Week Sets Emphasis On Stewardship

THE SITUATION In the news involving Billie Jean King, in which Billie Jean admitted having a homosexual relationship with her former secretary and aide may adversely affect women's tennis for awhile.

And, for those who were trying to get the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) passed, the incident may turn out to be the death knell which the ERA rightly deserves.

Ms. King has been an avid supporter of the ERA. One of the charges against the amendment has been that only the radically-thinking women were pushing for its passage. Already this week, one of the television commercials in which Ms. King appears has been taken off the networks by the advertiser.

Local women who attended such events as the International Woman's Year convention in Houston, which was designed to try to "sell" the ERA came back with stories that the leaders of the movement were those interested in homosexual rights, abortion, and a number of other "rights" which the average woman would not miss, if she were deprived of them.

The national leaders, as well as most state leaders, have apparently become aware that this is the case with the ERA leaders, and the issue has faded from front stage.

As one national magazine said this week regarding the King incident, "When the people at Virginia Slims (sponsors of the pro women's tennis tour) say 'You've come a long way, baby,' they may not mean quite THAT far."

PARMER COUNTY had some good fortune recently with the creation of the 287th Judicial District Court, which comprises Parmer and Bailey Counties. For years, our judicial district has included Lamb County.

Congratulations to Jack Young, former District Attorney, on being appointed as District Judge for the new district.

We have always had a fine relationship with Judge Pat Boone, who will continue to serve the remainder of the old judicial district.

Congrats are also in order to Johnny Actkinson on being named District Attorney for the new district, and to Charles Aycock, who was named to replace Actkinson as County Attorney.

It is unusual when the rural area gets an opportunity to make gains such as this in the legal process, and we should feel fortunate to have achieved this new status.

Soil Stewardship Week will be held nationwide this year, May 24-31, according to Raymond Schueler, member of the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Since 1955, Soil Stewardship Week has been recognized in churches and schools across the nation. It is designed to focus on the nation's natural resource problems and to consider ways to solve them.

"This country must, at whatever cost, maintain the capacity of the land to produce food and fiber," says the National Association of Conservation Districts (NACD) in its booklet for the 1981 observance. NACD sponsors Soil Stewardship Week in cooperation with the nation's 3,000 soil and water conservation districts.

"With our own population at 220 million and growing and with many regions of the world depending on the United States to supplement their food supply, the need to maintain our productive capacity becomes increasingly apparent," according to NACD.

This year's event focuses on "Society's Pressure Points" as its theme and covers such topics as soil and water conservation, urbanization, and loss of prime farmland.

Information and materials for the 1981 observance of Soil Stewardship Week have been made available to local churches from Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Two Friona Patrolmen End Course

The two policemen took subjects required by the state for a Certified Officer's certificate. They include penal codes, investigations, civil laws, report writing, traffic laws, investigations and first aid.

Five FHS Students Enter State Meet

Five Friona High School students are competing in the state UIL meet at Austin this weekend, four in the literary events, and the fifth, Sherry O'Brian, in the girls track meet.

Mark Blankenship and Mark Zachary, Friona's crack debate team, battled their way back to the state meet that they won last spring as juniors, so the FHS duo will be on hand to attempt to defend their title and win a coveted state meet medal two years in a row.

Pam Perez, the regional shorthand champion, will compete in that event at Austin, and Janette Reed, who was the silver medal winner at Lubbock in newswriting, also will compete in the UIL meet.

Miss O'Brian was the lone member of the district champion track team to qualify for the state meet, placing second in the 400-meter dash in the time of 59.2.

Blankenship and Zachary have had a good spring in the debate competition, and come off gold medal performances at both district and regional, two titles they did not win last year, although copping the state's top prize.

At the recent regional literary meet, Stanley Ellis placed fourth in headline writing, and was alternate to the state meet in that event. Patti Hinton reached the semi-finals in poetry reading, but did not place.

\$349.7 Million Farm Product Sales For Co.

The market value of agricultural products sold by the 753 farms in Parmer County amounted to \$349.7 million for 1978 or an average of \$464,474 each, up from \$261.5 million in 1974 with an accompanying increase in production costs, according to a preliminary report of the 1978 Census of Agriculture released recently by the Bureau of the Census, U.S. Department of Commerce.

