COGITATIONS and APHORISMS of Jodok

I know not how others may state it, but, in my opinion, if there is anything more beautiful than "beauty" it is more beauty. And this expression has been brought to my mind when I have had occasion to pass by our little city or community or county park, that is located practically and, perhaps, exactly in the geographical center of the City of Friona.

As I have been told, this block of the city was set apart and deeded, by George G. Wright, president of the George G. Wright Land Company, to Parmer County, for whatever purpose, of course, the people of the county might decide to use it for, and for many years it produced naught but the native prairie grass.

After a number of years, the ladies of the Friona Woman's Club took the park in hand and planted it in young Chinese elm trees, and gave the young trees some attention for a few years, until they had a start at growing, but the remainder of the citizens gave these ladies neither support or encouragement in their effort to beautify the ground so they also retired from the effort to thus beautify the city.

A year or two later the city authorities undertook the responsibility of carrying on the work begun by the Woman's Club, and the ground was plowed with a view to getting it seeded with Bermuda or other lawn grass, but dry weather and lack of irrigation facilities produced no grass but an abundance of careless weeds and thistles, and the lusterless verdure of such vegetation produced an "eyesore" rather than a "beauty-spot," so another plowing was necessary to rid the land of the weeds, but the hardy little trees continued to grow slowly, but in such a manner as nature decreed, until Mr. Gee with his "ag" boys went in and gave them a much needed pruning which added much to their beauty and accelerated their growth.

But I am now getting to what I started out to say at the first. Some two years ago, the men of the Friona Lions Club became interested in the matter and a park committee was appointed and after one or two unsuccessful efforts have succeeded in getting a nice stand of grass on the park grounds and have kept the trees nicely pruned, and the little park is now becoming a real "beauty-spot" for the city, and the Lions are richly deserving of the thanks and praise

of the entire populace for their efforts.

And now I will repeat the expression made in the first paragraph of this effusion and apply it to the discussion of the city park—"If there is anything that will make our park more beautiful it is more beauty." And I have no doubt but that this park committee if the Lions Club will see to it that this added beauty will be secured; and this may be accomplished in a variety of ways, such as beds and borders of perennially blooming flowers and shrubs, lily ponds, spraying fountains and—but here, I am getting out of my territory or ball-wick and where it is none of my business. It is the business of the committee, and more glory to its members.

But speaking of beauty, everybody likes it in some or all of its many forms, and there is but one thing that can keep Friona from being one of the prettiest cities in this plains country, and that is the desire and the will of its people to make it so. The spirit and desire for beauty is contagious, and when this contagion gets started in a community it goes almost like a prairie fire and can hardly be stopped until it has covered all the available territory.

For instance, if fifty per cent of the people of the city should conclude to have their homes painted, by the time they would all be through painting, fifty per cent of the remaining homes would be also painted. And the same would hold true of practically any other form of improving or beautifying the homes, such as landscaping the yard and other vacant spaces adjoining the homes with lawns, trees, ornamental shrubbery and flowers.

True, all people would not be led into the spirit of beautification of their homes by the acts of their neighbors, for there are exceptions to all rules; but the average American home owner resents being behind his neighbor in the matter of neatness. It is also true that all people do not have the same idea in regard to neatness and beauty of appearance, so there would be a variety of ideas and forms of this beauty making; but, while this is true, their would not be the monotony of sameness, and variety and comparison would produce additional beauty more frequently than it would detract from it.

Then, why not such an attempt at creating beauty be made for Friona? If some influential citizen should take up and promote the idea among his neighbors he would be well repaid for his efforts by the results he would obtain. Or suppose some civic or social organization, such as one or both of the local women's clubs, or the Lions Club should sponsor such a move, and there is no better time than right now, while the soil in the yards is moist and mellow, for many of the most beautiful flowers and shrubs do the best and make the best showing when planted in the fall, and it should also be a good time for planting as well, as there should not be any great amount of dirt carried by the breezes for some time. Of course I would not think of making such a suggestion myself, but there are plenty of people or organizations in Friona, that could make a rousing success of such a move; but I will agree to do the best I can considering my knowledge, skill and finances, and I will be glad to accept constructive advice or suggestions from those who do know how, in beautifying my own little hovel and its surroundings.

