Letter To The Editor

Dear Bill,

This week I have been to MX missile meetings in Lubbock, Clovis and Grady. There's a sense of urgency at these meetings which I think would amaze and confound local citizens. After all, hasn't Kent Hance said there's practically no chance of our getting the system?

But that's not the picture I'm getting. I see the juggernaut rolling right on schedule. Geotechnic studies--digging, surveying, staking--are actually underway on 24 square miles west of Clovis, this will be the main operating base. Of 54 farmers asked to sign "irrevocable rights of entry" to their land, 24 refused and are under threat of eminent domain proceedings. Eastern New Mexico is buzzing like a beehive as small towns--Dora, Elida, Floyd, Grier, Grady--organize to save their farms and protect their cherished way of life. The Eastern Plains Council of Governments (counterpart to our PRPC) voted 16-2 last week to oppose the MX.

I believe in all sincerity that MX is nearly the worst thing possible that could happen to our community. The changes wrought by the coming of Missouri Beef, for example, would be a drop in the bucket compared to MX. I would like it to be taken over by an occupying army.

But we are helpless only insofar as we are apathetic. No bureaucracy can withstand the force of a citizenry aroused to exercise its free-born and constitutional rights.

The immediate pressing concern is the final hearings in Amarillo and

Clovis next week. PACK THOSE HEARINGS TO THE RAFTERS. You'll have three minutes to speak your mind, and the Air Force has to listen.

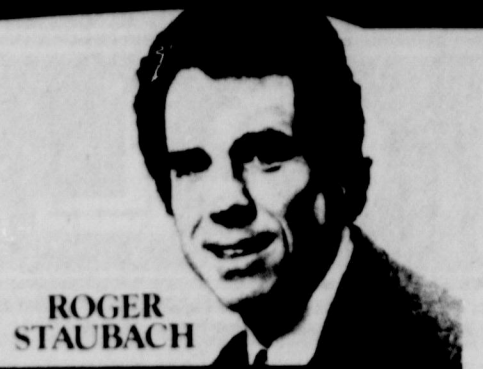

Actkinson Is Named D.A.

Parmer County Attorney Johnny Actkinson of Farwell has been appointed by Texas Governor Bill Clements to serve as District Attorney for the newly-formed 287th Judicial District. Actkinson's appointment is subject to Texas senate approval.

The new judicial district was created by Clements when he signed

into law the Omnibus Court Act which divided District 154, which included Lamb, Parmer and Bailey counties, into two separate judicial districts. Parmer and Bailey counties are now in Judicial District 287, and District 154 is a one-county judicial district comprised of Lamb County.

Judge Pat Boone, Jr. will remain

judicial district judge for District 154, serving Lamb County.

Appointed by Governor Clements to serve as District Judge in the newly created 287th Judicial District is former District 187 Attorney, Jack Young. Young's appointment is also subject to Texas senate approval.

Expected to serve as district attorney in District 154 is Lamb County attorney Curtis Wilkinson, who will continue to serve as county attorney.

Actkinson has not submitted his resignation to Parmer County Commissioners Court pending notification of senate approval to his new position. When he does however it will be the Commissioners Court who will appoint a replacement to his elected office as County Attorney.

As district attorney, Actkinson will prosecute felony crimes in both Bailey and Parmer counties. As Parmer County Attorney he prosecuted misdemeanor crimes.

Basically, the Omnibus Court Act signed into law by Governor Clements creating 21 new courts, was placed into effect on the basis of population.

Actkinson explains that there are approximately 20,000 persons per judge in each district, Parmer and Bailey counties contain an approximate total of 20,000 persons and Lamb has 20,000.

Other district "splits" took place in the larger towns of Houston, Dallas and San Antonio, according to Actkinson.

Friona Squaws Win Dist. 2-AAA Championship Title

The Friona Squaws won the championship of District 2-AAA track and field at the district meet Thursday, April 9 in Hereford. But although the team won the meet title by a relatively wide margin, 180 points to runnerup Muleshoe's 131, the meet was not without its anxious moments for the team.

For instance, at one point just following the 800-meter run, Friona held only a half-point lead over Dimmitt, 80-79½. Then, just two races later, the Squaws had appeared to have padded their lead with a second place finish in the 800-meter run.

But the judges' flag had been waved. Three of the teams in the race, including the Squaws, were disqualified for missing their handoff zones, and the team's lead remained slim. Friona missed out on 16 points, and another regional spot.

However, the Squaws didn't let adversity derail their intended goal. In the very next race, the 400-meter dash, the three Friona entries made the rest of the field "see red" at the finish line.