A breakdown of the county's total agricultural sales for 1978 followed by that for 1974, is as follows: Crops, \$76.4 million compared with \$80.8 million; livestock, poultry, and their products, \$273.3 and \$180.7 million.

While the value of gross sales rose, the farmers' costs also climbed since 1974. For example, expenditures for feed for livestock and poultry for 1978 were \$73.7 million compared to \$71.3 million; costs of gasoline, diesel and other petroleum products were \$13.7 million compared to \$6.5 million. Farm energy costs of all types totaled \$15.7 million for 1978. The estimated market value of machinery and equipment per farm increased from \$67,801 to \$97,368.

Of the total farms in the county, 331 had gross sales of \$100,000 or more and 74 had sales of under \$10,000. Farms operated by individuals or families represented 86 per cent of the total; farms operated by corporations accounted for 4 per cent. Some 66 per cent of the

operators owned all or part of the land they operated.

In 1978 the average age of farm operator was 45.1 years. Since 1974 the proportion of operators listing farming as their principal occupation changed from 89 per cent to 87 per cent.

Data in the reports for acreage and inventories for 1978 and 1974 are generally comparable; however, improved coverage in 1978, especially of smaller farms, should be taken into consideration in making direct comparisons of farm counts. Dollar values have not been adjusted for changes in price levels.

Other results of the census show the 753 farms counted in 1978 had an average size of 787 acres. For 1974, 704 farms were counted with an average size of 824 acres. The land in farms totaled 592,652 acres in 1978 and 580,073 acres in 1974. Crops were harvested from 351,405 acres in 1978 and 349,332 acres in 1974. Land irrigated decreased from 338,596 acres in 1974 to 332,271 acres in 1978.

The number of cattle and calves increased from 157,598 in 1974 to 246,342 in 1978, while farms with 500 or more on hand accounted for 85 per cent. Fed cattle accounted for 91 per cent of the total 527,193 cattle and calves sold in 1978.

The number of hogs and pigs changed from 4,421 in 1974 to 2,484 in 1978. The number of sheep and

Chitto Nabs Gold At Regional Meet

Hurdler Chitto Caballero won a trip to the state meet after claiming the Region I gold medal in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles last weekend in Lubbock.

The Chieftain track star, who will be competing in his second state meet, turned in a sparkling 38.52 in the regional finals, a new personal best, a school record for the event, and the best time logged for the event in the Panhandle area this year, for all classifications.

Caballero will be the alternate in the 110-meter high hurdles, as he finished third in that race at regional in the time of 15.35. Kyle Brack of Spearman won the race in 14.85, and Jerry Neatherlin of Denver City was second in 15.1.

Robert Osborn won a ribbon in the intermediate hurdles race won by Caballero, finishing sixth in the time of 40.92.

The Chieftain mile relay team, although posting its best time of the season and cutting virtually five seconds off their time from the district meet, had to settle for third place in the meet, and missed the state meet by one place.

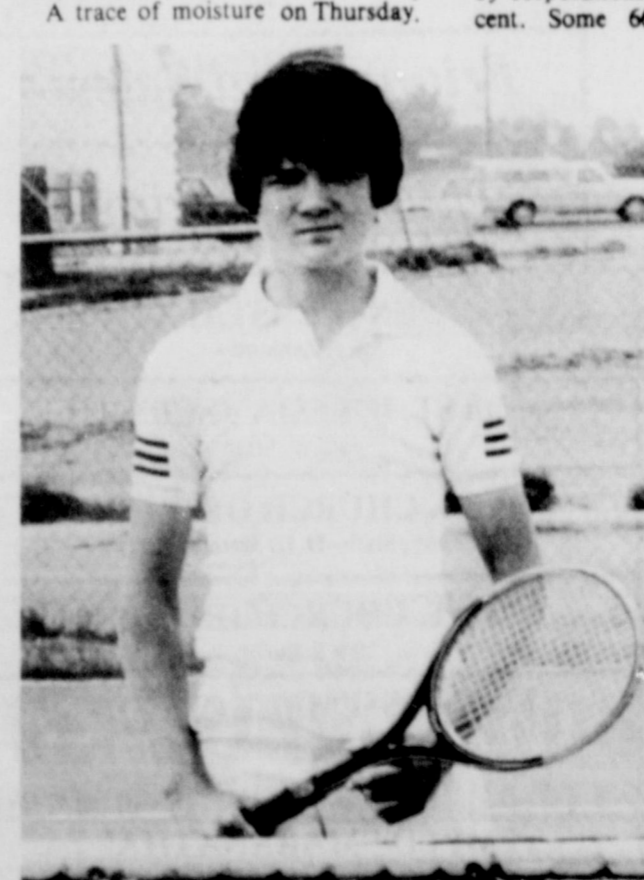
Friona's time in the event was 3:23.03. Brady won the event in 3:20.62, and Perryton was second in 3:20.86.

