INJUNCTION STAYED BY SUPREME COURT

Corsicana Judge Without Jurisdiction in Mayfield Case, Is Ruling.

Austin, Tex.-The state supreme court Friday granted a motion to stay the gotion of the Navarro county dis trict court in the injunction suit seeking to prevent the certification of the name of Earle B. Mayfield as democratic senatorial candidate. The court also in its answers to the certified questions from the Dallas court of civil appeals held that the plaintiffs were without authority to institute and maintain the injunction, and therefore the district court is without jurisdiction.

In holding that the appellees had no jurisdiction to bring and maintain the njunction proceedings, the court also held that section 91, chapter 88, which was the center of argument at the hearing before the court Wednesday, is constitutional.

Only two of the seven questions certified to the court by the Dallas court of civil appeals were answered. These two regard the right of the plaintiffs to bring the suit and constitutionality of the "quo warranto" section. It is declared that with the answering of these questions, the answers to the remaining questions are not necessary. The effect of the court's decision is to prevent the temporary injunction granted by Judge Scarbrough in the Navarro district court from becoming effective. The motion to stay the action of the Corsicana court also has the effect of preventing the injunction from becoming permanent.

The court's decision is a sweeping victory for Earle B. Mayfield, democratic nominee for United States senator, and sustains in effect Mayfield's right to a place on the general election ballot.

Corsicana, Tex .- The jury in the injunction suit in which it was sought to keep the name of Earle B. Mayfield off the ballot as a candidate for the United States senate in the general election on November 7 was discharged Thursday after having returned a verdet finding for the plaintiffs and against Mayfield on twelve of the tweny-one special issues submitted by the court.

The verdict of the jury was returned after Judge Hawkins Scarborough of the thirteenth district, before whom the case was heard, had instructed that the fury find for the plaintiffs on six of the general issues, instructing further that if the jury was unable to agree on all the special issues, that a erdict be returned into court as instructed.

in discharging the jury Judge Scarporough entared judgment for the plaintiffs and against Earle B. Mayfield, basing his judgment on the uncontradicted testimony and the answers of the jury that Mayfield and is campaign managers did not keep a record and report correctly all receipts and disbursements, and that the unconradicted testimony showed that the sum of \$40,500 had been spent by May-'ield and others in his behalf.

Printers to Gather at Gothenburg.

Gothenburg, Sweden.-American and other master printers from all over he world will assemble in Gothenburg. Sweden, at the international congress of master printers on June 4, 5 and 6 of next year. The initiative in bringing about this congress has been taken by the Swedish Master Printers' Association, and Waldemar Zachrisson, president of the association, reports hat American, English and French representatives are among the first to accept the invitations.

Paper Price Going Higher. New York .- A new price of \$85 a ton for news print paper, an increase of \$5 over the prevailing price for the first half of the current year, covering conracts calling for delivery during the first half of 1923, was announced this week by the International Paper Company. The new price is the same as hat announced last week by the larger Canadian producers.

Steamer Bringe 26,000 Sealskins. Seattle.-The steamship Brookdale as arrived at Seattle with about 25,000 sealskins taken last summer in the Pribilof Islands, Alaska. These skins, according to Harry J. 



Leaks Not Only Lessen Engine Power, but Also Cause Inefficient Operation,

Compression must be good to derive maximum power from an engine. eration by weakening the fuel charges entering the cylinders, thereby lessen ing the energy exerted upon pistons during power strokes, and they will less of pressure during this stroke. If the compression leak is in an inlet valve the fuel charges will be driven back into the lalet manifold, possibly igniting and spitting back through the carburetor. If leak is in exhaust valve, the fuel will pass into exhaust pipes, where it will ignite and backfire. If the rings leak, condensed gasoline from the mixture admitted to explosion chambers will run down into the crankense, diluting the cylinder oil and ruining its inbricating qualities. Thus compression leaks will not only lessen power, but will also cause inefficlent operation and increased wear to bearing surfaces.

This will completely remove the old and wornout or thinned oil and make it easy for the new supply to function properly.



CONVENTION PLANS TO EXTEND HIGHWAY

Highway Route From Galveston to Red River to Be Linked Up Soon.

Huntsville, Tex .- The Texas division of the D-C-D Highway Association adjourned Friday. In their business meeting reports from representatives of the various counties were heard. Officers for the Texas division were elected for the coming year and a number of resolutions were adopted. This highway now extends from Galveston to Boulder. Colo., but the plans of the association are for it ultimately to extend to Portland, Ore. It is divided into four divisions-the Texas, the Oklahoma, the Tri-state, from Childress, Texas, to Elkhart, Kansas, and the Colorado divisions. Each of these divisions has a separate organization. Two meetings per year are held on each of the two first named and one per year on each of the last two named. One meeting per year is held for the whole route, the next such meeting to be held next June at Guymon, Okla.

Reports from the various county delegates on the Texas division at this meeting show that practically the whole route from Galveston to the Red River will be linked up within a few months with improved roads. There are at present only two or three short stretches of unimproved road in this division.

A number of important resolutions were passed. The plan of the Motor League of South Texas for 120-foot highways instead of the standard 60foot distance now in use was approved and the association voted to co-operate in every way to secure the 120foot road. The convention voted to work for and support the passage of laws making it compulsory for the county commissioners to provide for the maintenance of roads built by bond issues and to make yearly contracts for their maintenance. The next legislature will be asked to provide the necessary money to obtain all the possible aid from the federal aid act, the federal government agreeing by this act to provide funds in equal amounts with the states in constructing approved highways. The highway commission of Texas will be asked to place all state highways under the 7 per cent system. The next legislature will be asked to give the highway commission of Texas the sole authority to provide for the construction and maintenance of all state highways. Heavy Christmas Mail

Washington.-Christmas mail for officers and men of our navy ships in European waters will be carried on the U. S. S. Sapelo, leaving Hampton Roads November 3, and should reach that station by December 1, bearing the address: "Via U. S. S. Sapelo," the navy department announced. Mail intended to reach ships on the Asiatic station should be addressed "Via U. S. S. Vega," in care of the postmaster, San Francisco. The ship will leave Mare Island for Pearl harbor, Guam and Manila on December 1, and Christmas mail should reach San Francisco by November 29.

After leaving Hampton Roads the Sapelo will call on November 8 at Port Arthur, Texas, where mail for Europe will be taken aboard. From Port Arthur the ship will go direct to European waters.


