The Texas livestock industry will be better informed about brucellosis because of the Texas brucellosis advisory committees, John Armstrong, Kingsville, chairman, Texas Animal Health Commission, said in Austin recently. He was speaker at a special orientation committee meeting.

Members of this area's brucellosis advisory committee are: Dr. Dale Barber, Channing; Vincent Braddock, Dimmitt; E.H. Brainard, Pampa; Julian Bivins, Amarillo; Jim Finley, Claude; John R. Henard, Wellington; Nolon Henson Jr., Happy; F. Jake Hess, McLean; Clarence Martin, Friona; A.E. Pronger Jr., Stratford; John Shelton III, Amarillo; and J.R. Taylor, Amarillo. Taylor is chairman of this area's committee.

There are 15 such committees in Texas, made up of persons actively engaged in the livestock industry. Each committee has 12 members. Names were selected from more than 600 persons suggested statewide from organizations and individuals.

Committee goals include: providing the TAHC with advice on program related matters from the producer viewpoint, and maintaining a working knowledge and awareness of the current program, especially as it relates within each area.

Land Bank Interest Increases

Interest rates on all Land Bank variable rate loans will be increased to 11 per cent on farm loans and 11½ per cent on rural residence and farm-related business loans, William C. Liles, manager of The Federal Land Bank Association of Muleshoe announced recently.

These rates become effective October 1, 1981.

"There continues to be substantial upward pressure in the bond market

with no relief from the record high interest rates anticipated in the near future," Liles said.

"The September bond issue carried a face rate of 17.85 per cent on nine-month bonds and 17 per cent on 2½ year bonds," he continued.

"The Bank's average cost of funds prior to the issue was in excess of 11 per cent."

Liles said that marketing conditions and a ceiling cost earnings spread prompted the increase in the variable interest rate.

"Certainly we regret this action is necessary," he said. "However, even with the increase, our rate remains substantially below market."

50 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 4, 1931

The tonsil and adenoid clinic held under the auspices of the Parmer County Health Association this past week was a tremendous success. Dr. R.R. Willis operated on 23 children during the two-day clinic, originally scheduled for one day but extended by the good response.

45 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 4, 1936

A WPA project has been accepted for straightening, broadening and deepening that part of the channel of Frio Draw which passes through or just south of the city limits. Surveyors have been busy on the project for several days and the actual work of moving dirt will begin in the near future.

A two-weeks singing school closed Saturday night, August 31 at Rhea. An average of 40 persons attended the school.

40 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 5, 1941

The 1941-42 term of the Friona Independent School opened in earnest Monday, when a large enrollment of both grade and high school students arrived at the buildings and got down to the work of the term. Superintendent of Schools W.L. Edelman seemed mighty well pleased with the enrollment and the spirit of both the teachers and the students. A total of 170 students were enrolled in high school. (Editor's note: Total enrollment was unavailable).

35 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 30, 1946

A local building boom finds several new residences under construction, with others having been just recently completed. Among those in the process of finishing new homes are Euel White, H.C. Davis, H.H. Lloyd, J.H. Hinds, Guy Latta, W.C. Osborn and Milton Blalock.

The Parmer County Hospital Board has secured the administration building from the Prisoner of War Camp at Hereford as a temporary home, it was announced this week. The building is to be moved to the hospital grounds as soon as possible.

30 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 30, 1951

Twenty-three boys have signed up for football this year, and Coach Raymond Cook says he anticipates a good year, as nine of the players are seniors with three years experience. The seniors returning are Max Cruse, Max Wells, Doyce Barnett, Walter Haws, Ross Miller, Frankie Allen, Frank Reed and Jay Cobb. Juniors are Ben Jordan, Arnold Fangman, Darrell Robbins and D.O. Robason.

25 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 30, 1956

In a slight deviation from the way most of the Panhandle counties went in the gubernatorial race, U.S. Senator Price Daniel rolled over his opponent, Ralph Yarborough, 1036-627 in Parmer County in the Democratic primary runoff Saturday. On the local scene, E.G. Phipps captured the office of county commissioner, and will represent Precinct One for the next four years. He won over E.R. Day by a tally of 471 to 348.

20 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 31, 1961

Joe Coronado was hired and began work this week as golf pro at Friona Country Club. Friona's city commission Monday approved a \$166,705 budget for the fiscal year starting October 1, 1961.

15 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 1, 1966

The Friona Chamber of Commerce ended its search for a manager last Thursday by hiring Mrs. Chuck (Mary Kay) Everitt for the position.

Carolyn Hamilton, 18-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Hamilton, was crowned Friona's "Miss Sugar Beet" in a contest here last Saturday.

