MY TURN

NEWSPAPER ARTICLES of long ago used to close with "A good time was had by all," which would also be quite appropriate to describe the July 4th activites around these parts.

A welcome addition to this year's festivities was the musical program performed in the park by "The Cornerstone Singers" and topped off by the closing fireworks at the end of the evening. The choral group consisted of about a dozen high school age young people from the Rio Grande Children's Home in Mission, Texas, located down in the southernmost tip of the state.

They seemed to enjoy singing out their message. . . "Love of God and love of country". . . just as much as the audience enjoyed hearing them. It would be difficult to imagine any of these neatly dressed, fresh-faced, wholesome young folks involved in the type of disrespectfulness and violence which has been associated with public schools across the country in recent months.

The point is, these youngsters attend a private Christian School where old fashioned character, moral values, Christian philosophy, and, yes, even prayer is taught at the school. But in our public schools, it is common to find unwed pregnancies, sexual harrassment, gangs, weapons and drugs. Condoms are passed out in the classrooms and children are taught about homosexual habits as part of the curriculum. So why are we surprised when American students fail to perform scholastically as well as students from other countries?

This is not the fault of the schools, however, because schools merely reflect the attitude of the country as a whole. The American Dream is fast becoming the American Nightmare. When did we become so obsessed with greed and materialism? Everybody has an axe to grind. Everybody thinks someone else owes them something for a greviance, real or imagined. Everybody goes around with their hands in someone else's pocket. Such avarice breeds discontent and discontent breeds violence.

I am very thankful that I am not a teenager in today's society. I feel so sorry for our young people. They're under so much pressure from adults who want them to achieve, plus pressure from their peers to whom achievements are a sign of weakness. Some of the high-achievers who don't want to be branded as "nerds" will pretend to be dumb in order to fit in with the group. With all these mixed signals, is it any wonder that youngsters are killing themselves and each other in record numbers?

A recent comparative study of Asian and American students showed that American kids do better in the lower grades than the Asian kids. By the sixth grade, all the students were about even, but the Asians passed American kids in a rush after seventh grade. When offered to have one wish granted, the majority of Chinese children wished for educational success, such as a chance to go to college, while the majority of American kids wished for toys, money and other material goods. Only ten percent of the American children made wishes for academic achievements. Yet we will spend \$400 billion this year on education. Pouring more money down this bottomless pit won't solve the problems.

Here is my "Five Point Program" to get our nation's schools back on the right track without spending an extra cent of money:

1. Put dress codes and decorum back in the schools. When people, either kids or adults, are dressed neatly they have less tendency to act up and misbehave. Kids today dress sloppy and treat each other with extreme cruelty. Good manners and dicipline build selfrespect and sensitiveness for the feelings of others. These things are

Musk Thistles Pose Threat To Area's Farm Acreage

A purple flowering road side weed poses a threat to cattle ranching and possibly to farmers. That simple weed a called the Musk thistle is catching on well in this

According to information from the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center in Amarillo, the plant takes two years to grow to maturity. In the first year the plant is in the rosette stage and and then flowers and seeds the next year. It is a hardy weed which is distasteful to livestock.

threat to ranchers that have it growing in their pastures. "The thistle is not directly poisonous to livestock, it is just that cattle and horses will not graze even close to it," Dr. Vic Anspaugh wrote in the June 10 issue of the Clovis Livestock Market News.

The Musk thistle ranges about 6 feet in height, depending on soil and growing conditions. The pointed leaves are dark green with lighter green midrib and silver-gray

leaf margin. They are hairless on both sides and have a winged appearance.

The plant shoots seed pods in late May with large purple flowers. The thistle is a hardy plant and a study in Nebraska using 50 plants found that 3,199 potential musk thistle seedlings from 9,235 were possible from only one plant. Some seeds can remain dormant for up to five years until the soil and growth conditions become optimal for the plant.

