Speaking of Concrete. We ran back through the records recently and found that in 1928 or thereabout 25 feet of concrete paving on a 100-foot wide street came to nearly \$180. That was more than 30 years ago. The paving we got then couldn't be duplicated now within anybody's budget.

He has pulled the treasury department through a pretty difficult situation that arose last fall, and with the aid of a Democratic Congress that kept the interest rate policy from being cockeyed, now has in sight a balanced budget with possibly two billion in excess. 
