160 Animals Expected For Local Jr. Show

Some 160 animals are expected to be entered in the second annual Friona Junior Livestock Show Saturday, February 7 at the Community Center-Showbarn.

The show is for all FFA and 4-H Club members residing in the Friona school district. No entry fee was required of the show participants.

Judging will begin at 9 a.m. on

Saturday. Judging the show will be Ronnie Dennis, vocational agriculture instructor at Kress High School.

Paul J. Smith, a spokesman for the local show, said that officials expected in the neighborhood of 75 sheep, 70 barrows, and 12 to 15 steers for the event, held last year for the first time.

Ribbons will be awarded to the top five animals in each class, and a plaque will be awarded to the three champion animals. Hi-Pro Feed's animal health department is donating the ribbons for the show.

Purpose of the show is to give some of the younger exhibitors some experience in showing their animals, prior to the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show, scheduled for February 19-21.

Exhibitors of the grand champion animals in the 1980 show were John Cass, barrow champion, a Hampshire; Scott Straw, champion lamb, a medium wool heavyweight, and Carrie Schueler, steer champ, a Charlois-Crossbred animal.

Amber Smith gave Friona a near sweep in the poetry division by winning third place, and Kipi Fleming placed third in prose reading.


The Friona foursome thus brought home five trophies, one for each event entered, plus the second place tournament award.

City's Bond Issue Vote Set Tuesday

Friona voters will go to the polls on Tuesday, February 10, to decide the fate on a \$1 million bond issue.

The bonds, if approved, will be used to purchase a 670-acre tract of land one and one-half miles northeast of the city, to provide water for the city's declining supply.

The Friona City Council climaxed six months of studying the city's critical water shortage by calling the special election. The group believes that the water supply it plans to purchase will take care of the city's needs for a number of years.

polling place for the city's bond issue will be the Friona Fire Station, 102 East 8th Street. Polls will be open Tuesday from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The city drilled a new well in the southwestern part of town last summer, after one city well failed and another well's production dropped. However, the new well's production has not achieved the production level that was hoped.

Independent studies conducted by the High Plains Underground Water District showed that the City of Friona has at best a 12-year supply of water, with this supply continuing to dwindle each year.

"The city council has been earnestly working on the water problem since last summer. We feel that residents and business people in Friona are demanding an adequate supply of water--something beyond the 12-year limit. We must have an

ample supply of water in order to remain progressive," says Mayor B.K. Buske.

"We encourage the residents of Friona to support the issue. We believe this will provide a solution to our water situation. We hope that a good percentage of voters will turn out on Tuesday and vote on the issue," Buske said.

In action Thursday relating to the project, city officials learned that the "pre-application" to the Farmers Home Administration for the loan connected with the issue was approved by the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC).

If the loan is approved by the FHA, it would affect a considerable savings in interest rate for the city.

RONALD REAGAN has been in office only a couple of weeks, but we like the things he has done in that short time. The few actions he has taken give evidence that already he is working to cut down on needless spending, and help the country's sagging economy.

The president's first major act was to declare a freeze on the hiring of government employees. This was a move aimed at cutting down on federal spending, mainly through the control of the bureaucracy.

If Reagan can accomplish nothing else during his term of office, trimming the number and size of government agencies could be the most important legacy he could leave for his country.

The work of these agencies in recent years has approached the gestapo stage, and frankly, we don't need this type of "Big Brother" activities in our country. Hopefully, these bureaucracies have not become so rooted that they cannot be pruned, trimmed, or just uprooted altogether.

So many programs need to be re-worked, such as the food stamp program. We understand that the food stamp program has been much abused, and costs the taxpayers millions of dollars each year.

For the most part, the middle class and lower middle class taxpayers are getting sick and tired of having not only to make a living for themselves and their families, but virtually add another family to their responsibility.

It would be nice to trim this downward, to just your own family again, plus perhaps the very old and needy.

Then this week, Reagan announced the scrapping of the former administration's program which was to require the teaching of native languages other than English by the school systems.

This program was ridiculous from the start, and it's bad we have to have a new president to remind us that the federal government cannot be all things to all people.

The teaching of Spanish to children in this area would not have been so bad (except that we think it should have been taught to all children, and not just those with Spanish-speaking backgrounds). The rub came where Vietnamese immigrants, for example, demanded their language be taught to their children.

As was stated, America may be the world's melting pot, but at the same time it must maintain its own identity.

PRESIDENT REAGAN'S first speech to the nation on Thursday night was not the type he would have preferred to have given, dealing with the state of the nation's economy.

The president did not pull any punches, declaring that the nation "was in the worst economic mess since the depression."