Also competing were Mike Neill in the high jump and Nelson Jackson in the 400-meter dash, but neither managed a ribbon.

Friona scored 29 points in the meet, good for sixth place in the regional field, won by Tulia with 50 points. District winner Muleshoe managed only three points at the regional meet, (30th place) and Dimmitt managed ten points, which spoke well for the quality of Friona's regional entries.

Maynard Battles Way To State

Mike Maynard, Friona High School's number one boys tennis player, earned a trip to the state tennis meet last weekend at Lubbock, after winning three matches at the Region I meet and battling his way into the finals.

Maynard, who was seeded fourth in the regional meet, defeated Dalhart's Kip Gentry, 6-0, 6-3 in the first round, to reach the quarterfinals.

In the quarterfinals, the Friona net star disposed of Cliff Elkin of Coleman in a tough battle, 7-5, 6-4. That put Maynard in the semi-finals, where he downed Donny Volger of Abilene Wylie, in another battle, 7-6, 1-6, 6-2.

The three Friday wins put Maynard into the tournament finals on Saturday, where he met Dalhart's David Pederson. The Dalhart player had pulled a surprising upset over the region's number one seeded player, Randall Stotts of Tahoka, in the quarterfinals.

Pederson downed Maynard, 6-0, 6-2 for the regional title, but both players earned a trip to Austin, as Maynard received the regional silver medal.

Mark Zachary also competed in the regional singles, but drew Tahoka's Stotts, the pre-meet favorite, in the first round, and suffered a 6-2, 6-1 loss.

The Chieftain doubles team of Mitch Massey and Brian Edelman lost to Tommy Lafon and Alvarro Martinez of Kermit, 6-4, 6-1.

Maynard will compete in the state meet next weekend.

APPLE POTATO PANCAKES
(Makes 4 to 6 servings)
3 eggs
1 cup enriched self-rising flour*
1 1/4 cups milk
1/2 tsp. salt
1 cup shredded potatoes
1/4 cup chopped onion
4 apples, peeled and sliced
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup brown sugar
Beat eggs in large bowl. Add flour, milk and salt; let stand at least 30 minutes. Stir in potatoes and onion. Divide batter into four floured and buttered 9-inch pie pans or one 15 1/2 x 10 1/2 x 1-inch jelly roll pan. Bake in preheated 425° oven 20 to 25 minutes. Melt butter and sugar in skillet. Add apples; saute until soft. Divide apples evenly over individual potato pancakes or over one large pancake.
*Spoon flour into dry measuring cup; level. Do not scoop.

PORK 'N EGG BRUNCH makes a good breakfast dish or late morning brunch, notes the Texas Department of Agriculture home economist. It can be prepared for early morning or served as a nutritious snack from the refrigerator.

