This will probably be the last entertainment of its kind, so let us continue our support by attending.

Memberships continue to grow with 428 now. Each week there will be sales teams doing some work in the different communities. No doubt the goal of 500 can be reached by Christmas.

Thursday night of this week the directors go to Rosedale, N. M., to acquaint the people there with the hospital plans. The superintendent, Mr. Younger, has given 30 minutes of a school program for that purpose. It is a fine opportunity to meet with a large group, and we are grateful for it.

The members of the Junior Woman's Club are happy because of the cooperation they received in the "Harvest Sale" which was held at the Auditorium last week. The amount of money made was \$387.00 more than enough to furnish a room.

After the program and the auctioning of the food, those present went to the cafeteria to eat. The local community was well represented, and there were people from other communities. The fine support given is another proof of the interest the people of the county have in the hospital project. Never has there been such cooperation shown in any other undertaking.

### Congregational Church

Members of the Union Congregational Church have been hosts this week, Dec. 2 to 9, to Supt. H. H. Lindeman, Oklahoma City, who has led in the Sunday service and in many departmental planning sessions on week nights and afternoons. Among other matters, the annual canvas for support of the local program and postwar reconstruction was organized and quickly pledged; the budget being much the largest in the church's fifty years of service. Dr. Lindeman assured the people that a capable and well trained pastor will be sent here before long. Another undertaking determined upon for the near future is a new parsonage of seven or eight rooms, to be located beside the church. For this, considerable funds are already in hand. Scheduled for Wednesday night was a consultation with the Sunday school staff. The week's activities are planned to close with the regular services Sunday, with a noon-day fellowship dinner, at which the work of the week will be summarized and the budget canvas completed.

Dr. Lindeman expressed great interest in the fact that Union Church was the first church organized in this frontier village, and included Christians of all connections working together in unity. He emphasized that the 6,000 churches of the Pilgrim Faith are still union churches, non-sectarian, and working and praying for the reunion of the forces of Christ, and willing to lay down their lives for such unity. Dr. Lindeman will return to Oklahoma City Monday.

## Elevator And Wheat Lost In Farm Fire

At 10 o'clock Saturday night Ralph Wilson, farmer who lives six miles west of town, saw flames breaking from the top of the grain elevator on Granville McFarland's place, a mile north of the Wilson home.

Mr. Wilson rushed to the fire, but found no one at home. Mr. McFarland lives in Friona, and the man living on the farm was gone. Mr. Wilson then drove to the nearest telephone and called the Friona Fire Department, asking that word be circulated so that all who could, might come and assist in fighting the fire.

When the fire truck and crew reached the farm, the elevator was enveloped in flames from the ground to the top so there was nothing that could be done to save it, and it was a total loss.

The elevator contained about 18,000 bushels of wheat—the greater part of Mr. McFarland's crop last season, along with several hundred bushels of sorghum, grain, barley and oats, practically all of which was destroyed. All the grain which was not burned was damaged to the extent that it was unfit for the market.

The water supply at the farm was used, but the irrigation well on the farm was put into operation and furnished an abundance of water to continue the fight until the fire was under control early Sunday morning. A large force of men from Friona and the surrounding neighborhood fought the fire throughout the night and many of them remained until afternoon to quench any new outbreaks.

It is estimated that a hundred or more men were on the scene, helping to subdue the flames. Ladies of the community served the workers with hot sandwiches and coffee.


Mr. McFarland stated that he carried only a small amount of insurance on the building and feed grains, but the wheat was covered with insurance.

Several hundred bales of alfalfa hay stacked on the south side of the elevator were saved by the Friona fire department.

into service, but was discharged after less than six months for a respiratory condition. On a hunting trip following his return home, he was accidentally wounded in the ankle and leg. He received emergency hospitalization in a private hospital. A gangrenous condition set in, requiring extensive hospitalization and removal of part of the leg and foot. With the aid of his local Red Cross chapter Richard was transferred to a Veterans Administration hospital because neither he nor his family was able to pay for the treatment needed. He now has returned home but is unable to follow his former occupation as helper in the shipping department of an industrial firm.)

This veteran is entitled to Veterans Administration hospitalization for the rest of his life. He is not entitled to an artificial limb or vocational rehabilitation through the Veter-

ans administration because his disability did not occur as a result of service.

All states have developed vocational rehabilitation programs. Prior to the passage of Public Law No. 113 by the federal government, state funds were sometimes unavailable. This law provides, however, for federal supplementation of funds to the end that adequate programs can be developed on a state level to carry out physical and mental rehabilitation among handicapped residents of each state.

At the present time, almost all states have well-developed programs conforming to the federal statute. Counseling services, vocational guidance, aptitude tests, expenses for necessary schooling, costs of prosthetic appliances, and subsistence allotments are all provided on the basis of need. These services are available to veterans and civilians alike. Because this man's disability is not service-connected, he is not entitled to vocational rehabilitation under the veterans administration program.

Red Cross will counsel with the veteran and his family and will help in making contact with the state agency in order to help the veteran maintain his confidence and usefulness despite his disability.

Your local Red Cross chapter at the courthouse in Hereford, is prepared to give you counsel and assistance with reference to benefits available to veterans and their dependents.


