Just as the Chiefs were getting ready to play their last game of the season and pack their suits away, they found themselves in a tie for district champions. The Chiefs defeated the Tulla Hornets earlier in the season and then fell to the Hereford Whitefaces. Tulla then, stinging from the defeat handed them by the Chiefs, ran rough shod over the Hereford eleven. This places Hereford and Friona "even steven" as Tulla has to play Dalhart yet. Both Hereford and Friona have played five conference games and won four each. Tulla has played only four.

The Chiefs defeated the Tulla Hornets 19-7, the Hornets defeated the Whitefaces 19-0, and the Whitefaces defeated the Friona Chiefs 19-6. This gives the Hornets the edge over the other two teams with the Hereford Whitefaces running a close second. Since all the defeats were handed the visiting team, each team is eager to play the team that defeated it. If the tie is played off, then Hereford, in all probability, will play the Chiefs on Chieftain Field, and of course if Friona and Tulla play the game will be at Tulla. Tulla would go to Hereford if those two teams play.

These are all "ifs" and the entire thing will be placed in the hands of the district committee made up of the superintendents of each member school. The committee as yet has not been called together by the chairman, Knox Kinard, but in all probability it will meet in the near future—as the game must be played by Dec. 2. Each team has played nine games and is eligible to only one more game each. If the committee can not decide which teams play it off, the facts may be sent to the state office for a decision of the state executive committee. Let us all hope that the district committee can settle the entire affair and that we can play and defeat one of the teams on our home grid-iron.

Hereford boasts of a couple of injuries, but so does Friona. Reed, Norwood, and Johnson have all been out for some time with injuries, and of course it would be wrong for us to think that these boys can be up to par for a game so near at hand. Tullas team is in tip top shape as stated by their coach.

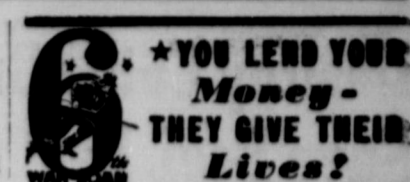

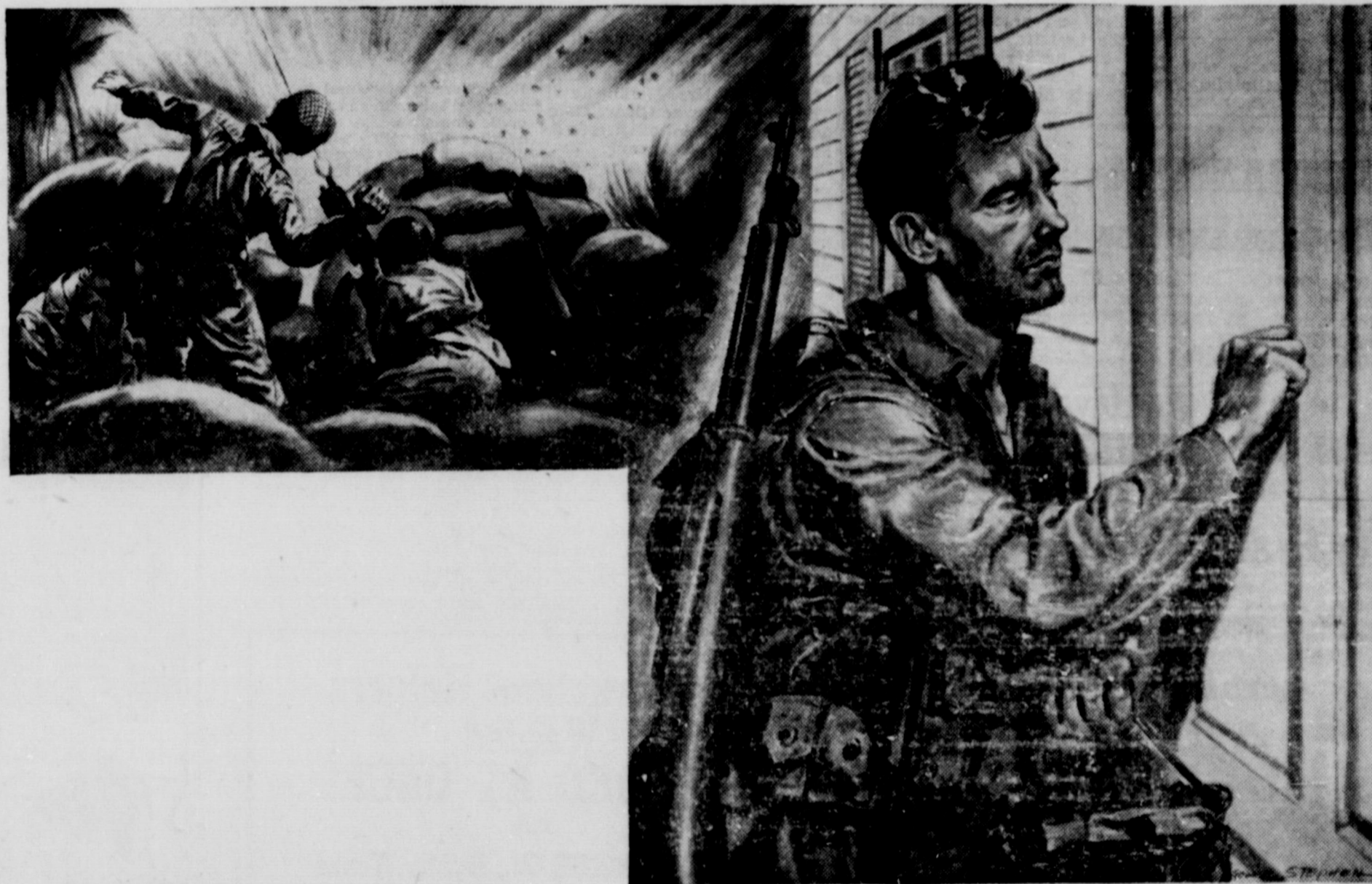

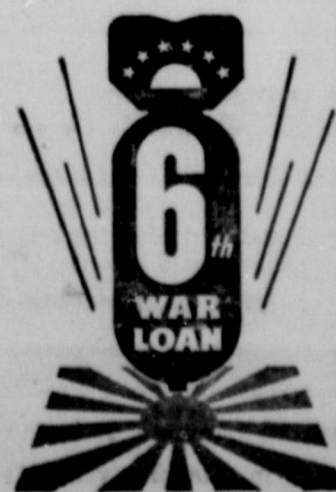
