EDITORIALS

Steel is a fair to good barometer of what is in the offing. Never saw a depression that was a real one, unless steel was begging for customers. At this time steel mills have orders piled up for at least a year and could stand for half of their orders to be cancelled and still be going full blast. This doesn't mean there won't be an early over-supply of a good many things and a consequent buyer's market in them.

Easily Taken in: The Hesperian was taken in, years ago, by the exchanges, the Commodity Exchanges, the New York Exchange and all the others. The result of this work of the devil leaves us thinking that exchanges cut business risks, lower costs of food to consumers, render an essential service to producers. Going further we do not think prices are fixed by the exchanges, we think they safeguard the consumer, make a more even market for the producer . . . and that they have just made a free market in contrast with a "guvmint" market which finally gets around to market a la Russ. Over there the government giveth and the government taketh away. Here government regulates but does not control. The government cannot keep a lamb from getting himself fleeced on the commodity market any more than it can keep the lamb from getting fleeced on a sale of his land or his wheat-or on the purchase of the same.

What we would like to say to any who may read this: No government agency should be allowed to tinker with commodity margins. The government's role should be that of an umpire. The Grain Futures Act, for instance, is good because it was designed to guarantee that the markets should really be free-free of the suggestion that they are rigged or that prices are improperly influenced. New proposals of our government are of an entirely different stripe. In effect, they propose that the government go into the market rigging business. When you get down to it the sole objective is to try to manipulate prices by manipulating margin requirements. Is that not the fact? The Hesperian has, indeed, wandered off after the flesh and the devil!

Perhaps the job of senator in Texas, meaning state senator, is the most highly prized job in the state. In many respects a state senator has the prize job of the lot. Although his salary is low he certainly gets respect from all and sundry, including the heads of the scores of heads of bureaus and commissions that go to help make up the state's official personnel. When a man gets to be state in advance senator he really has arrived somewhere. And the fact that he has been senator is an honor that stays with him as long as he lives. Whether it is that way in all of the states we do not know. But in Texas being a senator is being a senator!

The State Bar of Texas is on record as backing the fight of the states against the encroachment of the federal government as pointed up in the "Tidelands decision" of the Suprement court last year. "We feel a responsibility to the people of Texas to assist in informing them of the dangers inherent in this new philosophy of Federal-State relations," says a recent letter from the State bar written from capital station, Austin. We are glad the Attorney General of the state has this strong backing in presenting Texas' point in this matter which seems to us is extreme folly for the American people to permit. To us, as to the lawyers the opinion of the "paramount rights" doctrine "is so broad in its implications that under it the Federal government can appropriate for its own use, and without just compensation, any property, public or private, anytime it sees fit to declare or asset a 'paramount interest'." Unless we are much mistaken the principle involved is far and away more important than the immediate money consideration involved, immense as that is. We have been unable to "see" the other side in this matter.
