

WHAT VARIETIES OF WHEAT

Important in Floyd county is the discussion now going on as regards what variety of wheat to plant to get along with the millers. There is a bit of confusion and we would like at least not to add to the confusion. It would be a good thing if we could help to

Probably as good a catch-as-catch-can test as can be made by the man who does not claim to know is to be sure to plant a bearded wheat. Some of these varieties are better than others, some do better under one condition of moisture and temperature than others, some have more "baking qualities" than others. What makes us say to plant a bearded wheat is the fact that agents of the mills are making the wheat areas looking at the crops after they get into the head. Where they see quite a bit of beardless they put a question mark and where the beardless is too abundant they take no wheat from that area for milling.

We wouldn't say one kind of wheat is better than another. We are reasonably sure, though, that this important customer, the miller, bases his buying policies as to a given area by what he sees and hears from his agents. One important wheat-raising county in the West Texas area is said to have been by-passed entirely by the miller. We mean the mills simply bought no wheat from that county. It all went to export. Should a man lose his export market he would be in a rather tight spot.

THEY ARE HINTING THE BEST

Wheat men in this area should not be listed as trying to make the customers accept a product the customers do not want. The fact is they want to plant and sell the kind of wheat the mills want to grind into flour, whatever its name.

If such a wheat can be gotten that also works well in the type of soil and climate conditions which prevail here, all is well and good. It should be said, we think, that the wheat growers are combing the country hunting "good seed," meaning just exactly seed the customers call "good." Let anybody who wants to name it.



activities of the Texas Highway department now entering its 30th year as the state's road building agency, Commission Chairman John S. Redditt reported paved mileage on the state system had more than quadrupled since it was first accurately

The endless struggle to build new roads as fast as traffic demand increased has shoved the 1929 paved mileage of 6,061 up to 25,734 miles on July 1, with more being added

"This still isn't enough," Redditt declared. tions of these paved roads render them inadequate to handle the heavy traffic using them.

He expressed confidence that the Commission's recent expanded poli-cy for building farm-to-market roads on a cooperative basis with counties together with the current federal aid program, would result in substantial improvements to the state's farm ansportation problem.

The total investment in the state road network stood at \$934,197,811.55 on July 1, Redditt announced. This includes all expenditures made un-der the supervision of the Texas Highway department since it was created thirty years ago.

"It has been a good investment," he said. "I doubt if any other similar expenditure of public funds has done so much good for as many

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



Last Polio Health Hint: Avoid Sudden Chilling!

Sudden chilling such as plunging into cold water on a very hot day should be avoided as the sixth and final health precaution that should be ebserved in the polio season— June through September—the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis cautions through its local chapter.

Scientific research financed by March of Dimes funds has shown that when laboratory animals exposed to the polio virus were suddenly chilled, twice as many developed acute and paralyzing attacks of the

disease as did a control group which had been protected from sudden temperature changes.

Therefore, take no chances. To be on the safe side avoid sudden chilling, the National Foundation advises.




