New Dairy Test Program Frees Herds from Bangs

A new Federal program of cattle testing was announced this week by County Agent A. R. Bateman who said that the new system is by far the best ever offered and that it will be to the advantage of every dairyman to take advantage of it.

According to the plan, at least 20 dairy herds would be tested during one period; and if any reactors to the Bang's Disease test are found, the cows will be marked and may be kept in the dairyman's herd until the government notifies the owner of an approved packer or slaughterer to whom the cow may be sold. In the past, infected cows had to be sold immediately, with the result that they were often sold to cattle traders and eventually got back into other dairy herds.

By selling cows to approved slaughterers, and by vaccinating all calves between the ages of four and eight months, the dairyman may finally work up to having a fully accredited herd, Bateman said, urging that dairy herd owners take advantage of the testing program, which is carried out entirely without cost by the Federal Government.

Dairyman wishing to have their herds tested should notify Mr. Bateman, who will then make arrangements for the Federal inspection program.

Juel Owens Freed From Germans

Mr. and Mrs. C. R. Owens, of the Hub community south of Friona, have received word from their son Pvt. Juel Owens, informing them that he has been liberated from a German war prison, where he had been since the 4th of last October, and is in good health. He was liberated, April 29.

Pvt. Owens has been overseas a year and took part in the invasion on D-Day and was in combat most of the time thereafter until he was taken prisoner.

Mr. and Mrs. Owens have also received a letter from another of their sons, Sgt. Charles W. Owens, who has been overseas about two years and has seen combat in Africa, Sicily and Italy. The letter stated that he is on his way home to spend a permanent furlough.

Has Army Discharge

S-Sgt. Douglas P. Short, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. B. Short, of northeast of Friona, has received his honorable discharge from the Army Air Forces and arrived home Saturday.

Sgt. Short has been in the service for 41 months, 39 of which were spent in overseas service and much of it in actual combat.

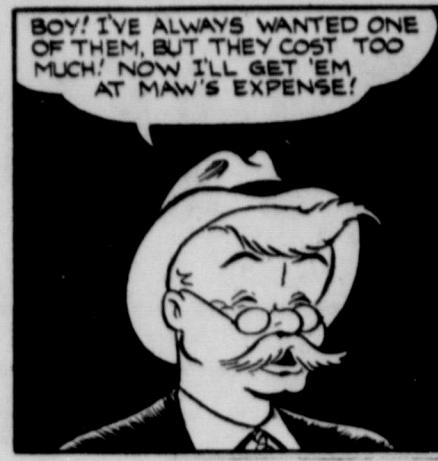
Bronze Star Awarded

What I've seen of it so far has been from the air. I am attached to the Ferrying Command, which is a part of the A. T. C. This will be a good job as soon as I get started on it. We'll be flying all over the U. S. I am an engineer on the planes which we will ferry. This is a small base and is located only 17 miles from Detroit, but I haven't been in town yet. I flew over it and almost got lost just looking down, so I haven't made up my mind yet to go in. I don't know when I will be able to see the old home State again unless we fly over it. I had already got my combat training when I was put on this job, so I'm keeping my fingers crossed that I'll get to keep this job. I have been getting the Star. It is always late because I move around so much, but the news is new to me. Please send it to my new address. Best of luck to all.

England, May 17, 1945. Dear Uncle John:

I haven't written to you for quite awhile, because I have not had anything in particular to write. Now that the war here is over, our censorship regulations are not so rigid and I can tell you where I am. The nearest town of any size, (a little smaller than Clovis) is Thetford, which is six miles away. We are located about half way between Norwich and Cambridge, the famous university town. There is a little village right next to

our base called East Wretham. It consists of a church, a pub and a store, and also an immense country home called Wretham Hall, which looks like a hotel. That's where our flying officers stay. This base was originally an RAF base and I stay in one of the RAF barracks.

When we left the states we sailed from New York harbor and it took ten days to get here—up past Newfoundland and near Iceland. We were in a big convoy and our ship docked at Liverpool and we traveled by train from Liverpool to this bump on the map of England the part which sticks out toward Germany.

In two more months I will have served a "hitch," (3 years) in the army. It has been two years since I have seen Friona and I know it has changed considerably. I see unfamiliar names in the Star and read of new businesses and other businesses changing hands. I'm getting pretty anxious to see it again.

Nobody seems to know how long we will be here, or whether we will ship direct to the Pacific or via the U. S.—everybody is hoping it's the U. S., of course. A few fellows in our unit had the necessary points for a discharge, but most are a few short, I'm 12 points short myself.

The weather here in England is lovely except for occasional rains, now that the May snowstorms are over. I just hope I'm not here when next winter sets in.

Our base is starting an educational program, to last until we ship. It will do us a lot more good than drilling and will help to keep us busy after the planes stop flying. Well, I have to close now. Hope to see you and the other Friona people within the next few months.

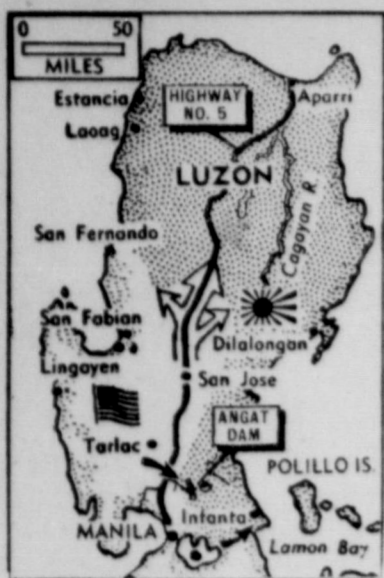

Maybe it's because her two sons, Daniel and George Turrentine, are still very much in the middle of the Pacific War that Mrs. Werner has tried to put punch into the salvage drive on her farm. And also, she says, she has had the help of her brother, Wray T. Ridge-way, a veteran of 1918, to carry out most of the actual work.

At any rate, this one farm salvage record stands as tops in Deaf Smith County:

Saved have been 125 pounds of fat, for which 250 red points and \$5.00 have been collected. Four hundred pounds of tin cans have been prepared as required, delivered at the Sales Barn and hauled by the P. O. W. truck to a salvage depot in Amarillo.

(This operation proved the end of a good can opener, Mrs. Werner said, as all cans must have both tops and bottoms removed so that the can may be pressed flat.)

In addition, one ton of papers—about \$10 worth—has been bundled as required and is ready to go on its way back to the paper mills and into useful war and civilian production.
