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

Meno pointed out a number of challenges that are facing today's educators, other than the financial crunch that everyone hears about.

Changes in the family makeup have a large bearing on education, Meno said, pointing out that a number of students today are saddled by having to move from place to place during the school year, as well as being a part of a singleparent family.

Fifty-one per cent of the students in Texas schools today are minorities. (It's hard to figure out how the majority of students can be minorities, but that seems to be the way it works--even if it gets up to 80 or 90 per cent).

A number of students have a language other than English as their primary language.

Meno is a native of New York, who was superintendent of schools at Syracuse, the nations second or third-largest system, prior to being appointed as Texas' Education Commissioner.

Personally, we thought that Friona native Ted Sanders, former U.S. Education deputy secretary, would have been a better choice for the Texas job, but Governor Richards opted to go out of state for this appointment. Someone forgot to give her the lecture about "shopping at home."

Anyway, Meno says that the Texas school system is in need of a fundamental re-structuring.

"We need to provide some summer school for the kids who need it," Meno said.

He pointed out that students who are retained while they are in school rarely ever graduate from high school. He hinted that a summer program to help the slow students catch up to their classmates might help them in their efforts to stay with their class and perhaps graduate.

A total of 20 per cent of the students in Texas schools are being retained, Meno said, and this is a very high percentage.

It's time for the schools' professional staffs to re-structure the schools, the commissioner said.

One of the big problems, according to the Texas Education chief, is the fact that the state's schools can't compete with other industries in the way of teacher salaries. Texas currently ranks 38th in the nation for teachers' salaries, he said.

Meno said that dramatically improved student achievement would remain his number one priority.

The problem lies in the fact that rural residents pay county taxes, but region work with the city fire no city taxes. Thus, they are not paying directly for fire protection.

For a number of years, the county commissioners have paid the City of Friona a flat \$4,000 to help in fighting rural fires, but this comes out woefully short, according to City Manager Paula

The \$4,000 amount is paid to each fire department in the county, including those at Bovina, Farwell, Lazbuddie and Rhea.

Mrs. Wilson issued figures that showed the expenses for the Friona Fire Department at \$50,689 since October 1, 1992. At this rate, the department will probably top \$70,000 in expenses in a year's time, she estimated.

Of this amount, City of Friona budgets approximately \$30,000 per year for fire department expenses, so that leaves a big discrepancy.

The City Manager added that last year the county did allot an additional \$22,000 to help purchase a new truck. There is still \$23,620 owing on this emergency vehicle.

In addition to the city and school races, voters will cast ballots in the special senate race and constitutional amendment election on May 1.



Dear Editor,

I am writing on behalf of Texas State Treasurer, Kay Bailey Hutchison, Republican candidate for the U.S. Senate. Texas voters will elect a new U.S. Senator on May 1.

Kay is the first Republican woman to ever be elected to statewide office in Texas. As Texas State Treasurer, she has strongly opposed a state income tax. She cut her department's budget twice, yet increased the Treasury's revenue to a record high. She understands that government needs to be smaller and more efficient. Having also been a successful small business owner, Kay understands the problems of excessive taxation and needless, counterproductive government meddling. She will work to reduce both. And as a strong supporter of congressional term limits, she understands that the job of a public official is to serve and then to live under the laws that he or she has imposed upon others. As an advocate of government and congressional reform, Kay will work to limit the obscene perks now abused by members of Congress.

Kay's opponent, Bob Krueger, could hardly be more of an extreme contrast. Twice rejected by Texas voters in previous bids for a U.S. Senate seat, Krueger has nonetheless slipped into the Senate chamber as an Ann Richards political appointee. Like other Richards appointees (i.e., Lena Guerrero), Krueger's record is predictable and lamentable: In the U.S. House of Representatives he voted for 94% of all spending bills and 9 out of 10 times to raise the national debt. His first vote as a United States Senator was to increase the deficit by 5.7 billion! As Railroad Commissioner, Krueger's bloated budget grew by 37%, and he asked for 14% more money in his most recent budget. A career politician who has been running for various and sundry offices for nearly two decades, Krueger naturally opposes term limits, and has voted for more congressional staff, increased travel budgets, bigger expense accounts and more perks for Congress. Can anyone, in 1993, possibly believe that the solutions to our problems include higher taxes, bigger government, more career politicians and more elaborate congressional perks?

The Friona area received a good rain last Saturday, with .78 inches measured in the city guage that day.

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
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Tortillas Can Be Utilized In Many Interesting Recipes

My parents taught me to eat Mexican food almost as soon as I could eat solid food. For as long as I can remember, my mother made dishes such as beef enchiladas, chicken enchiladas, tacos, Spanish rice and beans.