10 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 2, 1971

Parmer County scholastics totaled 3,137 at the beginning of this week. The figure was probably a record for the beginning of school, as two schools indicated all-time records. Friona led the way, with 47 per cent of the total. Enrollment in Friona schools stood at 1490 on Monday.

This was up 42 from the first-day total and an increase of 45 from the same date a year ago. The Farwell school system showed 675 scholastics, up slightly from a year ago, according to Superintendent W.M. Roberts. Bovina's enrollment on Monday stood at 662, also up slightly from a year ago. The total enrollment at Lazbuddie amounted to 310 students.

5 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 5, 1976

Residents of the Friona area watched a tornado funnel dance around in a cloud northwest of the city just before noon on Thursday. However, the funnel did not get on the ground to stay, and no damage was reported.

Joe Lewellen was appointed by County Judge Paul Fortenberry to fill out the unexpired term of Thomas Lewellen, Precinct 1 Commissioner, due to his recent death.

Story Hour Begins 18th Year Here

Story Hour at the local library began its 18th consecutive year Thursday morning. Sixteen children were present to enjoy a film showing the proper care of reading materials.

Story Hour was originated in 1948 by Mrs. Bill Stewart who began with four children and a few borrowed books. When the library was established in 1963 it took over the Story Hour program and has continued with it each year since.

Last year 336 children registered for the program which is serviced entirely by volunteer readers. The children enjoy not only hearing a good story and the viewing of entertaining films but participate in crafts, games, exercises, coloring, rhythm bands and activity records along with the study of safety, shapes, nature, health, grooming and other helpful activities.

Librarian Billie Fairchild invites area four and five year olds to attend this educational and fun activity which is held weekly at the library.

Officials Hail State Exemption

After a long two-year wait, members of the board of directors and stockholders for the Grain Producers Incorporated alcohol plant can now breathe a sigh of relief. Their fight for tax exemption is over and they won.

Guy Austin, spokesman for the group, said they were pleased on August 11, 1981 when the Legislature finally passed the tax exemption bill.

Austin said that Bill Clayton and Pete Laney co-sponsored the bill in the house, with Bill Sarpalius sponsoring the bill in the senate.

The vote to grant the tax exempted status was 28-2 in the senate, and was 105-14 in the house.

Austin said, also, that the Texas Farmers Union and American Agriculture were two organizations which aided in the push for the bill to be passed.

The GPI people also employed two fulltime lobbyists in Austin during the time the bill was being considered.

According to Austin, he had made at least 12 trips himself to the state capital, and all of the members had spent much time and money reaching this status, so it was a major step for GPI.

Now, the directors will put together a finance package to take to their financiers, which should be ready in mid September, and all of the legalities will have to be worked out. It will probably take from 60-90 days for all of the legal red tape to be cut through.

After that time, the directors will then be taking bids on the construction of a one hundred gallon per day plant, to be constructed somewhere in this area.

The alcohol plant will employ about 100 persons, and will be environmentally clean. And, the plant will produce 100,000 gallons of alcohol per day. It takes one bushel of grain to make 2.5 gallons of alcohol.

There are approximately 437 members of the GPI cooperative, and 70-75 per cent of the membership is from Parmer and Bailey counties.

Members of the board of directors include Guy Austin of Farwell, president; Burt Williams of Farwell, vice president; Grady Sorley, Bovina, secretary-treasurer; and members Herman Wheatley of Brownfield, Morris Killough of Muleshoe, Doug Bale of Muleshoe, Bobby Redwine of Lazbuddie, James Higgins of Hereford and Jim Owens of Tulia.

Ministerially Speaking

Since the 27th of this month the Ministerial Alliance is sponsoring a "Loyalty Sunday"--an effort to get as many Friona folks as possible into the church of their choice--I thought I would write on the power and purpose of worship.

THE HOW & WHY OF PUBLIC WORSHIP

"Why bother about going to church?"

"I've quit going to church, I don't have time."

"I can worship just as well out of doors as I can in a church."

We live in a practical age. "Why worship?" many ask. It builds no bridges. It bakes no bread. What purpose does it serve?

Three of the most traditional arguments in answer to that question are (1) The Bible says we should. "Forsake not the assembling of yourselves together. (2) The church needs our support. If the church is to survive and serve as the witness that is desperately needed in our day it needs the loyalty and support of its members. (3) If we are followers of Christ we must worship, for we know it was the habit of Christ to go and worship on the Sabbath.

There are other more personal reasons why we need to worship.

1. We need the fellowship of like-minded persons. We live in an age that tends to isolate, dehumanize, destroy one's sense of belonging. We need relationships.

