Voter Registration Rules Explained

Noting an anticipated interest in races for several county offices in the May primaries, Floyd County Tax Assessor-Collector Jonelle Fawver has these questions — and explanations — for voters or potential voters in the county:

Are you registered to vote?
Any citizen 18 years old or older is eligible to vote, if he is registered. Floyd County residents register at the Tax Assessor-Collector's office in the Court House.

Are you registered in this county?
You must be registered in the county to vote in the county elections.

Have you changed addresses since registering in this county?

The voter's registration certificate must show correct address and proper voting box. If you have moved within the county you have until five days before the election to transfer.

If you have registered here, have you cancelled in the county of previous residence?

You are illegally registered if you are registered in more than one county.

Do you have your voter registration card?

If your card has been lost or misplaced, the Tax Assessor-Collector's office can furnish a duplicate.

Did you vote in Floyd County in 1972 or 1973?

If you voted here in 1972 or 1973, you are registered to vote here for a period of three years from the date you last voted in a primary or general election.

Even though voter may register 30 days before an election, their names will not appear on the 1974 precinct voter registration lists if they register after February 1, Mrs. Fawver notes.

The Tax Assessor-Collector's office also reminds taxpayers that county, state, water district and hospital district taxes are due January 31. After that date, penalties and interest must be collected on the taxes.

Property Owners should declare their property for this year's taxes from now until April 30 at the office. Deputy assessors will not contact property owners for declarations this year.

Filing Deadline For Primaries February 4

February 4 is the filing deadline for candidates in the May primary elections. Announced candidates for local offices in the Democratic primary include Bob Ja-rett and Raymond Martin for County Commissioner, Precinct 2; Bill McNeill and Jack Lackey, County Commissioner, Precinct 4; Dell Yandell, County Treasurer; Margaret Collier, County Clerk; J. K. Holmes, County Judge; Mary L. McPherson, District Clerk; and H. E. Porter, Justice of Peace, Precincts 1 and 4.

WONDER IF IT'S OKAY to go 60 down the hills. We have this couple of miles south of our and if Mary Tom and the kids drag their feet, I find it almost impossible to hold my speed down to 55 going down the hill into the town.

Governor of Texas says there are two reasons for 55 mph speed limit. It will conserve fuel and it will save the state from losing some \$240 million for state highways from the government. Of course there's a good reason...there should be as many people killed on the highway. Though the lower speeds should save lives, the Texas Highway Department still reminds drivers that driving practices still are needed. Trucks at least 400 feet to stop from 60 per hour, for example, and under ideal conditions...good dry pavement, and on a clear day.

A historical note, this is the fifth statewide maximum speed limits been changed since the Texas Highway Department was established in 1917. In that year, the maximum possible speed was a blazing 25 mph. The speed limit went to 35 in 1928, to 45 in 1941, and to 55 in 1965.

One of the most impressive events of the year was in 1936 when a cousin from the city of Wichita Falls visited us on a farm near Kress. He had a beautiful brand new 1936 Ford coupe. He named it all by demonstrating he could get 60 mph in second gear.

All have ideas about how they have put the speed limit on 60 mph. Truckers say their trucks will get diesel mileage at that speed. My neighbor at Hereford, allows that the meter would be straight up on the road and much easier to watch than a little off center at 55 mph.

I wish I had one of those cruise controls on my car. I would just set her up and relax. Of course, I might have a neighbor, Weldon Jones, who will probably have to up to get the 55 mph speed limit.

Case In New Location

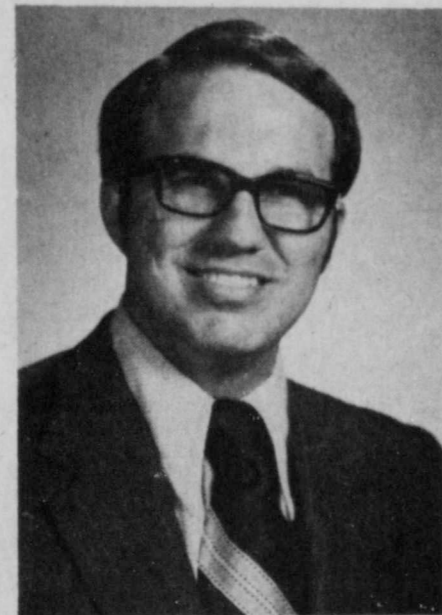
According to an announcement by Frank Milby, manager of Case Power & Equipment, the business has been moved to the Silverton highway, in the building formerly occupied by United Transports.