According to Dr. Brent Bean, Texas A&M Research Center in The taste is what poses the Amarillo, the thistle mainly grows in pastures, on road sides and in some cases in cultivated fields after harvest, such as winter wheat. It is prevelant in the mid-west, but is taking root in this area.

> Dr. Anspaugh warns that this weed has been serious in other states, such as Colorado, Kansas and Nebraska which have been affected with losses in production. The weed is noticeable in Curry and Roosevelt counties in New Mexico and from Farwell to Canyon, according to Dr. Anspaugh.

The Noxious Weed Control law in Texas is designed to control and prevent the spread of weeds that are listed due to their toxicity and affects to crops and livestock. According to Dr. Bean, he couldn't find a listing of the musk thistle. He said he was surprised, but the thistle hasn't been a problem in the past. Without it being listed, thistle can get into the seed and be planted along with the crop which can lead to the spreading of the thistle.

It can be controlled though it isn't guaranteed and isn't easy, according to information provided by Dr. Bean's office. Bean suggested plowing when it is in the rosette stage to control it from going to seed. Mowing helps keep it from seeding, but doesn't kill the plant.

There are herbicides which are registered for control of the musk thistle. 2, 4-D amine or LV ester, Dicamba, Picloram and Chlorsulfuron all help to control the weed. For specific amounts per acre contact the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center at 359-5401 in Amarillo.

Reminiscing About My Early Cooking Interest

What a delight to open my mailbox last week and find a letter from Mrs. Johnnie Scudder of Spur. I do enjoy hearing from everyone who reads the column.

I really don't remember exactly when I started cooking. I remember helping my mother in the kitchen. As a very young child, I was allowed to stir the chocolate chip cookie dough before the flour was added. After the flour, it was too stiff for my little arms to handle.

Just as important, he says, is the time element; a true picture of the nation's agricultural industry cannot be presented until the forms are returned.

Agricultural producers received their forms last December. Most have completed and returned them.

The census is the only source of comprehensive, consistent agricultural data for each county in the nation.

Advance reports for all counties, states and the nation will be published starting this fall.



2. Let's nurture them and let them be little children for a little while longer. We put too much pressure on the little ones to get involved in a hostile world too soon.Pollution, endangered species, global warming, rain forests, AIDS, abortion, politics....these should all be left to discussions in the higher grades. Let the little ones feel safe and secure. Frightened children will not grow into adults who can solve the world's problems.

3. Over-emphasis on sports has led to a "jock mentality" which pervades this entire country. A recent "Peanuts" cartoon depicted Patty giving a school report on the four seasons which she named as "baseball, football, basketball and hockey." President Clinton recently presented "lifetime achievement" awards to some of the country's famous sports figures, praising them for their "embodiment of the best values of America." The super athletes become role models for our children while exhibiting great ability at garnering unbelievable salaries for themselves. Team loyalty doesn't exist as long as bigger, more exorbitant salaries are available somewhere else. This does NOT embody the values that we should be teaching to our nation's youth. Let's put sports back into proper perspective.

4. We must stop giving in to every special interest group that decides to use the school as a springboard for their "cause." They do not have the welfare of the children at heart and the school should not be used as a political forum. No group or individual should be allowed to sue the school for any reason. Lawsuits have taken away the teachers' ability to maintain dicipline in the classrooms. The slightest diciplinary action ends in threats of lawsuits. This teaches the children that they do not have to be responsible for their actions.

5. Put God and Country back into the school curriculum, prayer back into schools, and teach Bible verses to children in the lower grades. Nothing builds character quite as good as memorizing the Gettysburg address and the Ten Commandments. The old "separation of church and state" argument is a bunch of crap. Because of a small handful of athiest activists, America's freedom of religion has been taken away. In addition to the three R's, children need to be taught the three P's: pride, prayer and patriotism.

Okay folks, chew on that for awhile and then go write letters. We do still have freedom of speech!

Coach David Blackburn explained that the teams are already in place and have been practicing for the last several weeks. The winners of the tournament will receive trophies.






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
