PLAN TO SPEND \$12,500,000 ON SICK MASONS

Establishment of a chain of Sanatoria throughout the United States for members of the Masonic order suffering from tuberculosis, the whole enterprise to involve an estimated expenditure of \$12,500,000 for construction and the care of 5,000 sufferers with an annual expenditure of \$5,000,000 for operation will be recommended to the Masonic Grand Lodge of Texas at its annual meeting at Waco on December 5, 6 and 7 by the Tuberculosis Sanatoria Commission of the Grand Lodges of Texas, Arizona and New Mexico.

This is a commission appointed by the Grand Masters of the three states named, under authority of resolutions adopted by the grand lodges to prepare a plan for the establishment of tuberculosis sanatoria, for the care of consumptive Masons who come to the southwest seeking restoration to health. These resolutions were adopted at the last meetings of the respective grand lodges.

The plan is to take care of tubercular Masons all over the United States. The first hospital will be built in the southwest because of the large number of Masons already awaiting treatment there.

"It will take from five to ten years to carry out this program of building. The cost will be advanced by assessments on the membership of Masonic bodies in the United States, and they will be invited to participate in the movement by voting a small assessment for this purpose."