MS VICTIM SAYS SHE'LL WALK AGAIN

Woman's Determination 'Fools' Doctors

Two years ago, doctors in Lubbock told Ona Beth Carter she had six months to a year to live. She is a victim of multiple sclerosis, a chronic, progressive disease of the central nervous system. Two months ago, she left a nursing home in Ralls to live with her mother, Mrs. May Dell Purnell, in Floydada.

And she says she's going to fool the doctors some more—she's going to walk again. She hasn't walked alone for about a year, and for several months before moving to Floydada, she was not able to walk, even with help. Since moving to her mother's house, though, she has begun to walk—six or seven yards a day, encouraging improvement over none at all.

"I know I'm going to walk again. There's no doubt in my mind," she says, defying the opinions of neurologists who said "nothing could be done" in her case.

A nurse gives her therapy every day, sometimes twice a day.

Mrs. Carter has a positive, spiritual outlook on life. She enjoys company but is often tired after the morning therapy sessions. The best time for visitors to call is in the afternoon.

Last Friday was a big day, but a tiring one, for the MS victim. She left the house for the first time since she has been in Floydada, for a visit to the doctor and to the optometrist. The Floydada Lions Club arranged for her to be fitted with new glasses.

She recently received a new reclining chair, thanks to a community fund-raising effort sponsored by the First United Methodist Church, and a fund for her and her mother has been started at the First National Bank in Floydada. Mrs. Purnell fell on the ice during a recent winter storm here and broke an arm.

Surely there have been times when she has been discouraged. "Yes," Mrs. Carter said, "but not recently," reiterating her determination to walk again.

Her nine-year-old son Charles Glyn visited her here during the Christmas holidays. Charles lives with his father in Lubbock and attends school in Post, where his father has a business, Mrs. Carter said.

Mrs. Carter has lived in Post, Lubbock and Lorenzo.

Cagle Named All-American

Whirlwind quarterback John Cagle has been selected as an All-American by the yearly publication "Who's Who In National High School Athletics." All votes have been tabulated from ballots submitted by a nationwide panel of more than 1500 coaches and sports-writers, including The National Advisory Board of Who's Who. (College Football Coaches).

A press release from Frank Gianetto, national director of "Who's Who In High School Athletics," stated:

These young men are being honored for definite evidence of excellence to the highest ideals of sportsmanship through competitive athletics. And further revealed by their strong contribution to team-mates acquired through sacrifice, sportsmanship, cooperation, and fair play.

Cagle, a senior, who served as a tri-captain for the 1973 Whirlwinds, was picked by the Harris Poll as blue-chip quarterback prior to the 1973 season. In ten regular-season games in 1973, he completed 71 of 133 passes (a 53.4-per-cent average) for 1088 yards and averaged better than five yards per carry on running options.

Cagle was selected to the 4-AA coaches' all-district squad, and the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal named the Whirlwind quarterback to its All-South Plains AA team.

The Wind football standout also has a high scholastic grade average, as shown by his membership in the National Honor Society.

The Floydada Whirlwinds defeated Idalou 46-38 Friday in a District 1-AA basketball game. Steve Moore scored 12 points and hauled in ten rebounds for the 'Winds. Kelvin Ratliff scored ten and caught 11 rebounds. Donzell Minner scored ten points, and MacArthur Mitchell got nine rebounds in the game. Idalou led 8-6 after one period and 20-18 at halftime, but Floydada was ahead 34-28 at the end of the third quarter. Floydada won the junior varsity game.

