Carolyn Lange Wins First Place In Essay Contest

Miss Carolyn Lange, junior in Friona High School, has been judged first place winner in a county-wide essay contest sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary. Topics for the essays was "Making America Strong."

The judging was done by three members of the faculty of the West Texas State College at Canyon, and there was no way by which any of these judges could know the author of any one of the essays.

Mrs. S. F. Warren of Friona, was chairman of the committee in charge of the contest and a portion of a letter to Mrs. Warren written by one of the judges is explanatory of the manner in which the judging was done.

"These essays were read and ranked by the judges without consultation. Believe it or not, each judge gave each essay the same ranking. This is always a satisfying result."

The judges were: Dr. A. K. Knott, Mrs. Travis Shaw and Dr. B. F. Fronabarger.

Miss Lange's prize-winning essay follows:

Making America Strong

What is the question that is foremost in the minds of American people today? Is it not about the post-war peace? Everywhere you turn there are articles, speeches and even books concerning the post-war peace. Everyone points out that America should lead in the formation of this peace. Our country has been successful in our government and handling our people. We feel that our way of life, democracy, is the best. But how can we convince the other nations if we are not strong within? Strength within is our goal. How can we as the common people help to make America strong?

First of all, we must each one believe deeply in democracy, believe in the constitution and our government, and respect our liberties so as not to destroy them. When the American people believe as this, they are sure to make America strong.

Each citizen must cooperate not only with the government but with each and every other citizen. We must not let race, creed or color interfere. We must all work for a common cause, our liberties and rights.

Everywhere each citizen should be on the march. We should learn to think and work together in labor movements, some of which may be extreme or impractical at first, but which eventually will settle down to serve effectively the interests of the common man.

Our inter-America system is based on sovereign equality, on liberty, on peace, and on joint resistance to aggression. It constitutes the only example in the world today of a regional federation of free and independent peoples. We must have courage as well as faith in the people that lead us. We must not be idle ourselves. We must help America move forward. What we are short on is faith in the future of our own country. What we need first is a new buoyance which comes only to those who know there is a solid basis upon which to welcome tomorrow with a sense of adventure. Milo Perkins said of this, "Once that is reawakened in us as a whole people, a thousand and one individuals will come forward with a thousand and one businesslike projects for making a mass production economy work. The magnificent fight of Secretary Hull for a freer flow of goods in this world is going to be won. Every farmer, every worker, and every business man will be needed to get the job done. Personal responsibility for economic victory at the end of this conflict will be as necessary as personal responsibility

PROCLAMATION by the Governor of the State of Texas

No. 6271

TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME: WHEREAS, America stands at the crossroads in the most critical hour in its history, engaged in a supreme effort to maintain high standards fundamental to a free people; and

WHEREAS, every loss of food, supplies, production facilities, property and life weakens the resources of this nation; and

WHEREAS, the preservation of the health of our citizens and the preservation of property from destruction by fire is of vital importance to the support of our men engaged in the battles of a global war; and

WHEREAS, the Texas State Health Department and the State Fire Insurance Department have, for a number of years, sponsored an annual Clean-up campaign in the interest of better health and fire prevention;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, COKE STEVENSON, Governor of the State of Texas, designate the week of April 4-10, 1943, as

HEALTH AND CLEAN-UP WEEK

in Texas, and most respectfully call upon municipal officials, public health authorities, fire departments, civilian defense units, schools, clubs, civic organizations, the press, the radio, and citizens individually to take an active part in the observance of Health and Clean-up Week.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, I have hereunto signed my name officially and caused the Seal of State to be affixed hereto at Austin, Texas, this twentieth day of March, A. D., 1943.

Bomber Takes Off For Duty Sunday

The big Army bomber plane, which made a forced landing in a wheat field, about thirteen miles southeast of Friona, some four weeks ago, and which has been guarded by soldiers while waiting for parts and undergoing repair, was pronounced air-worthy again last Sunday and soared away under its own power.

The big plane arrived over Friona about six o'clock p. m., and after circling the city, headed southwest, presumably for the army airport at Clovis.

The six army trucks, which have been in use about the plane, departed Monday, bearing the detachment of soldiers and the equipment that had been used at the site of the plane's landing.

Farmers May Butcher Meat For Home Use

The USDA War Board for Parmer County is sending out the following information and instructions to the farmers of the county to aid them in helping to stop "black market" operations in livestock and meats so the armed forces may be assured of adequate supplies.

"In addition to the order requiring permits for the slaughter of livestock for sale, Food Distribution Order 26, effective March 31, 1943, provides that every livestock dealer or agent must have a permit in order to operate and must keep records of his livestock purchases and sales."

"Under the order, farmers, growers and feeders are not required to have permits in order to buy and sell livestock, but are expected to keep records of their sales and purchases of livestock."

Form headings to be used in keeping these records, are being sent out from the county USDA office at Farwell.

