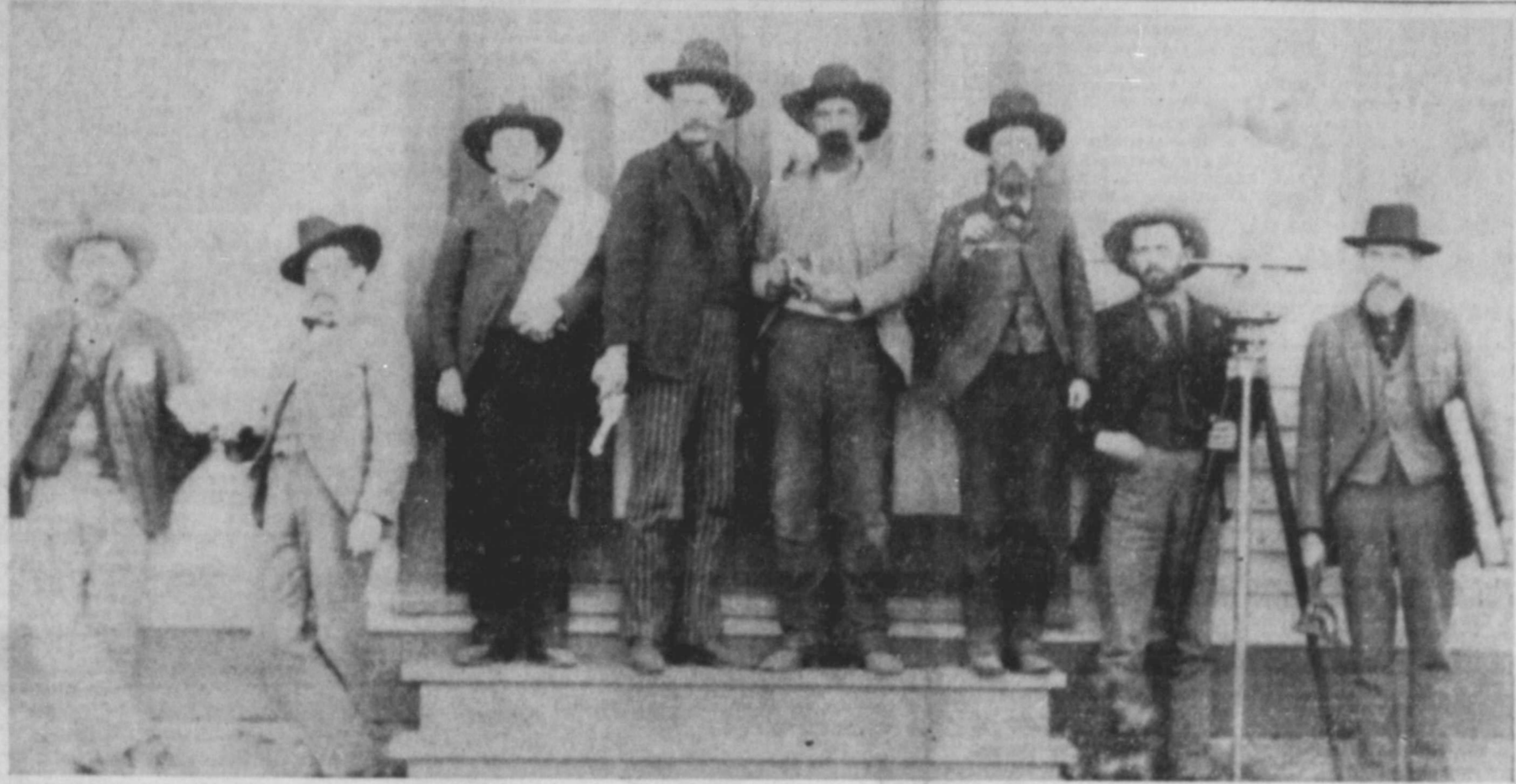


### Birth Brightens Outlook

May 13 — One of Floyd County's economic gains is a long-term basis, according to birth rate localities. The birth rate is acting as a stimulant to the local economy. Each year, some 34,000 babies are born in the county. Each of these babies is a big business consumer. Each baby arrives on the scene with a demand for all the necessities of life. The figures on birth rates in the other parts of the county are not far from those of the American business. The National Geographic and other sources show that the birth rate in the United States as a whole is about 34.2 per 1,000 live births. This refers only to babies born there and not to those born elsewhere.