In the third period of play Ralls outscored Lockney 12 to 4 to tie the score going

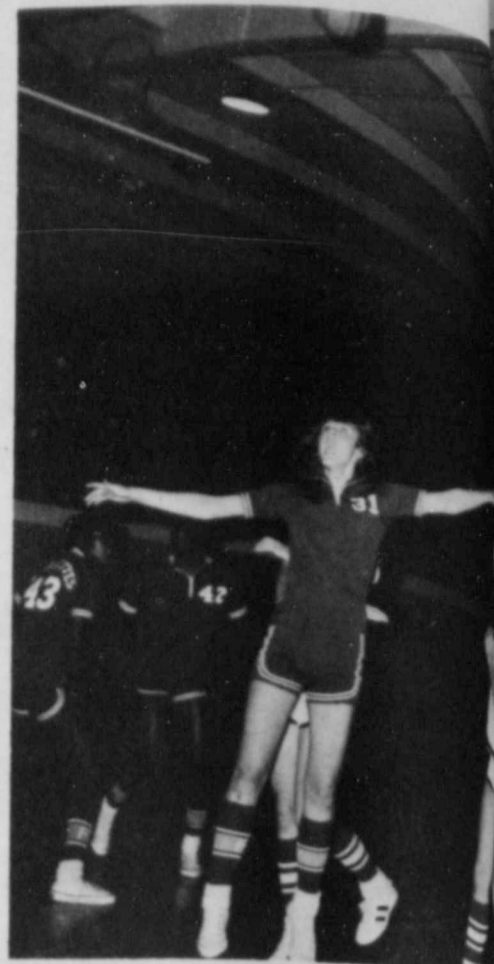
into the last quarter of play. Lockney outscored Ralls in the final stanza 23 to 13 to take the win 53-43 and