It is stated that it is vital that every head of livestock and every pound of meat, not intended for home use on the farm, find their way into legitimate channels of trade so that a full supply will be available for the armed forces.

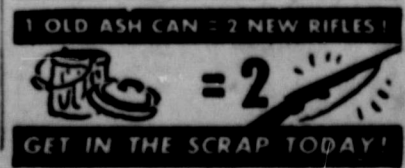

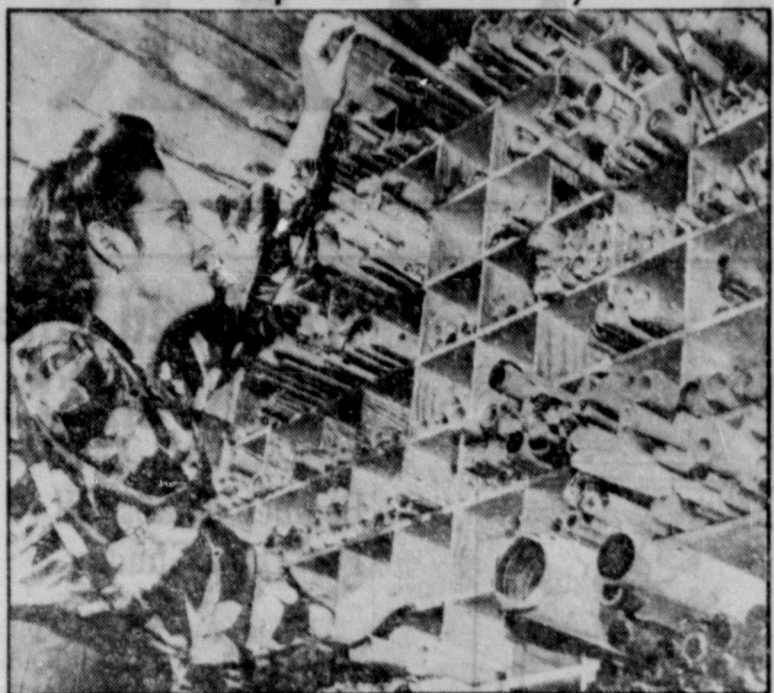
And here comes Lee Spring, who has been in another of his predicaments.

Dear Mr. White:

Just received the latest copy of the Star. I certainly was pleased to get it, because I was in such a predicament. I'm on the night shift now—from 3:00 p. m. to 11:00 p. m. and get to sleep through reveille. I usually get about 10 or 12 hours of sleep per night. This morning we were to have "shoe" inspection along with regular inspection so I put my four shoes on my foot locker—the others had theirs on their beds. Well, I had had about 11 hours sleep and was ready to get up. They said, "It's time for inspection" and I usually sleep through inspection. I said, "Inspection or no inspection, I'm getting up," and I did. I raked my shoes off on the floor, and then the immensity of my foolishness struck me—I had locked my foot locker with the key on the inside! While I was standing dumfounded, someone yelled, "Attention!" I had to think fast, my bed wasn't made up, I was standing there in my shorts and shoes were all over the

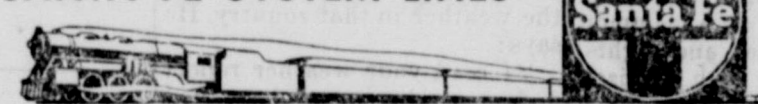

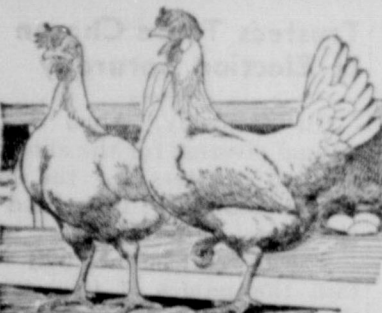

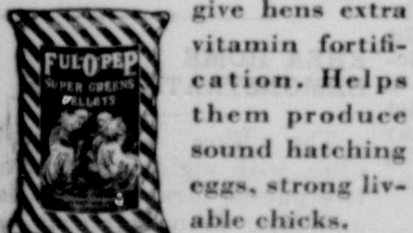

"Where was you... night of September 15th?"

Dear Mr. White:

March 27, 1943.

This letter is to inform you that I have changed my address and will appreciate it very much if you will send the Star to me here. I am at last doing the job I was trained to do, and I surely like it. I operate special radio equipment on aircraft coastal patrol. I have flown 60 hours this month and have got my wings and been assigned to combat crew on a B-34 bomber. The other fellows in my crew are really swell. My pilot and navigator are both from Texas, so you see that we get along fine. Our entire crew consists of eight men, not counting the ground crew, which I have certainly learned to appreciate. The weather here is nice and balmy like it was at Boca Raton. The day we got here we were welcomed by a baby hurricane which blew the barracks down around our ears. It soaked all our clothes and blew some of them away. No one was hurt, seriously though, only a few minor in-

juries. We have everything all straightened out now. Yesterday we had another storm warning and started to fly all the aircraft from here to another field, but the storm shifted and went out to sea. That didn't make me mad either, as it was a 100 mile-an-hour wind. I must close. Tell the folks hello, for me. I am looking forward to a furlough some time soon (I hope).