FEW OLD SETTLERS in Floyd County will recall all the men pictured above, who comprised Floyd county's official family in 1893. The county had a brand new court house, built of lumber hauled a hundred miles. The picture was made as the group stood at the door steps of the new seat of justice. One of the traveling photographers (name not known) who went from town to town and ranch to ranch recording the history of the area, made this picture, not on film but on sensitized glass. The officers, reading left to right, were Dan W. Jenkins, sheriff, J. B. Bartey, county attorney, Sam B. Chadwick, assessor-col-

lector, Frank Anderson, deputy sheriff, J. C. Welch, treasurer, Arthur B. Duncan, judge, J. I. Carter, surveyor, and R. T. Miller, county and district clerk. The daughter of R. T. Miller, Mrs. W. A. (Emma Miller) Robbins, had this picture in her personal effects at the time of her death in San Antonio last year. She left word with her son, Wallace, to give the picture to The Hesperian. Of the above J. B. Bartley, is the only one who was not also a member of the first official family of the county. He succeeded J. C. Hendrix elected county attorney in the first election held in 1890.

## Pioneers Gather Wednesday For 30th Annual Celebration

Floyd County Pioneers Association has a full day program for the old settlers when they gather here Wednesday morning of next week. It will be their thirtieth annual celebration of the founding of the County on May 28, 1890. More than 800 residents and former residents of the county whose calendars date back 25 years or more of residence here, usually register for the event. Along with them, come to enjoy the fun, are a few thousand others. This year is expected to be no exception, Bert Bobbitt, president, said this week. Only question mark is the weather. The feature address of the day will come at 11 o'clock when Clarence Whiteside, of Lubbock, will be presented by J. M. Willson Sr. Whiteside has lived in West Texas as many years. He is an ex-mayor of Lubbock, heads the Great Plains Life Insurance Co., is president of the board of trustees of Methodist Hospital, and has a hand in numerous business ventures in West Texas. Mr. Whiteside's wife is the daughter of Solon Clements who has been widely interested in Floyd County's development for more than a third of a century. Registration will begin early and on the lawn of the court house if the weather permits. One judging event -- the wild flowers for the old settlers will be held early -- at 10:30 -- while registration is in progress and before beginning of the program at 11 o'clock. The flower show will be in the agriculture building adjacent to the speakers stand. The interim between the talk of

the visiting ex-mayor and the ribbon hour will be spent in presenting old timers. President Bert Bobbitt says. Sequence of other events of the day calls for: The noon-day dinner at which 50-year residents will be guests of the association. The 50-year group will wear gold badges and be issued special guest dinner tickets. The biggest and noisiest feature of the day comes at 1:30 when the annual parade is held. Most of the more than \$600 in cash prizes to be distributed will be awarded to winners in this parade. Paul Kropp is chairman of arrangements for the parade and will be parade marshal. Three bands are lined up to march with the old settlers. Floydada High School Band, Floydada Junior High Band, and Lockney High School Band have promised to take part. After the parade the match roping of the Floydada Roping Club will be held in the rodeo association arena adjacent to East 12th Street. It will furnish interest and amusement to those not interested in the formal program on the square. Red Whitley, of Crosbyton, and Walter Arnold of Silverton will compete in an eight-calf event. Other roping events also are scheduled, reports Bill Norris, president of Floydada Roping club. The Memorial program is scheduled for 2:30 o'clock. President Bobbitt says that a male quartet headed by C. M. Lyles will sing for the memorial gathering. The list of deceased members will be read off. Mrs. Lon V. Smith is chairman of the memorial committee. Period dress will be featured in the style show. Mrs. Lucille Smith of Lockney and Mrs. Mattie Hale have been active in promoting the event. The show will be held on the platform and the judges will pass on the costumes there. The thriller diller for the youngsters will be their square dance contest which follows immediately after the style show. This is set down on the program for 3:30. The business session of the day

will come at 4 o'clock. Election of officers and directors will be held. Events of the day will wind up with the square dance of the old timers on the platform, a large concreted surface that will accommodate a hundred or more couples. Music is to be furnished by the Stephens Family of McAdoo. The dance will continue throughout the evening and into the night. Other dance groups also are planned for the night of the old settlers day. The Penney Building across the street from the old settlers dance platform will be scene