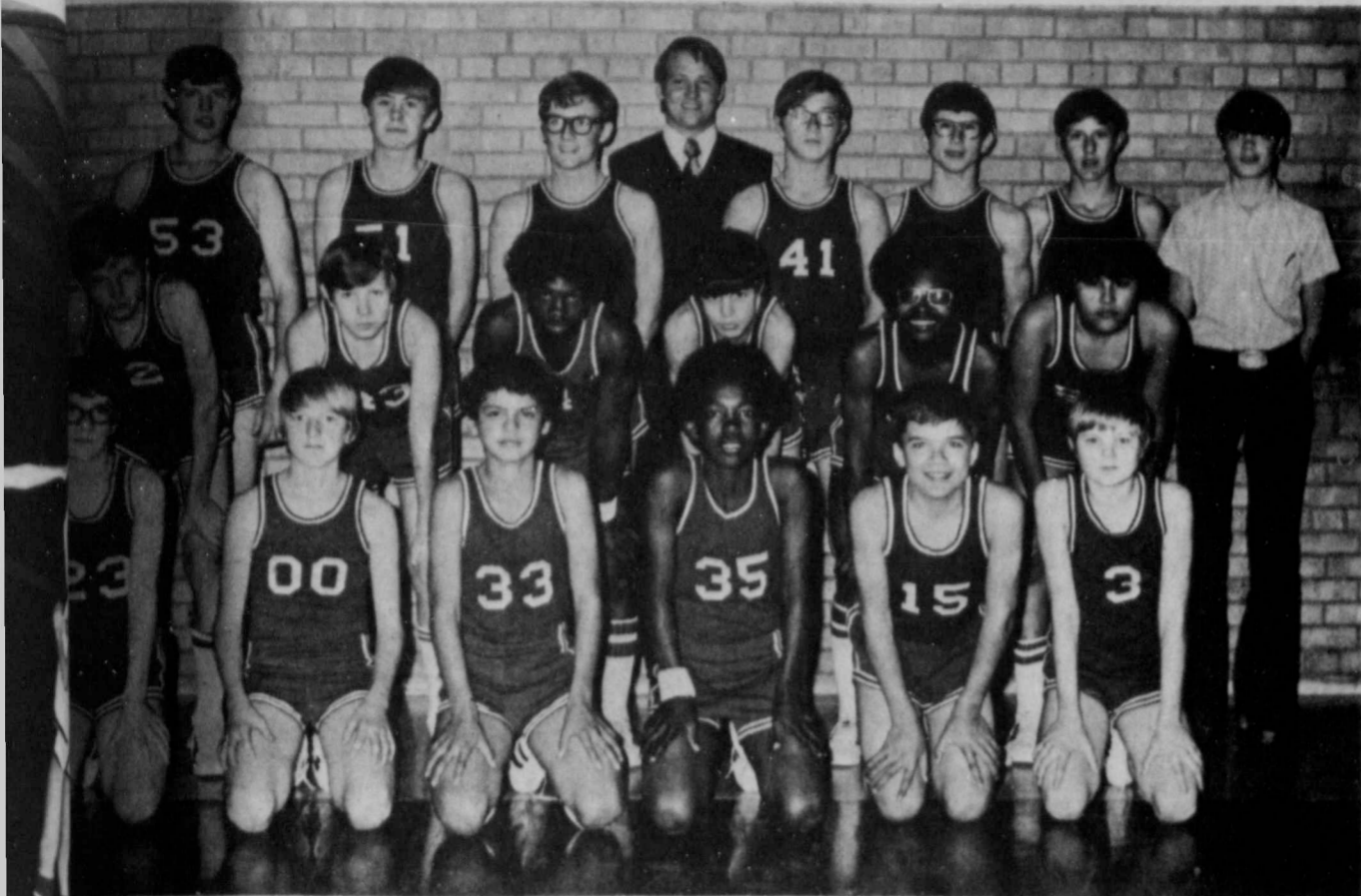

An early day math teacher of Floydada, Mrs. Helena Kea Hicks Green, 89, died about 11:30 Tuesday in the Lockney Nursing Home following a lengthy illness. Funeral rites were conducted yesterday in the First United Methodist Church. The pastor, Rev. James Tidwell, officiated. Interment was held in Floydada Cemetery with Moore-Rose Funeral Home in charge.

Pallbearers were Guy Ginn, Jimmy Willson, Joe Jones, A. E. Baker, Kenneth Bain and Dolphus Blodgett of Lubbock.

A native of Minden, La., Mrs. Green was born August 30, 1885, and married there July 7, 1906. She came to Floyd County in the early 1900s, and taught fifth grade math at the old East Ward School and later at R. C. Andrews after it was built, as well as Baker and McCoy School.

One of Mrs. Green's pupils, Arthur E. Gamble of Lubbock, wrote of her recently recalling: "Mrs. Green was a Southern Lady of the old school. I often suspected that she used her glasses for a rear vision mirror because she had the knack of always turning just in time to catch misbehavior at its worst. She taught a sound basic mathematics that stressed understanding 'what' and 'why' as well as getting correct answers. Getting the answer without understanding was not enough for this wonderful teacher. She was one who showed love for her students by making sure they learned what they needed for life ahead."

Mrs. Green was a member of the Woodman of the World and the First Methodist Church. She had been a patient at the nursing home some three years, but still maintained her home at 129 W. Georgia.

Mrs. Green was the stepmother of Mrs. Florence Simpson of the Floydada Nursing Home; Mrs. Gwendolyn Torrance of Sarasota, Florida, and Bailey Green of Los Angeles. She was married to their father, the late J. H. (Bob) Green in Floydada on May 6, 1923.

Survivors include a son, Durwood Hicks of Little Rock, Ark., two sisters, Mrs. Alma Bevers of Oklahoma and Mrs. Lee Panake of Sun City, Ariz.; and the stepchildren.

