KILL BIG PANTHER

The yellow cosmos plants set out all over Cuero last spring under the influence of the Cuero Civic League are in full bloom now. The cosmos was planted with a view to having the city the more beautiful for the November turkey trot.

Bond issues in the sum of \$150,000 for road improvement and park purposes were approved recently by Navasota voters, large majorities being noted in each vote. For roads \$90,000 was voted, with an additional \$50,000 for drainage.

Only six counties made application for road construction aid at the regular monthly meeting of the state highway commission at Austin, and all were taken under advisement. The counties asking for aid are Brewster, Brooks, Matagorda, Shelby, Rockwall and Travis.

Bell County cotton ginnings are over 50 per cent in excess of the same period last year, the government report showing 25,241 bales for 1922 as compared with 16,283 for 1921. The crop is estimated at 40,000 bales this year by good judges and its money value placed at \$4,500,000, or about \$100 per capita. This is an increase of approximately \$25 per capita over last year, or about \$1,600,000.

Eighteen Texas federal aid highway projects, including 138 miles of road, have been found to be in unsatisfactory condition by the federal highway bureau, according to information received this week by State Highway Engineer Fauntleroy from federal authorities. The projects are in the following counties: Hays, Valverde, Dickens, Randall, Foard, Fisher, Wheeler, Falls, Caldwell, Freestone, Milam, Sabine and Cass.

The state fire insurance commission is without authority to assess penalties against cities, towns, villages and localities for "bad fire records," the attorney general's department has ruled. During the present year the commission has assessed a bad fire record penalty against the following towns: Sweetwater, 3 per cent; Clasco, 15 per cent; Pecos, 15 per cent; Conroe, 15 per cent, and Venus, 15 per cent.

The attorney general's department has held that a person who has been admitted into the Confederate Home, or into the Confederate Woman's Home, remains an inmate of such home during his or her absence therefrom on a furlough or other leave of absence, and during such absence such person is entitled to only one-half of the amount of the pension such person would be entitled to if he or she had not been admitted into such home.

Commissioner of Insurance and Banking Chapman has authorized the statement that 89 per cent of the troubles of the state banking system are over and that for the first time in many months conditions are much brighter. He further made the announcement that on October 1 dividends were paid from five closed state banks ranging from 19 to 20 per cent and that on November 1 ten such banks will pay dividends extending from 19 to 60 per cent. At this time there are thirty-five state banks in course of liquidation and thus half of them are paying dividends.

Parts of the cattle section of West Texas have suffered so seriously from drought since July that plans are being considered for moving some 100,000 head from around El Paso and sections of New Mexico across the international boundary line into old Mexico in bond. E. M. Johnston, federal agricultural statistician, announces in the initial summary of live stock conditions issued in accordance with the recent decision of the department of agriculture to prepare statements on live stock at stated intervals.

AMERICAN LEGION MEN CHOOSE OWSLEY

Delegates of Many States Rally to Support of the Texan.

New Orleans, La.—Texas won one of the triumphs of her history Friday; it was a national honor conferred upon her. Alvin M. Owsley of Denton, the 34-year-old fighting assistant attorney general, who resigned that position to do Americanization work with the American Legion, was elected national commander by a landslide victory in the closing hours of the fourth annual convention. It was a landslide victory indeed. When the roll call's somnolent roster had finished ringing through the hall the vote stood: Owsley 574, William F. Deegan of New York 251, "Fighting Joe" Thompson of Pennsylvania 205, and John A. McCormick, national vice commander of Colorado, 12. Deegan then moved the vote be made unanimous.

Five national vice commanders were elected as follows: Edward J. Barrett, Sheboygan, Wis.; Robert S. Blood, Concord, N. H.; Charles P. Plumer of Casper, Wyo.; Earl Cooke of Macon, Ga.; and Watson B. Miller of Washington, D. C.

Two nominees for commander withdrew, T. Semmes Walsley of Louisiana, who threw his whole support and influence into a seconding speech for Owsley, and George L. Berry of Tennessee, national senior vice commander, who withdrew without endorsing anybody.

State by state the nation's fighting legionnaires swung up on Owsley's band wagon as the roll call went down the alphabetical line. Far Northern states, far Western states, far Eastern states, one by one threw their support behind Owsley.