### President of Pioneers Recalls Incidents of Early Day History

Bert Bobbitt, president of the Floyd County Pioneers Association is one of the few residents of the county now living who knew Dan W. Jenkins, first sheriff of Floyd County. Bobbitt has a watch that once belonged to the pioneer peace officer that was handed down to him by his father, Haines Bobbitt, and said he would have the watch here next Wednesday when the old settlers have their annual get-together. The story of the watch is an interesting one.

"Sheriff Jenkins and my father were partners in the cattle business when the sheriff became ill at our house (about two miles from where Bobbitt now lives at Sterley). "Dr. Wayland was called but couldn't do anything for Mr. Jenkins and he died pretty soon after he got sick." Bert was a little fellow at the time, about eight years old. "Mr. Jenkins and my father were getting ready to drive some cattle to Amarillo for delivery. They would have left the next morning. The body was brought to Floydada for burial and now lies in Floydada cemetery. It was in the spring of the year and, I think, in 1894. We never knew for sure what it was that caused his death. "My father did not make the drive to Amarillo as planned but stayed for the funeral and burial of his partner. Ed Burrus and Tom Arnold are the only two men I remember who took the cattle on to Amarillo to deliver to their new owners. "Mr. Jenkins came to the plains to work for Colonel Goodnight sometime in the eighties, my father told me. He was the man who fringed the famous herd of Goodnight buffalo. When the Colonel saw that the buffalo were being killed out and would be extinct soon he decided to save a small herd and got Mr. Jenkins to do the job. "They fenced in several sections of land, probably six or eight, with tall posts and 16 strands of barbed wire. Mr. Jenkins stationed his horses about every 15 miles when he started the drive. They bulk long wings to the fence so as to gradually

crowd the buffalo into the pasture. "After they had finished he called the Colonel was so pleased he job of Mr. Jenkins in. "I want you to have my watch," he said. "The watch, an open face time-piece, is still a good one. Mr. Bobbitt said. "Don't ever die like the watch too well. One day he told my father he wanted to trade watches. He took my father's time-piece and handed the Goodnight watch to my father. That's how I came to have it." "The Bobbitt family came to Floyd County in 1892, a year after the Lodge and was active in the Seagraves Rotary Club. 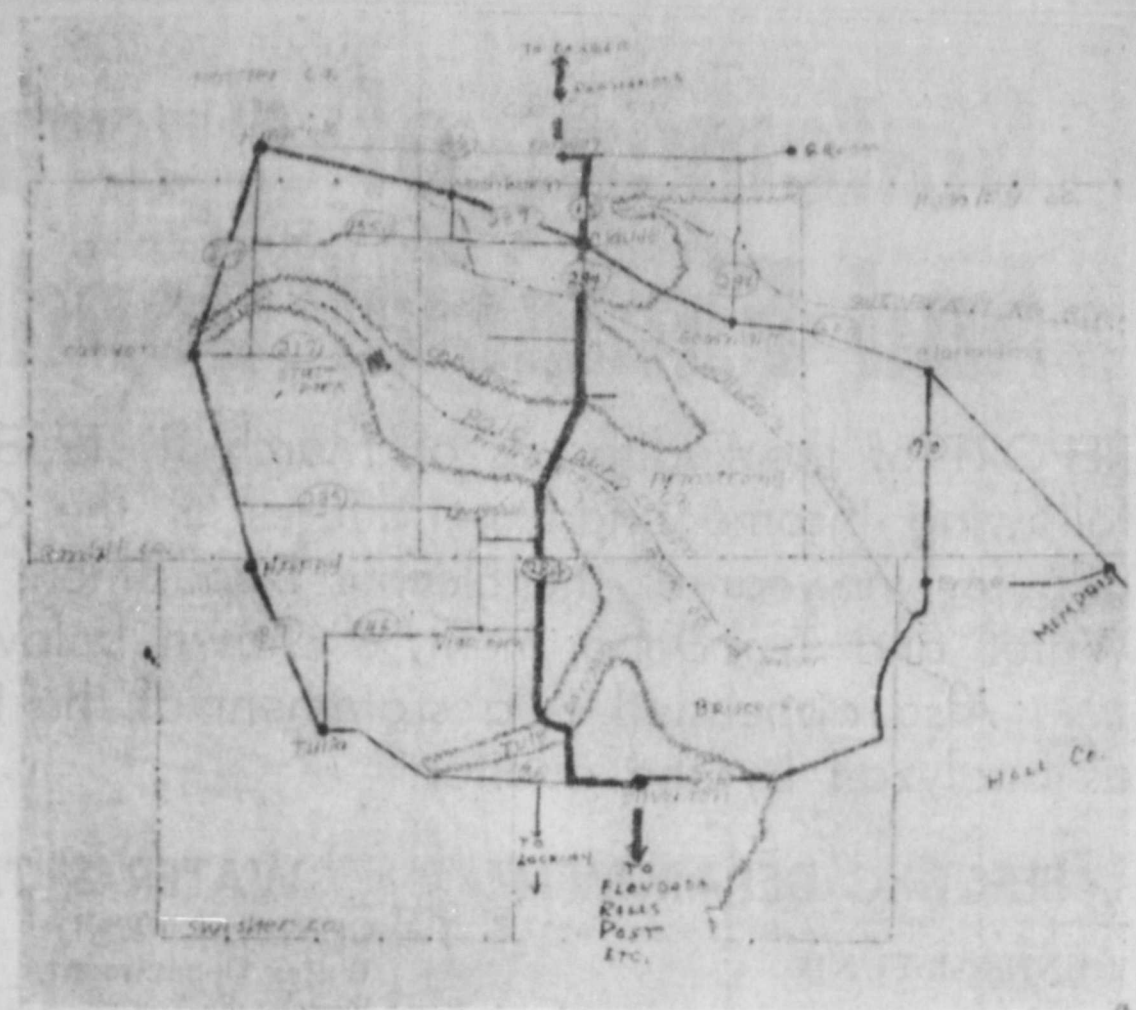

