New Dairy Test Program Frees Herds from Bangs

A new Federal program of cattle testing was announced this week by County Agent A. R. Bateman who said that the new system is by far the best ever offered and that it will be to the advantage of every dairyman to take advantage of it.

According to the plan, at least 20 dairy herds would be tested during one period; and if any reactors to the Bang's Disease test are found, the cows will be marked and may be kept in the dairyman's herd until the government notifies the owner of an approved packer or slaughterer to whom the cow may be sold. In the past, infected cows to be sold immediately, with the result that they were often sold to cattle traders and eventually got back into other dairy herds.

By selling cows to approved slaughterers, and by vaccinating all calves between the ages of four and eight months, the dairyman may finally work up to having a fully accredited herd, Bateman said, urging that dairy herd owners take advantage of the testing progam, which is carried out entirely without cost by the Federal Government.

Dairymen wishing to have their herds tested should notify Mr. Bateman, who will then make arrangements for

With the 76 Infantry Division in Germany-The Bronze Star medal for meritorious Service has been awarded to 1st. Sgt. Ernest F. Osborn, Headquarters Company, 691st Tank Destroyer Battalion, by Major General William R. Schmidt, 76th Division Commander

From January 1, 1945 to Feb. 1945, when the weather in France, Belgium and Luxembourg was bitterly cold, and the contact between the various elements of the Company was particularly difficult, Sgt. Osborn proved himself invaluable to his Headquarters Commandant, by maintaining continuous contact between sections. During these periods the temperature often fell below freezing, yet Sgt. Osborn was able to maintain contact with the Company at all times. Many times during the operations of this period the Company would be stretched between several towns at once, necessitating close personal supervision between the company headquarters, rear command posts and observation