The wild Texas yell of the Lone Star delegates split the air as the result was announced. On the shoulders of cheering, yelling legionnaires Alvin Owsley was carried to the platform. Alvin Owsley was introduced by Commander MacNider.

"Please accept my heartfelt gratitude," he said, "for the greatest honor that could come to one who served in the world war.

"We pledged to America in the world war that we were her defenders. We must now pledge even greater service.

"There are four great principles on which we rest: "Hospitalization, rehabilitation, adjusted compensation, and Americanization.

"I pledge the best energies of my manhood and my sacred honor."

Lloyd George Resigns; Succeeded by Bonar Law

London.—After holding the office of prime minister through seven of the most critical years of British history—three years of war and four years of reconstruction—David Lloyd George went into the wilderness Friday.

This was the description in his Manchester speech of his position if the unionist wing of his followers should desert him. Unionist withdrawal from the coalition was decided upon Friday by the meeting which Austen Chamberlain had called at the Carlton Club and which was attended by the coalition members of the house of commons and a handful of lords who were enrolled in the cabinet.

The vote was 186 to 87 against the Chamberlain policy of pledging the party to sustain the coalition and in favor of a general election to confirm its course. The meeting was followed by a succession of swift events which carried the coalition government into outer darkness.

Andrew Bonar Law will put on the prime minister's mantle for a short term of office. The king summoned him to Buckingham Palace Friday evening and invited him to form a new government, which Mr. Bonar Law will undertake.

Roads in Rough Condition. Huntsville, Tex.—The D-C-D and Jim Hogg state highways through Walker County are in rough condition because of the dust holes due to the extremely dry weather and to the new work that the county is doing in rebuilding much of its road system. Where it is found necessary the county is rebuilding and resurfacing these highways.

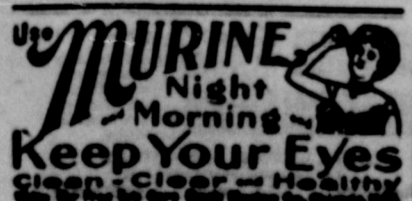

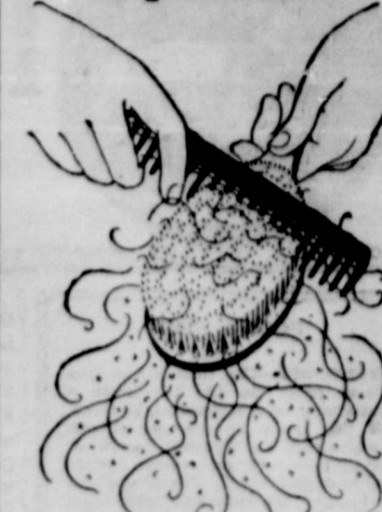

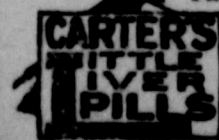

AGREEMENT SIGNED BY MANY SYSTEMS

Sixteen Railroads, Including Several in State of Texas, Join in Pact.

Chicago, Ill.—Sixteen railroads have completed agreements with new organizations of their shopmen by which in effect the men waive the right to strike and the companies pledged themselves not to litigate, both parties agreeing to abide by the decisions of the railroad labor board.

The mileage represented by the sixteen roads, which include such large systems as the New York, New Haven & Hartford, Lehigh Valley, Central of Georgia, Chicago, Burlington & Quincy, Southern Pacific and Union Pacific, aggregates 55,916.

In addition to these roads, numerous others are negotiating agreements with associations of their own employees.

With the organization of company unions on the sixteen roads, the federated railway shop crafts, which directed the nationwide shopmen's strike which started July 1, are without recognition or representation so far as the sixteen railroads are concerned.

The Pennsylvania Railroad, the largest of all the roads which have made agreements with new organizations of employees, is not included in the list, that system having begun such negotiations before the strike.

The roads which signed the agreement are: Southern Pacific (Pacific system); Missouri, Kansas & Texas; Southern Pacific, Texas and Louisiana lines; Nashville, Chattanooga & St. Louis; Central of Georgia; New York, New Haven & Hartford; Chicago, Burlington & Quincy; Colorado & Southern; Great Northern; Lehigh Valley; International & Great Northern; Union Pacific System; Illinois Central; Florida East Coast; Trinity & Brazos Valley; and San Antonio, Uvalde & Gulf.