He admitted that there was "no quick fix" for the solution, an opinion shared by most economic experts. As it has been pointed out, it has taken years for our country to get into the economic mess brought about by inflation, and it certainly will take a while for things to take a turn for the better.

But, the president took a positive attitude toward the problem, indicating that we can "turn the corner" if we really want to.

But in the meantime, it appears that the Reagan administration will be eyeballing every possible angle for cutting costs of government. This has always been one of his priorities, and we commend the president for attacking the problem early-on in his term of office.

FRIONA FLASHBACKS

50 YEARS AGO--FEB. 13, 1931

Friona barber shops have started a price war and have reduced the price of haircuts to 40 cents and shaves to 20 cents. Monday morning the town awakened to find a placard in the window of Smokey's barber shop listing new prices. This was followed by a still larger sign in front of both the other shops announcing the same prices.

45 YEARS AGO--FEB. 14, 1936

Friday and Saturday of last week registered probably the coldest weather we have had this season, with thermometers registering all the way from three to five degrees below zero. At this writing on Wednesday morning the wind is raging like a jungle full of roaring lions, with considerable dirt moving.

40 YEARS AGO--FEB. 14, 1941

According to reports reaching the Star office, the Friona schools will issue another school annual this term, and several students of the High School are now quite busy collecting and arranging the materials for it. It was reported that the school's two bands were to have their pictures taken for the annual Thursday.

35 YEARS AGO--FEB. 15, 1946

Dan Ethridge, who was formerly

employed in the Friona State Bank, and later engaged in the insurance business here, was recently discharged from the Armed Service, and has bought an interest in the Frank A. Spring Insurance Agency. Mr. Ethridge has taken charge of the office business, and will be assisted by Mrs. Dallas Coldiron. Miss Mary Spring, who has tended the office since her brother became associated with the bank, will continue with her income tax business.

30 YEARS AGO--FEB. 8, 1951

In a conference Tuesday in Hereford between officials of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. and the West Texas Rural Telephone Co-operative, agreements were reached whereby each organization will serve areas designated "economically feasible." Bell will serve an area about three miles around Hereford, with the Co-op left to serve the Dawn, Black and Summerfield areas.

25 YEARS AGO--FEB. 10, 1956

The "fires come in threes" philosophy was proved again in Friona the past week, when within three days one man burned to death, a locker plant was destroyed, and a truck at Hub caught fire. Robert H. Pierce, 52, was burned to death in the old building in which he was living. The building had served as Parmer

County's original courthouse at Parmerton.

20 YEARS AGO--FEB. 9, 1961

Friona Country Club needs only 19 additional members before actual construction on the nine-hole and spacious club house begins.

The Tulia girls basketball team wrote a heart-breaking finish to the Friona Squaws domination of District 1-AA in a 53-52 win Tuesday night that had all the thrills and disappointments that will make it stick out in the memory of basketball fans for many seasons to come.

15 YEARS AGO--FEB. 10, 1966

A teen center has opened in Friona during the past week, run by an organization with eight high school students and an adult sponsor, Mr. D.F. Milloy, owner of the building. Currently the center has two coin-operated pool tables, two ping-pong tables, a pin-ball machine, a juke box, a television set and a snack bar with tables and chairs.

10 YEARS AGO--FEB. 11, 1971

The annual Chamber of Commerce banquet was highlighted by the presentation of the Chamber's annual outstanding citizen awards. G.B. (Pete) Buske was named "Man of the Year." Mrs. Ethel Bengler was named "Woman of the Year." The "Teacher of the Year" award was presented to Mrs. Baker (Margaret) Duggins. The "Most Courteous Employee" award went to Mrs. Frances Davis, who has been the manager of the Friona School Cafeterias for the past several years.

5 YEARS AGO--FEB. 8, 1976

Sherri Thorn and David Blackburn were named Basketball Queen and King for Friona High School for the 1975-76 season between games Tuesday. Both are seniors at Friona High School.

The weather in the Friona area took on a wintry look the latter part of the week, with two days of fog and freezing drizzle. An early morning rain Thursday morning left .12 inch of moisture at the Friona weather station, the only measurable moisture received thus far in 1976.

Child Welfare Board Met January 24

The intention of the workshop would be basically helping folk become aware of the extent of the child abuse and neglect problem in our area, and then helping people understand what they could do when confronted with child abuse or suspected abuse.

Other business, like a Board member for Bovina, the key responsibilities of the Board, etc., were discussed.

The group set up two task forces, one to deal with community awareness and publicity, and one to begin dealing with fund raising.

The program for the next meeting, February 24, will deal with the qualifications and role of foster parents.