Such a plan could also be carried to the business houses of the city, (and the Lord knows some of them need it,) in the matter of a more systematic arrangement of the cast aside machinery and wrecked cars and such like, for even such stocks as these can be made to look attractive rather than repulsive, when neatly arranged and all the entirely worthless stuff could be hauled to the junk yard, then maybe the City Dads would get busy and have all the alleys cleared for such junk and rubbish, by having it placed on the property of its owners, or taken to the dump ground, so

To the Resident qualified Property Taxpaying Voters of Paramer County, Texas.

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held on the 5th, day of November, 1946, in said County, in obedience to an order duly entered by the Commissioners Court on the 12th, day of August, 1946, which is as follows:

On this the 12th, day of August, 1946, the Commissioners Court of Paramer County, Texas, convened in regular session, at the regular meeting place thereof in the Courthouse at Farwell, Texas, with the following members of the Court, to-wit:

A. D. Smith, County Judge, W. H. Flippin, Commissioner Precinct No. 1, F. T. Schlenker, Commissioner Precinct No. 2, T. E. Levy, Commissioner Precinct No. 3, W. E. Menefee, Commissioner Precinct No. 4, being present, and, among other proceedings had by the Court were the following:

Commissioner F. T. Schlenker introduced an order and moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Commissioner W.H. Flippin. The motion carrying with it the adoption of the order prevailed by the following vote:

AYES: Commissioners W. H. Flippin, T. E. Levy, F. T. Schlenker, W. E. Menefee;

NOES: Commissioners, none;

The order is as follows:

WHEREAS, at the general election held throughout the State of Texas on November 7, 1944, the qualified electors of the State, voting on the proposition, approved the amendment to Section 9, of Article 8, of the Texas Constitution, which amendment provides that the Commissioners Court in any county may reallocate the county tax levies authorized in said Section 9 of article 8 by changing the rates provided for any of the purposes authorized in said Section by either increasing or decreasing the same, but in no event shall the total of such taxes exceed eighty (80) cents on the one hundred dollars valuation for any one year, provided that before the Commissioners Court may make such reallocations and changes in such levies the same shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county, at a general or special election; and in event such reallocations and changes are approved by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of any such county, such reallocations and changes shall remain in force and effect for a period of six (6) years from the date of the election at which same shall have been approved, unless the same again shall have been changed by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county, voting on the proposition; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court of Paramer County, Texas, deems it advisable and to the best interest of said County to re-allocate the county taxes authorized by Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution, by changing the rates in respect to certain county taxes as herein provided;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF PARAMER COUNTY, TEXAS:

That a special election be held in said County on the 5th day of November, 1946, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified taxpaying voters who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon:

- "Shall the Commissioners Court of PARAMER COUNTY, Texas, be authorized to levy and collect in each year for a period of six (6) years from the date of said election, county taxes as follows: Not exceeding Fifty-Five Cents (55c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for County purposes; Not exceeding Thirty Cents (30c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for roads and bridges; Not exceeding Five Cents (5c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, to supplement the jury fund of the County; and Not exceeding Five Cents (5c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for the erection of public buildings and other permanent improvements."

In the event that the annual levy of a tax not exceeding fifteen (15c) cents on the one hundred dollars valuation for the further maintenance of the public roads of said County has heretofore been, or shall hereafter be authorized by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of the County, voting at an election held for that purpose, nothing herein shall be construed as rescinding or in any manner affecting the power and authority of the Commissioners Court to levy and to continue to levy said tax.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly amended Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution, and Section 3a, Article 6, of the Constitution, and all persons who are legally qualified voters of said County, and who are resident property taxpayers in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

"FOR RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES."

"AGAINST RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES."

Each voter shall mark out with black ink or pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote.

The same polling places and the same presiding officers as have been heretofore selected and appointed respectively to hold the General Election on November 5, 1946 in Paramer County.