The United States railroad labor board Tuesday granted increased pay of 2c an hour to over 400,000 maintenance of way employees. Four of nine groups of the United Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employees and railroad shop workers were affected by the raise. The decision raised minimum rates of pay for the classes affected from the present 23c and 35c to 25c and 37c.

Chairman Ben W. Hooper of the labor board in a statement following the decision said that the board based its findings on a general upward trend in wages since the board's decision of last July reducing wages for this and other groups of workmen.

Tuesday's decision marked a victory for the public group of the board, which proposed the 2c increase. The proposal being rejected at first by the three members of the railroad group, who favored no change, and the three members of the labor group, who favored a much larger increase.

Track laborers and all common laborers constitute the largest single class benefited by the wage increase. The men in this class number approximately 112,000. The ranges of average pay and the number of men in each of the other classes follow:

Seventeen cents to 23c an hour, 13,009 men, applying mostly to employees of Southern roads; 23c to 34c an hour, 109,864 men; 34c to 35c an hour, 35,975 men; 35c to 36c, 112,969 men; 36c to 37c, 872 men; 35c to 55c and above, 7,559 men. While these figures are averages supplied by 85 per cent of the railroads, they are generally accepted as typical of all roads.

Discovers Asphalt.

Richmond, Tex.—A stratum of asphalt ten feet in thickness was discovered on a farm near Needville, twenty miles southwest of Richmond. The discovery was made by Oswald Valka while turning weeds in a crevice caused by the drouth.

Deficiency Over Million.

Austin, Tex.—Since the beginning of the fiscal year on September 1 the state treasury general fund shows a deficiency of \$1,432,749. The department has enough money in this fund to pay all outstanding warrants for the last fiscal year.

\$5,000,000 Gold Shipment.

COTTON CONFERENCE MEMBERS APPOINTED

Governor Names Men Who Will Represent Texas at Memphis Meet.

Austin, Tex.—Governor Neff this week announced the appointment of the five Texas members of the commission created at a conference of representatives of the cotton growers of the South held at New Orleans last spring for the purpose of eradicating the pink boll worm, regulating co-operative marketing and warehousing of cotton. The commission is to meet at Memphis, Tenn., the latter part of November. In announcing the Texas members of the commission, Governor Neff stated that he was in hearty accord with the movement.

Texas will be represented on the commission by E. A. Peden, Houston; James Young, Kaufman; D. C. Reed, Austin; Ervin Astin, Bryan; W. D. Parris, Ennis.

The governor notified the Texas commissioners of their appointment in the following letter:

"Last year, at the instance and urgent request of Governor Cameron Morrison of North Carolina, there were appointed by the governors of the twelve Southern cotton-growing states representatives to a cotton conference held in the city of New Orleans, for the purpose of studying the problems confronting the cotton industry of the South and making helpful plans with reference thereto.

The report adopted by this cotton conference recommended the appointment of a permanent commission, to be organized definitely for the eradication of the pink boll worm, the regulation of co-operative marketing and warehousing of cotton. This, I believe, is a matter of great concern to the people throughout the Southern states, and the proposal for concerted activity for the betterment of cotton production and marketing has been approved by the United States commissioner of agriculture, who has promised the commission that he will attend the meeting.

"I am in hearty accord with this movement. I feel that lasting benefit to all our cotton-growing states will result from the combined thought and efforts of such a commission; and believing that you will appreciate the extensive possibilities of the meeting, and its direct and far-reaching value to the cotton industry of Texas, and feeling assured that you will join in an active interest in the consideration of the problems pertaining hereto, I wish to tender to you an appointment on this commission.

"As the members of the commission from the other eleven states have already been named, Thomas B. King, secretary of the cotton states commission, is anxious to name a definite date for the meeting, and it has been generally agreed upon by the commissioners appointed that the meeting should be held in Memphis, between November 10 and December 1."

RELATIVES REFUSE TO CARE FOR CONVICTS IF PARDONED

Austin, Tex.—A pathetic condition prevents the governor from granting pardons in a number of instances. Relatives refuse to care for convicts if they were pardoned and thus the prisoners are far better off in the penitentiary than if liberated. This is true of the old, infirm and decrepit and those who are suffering with some malady.

