Former Police Chief Gets One-Year Prison Sentence

A former Friona police chief was sentenced Friday, May 7, in Amarillo's U.S. District Court to a year in prison for a firearms violation.

Leonard Lloyd Niece, 64, had pleaded guilty in March, along with former Friona officer Bailey Hal Roberts, to a charge of falsely stating to the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms that each was purchasing a semi-automatic rifle for official duties and not for transfer or resale.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Christy Drake said Niece signed more than 15 purchase orders for weapons, and without his participation, the offense could not have been committed.

U.S. District Judge Mary Lou Robinson said it was "clear he (Niece) abused his position of public trust" and found that his involvement was more than "minimal." She also cited as "quite serious" Niece's "failure to observe

procedures for putting numerous assault rifles out into the public."

But Robinson said she was imposing the minimum prison term because she doesn't believe he was as culpable as Roberts and because of a long problem-free history and record in the community. Roberts was sentenced to 14 months in prison on Monday.

Niece told Robinson that, after 40 years in law enforcement, including many in supervisory positions, he "probably got lax and turned over too much responsibility."

"I did not intend to violate any laws," he said.

Robinson allowed Niece to report voluntarily at his own expense to a yet undesignated prison. She noted she would recommend an institution where Niece can get medical attention for his heart condition and not face retaliation for being a former police officer.

Niece and Roberts ordered two rifles from a licensed firearms dealer in Alabama in December 1989, according to court documents. The order was placed on official Friona Police Department letterhead and was signed by Niece, the documents say. The order included a statement that Niece and Roberts were law enforcement officers buying the guns as personal weapons to be used for official duties, records show.

Roberts sold the two rifles in early 1990. He intended to resell the rifles when they were ordered, and Niece knew the guns were intended for resale, documents say.

Charges were filed against Roberts in June, but he was not taken into custody until November in Las Vegas, Nevada, authorities said.

Niece was fired as Friona police chief in September 1991. He had been with the department for eight years, including seven as chief.

Roberts was an officer with the Friona Police Department from early 1987 until he resigned in July 1991, records show. He also worked for the Borger Police Department and the Parmer County Sheriff's Department in the 1980s, records show.

Niece is living in Clovis, New Mexico and Roberts lives in Merkel, records show.

Funeral services for longtime Friona merchant Wesley Foster were pending at the Star's press time.


Foster passed away Thursday following a number of months of declining health.







No-Cook Meals Are Summertime Favorite

I'll admit it: summer is not my favorite time of the year. Nor is it the time of year when I'm at my best.

Hot summer days are considered miserable in my book, and the heat tends to make me grumpy.

Of course, I enjoy the garden that summer brings, and the break from winter's snow and ice is nice. But, my favorite part about summer are the coolish mornings and evenings.

When it's steamy hot outside, I just can't bring myself to heat up the kitchen with a lot of cooking and baking. Grilling outside does help keep the kitchen cooler, but I've collected an array of no-cook recipes when it's even too hot to stand over the barbecue grill.

Cold cut sandwiches are the simplest no-cook meal, but bologna and cheese gets boring after a while. Left-overs are good for no-cook meals since the cooking has already been done.

Another easy no-cook meal is a plate of salad. Plates of salad are quick to prepare and each salad can be tailor-made, making everyone happy. Start each salad with piles of fresh lettuce, spinach leaves or other greens. Add chopped onions, cucumber, tomato, radishes,

sprouts, carrots, celery, etc. Top with shredded cheese and diced meat, such as left-over chicken or steak. Serve with a variety of dressings.

Try the following no-cook meals the next time it's just too hot to cook.

HEARTY GAZPACHO

- 14 ounce can tomatoes
- 1-3/4 cups chicken broth
- 3 cloves garlic, halved
- 1 small onion, quartered
- 1 medium-sized cucumber, peeled and cut into bite-sized chunks
- 3 tablespoons rice vinegar
- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 teaspoon dry (or 2 teaspoons fresh, chopped) tarragon leaves
- 1 teaspoon dry (or 2 teaspoons fresh, chopped) basil leaves
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1/4 teaspoon chili powder
- Hot pepper sauce, to taste
- 1/4 cup chopped parsley
- 1 small red bell pepper, seeded and cut into chunks
- 3 green onions, chopped, including green tops
- 15 ounce can tomato sauce
- 3 tablespoons lemon or lime juice
- Condiments:
- 3/4 cup sliced green onions
- 3/4 cup peeled, seeded and chopped cucumber
- 3/4 cup seeded and chopped red bell pepper
- 3/4 cup peeled and diced fresh tomatoes.

In a blender, combine the canned tomatoes and their liquid, and about half of the chicken broth. Add the garlic, onion, cucumber, vinegar, oil, tarragon, basil, cumin, chili powder, hot pepper sauce, parsley, red bell pepper and onions. Process until coarsely pureed. Pour into a large bowl and stir in tomato sauce and remaining chicken broth. Add lemon or lime juice to taste. Cover and chill for at least two hours or overnight. Serve in individual soup bowls and allow guests to add condiments to taste. Makes 6 servings.