But, it wasn't until my family moved to West Texas that we really began to appreciate the tortilla. After we moved to Plainview, I became friends with a girl my age and her family who introduced me to many aspects of their Mexican-American culture, including homemade flour tortillas.

I thought I was in culinary heaven the first time Rosa's mother Mrs. Efrain Nunez, handed me a hot tortilla fresh off the stove. Rosa put some margarine on it for me, and I rolled it up and ate it just like Sour cream that. I was hooked.

I still haven't learned to make the round, flat bread, but I have thoroughly integrated tortillas into my cooking.

Tony and I often stuff tortillas with eggs, potatoes, and bacon, sausage or chorizo for breakfast burritos. A little leftover meat, some shredded lettuce, chopped tomatoes, and a dash of salsa or hot sauce all rolled up in a tortilla make a quick lunch-time meal.

From burritos and enchiladas to fajitas and tostados, the tortilla is a versatile bread enhancing every meal from breakfast to midnight snack.

Tortillas--flour or corn--can be and pliable. Or, they can be fried-flat or in a taco or basket shape-until crisp and then filled. Another option is to fill the tortilla and then fry it, creating a flauta or a taquito.

Try the following recipes (the Chicken Burritos is one Tony and I created together, tasting and adjusting each time we cook them) and enjoy the versatility of the

CHICKEN BURRITOS 2 boneless, skinless chicken breasts Vegetable oil

1/2 onion, chopped 1 garlic clove, minced or pressed Chili powder, to taste Cayenne pepper, to taste 1 can tomatoes and green chilies

Green onions, chopped 6 flour tortillas

Cook the chicken breasts (in a microwave or skillet); allow to cool and shred into bite-sized pieces. In a large skillet, cook the chopped onion over medium heat until soft. Add the garlic and cook for 1 minute. Add the chicken and chili powder and cayenne pepper to taste; stir to mix. Add tomatoes and green chilies and stir. Let simmer until mixture is not too watery. Fill heated tortillas with chicken mixture and sprinkle with chopped

green onions. Makes 2 to 3

1 dozen corn tortillas 1 chicken, boiled and cut into chunks or shredded

servings.

Warm the tortillas, one at a time on a griddle. Place the chicken in each tortilla, near one end of the tortilla, and roll. Secure each roll with a toothpick. Fry the flautas in the oil or lard until crisp. Drain on paper towels. Serve with sour cream and salsa.

TORTILLA SOUP

9 tortillas 1/4 cup vegetable oil 1 onion, chopped 1/3 cup tomato puree 2 quarts chicken broth

1 tablespoon chopped fresh cilantro 1-1/2 cups grated Monterey Jack cheese

Cut the tortillas into 1/2-inch heated and eaten while they are soft wide strips. Fry them in hot oil until crisp. Remove and drain on paper towels. Fry the onion and tomato puree in the remaining oil over lower heat for 5 minutes. Add the onion mixture, the tortilla strips and the cilantro to the boiling chicken broth. Simmer for 30 minutes. Put the grated cheese in each soup bowl and pour the hot soup over the cheese. Makes 6 servings.

Dip one tortilla at a time into the hot oil until the tortilla is pliable. Remove each tortilla from the oil to a warmed plate and continue with each tortilla. Fill each tortilla with 3 tablespoons of cheese and 1 teaspoon onion. Roll up each tortilla and lay them in a baking dish, one alongside the next. Pour the warm sauce over all the enchiladas and top with the remaining cheese. Bake at 250

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



ASCS Sets Signup Deadline

The Parmer County ASCS Office would like to remind every farm owner and operator that the deadline for signing up into the 1993 Wheat, Feed Grain and Cotton Program is April 30, 1993. If you have not signed up, please contact the ASCS Office for an appointment.

The ASCS Office is also in the process of certifying fall seeded small grains. The final date to certify or request measurement service for wheat, rye, barley, oats and triticale, regardless of use, program or non-program, ACR or CU, is May 15, 1993. This is also the date to certify to zero planted acres if the farm has a base for that commodity.

REMEMBER: Tolerance on spot checked acres is the larger of 5% or 1.0 acre not to exceed 10.0 acres, up or down. Penalties for being out of tolerance can be costly or may cause the farm to be ineligible for program benefits. To insure compliance with program regulations, producers should consider measurement service.

The special disaster for 1992 low quality corn, applies only to #4, #5 and sample grade corn. No adjustments will be made for corn that graded any higher.