In some instances prosperous sons have refused to accept and care for their father if the governor pardoned their sire. In most of these cases the convict was unable to earn a living and with no one willing to take care of him if he was turned out he finds his only home in the Texas penitentiary. The governor indicated his willingness to pardon several of these unfortunate but the "folks at home" refused to take and care for the aged or sick relatives.

Brotherhood Moves Headquarters.

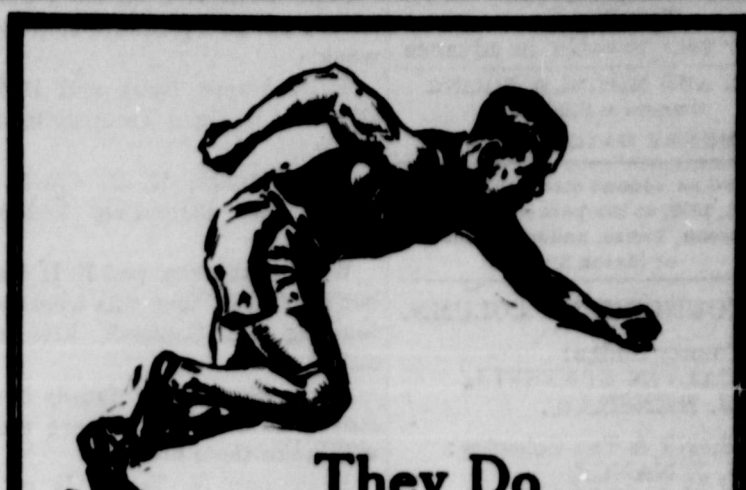

Fort Worth Stock Market.

Fort Worth, Tex.—Demand for cattle was good enough to absorb a supply of 2,000 head at strong prices Friday, but the inquiry for calves weakened and the market was steady to 25 cents lower on that class. About 1,500 head of calves were on offer. A feature was the sale of two cars of good fed steers from Jack county at \$7. Fat cows sold around \$4 to \$4.50. Good calves brought \$5.50 to \$5.75.

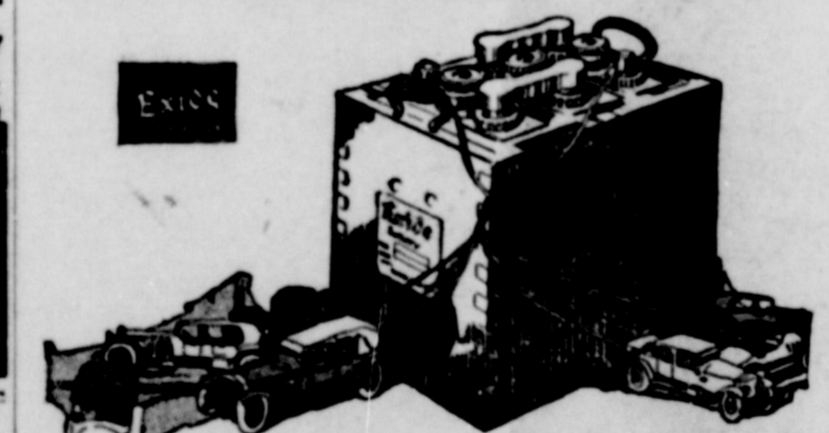

Road-Building Program

Washington, D. C., Oct. 19.—
 Fifteen to twenty years of build-
 ing good roads lie ahead of the
 United States. Under the pro-
 gram which the country has
 adopted there will be built, dur-
 ing that time, 180,000 miles of
 improved highways which will
 constitute the Federal-aid high-
 way system and an equal or
 greater mileage of State and
 local roads. Officials of the bu-
 reau place the aggregate cost of
 the Federal-aid program alone at
 about \$3,000,000,000, spread over
 a twenty-year period. They
 base this estimate on an average
 cost of \$17,000 per mile. The
 average cost, in turn, takes into
 consideration all classes of im-
 proved roadways from the cheap-
 est to the most expensive types.

The bureau is continuing its
 research work into most efficient
 methods of road-building, includ-
 ing the character and wearing
 power of materials, resisting
 qualities of varying subsoils, etc.,
 and has amassed a considerable
 store of valuable information all
 of which will be available for the
 highway engineer.
