Pushed By Co. Officials

Administrator Warns That WPA Funds Are Gone: Cuts Are Made

Wasting no time following their introduction to their offices, G. C. Tubbs, county judge, A. S. Cummings, H. J. Nelson and E. R. Harris, commissioners made a trip Wednesday morning to Lubbock to confer with G. M. Garrett, state highway engineer.

The purpose of the meeting was to get the Floydada-Silverton highway designated as a state highway as far as South Plains in order that WPA labor might be used on the roadbed in preparation for future paving.

An appropriation has already been made for a "farm to market" road project to begin sometime after July 1. Farm to market funds may not be used on a designated highway, therefore it is planned to use the WPA workers to South Plains, if designated and farm to market money from South Plains to the county line.

WPA workers may not be used on a highway that is not a designated highway by the state. If the judge and commissioners can manage to overcome these two obstacles it is possible that another portion Foydada's road problem will be solved.

Garrett was also questioned concerning the Petersburg highway which has been proposed. No right of way has yet been set, although two possible routes have been proposed

Judge Tubbs and the commissioners plan to make a trip to Austin January 23 in an effort to get the highway north designated as far as South Plains and get it set up as a WPA project for this county. It is believed that the highway department will grant this request with the assistance of Garrett and WPA administrator Jones of Lubbock. Tubbs plans to do all in his pow er to close the present unpaved "gap" in Floyd county northward and then cooperate with the other county judges in getting appropriations to make a complete hard surface road from Claude, through the Palo Duro canyon, up the caprock to Silverton and to Floydada.

Such a paved route would save thousands of miles annually to truck lines and commercial vehicles going







Funds Run Low

WPA Administrator Jones of Lubbock warned the county judge and commissioners that government and state WPA funds had "run out" and that reductions will have to be made

Although the commissioners and county judge have little or no control over WPA funds, the WPA administrator told them that orders from San Antonio had instructed him that 284 WPA workers in the 24 counties of this district must be released because of lack of funds. At present workers in this county are being cut off instead of being added because of this fund shortage. Certainly nothing can be done until more appropriations are made by the government.

Reports of the incident said the scientist is a man of some standing and that the scientific world has every reason to take him more or less seriously. He had not intended to make the story of his gadget public until he had experimented some more but was irked by slighting remarks made about his pet experiment.

R. A. Dickson of the Texas Agricultural Experiment station at Spur, shows some very interesting figures. A terraced field over an 11-year period gave an average income yield of \$7.84 a year. The 11-year total income was \$222.89 while that with the rows running down the slope was \$134.56. The difference

in the gross income per acre was \$86.23 in favor of the terraced area. In other words each inch of rainfall held on the land returned an extra income of \$3.86 per acre.

In 1935 when County Agricutural Agent D. F. Chapman And Camp Speak At Rotary Mr. and Mrs. L. V. Chase of Clar-

M. T. Camp, band director of Floydada High school, and L. W. Chapman, superintendent of the Floyd County REA, were the speakers on the Rotary program Wednesday afternoon.

Camp described in detail the Floydada Band's recent trip to the "Although we Cotton Bowl game. were the smallest band there, with only 25 musicians, we feel that we managed to advertise and cause attention to be drawn to Floydada."

"I feel that the trip will make everyone of the members work harder to improve and be in the class of some of the bigger bands we saw down there." Camp said, "We should have 60 or 70 members in our band but unless we cooperate and call attention to band work we will never reach that mark.

Camp expressed his thanks for the fine cooperation and the assistance he received in taking the boys to Dallas. He offered his services and the band's at any public function where the band could help entertain or advertise Floydada.

Following the band director was Chapman, who described the efforts of the REA Co-op in detail. First off Chapman denied that the REA was at any time a "political corporation.

"It started in 1935 after several years of hard study and work, and after much hard work and effort did Floyd county manage to get her REA Co-op.

"The Floyd County REA is one of the largest in Texas with its 170 miles of line, and a large number of farmers and families are asking that extension lines be run to their communities, which were not figured in the original plans.

"Two sub-stations are planned, one near Sand Hill and the other near Aiken, the power will be obtained from Tuco and the main line will handle irrigation well motors the lines running to Dougherty and other communities from the main line carry less power but will handle a 10 horsepower motor if the proper starting device is used.

"The rural families will be able to have all of the comforts of town residences, including refrigeration lights and other appliances for possibly 5 dollars per month.

"The REA has a loan division that will give a loan to have the rural home wired for electricity, and the owner has 5 years in which to repay the loan. Fifty homes on the Dougherty line will have their wiring et by contract in one lump to one ontractor this week, but only 5 are taking advantage of the five-year loan offer. Other communities are using it more than those on the Dougherty line however.