**OHIO'S #1 HOMEMAKER MRS. AMERICA**

Ohio's ideal homemaker, who won the coveted Mrs. America title, Mrs. William Giesse of Cleveland, takes a delicious yeast-raised sweetbread from the gas oven to set before the judges of the contest finals at Fort Lauderdale, Florida. Acclaimed the state winner at finals held in Columbus at the Ohio Fuel Gas Company, Mrs. Giesse, mother of three children, was accompanied for one of her two-weeks in Florida by her husband who believes this is her best recipe:

**CROWN COFFEE CAKE**

1 cup milk  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup margarine  
2 teaspoons salt  
1/4 cup warm, not hot, water (lukewarm for compressed yeast)

2 packages or cakes yeast, active dry or compressed  
2 eggs, slightly beaten  
4 cups sifted enriched flour  
1/2 cup melted margarine  
Raisins

Scald milk. Stir in sugar, 1/2 cup margarine and salt. Cool to lukewarm. Measure water into a large mixing bowl (warm, not hot, water for active dry yeast; lukewarm for compressed yeast). Sprinkle or crumble in yeast; stir until dissolved. Add lukewarm milk mixture and eggs. Add about half the flour. Beat until smooth. Stir in remaining flour to make a soft dough. Turn dough out on a lightly floured board. Knead until smooth and satiny, about 5 minutes. Form into a smooth ball. Place in a greased bowl; grease top of dough. Cover and let rise in a warm place, free from draft, about 20 minutes. Punch down. Cut dough into pieces about the size of a walnut. Form into balls. Dip balls in melted margarine then into \*Cinnamon Mixture. Place coated balls pyramid-fashion in greased 9-inch angel food pan, placing a raisin between each ball. Let rise in a warm place until doubled in bulk. Bake at 375°F. 40 to 45 minutes. Turn out of pan immediately.

\*Cinnamon Mixture: Combine 1 cup brown sugar, 1/2 cup chopped pecans and 2 teaspoons cinnamon.