Sherry O'Brian set the pace with a first-place finish in the good time of 61.5; teammate Rene Noland was second in 64.2; and Shawn Osborn was third in 64.9. The sweep of the event by Friona was good for 24 points in the meet and got the team back on its way to winning the meet title.

In all, the Squaws won six events. The 400-meter relay team (Sherry O'Brian, Cara Brockman, Stephanie Lane and Kayle Britting) won their event in the time of 52.3, and won a regional qualifying spot.

The mile relay team, pressed all the way by Muleshoe, likewise got a win, with Miss O'Brian nipping Muleshoe's anchor girl at the finish line. Winning time was 4:14.3. Members of the relay team are Sherry O'Brian, Shawn Osborn, Rene Noland and Pat Harris.

Sprinter Kayle Britting blazed home first in the 100-meter dash in the time of 13.0. Miss Britting led a 16-point Friona performance in the event, as Kristi Britting placed fourth and Tammy Smith placed fifth.

Freshman Wennetter Jackson won the shot put event with a throw of 34-

3, gaining a regional spot. However, Miss Jackson failed to hit her potential in the discus, finishing sixth with a best throw of 88 ft.

Rene Noland won the triple jump with a leap of 34-1 for the team's other gold medal.

Also qualifying for the regional meet by virtue of a second place finish were Pat Harris on the 800-meter run in 2:34.2; Noland in the 400-meter run; Stephanie Lane in the 200-meter dash in 27.5; Miss O'Brian in the high jump at 4-6 and Miss Noland in the long jump at 15-4.

Others scoring points in the district meet included Shawn Osborn, third in the triple jump, 31-9¾; and Diane Johnston, third in the high jump.

Contrary to the team's season-long habit of having to content with nasty weather, the district meet was conducted in near-perfect weather. The morning field events were held in warm, windless condition, and although the breezes were blowing somewhat for the running finals, it was nothing compared to the team's earlier meets, and the temperature was in the high 70s most of the day, reaching 80 by meet's end.

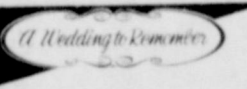

begin with, foster care means providing a temporary home for children who for one reason or another must be separated from their parents. Many of these children have been abused or neglected; their parents are unable to provide a safe and secure environment for them.

These children range in ages from infants to eighteen years and come from all races and backgrounds. They are lonely, frightened and often troubled children who need a loving, caring substitute family to help them through this time of great need. They need a foster family. Foster parents are concerned citizens who open their homes and their hearts to children who are at the most critical point in their lives. Foster parents are willing to share their home with another person's child and give him the love, patience and understanding that he needs. Foster parents provide a stable home and deal with a child's needs on a day to day basis.

Foster parents are certified by a foster home worker from the Department of Human Resources after a "home study" has been done with the family and the home meets certain standards set by the state. The foster home and caseworkers continue to work together closely to meet all of the foster child's needs after he is placed in the home. Foster parents may be married or single; they may have other children or not; they must be able to meet their own financial needs, and be in good health; they may work outside of the home if suitable day care is provided. Foster parents must remember that most foster children eventually return to their own home, to relatives or to permanent adoptive parents. And perhaps most important, foster parents must be willing to get to know and understand each foster child, and deal with his very special needs and problems with patience, skill, determination and love.

Foster parents are always needed in Parmer, Deaf Smith and Castro counties. They are especially needed in these areas for older children, teenagers, and for brothers and sisters who need to be placed together. Foster parenting can be a very rewarding experience and foster children need special families like you. 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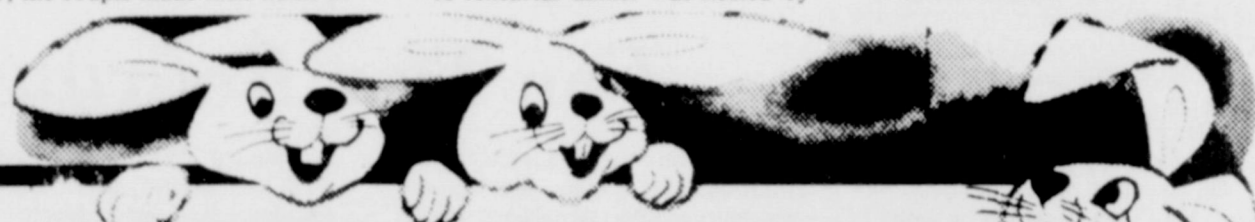
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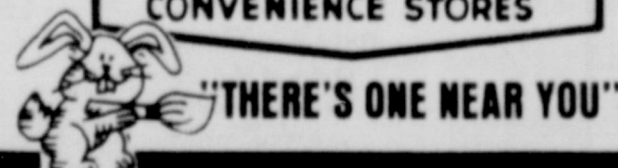
