Here we have a very interesting letter from 1st Lt. C. Carl Dollar, which we know all his Friona friends will be pleased to read.—U. J.

Midland Army Air Field, Midland, Texas, Sept. 23, 1943.

Dear Uncle John:

As one of the "Sons in Service," I'd like to have a word or two to the other fellows in the service and their parents. I am always glad to read in your column the letters from the Friona and Parmer County boys, to learn where they are and what they are doing, and I know all the other men away from home appreciate the news in the Star. Yesterday we had a happy experience of seeing some good Friona people who were attending the County Judges Commissioners Association in Midland. We got quite a long chat with Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Schlenker, and we saw Mr. and Mrs. Dave Moseley and Judge Thompson. That was quite a treat for Mrs. Dollar for she gets pretty lonesome down at Odessa while I am at the field. I have to keep so busy I don't have time to get lonesome or homesick. I have been asked to give quite a few talks in this vicinity to civic clubs and church groups on the work of a chaplain. I think this interest indicates that the people back home are concerned about the spiritual welfare of the boys who are in the service and they want the chaplain's assurance that that need is being pretty well looked after. I feel that it is. There may be chaplains who take their business lightly, but I believe most of them are deeply impressed with their responsibility and use their opportunity to be of help to the fellows. I'll just have to digress here and tell what the bombardier cadets are singing as they march to class. They are singing: "They say the WACS will win the war, so what in the heck are WE fighting for?" to the tune of Mademoiselle from Gay Paree. We have WACS here in our field and they get quite a bit of kidding from the soldiers, who think the girls' place is in the home or the store or the factory. But the girls take the ribbing in good stride. I was sorry I missed Roy Hughes (Sergeant Hughes, I believe) when we were in Friona, but it just happened that way. I wonder where he is now. ## County Lacks \$90,000 on Quota

### Big Loss From Grain Fire At F. N. Welch Farm

About the middle of last Saturday afternoon, a call for aid came in from the F. N. Welch farm, seven miles northeast of Friona, where fire had broken out on two long ricks of bundle grain. The Friona fire truck and the booster tank with a few of the fire crew at once started for the scene of the fire which had gotten to the stacks while the men on the farm were burning some dry weeds which were a hazard to the stacks, and some of the burning weeds had, unnoticed by those in charge of the fire, blown in between two of the stacks and they were aflame before the fact was observed.

The booster tank was used to wet the three adjoining stacks to prevent their taking fire, then the attention was turned to fighting the fire in the other stacks. Two large storage tanks of water on the farm were soon emptied and two large oil truck tanks were secured in which water was hauled to the farm from the Friona city water supply.

Tunnels were cut in the two burning stacks, separating the burning portions from that which the fire had not reached, and with the continuously arriving supply of water the little booster tank was able to keep the fire under control to the extent that there was no further spreading of the fire, but this was not effected until an estimated 2,000 bushels of grain had been consumed.

Several men from town went to the farm and labored faithfully assisting those there in fighting the fire, some of whom remained at the farm all Saturday night and until Sunday afternoon, to be on hand to render assistance should the wind fan the smoldering piles of bundles into renewed flames. It is understood that the burned grain was partially secured by insurance.

Her ailment is pronounced to be acute indigestion.

### Friona Men Visit Bovina Oil Well

On Thursday afternoon of last week, Floyd Reeve and John White were business visitors in Farwell and Clovis, and having attended to their business errands and starting homeward, they had a little spare time so concluded to drive out past the Bovina oil well.

Turning into a side road a few miles west of Bovina, they drove north for a mile or two on a good graded road, but before reaching the site of the well the graded road gave place to an ungraded but fenced roadway, and going was good until they had reached a point almost due west of the well site, which they found to be out in a field at least a quarter of a mile from the road, with no road leading to it from the west.

At this point the sod roadbed gave place to a dense growth of rank thistles, which completely covered the ground so dense and rank that it was hard work for the car to navigate it, and being unable to see the ground at any point, Mr. Reeve, who was driving, was greatly concerned lest the car drop into a hole or ditch. But, though it was necessary to go in low gear at times, the little "Chevy" ploughed on through the mile and a half of this sea of thistles until another graded highway was reached and Floyd drove out upon it, heavily perspiring but thankful.

The amateur oil well seekers were greatly surprised to learn that any such highway existed anywhere within Parmer County.

## FARMING TALK

with GARLON A HARPER  
County Agent

There appears to be some demand for organization of a Soil Conservation District in Parmer County. For the information of those who may be interested in this work, I am listing a series of questions and answers on the formation of a district. This series of questions and answers will appear in this issue and will be completed in the next issue of this paper.

Q. Who may take the first step toward the creation of a district?

A. Any individual or group of individuals who feel that a district is needed for the benefit of the land surrounding their homes.

Q. How may an individual or group signify this interest to the State Board?

A. By requesting a blank petition from the Texas State Board.

Q. What is necessary besides filling out the blank petition form?

A. The petition must be signed by at least 50 (a majority where there are less than 50) landowners of the proposed district. The petition, filled in and signed, and an outline map of the proposed district, must then be filed with the State Board.

Q. What does the board do after it receives the petition?

A. Within 30 days after the Board receives the petition, it must set a date, place, and give due notice of a public hearing to be held for an open discussion of the questions of desirability and necessity of the creation of the proposed district.

Q. Who may take part in the hearing?

A. Any interested party may present spoken or written opinions or testimony.

Q. If the general opinion of the hearing is unfavorable, what does the Board do with the petition for organization of the district?

A. The petition is denied. Q. Does this denial make it impossible for interested persons to go any further toward organizing a district?

A. No. Another petition may be presented after six months. (Questions and Answers will be picked up here next week)


