

"Supplement grains with exra vitamins, minerals and proeins for best feeding results. "Check on the time and need o have animals and poultry accinated against infectious

"Make a gradual change from asture to winter feed to avoid he danger of digestive upsets nd more serious disorders. "Check herds regularly for ac cidental wounds through which infection might enter. Have good disinfectants available
