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

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VIEWS AND COMMENT

Independent Democrats. One assumption that is apparently correct to take from a study of the Saturday night primary election returns is that there are still plenty of Texas Democrats who are just Democrats and not Liberal or Conservative. The inclination of party leaders to try to herd the voters is usually in evidence. The people go along just about so long then begin to do their own thinking.

It's all over politically until Saturday when the county convention is held. Senator Yarborough is still smarting from his defeats for governor (which position he secretly coveted instead of that of U. S. Senator but got scared of his bosses), and immediately after the primary announced that the governor could depend on a battle for control of the state party machinery. The Floyd County delegation can be predicted safely as against the governor. He carried the county almost three to one but who got the votes in the election does not count in party convention battles.

-0-LET'S KNOW WHERE WE'RE AT (A Contributed Editorial)

Some Texas cities are acting with uncommon displays of common sense. They are making it easy for motorists to find their way.

El Paso, for example, is currently putting up street name signs that are much easier for drivers to read. Harlingen is doing the same thing.

So obvious a proposition - that street name signs should be made to read - is worthwhile discussing, we think, because there are still too many towns that seem to

have ignored it. Most motorists have had the frustrating experience of driving around and around in search of a strange address looking in vain for a visible, readable street sign to guide them:

You may have to get out of your car and get down on hands and knees to peer at the lettering on a curbstone, almost hidden from your view by a parked car. Or perhaps you have to shinny half-way up a pole to find that the sign there does not - after all have on it the name you seek.

It's hard to keep a friendly feeling for a town when you have to go through this sort of thing. Even worse, according to traffic engineers, is the fact that the "lost" driver is a safety hazard as he weaves, slows and speeds up while searching for his way,

El Paso and Harlingen both are putting up street name signs that show up at night from a block away. One El Paso official commented: "If a sign is worth having at all, it's worth having both day and night." So they made the signs of material that reflect headlights - just like modern road signs and can be seen in the darkness.

Maybe there's some hope for the po rist yet. Maybe we'll be able to find the Negro Man Talking: When your friends all make the late movie.

Whether Mrs. Williams offers an idea that is bigger than Floydada can assimilate (in the Lakeview News last week) we do not know. But we do know this, that communi-ties all over the country would have people in Floydada often, and more often if out the county. places like parks, community houses and the like, were put in the city's budget on a long range basis. While we hanker for "industry" payrolls and the prosaic laboring man's dollar to be spent in the community, these ready-made visitors would come our way by hundreds. Mackenzie Park is a big result from a small beginning with definite, concrete, long range planning. A community has no business biting off more than it can chew but it can make a start and keep pointed in the right direction.


