#### TEXAS SENATE AND **HOUSE PROCEEDINGS**

#### Legislators Now Busy Dealing With Numerous Measures of Importance.

Friday's Senate Proceedings.

Austin, Tex .- The senate Friday passed finally the bill by McMillin creating a ratemaking board to fix the rate of interest to be paid by depositories on state funds and limiting the amount of state funds to be deposited in any one bank.

The McMillin bill provides that the ratemaking board shall decide on the rate of interest to be paid by banks selected as depositories, this rate not to be less than 3 per cent.

The bill limits the amount of funds to be deposited in any one bank to \$100,000, unless a surplus is left, in which case the surplus is to be divided among the banks making applications for deposits.



#### Child Labor Cannot Be Consistent With American System of Education

By SENATOR MEDILL M'CORMICK of Illinois.



Figures available indicate that as a result of last May's decision of the Supreme court invalidating the child labor act, the number of children employees in industry has already increased 20 to 30 per cent. Unless congress be empowered by constitutional amendment to act, plainly, matters will grow worse. We have no recourse but to amend the Constitution for the sake of the children who otherwise will be driven into the mills of the country to their own injury.

Child labor, it is obvious, cannot be accepted as consistent with a system of education, free, universal, and compulsory. Obviously a child denied play and forbidden school is refused that physical development and opportunity for learning so important to its citizenship in a democracy. Certainly the nation has an interest in the matter of citizenship. Child labor injures not only the individual child, but also it injures society at large.

It appears that the only formidable opponents of action by congress are those who ably hold that the national government is now powerless to forbid child labor, and further that under our federal system it ought not by constitutional amendment be vested with such powers. But it will be remembered that the Supreme court's decisions have been by narrow margins, The first decision was handed down by a majority of 5 to 4, the majority holding that the federal act of 1916 invaded the rights of

Since the toleration of child labor by any group of states establishes unrighteous competition with the industries of states which more effectively prevent the labor of little children, we know that such competition tends to delay or thwart advanced legislation by the states.

The country has become an economic unit; production in one state is affected by costs and conditions of production in another state. The country is becoming increasingly a social and political unit. Its citizens everywhere must suffer from a continuing injury to its citizens in any part of the union.

#### In Character Analysis There Is No Substitute for Long Acquaintance

By PROF. F. A. KINGSBURY, University of Chicago.

As yet there has not been developed a sufficiently reliable system for character analysis. There is no substitute for long acquaintance. So be just a little bit doubtful about those pet systems-character reading by palms, bumps, handwriting, photographs, letters and short interviews. They may work out in some instances, but they cannot be used as standard, reliable ways of analyzing character.

So far, scientific laboratories, business establishments and others have failed to produce a reliable standardized scale for character reading.

#### From No Viewpoint Can Co-operative Marketing Be Considered Socialistic

By ALVIN T. STEINEL, Colorado Agricultural College.

The history of the co-operative movement in Europe indicates that it came of necessity and force of circumstances, and that is the reason for its present growth in America. What far-sighted leaders of agricultural thought in this country are doing now is to capitalize sentiment while the farmer is in a mood to act and before prosperity again makes him as independent as a rooster on the fence at sunrise.

Herbert Hoover declared that the development of co-operative marketing was of value to business in general, in that it helped to stabilize farm commodities.

"From no viewpoint can co-operative marketing be considered socialistic," said Mr. Hoover, "because it is based upon self-interest of the individual grower. Co-operative marketing is a form of organized capital with the producers providing their own capital. They also will have to develop their own personnel and system. It holds out the greatest hope for the American farmer to organize himself on an equality with other industries."

The problem is bigger than any industry or party, or class or group. It affects all the people and it deserves careful study by every citizen, be he producer, consumer or middleman.

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
#### Tests for Car-Driving Ability Should Be Varied According to Tasks

By DR. RAYMOND DODGE, Wesleyan University.

Slow and uncertain or wavering actions are undoubtedly the occasion of many automobile accidents. This slowness is in part due to lack of practice and training and in part due to the natural tendencies of the individual. Both of these factors can be made matters of test.

Tests for car-driving ability should be varied according to the sort of tasks which the drivers are called upon to perform. Tests for drivers of light pleasure vehicles might be very different from tests for drivers of fast ambulances and fire appliances, and they in turn might be quite different from tests for drivers of heavy motor trucks. High-powered fast machines obviously should not be entrusted to poor or relatively untrained chauffeurs. A specific form of test for various types of machines is good common sense and good science.

RURAL SCHOOL NEEDS ARE MADE KNOWN

#### Better System and Teachers to Equal Those in Cities Necessary.

Austin, Tex .- "The rural schools c our country should have just as good eachers and should, in every respect be the equal of the city schools," declared Dr. George A. Works, professor of rural education at Cornell Univers ity at the closing session of the conference on citizenship, education and home welfare, at Austin, Friday.

