married to the former Esther Reeve, joined forces with his father-in-law and brother-in-law.

During World War II automobile production was at a standstill as the factories were converted to making things necessary to carry on the fight. For awhile the two owners had only one part time mechanic to help keep vehicles in operation. At this time most men did their own automobile, pick-up and truck repair, so there really wasn't a lot for a dealership service department to do.

Following World War II another of F.W. Reeve's sons, Hadley, moved to Friona and joined the firm. When the factory started manufacturing cars, again, it was necessary for would-be buyers to get their names on a priority list and wait until the vehicles were available.

Glenn Sr. remembers, "Two of our early day employees were Mack Flippin and Kater Crume."

"Later," he adds, "Charles Bainum, who had operated his own shop down about where the Frio Draw is now, came to work for us and stayed until his death in 1965."

Reeve also remembers distinctly when the Frigidaire line was added to Reeve Chevrolet's merchandising.

He says, "One of our fastest selling

items was a refrigerator which could be sold for \$2 down and \$2 per month. At that time refrigerators were the only appliances made by Frigidaire."

Allo Sparkman Reeve, to whom Glenn was married in 1935, joined forces with the company in 1951 and served in the capacity of head bookkeeper for the next twenty-five years. She grew up in Childress, graduated from Panhandle High School and attended Amarillo Business College before enrolling at West Texas State University, Canyon, where she met Glenn.

He was born in Parmer County, where he grew up. Following his graduation from Friona High School, he enrolled at West Texas State.

This couple have four sons who were born here. All of them attended local schools, graduated from Friona High School and were later associated with the family business. At the time Glenn Evan, Don, Joe and Max were growing up, the Reeve family also had farming interests and the boys learned to do farm work.

Following his high school graduation and one year at West Texas State University, Glenn Evan returned to Reeve Chevrolet as sales manager, a position he has held since 1955.

Don attended West Texas State following his high school graduation. Then he taught a few years before returning to Friona and becoming a part of Reeve Chevrolet. Later he and his father-in-law, Raymond Fleming, bought the Chevrolet dealership at Dimmitt and operated Fleming-Reeve Chevrolet for several years before selling it last year.

In the fall of 1961 Joe became a full time employee of the local dealership and is still a part of it. More recently his sons, Joe Kyle and Mitchell, have been employees of the firm. These two make the fourth generation of Reeves to be involved in the operation of Reeve Chevrolet-Olds.

Max, the youngest of Glenn's and

Allo's sons, has not been actively engaged in the business since his graduation from Friona High School. At the present time he lives in Duncanville, Texas, and is an employee of the pharmaceutical division of Johnson and Johnson.

Hadley Reeve died in 1957. His wife, Fay, and two of their children, Floyd and Sharon Reeve White, still live here. Their youngest son, David, lives in Houston and Carol, the youngest of their children, lives in Lubbock.

At one time Reeve Chevrolet was also the agency for the Allis-Chalmers line of farm equipment, which was later sold to Bill Hannold, who operated Galloway Implement



Retired Teacher Is Recognized For Service

Mrs. Wana Brewer, 714 Washington, recently received a copy of a resolution from the Senate of The State Of Texas-67th Legislature, first called session, recognizing her outstanding contribution to the field of education by her thirty-five year teaching career.

A native of the Cedar Community in Grayson County, Texas, Mrs. Brewer is the daughter of the late Cecil Lee and Sarah Lucy Vestal. She was born December 14, 1913 in the same house in which her father was born.

Wana grew up in Grayson County and joined a Methodist Church, for which her grandfather had given the land, when one of her uncles, Rev. Tom Lovell, was the pastor.

The first school Wana attended was at Tom Bean, Texas. Later the Vestal family moved to Altus, Oklahoma, for a brief period. Then, they moved back to Grayson County before moving to a Parmer County farm in 1929.

A 1932 graduate of Friona High School, Wana took a post-graduate course the following year and centered her interests on learning home economics and bookkeeping.

She entered West Texas State University, Canyon, in the fall of 1934 and attended two years before she began her teaching career.

She taught two years in the Rhea Community, three in the Lakeview Community and another one in the Rhea Community School before receiving her degree from West Texas State. At Rhea she taught the fourth, fifth and sixth grades the first time then the fifth, sixth and seventh the second time. At that time Texas only had seven grades in grade school.

At Lakeview she taught grades one through four. In her first class of first graders Sam Mears and Billy Joe Mercer stand out most vividly in her memory. Then, in the following class C.H. Veazey left a standing

impression on his teacher.