LAYERED GREEK SALAD

- Dressing:
- 1 clove garlic, minced or pressed
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice

- 3 tablespoons red wine vinegar
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1/2 cup olive oil
- 1 teaspoon chopped fresh oregano or 1/2 teaspoon dried
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- Seasoning mixture:
- 1 bunch green onions, chopped, including green tops
- 1/2 cup fresh mint leaves, chopped
- 1/2 to 3/4 cup quartered pitted Greek olives
- 1/2 pound feta cheese, crumbled
- Salad ingredients:
- 2 large cucumbers, peeled and cut into 1/2-inch dice
- 1 red bell pepper, seeded and cut into 1/2-inch dice
- 1 green, yellow or orange bell pepper, seeded and cut into 1/2-inch dice
- 4 large tomatoes, seeded and cut into 1/2-inch dice, well drained.
- 1/2 pound thinly sliced, cooked ham, cut into 1/4-inch strips
- Chopped fresh parsley, to taste

Combine all of the dressing ingredients in a bowl and set aside. Combine all of the seasoning mixture in a small bowl and set aside. In a large deep glass serving

bowl, layer the cucumbers, peppers, tomatoes and ham with a layer of seasoning mixture between each vegetable and the next. Whisk the dressing and pour it evenly over the salad. Garnish with chopped parsley and refrigerate the salad for at least 30 minutes to let the flavors blend. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

POTATO SALAD

- 1-1/2 tablespoons mayonnaise or salad dressing
- 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard
- 1-1/2 teaspoons paprika
- 2 tablespoons red or white wine vinegar
- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 left-over large baked potato
- 1/2 small onion, chopped
- Salt and pepper, to taste

In a medium-sized serving bowl, combine the mayonnaise, mustard, paprika, vinegar and oil. Gently stir in the potatoes, onion, salt and pepper. Makes 2 to 3 servings.

PASTA WITH FRESH TOMATO SAUCE

- 5 large ripe tomatoes, peeled, seeded and coarsely chopped
- 3 tablespoons chopped fresh sweet basil
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh chives
- 3 tablespoons chopped parsley, preferably Italian flat-leaved parsley
- 3 garlic cloves, chopped or pressed
- 1/2 cup olive oil

3/4 cup grated Mozzarella cheese
Salt and pepper, to taste
Fresh grated Parmesan cheese
8 ounces spaghetti

Have all the ingredients at room temperature. Combine all the ingredients except the spaghetti and allow to stand at room temperature for about an hour to let the flavors blend. Cook and drain the spaghetti. In a large bowl, combine the spaghetti and the sauce; toss together and serve with Parmesan cheese. Makes 4 servings.



"Farm leases and operating agreements take many forms," notes Hayenga. Many of these will be discussed at the seminar, including benefits and restrictions to both landowners and tenants.

Regarding income tax

planning, tax-saving opportunities will be explored for business growth, retirement income and helping out children and grandchildren.


A session on estate planning will deal with wills, trusts, estate tax deferrals, gifts and property titles.

He was age 90 when his first wife died and he promptly married again to a 20 year old maiden.

Those who march to a different drummer may march a little livelier and longer. . .and, frankly, I plan to be among that group.

FmHA tries to find members of those groups who are interested in farming and can qualify for an FmHA farm ownership loan. The agency can sell or lease to those who are eligible, a farm held in its inventory or make a loan for purchase of land on the open market, Thomas S. Taylor said.

FmHA can also provide other loan assistance, including operating loans, and advice, if needed, to help the borrower get started.

People who think they may be eligible, whether they already are in farming or would like to become farmers, are urged to contact the Farmers Home Administration county office in their area, Thomas S. Taylor said.



A Changing Economy Does Not Mean The Sky Is Falling

After 12 years of a Republican administration, our nation has voted to change course. Where will it lead?

While pundits debate about our future, the economy goes on. In fact, our leaders have always voiced opinions and made predictions about the destiny of this nation.

Take, for example, the national debt. Before Ronald Reagan was president, he said he could not understand "how the Democrats can run those \$1,000-a-plate dinners at such a profit and run the government at such a loss."

Even the founders of our country couldn't agree on the national debt. In 1781, Alexander Hamilton said, "A national debt, if it is not excessive, will be to us a national blessing." Forty years later, Andrew Jackson argued, "I am one of those who do not believe that the national debt is a national blessing but rather a curse to a republic, inasmuch as it is calculated to raise around the administration a moneyed aristocracy dangerous to the liberties of this country."

Excessive debt is the result of uncontrolled spending without matching revenues. Calvin Coolidge reminded us that those revenues can come only from the economy and that "the business of America is business."

After the national debt, two other areas the Clinton administration promises to target are unemployment and youth. Thomas Edison offered a solution that combined the two--"What young people should do to avoid temptation: Get a job and work at it so hard that temptation would not exist."

Henry Ford, a man whose industry changed the world's work habits, agreed. "There will never be a system invented which will do away with the necessity of work." George Ade, another advocate of labor, spoke of "a people so primitive that they did not know how to get money except by working for it." Noel Coward lightly referred to work as "more fun than fun." George Saud was more philosophical: "Work is not man's punishment, it is his reward and his strength, his glory and his pleasure."

Regardless of personal philosophy or political affiliation, most people agree that a strong work ethic is the basis of a strong economy. In our capitalistic economy, jobs are created by industry. To survive, industry must produce sufficient goods to pay the bills and to earn a reasonable profit for investors. Coolidge believed that "civilization and profits go hand in hand." Samuel Gompers went a step further: "The worst crime against working people is a company which fails to operate at a profit."

Today's problems are not new nor will the solutions be unique. More recent history will likely prove that despite all the economic changes and Henny Penny's warnings, the sky isn't falling after all.