Other speakers were Dr. P. W. Horn president of the Southwestern University; Edward P. Costigan, member of the federal tariff commission; Pro fessor S. M. N. Marrs, superintendent of public instruction; Turner Jones of Atlanta, Ga.

"The ideal toward which the educa tors of the state who are interested in the rural education should work, said Mr. Works, should be to establish a rural school system which will enable the rural children to attend first-class high schools at home. But at the same time, this system should not be so highly developed along class lines that there would tend to develop separate class of city schools and a separate class of rural schools.

"Perhaps the best plan, at least the most practical one, is to have excel-lent high schools at the economic centers of the state or county in which courses are given fitted to both city and rural children. This type of school system will not be as expens ive as an attempt to place high schools over the entire rural districts would







PROPER FEEDING OF HORSES

Outline of Results Obtained in Experiments Conducted at Illinois Station.

Experiments in the feeding of farm work horses and mules completed at the Illinois experiment station indicate that a practical work ration requires approximately a pound of conentrate and a pound of roughage for every hundred pounds of body weight of the animal fed. #### **AUTO GAS POISONING DURING COLD SEASON**

Motorists Are Warned of Danger From Carbon Monoxide.

There is an Ever-Present insecurity to Owners of Cars, More Particular ly When Closeted With Their Machines.

A writer to the New York Times calls leserved attention to the marked difference in the danger from fumes of illuminating gas as contrasted with the automobile carbon monoxide gas.

"There is a vast difference," he says. between illuminating gas and the escaping exhaust fumes from an automo bile while the engine is running. Properly harnessed, escape from death is easy while using illuminating gas. As to the latter, no escape seems possible, even in the open air. There is an everpresent danger to operators of automo biles, more particularly when closeted with their machines.

"The attention of the New York board of health has been called to the danger that exists from carbon monoxlde gas, particularly to those who sit on low benches along pleasure drives. Examination by blood tests of pleasureseekers who have suddenly become ill from unforeseen circumstances has proved that exhaust gases from passing automobiles are responsible for their condition. This may appear fishy, but is nevertheless a reality.

The danger is materially increased when the winter months naturally bring persons in close contact with the fumes while automobile engines are started in tightly closed garages, too often the result of carelessness on the part of those who have not been instructed in the peril of such a proceed-

ant of the fact that, according to prominent medical authorities, the continned breathing of even extremely weak mixtures of carbon monoxide and air may cause injury to the kidneys, heart, brain and nerves. Automobile manufacturers are fully aware of this danger. It has been stated that the various organs of the body can be seriously affected by poisoning from breathing the air containing so small a quantity as 1-1,000 part of carbon monoxide.

"How many automobile owners know that carbon monoxide is a colorless. odorless, tasteless gas? It is extremey poisonous, because it combines with the red coloring matter of the blood more readily than does oxygen. Exposure to as little as 5 per cent causes headaches. The dangerous symptoms ome without warning."



Addition of Acid Phosphate Will Make Almost Fourfold Return in Yields.

#### DEFICIENCY IN PHOSPHORUS

Composition of Manure. A ton of average barnyard manure

contains ten pounds of nitrogen, two pounds of phosphorus, and eight pounds of potassium, according to L. Wainscott, assistant in the soils department of the Missouri College of Agriculture. Comparing this composition with a standard commercial fertilizer such as 2-12-2, one can see that manure is relatively deficient in the element of phosphorus. #### PROTECT LIVE STOCK OWNER

Federal Inspectors Keep Close Watch to Preyent Entry of Foot and Mouth Disease.

The live stock producers of the United States are protected against the dangers of various plagues of domestic animals existent in other countries by quarantine regulations enforced by representatives of the bureau of animal industry. Never in our history has this country been so menaced by foot and nouth disease as in the last few years. It has existed in European, Asiatic and South American countries and still exists in many of them, but our inspectors keep a close watch and hope to prevent another entry. Other serious diseases of domestic animals that have been kept out are contagious pleuropneumonia, rinderpest, surra, and Mal-

#### LIKE HARD SURFACED ROADS

Macadam or Broken Stone Material Being Discarded for Cement for Heavy Traffic.

The ordinary broken stone or macadam road, invented by John Macadam, a Scotch road engineer of Ayrshire, has until recently been in general use. These are now giving way to the hard surfaced roads that are better adapted to automobile and truck traffic. Seaweed, cotton, hay and straw have often been used in the construction of roads and in contrast to such materials it is interesting to note that fron and steel have been used. A steel road has been in use in Calencia. Spain, for 20 years. Cement roads in America are now commonly being reinforced with steel.

The building of good roads with the eccompanying development of the automobile, has greatly increased the efficlency of the practicing physician. Before the motor reached its present state of development, physicians were compelled to make their calls on foot, on street cars, or by carriage, in cities, and on horseback or by carriage in the country. As a result, the physician was limited in his practice, and the community or portion of it, at least, was denied the medical and surgical relief necessary to the highest possible degree of health. Lives frequently paid the penalty, and unnecessary suffering was always the result.