On December 22, 1945 Wana was married to Loyde Arthur Brewer, a native of Vici, Oklahoma, who had come to Friona to make his home

with an uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. Art Brewer, in 1928.

Loyde, a 1933 graduate of Friona High School, served as Parmer County Clerk from 1946 to 1954 and as Parmer County Judge from 1958 until 1967.

The Brewers have two sons, Byron and Galen. They are both graduates of Friona High School. At the present time Byron lives in Fort Worth and Galen and his wife live in Austin.

Loyde, Wana and the boys lived in Farwell several years then moved back to Friona in 1954. The following year Wana had a private kindergarten in her home. Then, in 1956 she started teaching third grade in the public school system. She continued to teach third grade until her retirement this spring.

Reading, sewing, collecting bells and trying new recipes are Mrs. Brewer's hobbies.

Many of the decorations in her home are gifts and mementoes from her teaching days. Students and friends have given her bells, figurines, and other interesting knick knacks, which she displays attractively.

She enjoys antique dishes, furniture and other collectibles. Her dining room furniture was bought by her parents in the early days of their marriage. Some of her antiques were originally owned by her parents and grandparents.

She was a member of Modern Study Club many years, but in more recent years has limited her activities to those of Friona Methodist Church, Delta Kappa Gamma and the Parmer County Historical Society.

She has spent much of her time this summer working on the Parmer County history book, which is in the process of being published at the present time.

In concluding the interview with this long time teacher, who was dedicated to her profession, her

family and the community, she said, "This citation came as a complete surprise, but I feel very honored to have received it."

Another honor which came to her in 1979 was being named by the



Struves Successful In Securing Patent

By JUNE FLOYD

If the volume of sales of Sideswipe continues to grow as rapidly as it has during the past two years, the agricultural field should be well covered with "The ultimate tool in rubbing out weeds," as this product of a local inventor has been advertised.

In the first year of operation, this manufacturing concern, which has been located at 421 Euclid since its beginning in 1979, 450 Sideswipes were marketed. Then, in 1980 total sales added up to 5500.

The projected goal for this year is 10,000 and at the end of August Steve and Seva Struve, president and vicepresident of the company, feel this is a realistic goal.

The Sideswipe is a wipe on herbicide applicator which Steve invented and has recently received a registered trade mark for. Following his retirement from farming, Struve sold tractor mounted herbicide applicators, which worked on the rope wick theory.

He was dissatisfied with the lack of control of these devices, so began working on an idea for a better method of controlling weeds in fields, gardens, flower beds and truck patches. The first model, which was very crude, was constructed entirely of plastic parts and paint roller, which was covered with polyester nap

This device, which he named Sideswipe, was designed so that an operator would be in full control of applying the herbicide to weeds he wanted to destroy. It can also be used to destroy Rogues in seed production.

The Sideswipe weighs 11/2 pounds with one quart capacity reservoir and 40 square inch wiping area pad. It can cover 1800 square feet of broadcast vegetation with one filling.

The Struves recently moved the Sideswipe sales office and factory to the McFarland Building at the corner of Seventh and Euclid, which was

They have also been shipped to our neighboring countries, Canada and Mexico.

1981 Traffic Statistics Released

In the first six months of 1981, there were 217,897 traffic tickets written, and in those instances, there were 850 persons who died and 65,484 persons injured, according to DPS statistical services report released recently.

In accidents involving a motor vehicle in traffic, there was a 2 per cent increase in the number of accidents which occurred from this time last year to the present time.

In motor vehicles accidents to date there have been 157,382 accidents in which 902 persons lost their lives, and for the same period last year, there were 156,320 accidents with 886 nersons dead

In towns the size of Bovina 39,269 accidents were reported and out of those accidents 1014 were fatal. Small towns had the second largest number of accidents, next to towns with populations over 250,000.

Most accidents happened on a Friday at 5 p.m. on clear days during daylight hours. And, in most cases, no defects were reported wrong with the vehicles which were involved.

Most accidents involved a Texas driver, with normal eyesight, who was between the ages of 25 and 34 and was a male.

And, the largest number of

accidents involving a vehicle occurred on city streets, 107,014.

For the current time period, there were 218,945 accidents in Texas, as opposed to 210,972 last year at this time, which indicates a 6 per cent increase of accidents this year over that of last year.

On US and State routes, there were 63,379 accidents in the past six months, on Farm-to-Market roads there were 16,138 accidents during the past six months, and on county roads there were 8901 accidents the past six months.