Rites for Agapito S. Guzman, 73 year old Floydada farm laborer, were held Tuesday afternoon in the St. Mary Magdalen Church in Floydada. Officiating was Father Ralph Zinser. Burial was in Floydada Cemetery with Moore-Rose Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Guzman was killed when his vehicle was in collision with another at the intersection of FM 2461 and No. Quaker Ave., in Lubbock Sunday about 5:15. Friends said Guzman had attended church Sunday in Floydada and had evidently gone to Lubbock for the visit. Occupants of the other car, a Hurlwood family, were seriously injured in the wreck. An eight year old girl, member of the family, died Tuesday night in Lubbock as a result of the wreck injuries. Guzman was killed when he was thrown from his car after the impact.

A native of Agua Dulce, Tex., Guzman moved to Floydada in 1956 from Derby, Tex. His wife, the former Domitila Santos, died in Floydada Feb. 26, 1962. Guzman was a veteran of World War II and a member of the Catholic Church.

Survivors include two sisters, Gregoria G. Santos of Floydada and Petra G. Arellano of Childress; and a brother, Estevon Guzman of Los Angeles, Calif.

Mrs. Cagle

Funeral rites for Mrs. H. I. Cagle, 97, of Amarillo, and mother of Mrs. W. S. Simmons of Floydada, were held Tuesday in the Baptist Church at Quail with a grandson, Doyle Holmes of Lubbock, officiating. Mrs. Cagle died Saturday in Southwest Osteopathic Hospital in Amarillo.

A native of Grayson County, Mrs. Cagle had resided in Wellington and Quail before moving to Amarillo some 13 years ago. She married Harmon Isaac Cagle October 8, 1893 at Hardy, Texas. He died in 1956.

Mrs. Cagle's hobby creations were well known in the South Plains area. At the age of 90 she began creating baby-sized doll figures made from plastic bottles, then one of her Christmas projects in 1972 won first place in the Floyd County Fair and second in the South Plains Fair at Lubbock. A colorful decorated clown made by Mrs. Cagle won her a blue ribbon in the golden year toy division of the Floyd Fair, and she took second place honors in the Fair with a quilt.

Survivors include two sons, W. W. Cagle of Hollis, Okla., and Fred Cagle of Amarillo; three daughters, Mrs. Simmons of Floydada, Mrs. Oltis Milton and Miss Daisy Cagle, both of Amarillo; 22 grandchildren, 50 great grandchildren and five great great grandchildren.

Mrs. Lacy

Funeral rites are to be held today in Turkey for Mrs. Geraldine Edwards Lacy, 64, sister of Mrs. V.W. Bradshaw and aunt of Willie Bradshaw of Floydada. Mrs. Lacy was killed and her husband injured in a head-on collision four miles west of Turkey about 10 o'clock Monday morning.

Mrs. Lacy was driver of the car in which her husband, Elmer, sustained bruises and abrasions. He is in Lubbock Medical Center and reported by relatives to be improving.

Driver of the other vehicle involved, a pickup, said to be driven by Jerry Yates of Kress, was not injured seriously.

According to other news sources, charges were filed Monday against Yates for involuntary manslaughter in connection with the death of Mrs. Lacy.

District Atty. George Miller of Floydada filed the complaint in the court of Justice of Peace Barbara Pigg in Silverton, but due to inadequate jail facilities in Briscoe County, authorities transferred Yates to Floydada, where he was arraigned before Justice of Peace H. E. Porter. Bond was set at \$7,500 and Yates remained in the Floyd County jail as of yesterday, according to Floyd County officials.

Survivors of Mrs. Lacy include her husband, her mother, Mrs. Vesta Edwards of Lubbock; two brothers and two sisters.

Internal Revenue Service (IRS) Administrative Officer, Walter I. Perry, today reminded employers that next Thursday, January 31, is the last day to have completed W-2 Forms in the hands of their employees.

"W-2 Forms for those employees who left the job during the year should have been furnished to the employees not later than

Simon Says Farmers Get Fuel Priority

William E. Simon, Federal Energy Office Administrator, yesterday assured America's farmers they are receiving "top priority" for fuel needs to help protect the Nation's health and economy.

"The future stability of our dollar is dependent on our balance of payments, and a major ingredient in providing us with a trade surplus will continue to be our agricultural exports," Simon told the 45th annual National Council of Farmer Cooperatives at the Washington Hilton Hotel.