PORK 'N EGG BRUNCH
1 lb. ground pork
1 3 C. chopped onions
1 beaten egg
3-4 tsp. salt
1-4 tsp. paprika
1 2 tsp. pepper
1 2 C. bread crumbs
3 or 4 hard cooked eggs, peeled
1 2 C. sliced mushrooms
Cherry tomatoes for garnish

Place pork, onions, beaten egg, salt, paprika, pepper and bread crumbs in a bowl and blend together until well mixed. In a small loaf pan place half the pork loaf mixture. On top of the meat, place the peeled hard cooked eggs, end to end. Cover with the remainder of the meat. Arrange meat so that it completely encloses eggs. Top the meat with crushed cornflake crumbs. lamb's changed from 3,069 to 4,108. Acreages of crops harvested for 1978 and 1974 were as follows: corn for grain, 183,480 acres vs. 154,994 acres; wheat, 54,785 acres vs. 75,369 acres; sorghum for grain, 26,637 acres vs. 61,787 acres; soybeans, 7,389 acres vs. 3,249 acres; cotton, 57,220 acres vs. 33,762 acres.

Production of corn for 1978 was 21.7 million bushels compared to 17.6 million bushels in 1974.

The figures are for farms qualifying under the definition: Any place from which \$1,000 or more of agricultural products were sold, or normally would have been sold, during the census year.

The agriculture census was conducted in 1979 to obtain data on the Nation's farm production and sales calendar year 1978. Information from the farm census, the 21st of a series which began in 1840, will be used by Federal, State and county agencies, agricultural colleges, agricultural and business groups, and farmers to help make a variety of decisions about agricultural programs and policies.

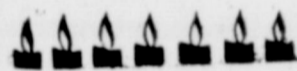

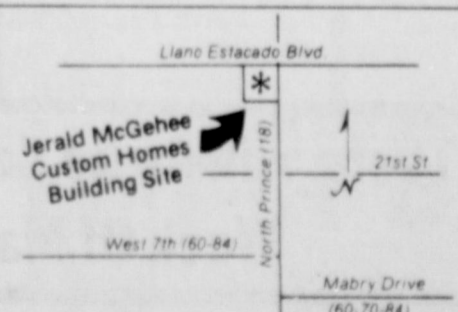

Sorghum Growers Set Marketing Program

Three sorghum growers will be chosen to participate in a Sorghum Farmers Market Development Team to Mexico next fall as part of Grain Sorghum Producers Association's market development work. The team will work with U.S. and Mexican Government officials, Mexican grain importers and the Latin American Director of U.S. Feed Grains Council.

The National Grain Sorghum Producers Association (GSPA) began feed grains foreign market development in 1958, with offices in Rome Italy, and Bogota, Columbia. It was from this effort, that U.S. Feed Grains Council was formed to work with USDA's Foreign Agriculture Service to promote overseas sales of all U.S. feed grains. GSPA has continued to work on foreign market problems that are specific to sorghum.

Mexico is now the second largest volume buyer of U.S. sorghum. Even larger purchases are likely if some problems can be solved. This will be

the work of the Sorghum Farmers Market Development Team.

Three GSPA members will be selected for this expense paid (travel, meals and lodging) trip at the end of GSPA's current membership campaign. One winner will be chosen from each of three categories of members. The winner of Category I will be the GSPA member who has contacted and enlisted the most GSPA new members and membership renewals before the end of the campaign on October 1. The winner of Category II will be chosen by drawing from the names of the first one thousand GSPA members who renew next year's membership in advance. (GSPA's next fiscal year begins October 1, 1981.) The winner of Category III will be chosen by drawing from the names of the first one thousand new members to join GSPA.

All sorghum farmers are eligible to compete for a position on the Farmers Market Development Team. GSPA members will receive details in the mail and will contact sorghum growers who are not GSPA members.

Karate Demonstration Scheduled May 17

"This is the biggest thing that will happen in New Mexico and Texas Karate," said Waldo Casarez, head instructor of the Friona Karate Dojo, about the visit of Master Fusei Kise of Okinawa to Clovis, New Mexico and Friona.

The world's youngest Grandmaster of Shorin-Ryo Karate and members of the Clovis and Friona Shorin-Ryo Karate Dojo's will give a two hour demonstration of the self defense form Sunday, May 17, at 2 p.m. in the gym of Yucca Junior High School in Clovis.

Master Fusei Kise, 47, is one of about six true 9th degree red belt karate experts on earth. As the youngest man ever to become a karate master, he won the all-Japanese National Karate Championship in 1963.

Master Kise is visiting Clovis and Friona for the sole purpose of conducting a five-day clinic for instructor Waldo Casarez and his students.