Frank Truitt wants it distinctly understood that he is filing a request that the Star may continue coming to him. However, Frank's name had already been re-instated on our mailing list, since it was learned that the Navy, the Coast Guards and the Marines were not included in the Government regulation, forbidding the paper to be sent overseas. Just the boys in the Army are excluded. But Frank had other things to tell about, which makes his usually interesting letter.

March 18, 1943.

Dear Mr. White: Here, Here! What is this I

hear that you have been told not to send any more papers to the boys overseas? We can't have anything like that, so you tell Uncle Sam that he had just as well take away a man's "liberty" days as to take away the news from his "home town." Tell him that there is one fellow who is making a request that the Friona Star be sent to him. That fellow is myself, because I surely do enjoy reading about the people at home. The column "Sons in Service" is of particular interest to all of us who are away from home, because it is these fellows who are "buddies." One who has never experienced this kind of life will never know the real meaning of the word "Buddy." There are some of the best men in this outfit that I have ever met in my life but as swell as they are, they can never take the place of the folks at home. I wish it were possible for me to describe to you the place where I am stationed, but if I tried to do so, it would be cut out by the censor—and that rightfully so. It looks as if I'll just have to put that description off for a while; and maybe, in the not too distant future (I hope), I can talk to you personally. We are still working long hours, and as time goes into the summer months, I imagine we will put in even more hours at our job. Do you know, I know now, that I had never been really tired in my life until I joined the service. Boy, oh, boy! What work one can do if he has to do it! I must close now and get my five or six hours of sleep—if one of these fellows doesn't take to snoring like a buzz-saw. Ha!

A letter received from Mrs. C. Carl Dollar, bearing the date line, Hogansville, Ga., March 25, 1943, reads in part as follows:

"We have really been busy trying to get moved. Carl has been in Harvard University at Chaplain's School for three weeks and he will be there for one more week, then he will go to his assignment. He is going back to Texas—to San Antonio, to Randolph Field. I think he is glad to go back to Texas, but it is a little too far from Friona to suit me—about 500 miles. It will be nice if we can visit Friona while we are there near. I say we, because I am hoping to be able to go with him when he finds us some place to live, and I hope that won't be very long after he gets there . . . He writes to me occasionally. He tells about

taking long hikes in the pouring down rain, and is having some trouble with his throat because of them. He says they have had only one and a half days of sunshine since he has been at Cambridge."

SOYBEANS FOR TABLE USE

By Elsie Cunningham, CHDA

If you are going to try soybeans this year in your garden be sure to plant some of the varieties that are good as a vegetable. Rokusun, Easycook

and Seminole are some varieties recommended. They contain less fat and have better flavor than the varieties planted for livestock.

The varieties given above require rather long growing season and should be planted between May 1 and June 1. Fertilize and cultivate as any other bush bean. Soybeans may be eaten either fresh or dry.

When the beans are mature in the pod, but still green and tender, is the time for eating

them green. The pod itself is not edible. In the green stage the beans are hard to shell. Drop pods in boiling water for 3 to 5 minutes. Then they shell easily. Soybeans canned in the green stage are excellent.

In late fall the beans should be cut in the field, tied in sheets or sacks and beat out at convenience. Storage is fairly simple as soybeans are not subject to weevil damage. Dry beans are prepared same as other dry beans. They should be soaked overnight.

Now for some information about the food value of soybeans. Fresh green soybeans are a fair source of Vitamin A. The deeper their color the more Vitamin A. Green soybeans are also good in two of the B Vitamins—Thiamin and riboflavin. They have a little Vitamin C. As for minerals, either fresh or dry soybeans are good in calcium, phosphorus and iron.

Dry soybeans are like fresh soybeans in the B Vitamins, but they contain considerably less vitamins A and have little

or no Vitamin C. However, the sprouts from dry soybeans are food in Vitamin C.

One of the most important values of soybeans is neither vitamins nor minerals. It is protein. Cooked soybeans are top notch in "efficient" protein. This protein nearly equals the quality of the protein in meat, eggs, cheese, and milk, which is the most efficient protein. In fact, soybeans are the best vegetable substitute for meat. Also soybeans supply considerable fat.

In addition to its use as a vegetable, the soybean is being used to make flour, "milk", curd, refined oil for salads or cooking purposes, and the flavorful soy sauce widely used as a condiment.

Soybean seed for garden use will be available at all the home demonstration club meetings in April. We have secured the Seminole variety. The price will be 25¢ per pound. If you are interested in getting these seeds, be present at one of the following club meetings:
