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OPA FIGHT IMPORTANT

Fight on in Congress over the future service that OPA can be to the country is an important one. Opposing ideas as to what would be good to add in bringing back a normal balance and at the same time preserve the buying power of money against sky high prices, have been aired for weeks. Principally those who are against further controls of commodities which are in reasonable supply have been heard, and those who are between the hard place of mounting costs and the rock of deflation.

Charges of selfishness have been made against many of these, the claim being that many have stockpiles of goods on which they can profit greatly if they can bring enough pressure on Congress to force OPA to raise ceilings. This week the pressure on congress from the other angle is to be put into the hopper.

CATTLEMEN ARE CONSISTENT

One of the most consistent objectors to the whole scheme of OPA as regards their own industry is the cattleman. He argued at the beginning of the war against controls that would make artificially high prices, opposed subsidies from the beginning, claimed that control of feeds and the uncertainty of political maneuvering would be injurious to the whole scheme of OPA.

For many years it has been the custom for farmers to retire and move to town. Now it seems that farm homes are being the same. A house you have been accustomed to seeing in the same place for years and years, all at once is hiked up on a moving truck and landed in town. I wonder how they feel.

There is no noise of cream separators, no prints of muddy feet from the lot. No tubs of partly drowned chicks, or of cold hungry baby pigs, to be warmed up near the kitchen stove. No grain will spill from shoes pulled from tired, hurting feet. The old house has been removed from the heavy and worry of the industry and a corollary also to the public.

Whether they are right or not the cattlemen have an existing bad condition that seems to prove that most any other way of approaching the most situation could not have been any worse for the country as a whole than the plan used.

FATS AND OILS SHORTAGE

Shortage in fats and oils for soap making and for the myriad other uses to which fats are put in modern times has not been aided materially in the smaller cities and towns of the country of recent months by savings from the kitchen.

Principally the trouble has been that after the householder saved her small donation and offered to let someone have it to get into channels for re-processing, there was not anybody to hand it to. After waddling about for a time with a can of used fats in her hand the lady of the house begins to feel sorter silly instead of patriotic and goes home with her mind made up not to listen to that kind of talk any more.

A good many bars of soap have been sent to the country that way in the past few months.

WED LIKE IT DIFFERENT

Nobody ever is satisfied with what ever is done in anybody's town about handling traffic or with parking rules or ordinances. Not to be different the Hesperian registers a complaint that will get a hearty second from the country around Floydada, namely that the one-lane parking arrangement around the square has hurt rather than helped. True a little bit more room is needed to make possible double parking but on busy days the driving zone is filled with cars trying to get to and away from stores any way so the danger from two rows of cars in the center of the street is not helped any by the single row.

People like to get reasonably close to their shopping places if they can and when they see what looks like a lot of waste space they had as well be using they wonder. Streets are made to use and all the danger can't be eliminated. If, indeed, one-lane center parking reduces the danger.

Wonder why it doesn't rain. Wonder when it will.

I am almost as busy with my rigging from the windmill as the farmers around are with their watering from the big wells. When the wind is blowing I keep the hose to the garden running and the one to the yard going, too. When one does not need seeing about or changing or a ditch fixed, the other does.

And then there are the ducks! They push their flat bills down deep into the Bermuda grass where the water is running and make holes and puddles. I run them off. They disappear. I come in the house, they come back. Again I run them off, shouting vengeance. They sit calmly down and wait and watch with their beady black eyes. Yesterday I was trying to sleep. They came near my window to wade and paddle and ruin the lawn. I grabbed a baseball, missed them, went after the ball and sat on the porch in readiness of their coming back. Missed them again, decided it was too much work to go after ball, picked up a stick and threw to kill, but only ran a small nail in my hand I waved and shouted, and they hid. Company came and the ducks took peaseable possession.

Why don't I sell or kill the pests? Well, you see one of the ducks is Donald and Donald was brought down here from Joe Ellis' home to escape the wrath of parents tired of a water tank being to fix every day. Joe thinks Donald has found a haven of refuge at grandmother's, but some day my stick may not miss and Donald will pay the price in a roasting pan with the other late lamented duck by his side in the stry.

Poke salad greens are plentiful on this place this year, and I keep 'em a-billing with plenty of bacon grease. Asparagus is good, also, swimming in white sauce. Don, the colored boy on our place, says Mr. Spikes is going to kill his self, eatin' all them there green things.

The pecan trees have more curls a harging than a lady with a new permanent. Seems to me that pecan trees would be a fine investment for the happiness of the future if they were planted along the main irrigation ditch from the big wells.

We scarcely ever miss a crop of pecans the same years it is cut short mostly by hail. We have been told that our two large trees are some of the largest to be found on the plains. Don't know about this but they are large and beautiful. They are beginning to get over the breaking off of large limbs in the "ice age" we had several years ago.