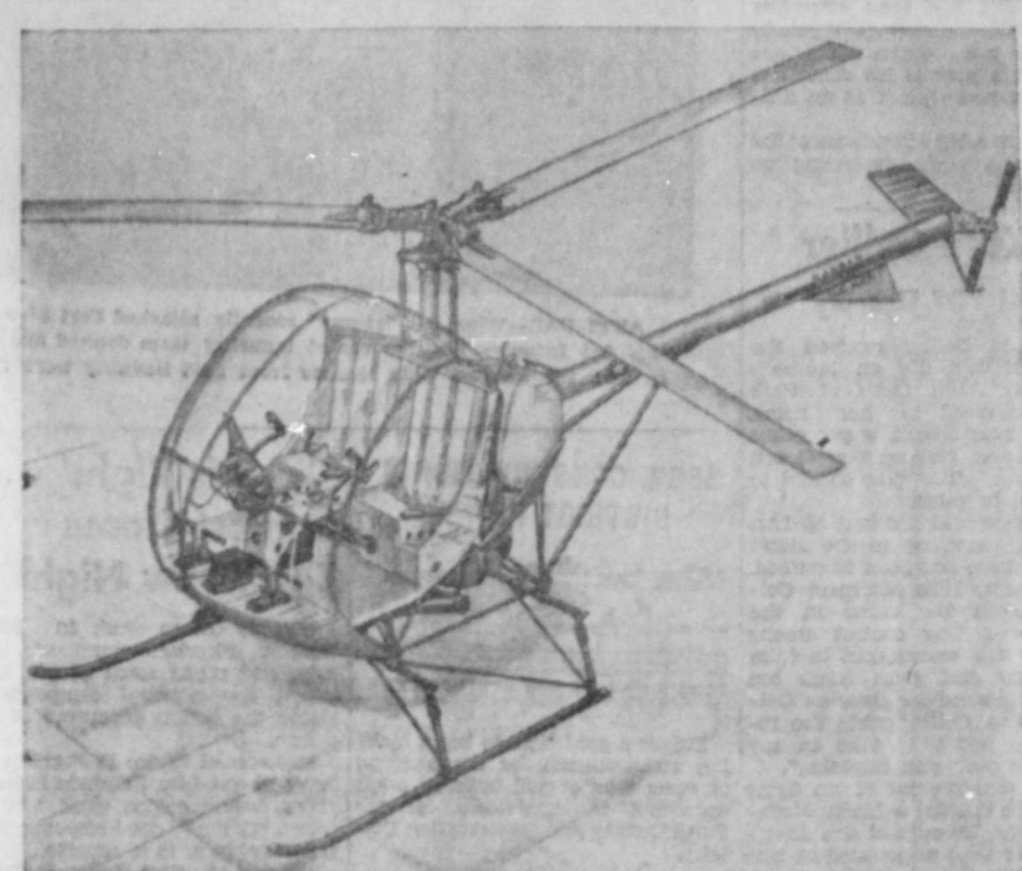

money they'll spend on groceries. High Tension — With millions involved, the highway lettings are a sport of high tension. Sunburned, sport-shirred contractors, plus materials men and insurers flock to the Department's hearing room where the sealed bids are opened and read, item by item. Department personnel have an electronic computer to add up the item bids and determine the low bidder. Results are announced later in the day. But contractors or their representatives take down the bids on the spot and make rapid calculations. It isn't hard to spot the man who's just realized he missed a million-dollar job by bidding a few hundred dollars high. Typical muttered comment: "He can't do it for the money." Bumpy Road — Though the mammoth highway building program is moving forward, top speed, there are problems along the road. Chief bone of contention, now in the courts, is whether cost of relocating utilities to make way for new construction should be borne by the cities and utility companies or the state. A law passed by the last Legislature authorizes the state, with 90 per cent federal aid, to pay for utility re-location on the federal projects. Atty. Gen Will Wilson has ruled that part of the law invalid in "donating public moneys to corporations and individuals... for private and individual purposes." Wilson filed a test case in an Austin district court. City officials, through the Texas League of Municipalities, take the opposite view. They contend that in other states cities get this money for utility moving and that Texans, through federal taxes, contribute to the cost. Besides, they add, it'll cost the cities some \$20,000,000. Hospital Officials — The Texas Board for State Hospitals and Special Schools has a flock of new names topping its roster of officials. W. W. Heath of Austin was named chairman of the Board. He succeeds Dr. Raleigh Ross, also of Austin. Howard Tellepsen of Houston is the new vice chairman. Raymond W. Vowell was appointed executive director of the hospital system. This post has been vacant nearly a year. It was announced, also, that Dr. C. J. Ruhlmann, now commissioner of mental health for Tennessee, will become director of Texas mental hospitals in June. Heath, appointed to the Board by Gov. Price Daniel last fall, is prominent in business circles as an attorney, banker and rancher. He also is a former county judge, secretary of state and assistant attorney general. SHORT SNORTS A slight downward trend in joblessness was noted in the Texas Employment Commission's latest report. Number of persons receiving unemployment compensation checks dropped from 90,949 to 90,913. A former TEC attorney, Lee G. Williams, has filed suit in an Austin district court for reinstatement to the job from which he was fired last month. Williams contends that his position in Texas Merit