The Energy Office Administrator, predicting that farm exports will reach approximately \$19 billion in fiscal year 1974, stressed that farmers will get the fuel they need to keep up their record production.

He further pointed out that planting an additional 10 million acres next year would increase farm fuel needs for gasoline by one million barrels; diesel fuel by about 12 million barrels; and liquefied petroleum gas by two to four million barrels. "However," he stressed, "I believe that 'farm needs' are really national needs."

While urging the cooperatives, who supply farms almost 30 percent of their fuel needs, to help spread the word on energy conservation to farmers, Simon cited the Mandatory Petroleum Allocations the Federal Energy Office submitted this week, as proof of his commitment to "fuel the farms." He said:

"Gasoline will be provided to agricultural users on a priority basis, supplying 100 percent of what they need.

"Propane, butane, and mixes will be provided to agricultural users on a priority basis, supplying 100 percent of what they need.

"Residual fuel oil will be provided to agricultural users on a priority basis,

thirty days after the last paycheck," Perry reminded.

"Those W-2's which are undeliverable should be sent to the IRS with the employer's Form 941 or 941E for the second quarter of 1974," he said.

supplying 100 percent of what they need. —Diesel fuel for agricultural production will be provided on a priority basis, supplying 100 percent of what the farmer needs.

While explaining that the Mandatory Allocation Program does not guarantee everything to everybody, Simon added, "To help make the energy programs work, we are counting on everyone to do his job to conserve energy. To succeed, we need the help of farmers, industry, and the entire American public."

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Farabee Files For Texas Senate 30th District

Farabee launched his campaign with a meeting in Vernon followed by the Vernon Chamber of Commerce Banquet on Thursday. On Friday he was in Albany and at the Sweetwater Chamber of Commerce dinner and on

Saturday he was in Big Spring.

His schedule took him to the Quannah Chamber of Commerce dinner on Monday, to Childress on Tuesday, to Memphis and Silverton on Wednesday and to Plainview Thursday. Farabee had a Friday meeting scheduled in Iowa Park and a Chamber of Commerce dinner in Burk Burnett on Friday night.

"This is going to be an active campaign," Farabee explained. "As a citizen who is willing to get involved, I am anxious to get others involved so this district will be as strong as possible. I do not believe you can represent people well unless you know them and keep in touch with their needs and interests."

Farabee concluded by saying that he plans to meet with the people in every part of the widespread 30th district frequently during the next three months.

Charles Finnell Appointed Constitutional Commissioner

AUSTIN — Rep. Charles Finnell of Holliday has been named to the Judiciary Committee of the Constitutional Convention and has pledged to work for continued strong local control of courts and judges.

Finnell was appointed to the post by the President of the Convention and the appointment was confirmed by a vote of the 180 house members and state senators serving as Convention Delegates.

The Judiciary Committee is one of eight major committees named to draft a proposed revision of the 98-year-old constitution.

"There is no area of government deserving greater protection than the state judiciary," Finnell said. "Unlike the legislative and executive branches which are subject to politics and personalities, the judiciary must stand solid as the basis for everything this state and country believes in."

The judiciary must be independent in administering law and order and in protecting every right and justice for which this country was founded," Finnell said.

Finnell, an attorney with eight years legislative experience, said he opposes efforts to do away with the Justice of the Peace system and opposes efforts to make judges appointive instead of elective.

Our devotionals were really inspiring this week and such good singing.

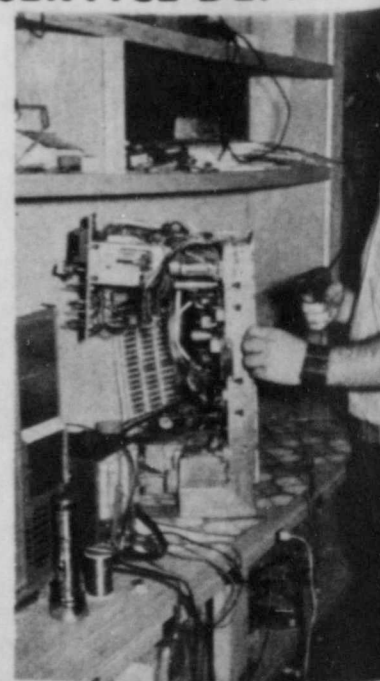
We didn't play bingo as this was the week for the birthday party of the month.