The Okinawan Shorin-Ryi Karate class of the Clovis and Friona Karate Dojo, practices a unique self-defense system, unique because of its history and techniques. The sport loving Japanese changed much of the self-defense systems in the 1930's but the Okinawan system escaped the change and was preserved by grand master Hohai Soker, who was in Argentina at the time of the changes. The genuine Okinawan system and its concepts were taught to only a few people and Master Kise was one of them.

Kise, a native of Okinawa, personally supervises over 1,000 karate students in his native Japan. His appearance in Clovis is part of an American tour through which the Kenshin-Kan Association was formed in the United States as well as in Germany, France, Australia, Nigeria, Argentina, and throughout Asia, in which all schools of the Shorin-Ryi Kershin Kay system will be internationally recognized.

Tickets for Sunday's demonstration are \$3.00 for adults and \$1.00 for children 5-9. Children under five are free. Tickets can be purchased at the door or from any Friona karate member.

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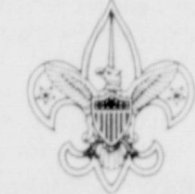

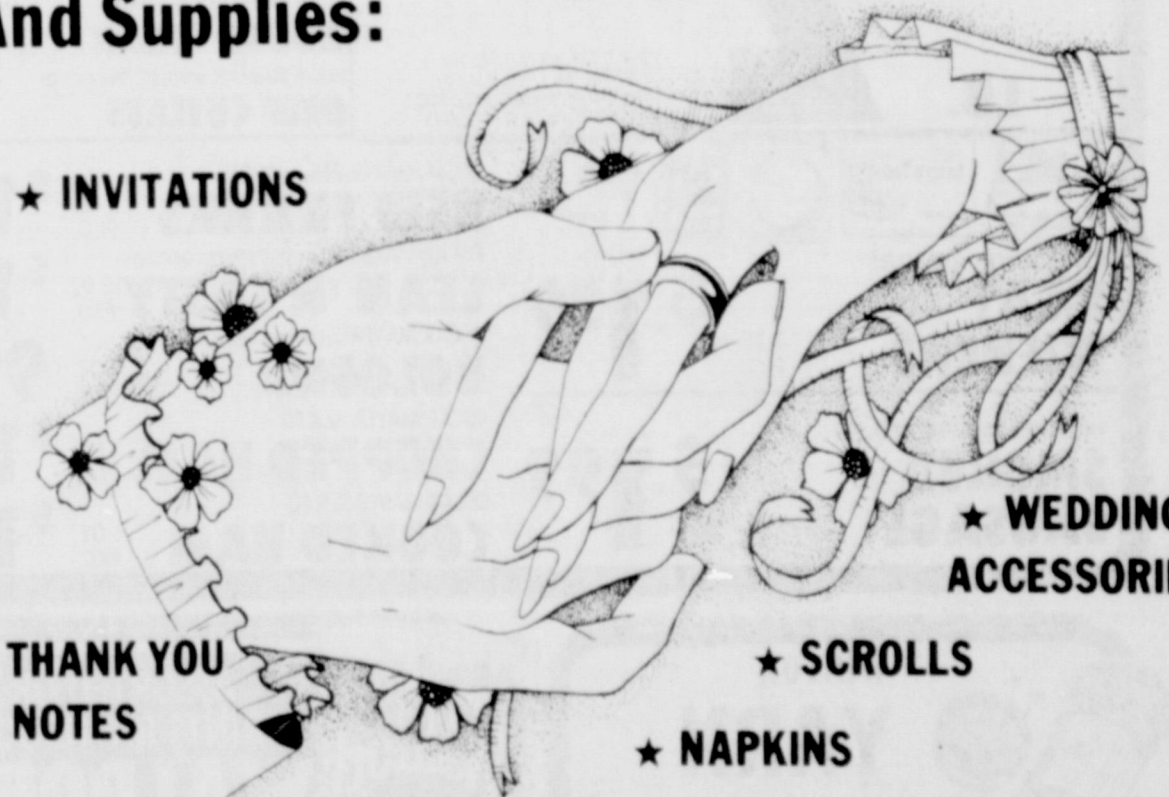