System corresponds to federal civil service status and he cannot be fired for the reasons given. A majority of the 3-man Commission said they had "no confidence" in Williams. Twenty-two bus companies operating in Texas have asked the Railroad Commission for permission to hike intrastate (within the state only) fares by 10 per cent. They're being squeezed by increased operating costs, says the companies. Fred Erisman of Longview has been named chairman of the new Texas Council on Administration of Justice. Council's purpose is to work with other groups in curbing crime and delinquency. Maco Stewart of Galveston, former assistant attorney general, was elected new president of the liberal-dominated Young Democrats Club at its Austin meeting. Young Democrats officially criticized recent legislative action designed "to illegally circumvent the U. S. Constitution as interpreted by the Supreme Court." Whatever they think of candidates, some half-million Texas citizens won't be able to do much about it at election time next summer. State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert reported that paid poll taxes and exemptions dropped from 2,410,188 in 1956 to 2,055,318 this year. State Department of Health is urging the establishment of more poison information centers over

Texas. Four Texas cities — Austin, Galveston, Houston and Fort Worth — now have such centers able to give immediate and sometimes life saving information on what antidote to use for what poison. 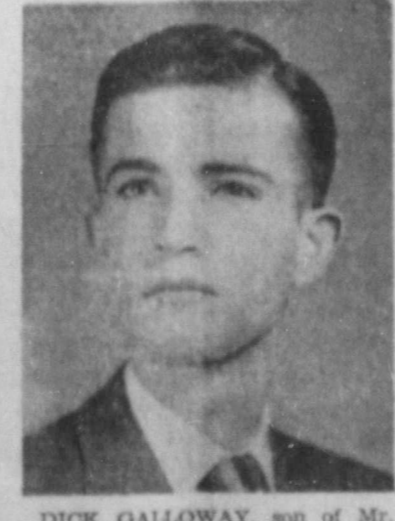

The all important day, Friday, March 28, 1934, finally arrived. From all directions, North, South, East and West could be seen Model T Fords, Chevrolet Touring cars with curtains "flapping", horse drawn carriages and wagons, descending on Starkey School in all its newness and splendor. Each vehicle had one thing in common—a huge basket, box or maybe a wash tub, filled with delicious food to be "spread on the ground" at noon.

Across the west a sickly reddish gray color appeared over the horizon. The westerly wind, a nice cool breeze at 7 o'clock in the morning, had now risen to a brisk 40 or 45 miles per hour by 9 o'clock, when the first visitors began arriving. The old timers stood admiring the beautiful building and casting wistful eyes westward, fearing another sandstorm might hamper the presentation of the program which had been so thoroughly planned.

On the rostrum at the opening of the morning exercises were J. L. Elmore, W. F. Ferguson and J. C. Garrett, trustees of the school district, under whose plans and directions the fine new building was constructed, J. J. Day pioneer settler of the community, Rev. J. L. Henson pastor of the Methodist Church in Floydada, E. C. Nelson Jr., county judge of Floyd County, T. R. Webb, Floydada businessman, K. T. Miller, principal of Starkey School and Mrs. Tom Colham, of Floydada.