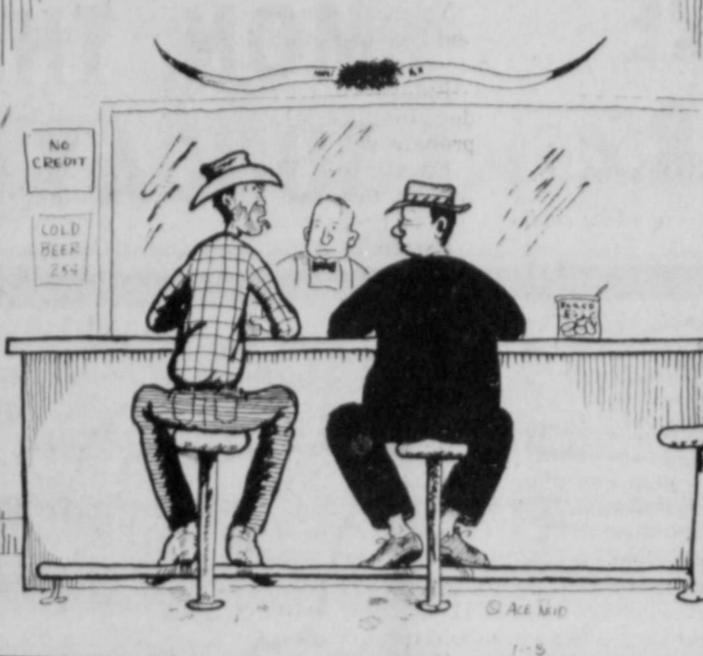

1973 Water Depletion Maps Now Available

The High Plains Under-ground Water Conservation District No. 1 has made available the 1973 depletion maps, to be used by landowners and their accountants to calculate their possible deductions on their income tax statements. The maps are available at the District's Lubbock office, 1625 15th Street.

The maps depict the decline of the water table in the Ogallala Formation, and are available to persons owning property lying within the 15-county boundary of the Water District at a cost of \$7.50 per map. The guideline maps are a result of the cost-in-water depletion, income-tax-allowance program carried on each

year by the District's Lubbock office. In their January 15 meeting, the District's Board of Directors voted to charge a fee of \$5 per parcel for all claimants in Bailey, Farmer, Lamb and Castro Counties. This means the \$7.50-maps will not be furnished for these counties — the landowner or his

accountant must supply the District with the data necessary to compute their decline — at the \$5-per-claim fee. Data necessary to determine the decline for Farmer, Bailey, Castro and Lamb Counties is as follows: 1) taxpayer's agent's name and address, 2) landowner's name, address and social security number, 3) account number and 4) legal description.

The correct legal description includes the number of acres, quarter, section or labor, block or league, survey, township and range. A new method for determining saturated thickness for any new claims for depletion allowance in Farmer County was also adopted by the Board on January 15. In the past, Farmer County decline maps for 1963 through 1970 were sold

for one dollar apiece. In 1971 they were raised to \$7.50 and in 1972 the county was automated and the charge was set at \$5 per parcel. Saturated thickness, therefore, for those years would have been determined at a cost to the claimant of \$431.50. However, to figure saturated thickness in this way would require the District to reprint outdated maps — therefore, the Board voted

to provide to individual claimants the information necessary to determine the base saturated thickness at the time of purchase at a fee of \$25. This cost will also include the decline to the time of purchase. For example, a Farmer County landowner purchasing land in 1970 and making a claim for the first time in 1973 would receive the saturated thickness information and the 1970 to 1973
