

# SHOPMEN APPROVE PEACE PROPOSALS

#### Leaders of Striking Shopmen Accept Plan Proposed by President Harding.

Chicago.-Full acceptance of the peace proposals submitted by President Harding was voted Wednesday by leaders of the striking railway shopmen who, however, gave their own interpretation of each of the three suggestions.

"We accept reluctantly, it is true, but commit ourselves to carry out the terms of settlement in utmost good faith and in aid of the general welfare," said the message of acceptance which was sent to President Harding Wednesday night. "If these proposals fail to bring about the results which you desire, the responsibility of ailure will not rest upon the repre sentatives of the organized employes. On the proposal to restore unimpaired seniority rights to the strikers, the Brokers and Stokers' Magazine." which was rejected by railway executives at a meeting Tuesday in New York, the message declared:

"It would certainly be a wholesale men who have given four to 40 years' next service, and whose value to the trans. nal. portation industry is proportioned to the length of their service, should be placed in a position of inferiority to limited number of men who have guage." Replying to the president's suggestion that railroads and workers agree to abide by decisions of the railroad labor board, the reply said the shopmen had always taken the position that so long as they continued to render service they should abide by the rules and working conditions and accept the wages agreed upon by proper negotiations or determined by the labor board after a hearing of a dispute.

Violations of the law and refusal to abide by decisions of the board "have been exhibited only by the rallway managements," the reply said, and as serted that suspension of work under nonacceptable conditions was not in violation of the board's decisions.

On the president's proposal that lawsuits growing out of the strike be withdrawn and that railroad labor board decisions to which exception is taken by either side may be taken to the board by either side for a rehearing, the message said that it was the understanding of the union leaders that the labor board would give a prompt rehearing and decision of questions in dispute and that there would be no question as to "who are the properly accredited spokesmen of the vast majority of railway employes.

The decision accepting the prestdent's suggestions was reached after the policy committee of 90 men of the shoperafts organization had considered the proposal two days. After the executive committee had decided recommend acceptance, the policy committee followed the recommendation, but demanded that it be given the right to give approval to the message of acceptance and the interpretation of the proposal sent to the pres ident Wednesday night.

Timothy Healy, president of the firemen and oilers' unior, which is also on strike, signed the shopmen's acceptance of the president's proposal

#### Port Arthur Oil Exports.

Port Arthur, Tex.-Shipments of oi products by water out of this port in July amounted to 3,835,979 bulk bar rels on a base of fortw-two gallons per barrel. Of this amount 2,533,129 varrels is credited to the Gulf Refining Company and 1,302,850 barrels to the Texas Company. The Gulf Company loaded out 2,170,157 barrels refined coastwise and 125,290 barrels crude coastwise. The balance of the total was refined oil shipped foreign. The Texas Company loaded out 725,788 barrels refined coastwise and 78.683 barrels crude coastwise, 447,630 barreis refined foreign and 50,749 barrels crade foreign.

### Gulf Coast Shows Oil Increase.

New York .- Domestic crude oil pro duction in the week ending July 28 averaged 1,500,000 barrels daily, according to an estimate by the American Petroleum Institute, an incresse of 1650 barrels daily. Oklahoma is shown with decrease of 2650 barrels daily, Wyoming 5200 barrels daily and California unchanged. Other districts showed varying changes, with the gulf coast an estimated increase of 5056 barrels daily. The midcontinent field is reported at \$21,100 barrels, a de crease of 1200 barrels daily from the previous week.

Waco, Tex.-The ranch of General Felix H. Robertson at Crawford, about twenty miles east of Waco, consisting of 829 acres, has been bought by C Hillen Simmons of Dallas, the con sideration being \$80,000.

# HARDING'S PLAN TO **END STRIKE FAILS**

#### Rail Heads Claim Acceptance Would Be Breach of Faith to Men.

New York.-Railway executives of the nation Wednesday firmly but courteously rejected the program advanced by the Harding administration for settlement of the rail strike.

Willing to accept conditionally two suggestions put forward by the White House—that both sides abide by wage decisions of the railroad labor board and that law suits springing out of the strike be withdrawn—the heads of 148 roads declared emphatically that it was impossible to reinstate strikers with unimpaired seniority rights, the third provision in the president's plan.

After being told by Robert S. Lovett of the Union Pacific that there was no moral or practical reason for budging from their position, the executives disbanded, caught the first trains for their respective headquarters and indicated that they were going ahead and would operate their roads with the forces they had assembled since the shopmen walked out on July 1.

The decision not to yield on the question of seniority was made known to the White House by telegraph after the rail heads had listened to a twenty-minute address by Secretary of Commerce Hoover, who, as direct representative of the president, told them in effect, that the administration held the seniority question of minor importance in comparison with that of upholding the railroad labor board.

This action was taken in the face of a letter from President Harding addressed to T. Dewitt Cuyler, chairman of the American Association of Railway Executives, embodying the "terms of agreement as I understood them upon which the railroad managers and attacks the bones and should never be United Shopcraft Workers are to agree, preliminary to calling off the strike.

President Harding had closed his letter with these two sentences: "I need hardly add that I have reason to believe these terms will be accepted by the workers. If there is good reason why the managers can not accept, they will be obligated to open direct negotiations or assume full responsibility for the situation."

HOW BOOKS ARE DISINFECTED

The danger of contagion from books that have been in the hands of persons suffering from various diseases has led to the invention of methods of disinfecting, of which none appears to more effective than that devised member of the municipal council

This process consists of two features. In the first place, the books are placed in a "beater," where a strong turrent of air opens every leaf. and an aspirator sucks out the dust and deposits it in aseptic water. Then they are suspended in a disinfector, the covers being bent back and held by citps, so that the leaves are widely ed, and placed over a heater, opened, and placed over a heater, which for a long time subjects them to a temperature of 167 degrees Fah-renheit. The paper is not damaged, and the efficiency of the process is said to be well demonstrated.



"The month has been almost ideal for cotton," Mr. Gray's report states. "With little exception, hot dry weather has prevailed and weevil ravages have thereby been reduced to a minimum While all late planted, or young cotton, has suffered more or less, in vaious districts, from lack of surfac moisture, the older cotton has made steady progress, account of moisture stored in the subsoil. Important gains in condition are noted in the north northeast and the eastern districts, while a serious loss has occurred in the southern districts. The northwest and the center districts maintain an unchanged condition, although some what spotted in the central district account of the May floods. The chief causes of deterioration in the south district are lateness, weevil ravages and the recent visitation of the army or leaf worm.

"The northwest and most of the west center districts are still very promising of heavy yields. High temperatures have at times prevailed in certain districts and bot winds have been reported, but the injury inflicted has been mostly upon young cotton, lacking in tap root development. Rare ly, however, at this date are more blooms to be seen, covering almost the entire state. This is in evidence of weevil control, under the dry hot conditions of weather, supplemented by a spirit of co-operation on part of mer chants and bankers, lending every aid possible in destruction of the insect.

"Picking is now general in the south ern part of the state and labor seems to be ample at a fair wage."

#### School Warrants Totaling 648,500 Being Sent Out

Austin, Tex.-Warrants are going out for \$648,500 in available school fund to the various schools of the state, representing a payment of 50 cents per capita on last year's apportionment of the state fund of \$13 for each child within the scholastic age. There is yet \$1.50 due on last year's apportionment, or a total of \$1,945,500. Last year's census showed 1,297,270

apportionment will exceed \$10.