As the hymn "America", led by Mrs. Colham was sung, the faces of our dads became more grave and solemn because the intensity of the wind was rising at an alarming rate. The sickening gray color of the sky had now turned to a deep brown and the sand was so thick in the air, one could not see far in the distance. The men took turns at going outside and climbing a ladder to the top of the building to check the newly laid asphalt roofing. We were not permitted to hear the reports on the condition but we knew from the way they shook their heads and motioned for other men to join the discussion, that all was not well.

The storm continued and as Mr. Miller welcomed the visitors, on behalf of the school, we felt the building quiver as tho an earthquake was

taking place. He paid tribute to the trustees and patrons of the district, and said, "to visions from other communities, we see in you the spirit of friendship and co-operation. We are glad you have come."

J. L. Elmore, president of the board of trustees, introduced E. C. Nelson Jr., county judge, who expressed his pleasure at the event which he said means so much in the life of the community. "Starkey people have just cause to be proud of their new building," he said, "it is one of the best in the county, and gives evidence of the fact that the citizens have built for growth and have their faces turned forward." An interesting feature of his talk was given over to a flag drill conducted with the school boys and girls of the Starkey school.

Mrs. Tom Colham read "The Prodigal Son" very effectively, and was heartily applauded.

T. R. Webb declared in the opening of his address, "The wealth of America is not in its rich valleys, fertile plains, forests, mines and factories, but in the boys and girls of our country." And he argued, it is well we should expend our time and money in the education of the children of the land, seeing that all have the opportunity to develop the inherent ability in themselves, while learning to subdue or restrain the bad things in themselves.

At this end he declared that home, church and school must lead in the same direction. Lack of co-operation leads to bad results, and he declared that one of the best ways to co-operate with school officials is to send the children regularly to school. He heartily endorsed the idea of parent-teacher's associations, he said, and sees in them great possibilities for co-ordinating the efforts of a community to bettering school and social conditions. Stressing the fact that cramming with facts is not an education, he declared in closing his address that education consists also in inculcating into the pupils life four great principles -- loyalty to flag, loyalty to fellowman, loyalty to self and reverence to God.

Rev. J. L. Henson took for the text of his dedication sermon a portion of the 25th and 26 verses of the 25th chapter of Matthew: Who-soever will be great among you, let him be your minister; and he who would be chief, let him be your bond slave: "Means or ability, are not our own but are the gift of God and should be used as such rather than as predatory privileges," the Floydada Pastor declared.

The supreme need we have in this day is not to be comfortable, but to be useful, and the text negatives flatly the Pagan notion of greatness which was that it should be reflected in power and pleasure. Following out the idea that greatness and goodness can only be expressed in service he made an Analogy of the service being rendered their children and future generations by the people of the community.

Elder J. J. Day closed the morning's exercises with a prayer that jars and schisms might not prevail in the community but that the strength and power of co-operation might continually be theirs.

In the intermission, while dinner was being prepared the assembly enjoyed the first public concert given since its organization by the Floydada Concert Band. Also the men who had been so carefully watching the progress of the electrical sandstorm reported to the trustees on the gravity of the situation. The gravel, they said, had blown off the top, leaving the layers of asphalt roofing exposed to the mercy of the elements. Their hopes were dim that the roofing could hold indefinitely under the ferocity of the wind.

About one thousand persons enjoyed the very generous spread of dinner prepared by the ladies of the community, which was augmented by barbecue prepared by the men of the community.

In the afternoon Elder J. J. Day talked for 25 minutes in reminiscent mood. Telling of his great pride in the forward steps being taken by the community of Starkey, in which he made his home for more than 30 years, and in which he still had much financial and sentimental interest. Elder Day spoke among other things of the hardships of the early days of his purchase of the land on which the school house stands, for \$1.00 per acre, of the rapid development of the country and the immeasurable possibilities which yet lie in the future.

The afternoon athletic program was abandoned when the winds arose to such fierceness as to forego any outdoor program.

Among the candidates who spoke presenting their claims for various officers were Charles Clements,

candidate for District Attorney, C. M. Meredith, candidate for tax assessor, Clarence Foster, Miss Clara Lee Johnson and Mrs. John W. Smith, candidates for county clerk.

