

Five per cent rotenone mixed with sulphur is the combination used for both. For a few head the dust method is recommended but for larger herds the dip or spray method is the most economical. For the dust treatment mix equal parts of sulphur and five per cent rotenone in any type of convenient can with holes in the lid and dust the material on the back of each animal. It requires about one pound of this mixture for 15 animals. This method will give 95 to 98 per cent control.