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





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NOTICE OF RATE CHANGE REQUEST AND STATEMENT OF INTENT

Notice is hereby given that DEAF SMITH ELECTRIC COOPERATIVE, INC. (the "Utility") intends to decrease rates for electric utility service effective July 6, 1993, or as soon thereafter as may be permitted by law. Based upon a test year ending December 31, 1992, the decrease requested is \$740,000 or 4.465% of actual test year revenues. The changes are applicable to all areas, all customer classes, and all customers served by the Utility.

The Utility proposes to change all rates for Farm and Home, Residential Space Heating, Irrigation, Commercial, Large Power, Industrial, Cotton Gin, and Lighting, including demand, energy, minimum and other charges. The proposed changes are expected to affect the classes as follows: for the 4,416 customers in the farm and home class, the proposed decrease will be \$109,357 or a negative 4.53% change in revenues; for the 147 customers in the residential space heating class, the proposed decrease will be \$7,793 or a negative 3.39% change in revenues; for the 4,060 customers in the irrigation class, the proposed decrease will be \$376,215 or a negative 4.15% change in revenues; for the 774 customers in the commercial class, the proposed decrease will be \$54,019 or a negative 6.17% change in revenues; for the 111 customers in the large power class the proposed decrease will be \$81,413 or a negative 8.11% change in revenues; for the 26 customers in the industrial class, the proposed decrease will be \$95,907 or a negative 3.74% change in revenues; for the 6 customers in the cotton gin class, there will be no change in revenues; and for the 2,888 customers in the lighting class, the proposed decrease will be \$15,296 or a negative 6.11% change in revenues.


The Utility also intends to change its service rules and regulations, including rules relating to obtaining service, line extension and line extension charges, the provision of electric service, service fees, and discontinuance of service.

Information concerning the proposed rate changes, including the proposed revisions of tariff and schedules is available at the General Office of the Utility, located at Highway 60 at Whittier Street, Hereford, Texas 79045-0753. Inquiries should be directed to Mike Veazey.

The Utility is required to give notice of the percentage change in base revenues which is negaive 12.087%. The percentage decrease in base revenues is not an indication of how much your bill will change. Rather, it is a measure of the decrease in revenues that will be experienced by the Utility for its own operations, excluding payment of the cost of power purchased by the Utility from its wholesale power suppliers.

On or about May 7, 1993, the Utility will file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, a Statement of Intent to Change Rates, specifying in detail each proposed change. Requests to intervene must be filed no later than 45 days after the application filing date; Thus, the Utility anticipates the deadline for intervening and objecting to the rate changes will be June 21, 1993. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. 

Looking Back To Plan Your Future

One of the most reliable ways for shareholders to build wealth long term is in the stock market, according to Scientific Investment,

a journal of investment strategies.

The financial publication studied the period from 1925 through the end of 1987, which included the Great Depression, World War II, other major wars and recessions, and the Crash of 1987, our most recent notable market

What's the message? Scientific Investment says, "Invest long term in stocks." The problem is that most investors do not have the means to invest in each of the 500 stocks that make up the Standard & Poor's average or all the stocks listed on the NYSE. The challenge is deciding which stocks to buy and

which to avoid. According to Scientific Investment, two investment pioneers, William F. Sharpe and Harry M. Markowitz, won the Nobel Prize in 1990 by finding that nobody can beat the market long term. This means that anyone's investment results over a long

period will not average better than the Standard & Poor's 500 or the Dow. Yet, it goes on to say that 18 per cent of mutual funds outperformed the S&P 500 over the past 10 years. That's beating the

Of course, no one can predict that these same funds will continue their success in the next 10 years. It is, however, reasonable to assume that some professionally managed funds will continue to beat the market. Deciding which funds may do this requires some work, but the results could spell the difference between a secure financial future and no financial future.

Some questions that might help find a fund that has the potential to beat the market are:

1. What is the objective of the fund? The risk?

2. What is its long-term total return (dividends + capital gains + growth=total return)?

3. Has the fund outperformed the major indexes (S&P and Dow) over the long term? How often?

4. Is management consistent? Answers to these questions can be found in the fund's prospectus, in approved sales literature, directly from the fund or from your broker. Ask pointed questions, and ask for specific examples (hypothetical illustrations, the fund calls them) based on past results using your specific investment dollars.

Past performance is one factor in selecting an investment; however, it is not an indication of future performance. Intelligent investing is not a get-rich-quick system designed to beat the market. It is rather a deliberate effort to regularly invest in a diverse portfolio of quality securities and give the market enough time to work for you.

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