The crowd was disbanded but every one was reluctant to leave the building. There was no wind gauge available but the patrons best qualified to judge, estimated the wind velocity at hurricane force, or 75 to 85 miles per hour, with so much electricity content, it was almost impossible to even open the car doors, especially the older models. A few visitors, including the members of the concert band managed to get their cars started but reported later that they reached their homes which were only a few miles distance, after hours of literally creeping along the highway at a snail's pace.

Most all of the Starkey people and hundreds from the nearby communities spent the night in the newly dedicated schoolhouse; the howling winds continued throughout the night; by morning the wind had abated somewhat and everyone was able to return to their homes. The condition of some of our homes defied description, ours for one. The west door, from whence the wind had come, had blown open during the storm and the carpet had blown up over the piano. Everything inside was covered with the sickening gray silt; the wall paper hung in shreds on the walls giving the appearance of an old abandoned ghost town. The wailing winds still sent chills up our spines as we attempted to restore the house to order.

The roof of the school building was badly damaged and had to be repaired, as did many of our homes, but the memories of March 28, 1934, will always live in the hearts of the old time friends and neighbors of

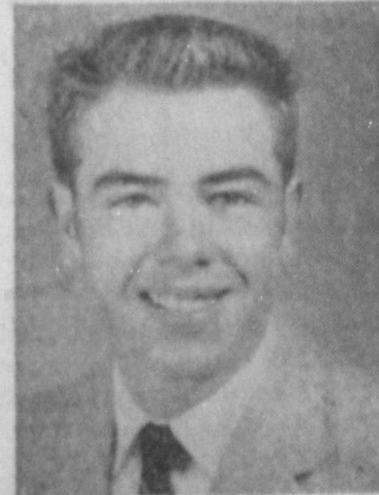

# SS Trust Fund Has 23 Billion

The balance on hand in the Old-Age and Survivors Insurance Trust Fund from which social security benefits are paid still stands close to the 1937 record level of 23 billion dollars according to John G. Hutton, district manager of the Lubbock social security office.

Mr. Hutton declared: "The social security system is self-supporting, financed by the social security tax contributions made by workers, employers and self-employed persons. He added that the payments into the trust fund combined with the interest earned by the trust fund assure the financial soundness of the system, leaving no doubt as to its solvency and full capability of making benefit payments to the present 11 million beneficiaries and the millions more to be added in the future. Mr. Hutton said that actuarial studies show that the Trust Fund will continue to grow well beyond the year 2000.

## YOUR COUNTY AGENT

### Grain Sorghum

Now that most of the cotton is up or being replanted, we begin to think about planting grain sorghum.

Over a period of years the highest yields of grain sorghum can be expected from June 10th to 30th plantings. By planting early it increases the length of maturity and early planted grain sorghum requires more water to produce an equal yield when compared with late planted sorghum.

Tests have shown that planting date can increase the yield as much as one-third.

The recommended planting date is June 10th to 20th.

### Floyd County Fair

Plans are well under way for the 1948 fair to be held September 11, 12, and 13.

A carnival has been secured, the gospel singing is already being planned along with some other interesting events.

Many of you are making plans to exhibit animals, crops, and other items in the fair. We should plan now selecting our small grain samples and be ready to save and select them as harvest begins.

### Summer Legumes

The use of summer legumes on acreage reserve land would be a good investment.

With plenty of moisture stored in our soil the planting of cowpeas, guar, and soybeans could help us build the fertility of our soils. We could expect a good growth which should be turned under green to increase our organic matter and plant food.

If you plant any of these legumes they should be inoculated to produce the maximum amounts of nitrogen.

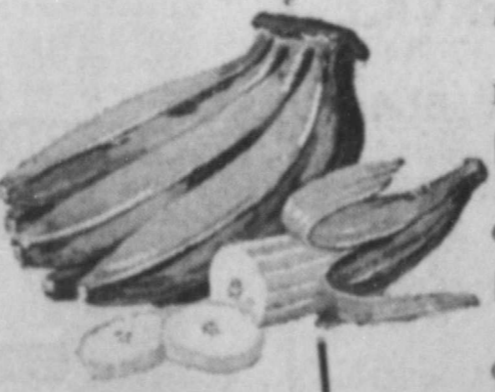
