

It will give a voice to all nine judges who now hear arguments and write opinions, but upon which only three are empowered to rule.

It will require a majority of five judges for court rulings, instead of two as at present. It will require five for a quorum, instead of the present two.

It will prevent the possibility of two judges handing down an opinion which might be entirely different to that held by one of the present three judges and all six of the court-appointed appeals commissioners.

It will enable the people of Texas to choose all of the men who serve on this court, with election of three each two years for six-year terms. Today one judge is elected each two years, with two Commissioners being appointed at the same time for six-year terms,

We, the undersigned members of the Floyd County Bar, urge our citizens to vote for this amendment. Because we believe the people should have the added efficiency which the action would provide for the court, we recommend the adoption of this nine-man Supreme Court amendment.

The pain usually is felt in one of these centers and spreads to the others. Often times a child will get irritable and cross without any visible signs of a good reason for this attitude; he may cry easily or develop habits of nervous-ness. A physician should be con-sulted at once in such a situation, for these symptoms may be the be-ginning of rheumatic fever.

According to Dr. Cox the best safeguards against this disease are to have each child examined at least once a year by a physician, to have the right kinds of food and plenty of rest. When the disease is suspected of being present, a doctor should be consulted at once. and if he prescribes complete bed rest, his advice should be implicitly followed.