Irrigation Conference Scheduled Thursday

Bailey County Electric Cooperative is sponsoring an "Irrigation Conference," a program for irrigation farmers, agricultural agencies, power suppliers, financial representatives and all interested persons, beginning at 9:30 a.m. on Thursday, February 12 at the Bailey County Coliseum on the Clovis Highway in Muleshoe.

The program is designed to provide a look at the present cost of pumping water, and will also look at the projected growth in electric powered systems, and the projected cost and availability of energy for the 1980s and beyond.

Appearing on the program will be Wayne Wyatt, manager and Dwight Adams, ag-economist, with the High Plains Underground Water District in Lubbock, and Myron Namken, civil

engineer for the area ASCS office, Lubbock.

Also, Leon New, ag engineer with the area Extension Service, Lubbock, will speak on "How pump and power unit performance affect energy costs."

Don Gray, assistant director of the electric division of Hicks and Ragland Engineering, Lubbock, will speak on "Irrigation Rate, Now and Projected."

Other specialists in the field of irrigation will also be on the program. A free lunch will be served at noon. The conference will conclude at approximately 2:45 p.m.

Those planning to be on hand for the free lunch are asked to contact the electric cooperative by noon on Monday, February 9.

The city leaders say the bond figure will include purchasing the land, building a large water reservoir on the property, plus a chlorinating and pump station, and piping the water into the city's system.

"We feel fortunate that such land was available this close to the city, due to the fact that we must pipe the water into the city's present system," Outland says.

The city manager says that if the issue passes, it is his belief that the tax increase which will result will be from the present 70 cents per \$100 valuation to just under \$1.00 per \$100.

The land, which the city has taken an option to purchase, is located a mile north of the city on the Cemetery Road, and on the east side of the road. Part of the parcel belongs to Glyn Hamilton, part to D.C. Herring and part to Glenn Herring.

The council feels that the price they have negotiated to pay for the land and water rights is within the price range that similar land is currently selling for.

It has been noted that the city might lease out the farmland involved, for strictly dryland farming, and in this manner recoup a portion of the purchase price on a yearly basis.

The Fifth Annual Crop Production and Utilization Symposium will be held February 12 at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center. All persons interested in the latest agricultural research are invited. "What's Ahead in Crops and Production Practices?" is the theme for the event.

The outlook for new farm implements, improved irrigation, dryland water conservation techniques, and a new greenbug biotype are program features. Alfalfa

varieties, sunflowers, perennial grasses, minimum tillage, wheat grazing, and new herbicides also will be discussed by scientists from Bushland and Amarillo.

Registration starts at 9:30, and the morning session entitled "Alternative Crops" begins at 10:00. Dr. Charlie Rogers, lead-off speaker, will discuss the potential of sunflowers in the Southern High Plains. Dr. H.V. Eck will detail his research with irrigated perennial grasses, and Dr. Dan Undersander will discuss alfalfa varieties. Undersander says selecting the proper variety can increase alfalfa production several tons annually.

The keynote address, "Farm Implements--A Look Into The Future," will be presented by William W. Jackson, who is in charge of planning for tillage and planting equipment, Deere and Company, Moline, Illinois.

After a Dutch treat lunch, Dr. Frank Petr, Area Agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will moderate a session on "Alternative Production Practices." Dr. B.A. Stewart, USDA Research Director at Bushland, will discuss a new system of furrow irrigation. Seeding rate, fertilizer rate, and furrow diking are integrated into the system so neither rain nor irrigation water leave the field. Stewart says water-use efficiency for sorghum was doubled in 1979 and yield efficiency was greatly improved in 1980. Reggie Jones, USDA Soil Scientist, will describe methods of increasing dryland crop yields by retaining all rainfall on the land. New herbicides will be discussed by Dr. Allen Wiese. Ron Allen, USDA Agricultural Engineer, will outline several minimum-tillage systems that reduce fuel cost, while increasing yields and profits.

The final session will be moderated

by Dr. Ed Runge, recently-appointed Head of the Soil and Crop Sciences Department at Texas A&M University. Research with greenbug biotype E that attacks greenbug-resistant sorghum will be discussed by Dr. K.B. Porter. The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station small grain breeder found the new biotype last spring while evaluating wheat lines for greenbug resistance. Dr. Dave Hutcheson, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Animal Nutritionist, will discuss his experiments on grazing wheat. He will be followed by Dr. Runge describing highlights of research in the Soil and Crop Sciences Department at Texas A&M University. Dr. Steve Winter, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station sugarbeet researcher, will complete the program by discussing agricultural research in Australia.

The Symposium is sponsored by the USDA Conservation and Production Research Laboratory at Bushland, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and Panhandle Economic Program.



Dimmitt 8th Graders Down Braves, 43-12