2. We need to be reminded of values that the world tends to make us forget. We live in a secular, materialistic culture where values are placed on things. Worship reminds us that the real values are personal and spiritual. It also reminds us that to choose not to live by God's moral laws is to know destruction in our own lives.

3. We need the assurance of forgiveness and an awareness of God's grace. According to the New Testament, "all have sinned and fallen short..." It makes no exceptions. Guilt can be a terrible burden. Worship assures us that "As far as the east is from the west so far has He removed our transgressions from us."

4. We need a reminder and an opportunity to offer thanksgiving and praise. We need to experience the

meaning behind the words of the Doxology, "Praise God from whom all blessings flow."

5. We need a sense of direction and perspective. We are often confused, not knowing which direction to go. We are like someone lost in the woods, going in circles until we can climb a hill and see things in perspective.

6. We need a change of pace. We live in a time of speed, noise, competition, and tension. At least once every seven days we need a pause in this activity to withdraw for a moment and discover the meaning of the words of the Psalmist, "Be still and know that I am God."

7. We need our faith deepened, our hopes renewed. It is through worship that we learn of God's plan, and God's constant activity in our midst. Realizing this gives us hope even in the darkest of hours.

8. We need to renew our dedication and our commitment to Christ. George Buttrick once said to a group of seminary students that the purpose of going to church was to remind ourselves of One who lived 1900 years ago who is the Way, the Truth and the Life.

9. We had a Children's Sermon recently which said that just as a candle needs a match to get it going, air and wax to burn, so Christians need worship, study and prayer to keep the light of their faith from going out.

10. Worship has a subtle way of making families stronger, individuals kinder and life better.

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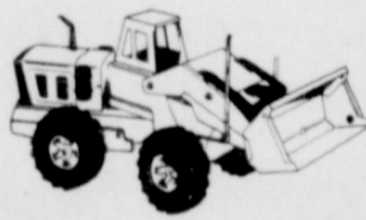

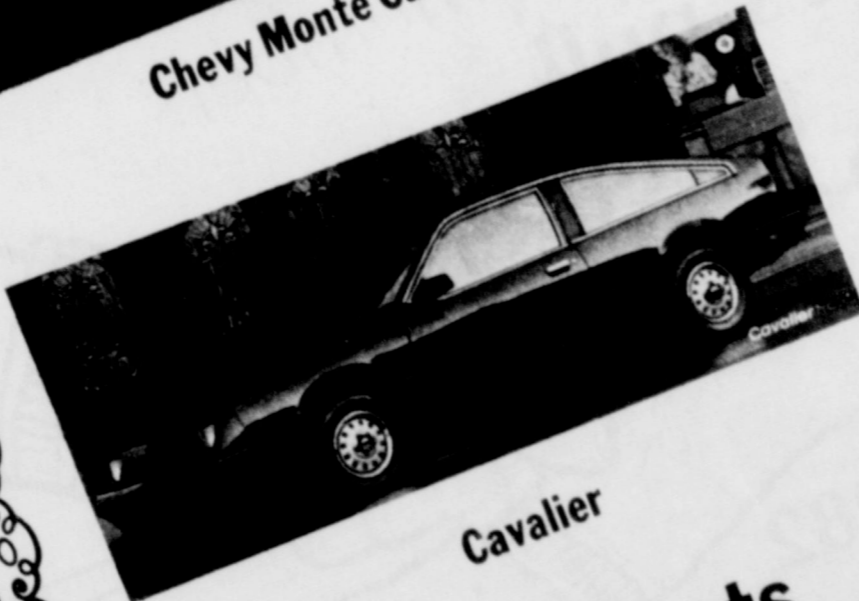
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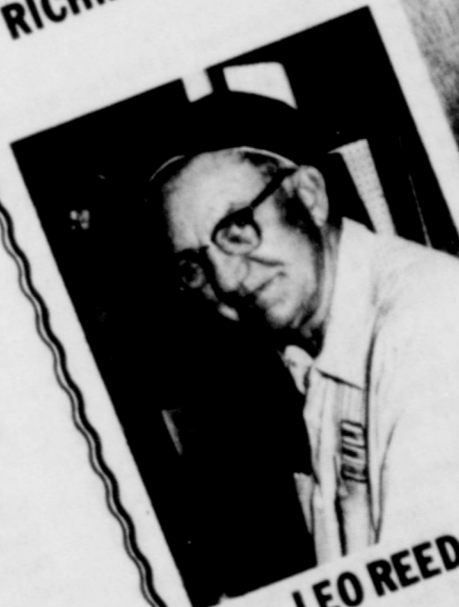

Rites Held Friday For Accident Victim

Funeral services for Pedro Guerrero, 19, of Bovina were held Friday, September 18, at 2 p.m. in the First Baptist Church of Bovina with Rev. Lupe Silva, pastor of Mission Bautista Belen and Rev. J.L. Bass, pastor of First Baptist Church officiating.

Burial was in Bovina Cemetery under the direction of Parsons-Ellis Funeral Home.

Guerrero, an employee of Borsberry Construction Company, was working as "flag man" for the company which is re-paving small sections of Highway 60 between Bovina and Friona.

Department of Public Safety spokesman Art Lopez said that Guerrero died of head injuries, after being struck by a fertilizer truck driven by Jimmy Edward Owens, 69, also of Bovina.

Owens was westbound on Highway 60, and was being directed into the eastbound lane at the point where the highway was being reconstructed.

Owens told the DPS investigator that a cattle truck, eastbound, was not yielding room for the two to meet on the eastbound lane and its shoulder, and he had to swerve to the

right to avoid hitting the truck. That was when he struck Guerrero.

Lopez said that Owens' vehicle was going no more than 20 miles per hour at the time of the incident. Guerrero was hit by a wheel on Owens' truck and knocked to the pavement. He was facing more or less toward the south, and probably never saw the truck, Lopez said.

Bovina Justice of the Peace Wayne Spears pronounced Guerrero dead at the scene. The accident occurred Monday, September 14, at 5:30 p.m.

Guerrero was born June 15, 1962 in Edinburg, Texas, and had moved to Bovina 12 years ago. He was a Baptist.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Elias Guerrero of Bovina; four sisters, Mrs. Alejandrina Cruz and Mrs. Celia Cavazos, both of Bovina, Mrs. Nora Telles and Maria Adelina Guerrero, both of Clovis, New Mexico; five brothers, Antonio, Juan Jose, Elias Jr., Santos and Martin, all of Bovina; and his grandmother, Mrs. Thomas Guerrero of Edinburg.

Pallbearers were Raul Cruz, Magdalena Cruz, Alfredo DeLaRosa, Rabian Guerrero, Juan Telles and Tony Guerrero.

Radio Problems Are Aired With Court

Several members of the Parmer County law enforcement community were on hand at the County Commissioners meeting to voice their displeasure with the current situation involving the radio transmission problems within the county.

Parmer County Sheriff Bill Morgan led off the discussion and was joined by two representatives of the Motorola Communications division, the company which services the radio equipment.

Morgan said the transmission problems had been going on all along, but the majority of the problems had, in the past three years, gotten worse.

"We can get 5-6 miles out of town and won't be able to use the radio," said Morgan, when the Motorola reps questioned him on what the problems were.

Local police officers, members of the Texas Department of Public Safety, sheriff's officers, as well as the mayor of Friona and the city manager of Bovina were on hand to hear the questions and answers fired at the Motorola people.

Harold Lewis and Dick Breit of Motorola, tried to explain why the company, after being called on numerous occasions, could not explain or correct the problems in the transmission between the county courthouse and all other parts of the county.

"I don't want that bunch (Motorola) back down here again, if all they are going to do is tell us we have a 'problem' and then send us a \$200 bill for it, telling us something we already know," retorted Sheriff Morgan, when the Motorola people offered to come down and bring one of their engineers to explore the problem.

According to the Motorola representatives, the problem was possibly an intermodulation, caused primarily by a mix-up of signals from an FM station and a TV station in the area, which was desensitizing the station there in Farwell, thus causing all the signals to mix together and cause the receivers to try to listen to all frequencies instead of the one they

were supposed to listen to.

Lewis and Breit said they would look into having an engineer come down and look at placing the tower on Parmerton Hill, the highest spot in the county, in hopes to correct the current situation. But, they made no guarantees.

And, if an engineer came out, he would get \$300 per day and Lewis said he thought the problem could be found within three days.

There was talk of moving the tower, antenna and line to Parmerton Hill or maybe even to Friona, wherever the engineer agreed would be the best pick-up location and this would cost somewhere in the neighborhood of \$6,200.00. There would also have to be another additional base in Farwell to replace the unit moved to a new location.

Up until now, the law enforcers had been using an old 37180 radio unit, which would work for all except for the officers in Friona where this unit was done away with. This is the radio unit and frequency over which ambulance and fire departments operate and is not used for law enforcement anymore, except in Parmer County, now.

Officers tried to make the Motorola reps realize that the main issue was not what had been done in the past, but what could be expected to be done in the future, as their future depended on the operation of this transmission.
