


Treasures in Tomb of Tut-Ankh-Amen of Egypt



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

FINAL BLOW DEALT THE SHIPPING BILL

Death of the Administration Measure Came Quietly Without Discussion.

Washington.-The administration hipping till died Thursday just a year to the day after it had been born. On Feb. 28, 1922, President Harding, appeared at a joint session of ongre., urged enactment of legislation designed to build up an American merchant marine through government aid, and identical bills embodying the views of the administration were introduced in the senate and house. Thursday the bill then introduced, after having passed the house in the meantime, met its death in the senate through adoption of a notion to lay it aside.

The end of the legislation, which the president has advocated with all the powers at his command, leaves the administration where it was i ear ago, in dealing with the three dillion-dollar investment in war built ships. The task of liquidating this investment already has been made the subject of study and the plans under consideration are to be announced after congress adjourns, The death of the shipping bill

came quietly and without the bitter discussion which marked its hectic career. The senate proceeded to vote on the motion of Senator Robinson of Arkansas, the acting democratic ader, to send the ship measure back the committee. Administration leadrs, including Senator Jones, repubcan, of Washington, who has been charge of the legislation in the enate, had indicated their opposiion to this course and the motion was voted down, 48 to 36.

The final blow then was dealt the bill, which was given up as lost by its supporters after a four-day filibuster.

Senator Ladd, republican, of North Dakota, moved that it be laid aside in favor of the filled milk bill, and the motion was carried 63 to 7, the republican leaders voting with the majority.

The action meant the death of the shipping measure.

The action also was taken to mean the end of such legislation in the near future, for President Harding had let it be known that the admin istration plans no attempts to obtain onsideration for the bill at the next regular session of congress.









Marriage and Divorce Laws Must Be Identical in All States of the Union

By SENATOR ARTHUR CAPPER, of Kansas.



lieves that the laws should be uniform and that at the same time the grounds for divorce and laws for marrying should be made more conservative. So I was quite glad to intro-

duce the bill which was prepared at the direction of the federation by Mrs. Edwards Franklin White, deputy attorney general of Indiana. At the outset I am not prepared to state that I favor all of the terms of the bill, but it is a fair beginning and from it we should get

a reasonable, sane and safe nation-wide law. The legislation is designed to prevent hasty and foolish marriages and to make divorce more difficult. The age at which girls and boys may marry with consent of the parents is fixed at sixteen years for girls and eighteen years for boys.

The age at which girls and boys may marry without consent of the parents is fixed at eighteen and twenty-one years, respectively.

Marriage is forbidden of the feeble-minded and of those afflicted with epilepsy, insanity or communicable diseases; of blacks and whites, of Mongolians and whites and of those within the first degree of blood

Application for marriage must be made by one of the parties to the prospective marriage two weeks before issuance of the license. Both parties must present affidavits certifying that they are not afflicted with communicable disease and are normal mentally.

The application must be posted in the office of the clerk and in his public record. Two witnesses in addition to the one who performs the ceremony must be present at every marriage.

Marriages must be reported in the county and in the state in which they take place. Penalties are attached for infraction of this law. Divorce will likewise be safeguarded under the terms of the proposed

Enforcement and application of this law is left to the state courts and their machinery. No new federal bureau is created by the legislation,

The idea is not to make divorce easier-only to make marriage safer for the young, to insure the children of the future better health and heredity and to prevent hasty and ill-considered marriages.



LENGTH OF DAY IS BIG FACTOR

Useful in Determining Whether or Not Alfalfa Seed Is of Suitable Variety.

EXPERIMENT IN GREENHOUSE

Peruvian, Turkestan and Grimm Have Own Peculiar Reactions When Grown Out of Season-Avoid Argentine in North.

Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) The peculiar reactions of plants to change in the length of day to which they are accustomed is being found useful in determining whether or not alfalfa seed is of the variety recomnended and whether it is adapted to onditions in the sections of the country where it is being sold. By growing the seed in greenhouses in the ate fall and winter the United States Department of Agriculture has been able to determine the suitability of alfalfa seed from Argentina to condiions in this country. As a result, it has been determined that this seed is not adapted to the northern part of the United States. Most of it should not be grown any farther north than Kansas-grown seed.

Tell Different Groups

By growing the seedlings for a short time in the greenhouse it is possible to tell to what group they belong. For instance. Peruvian. Kansas-grown common, Turkestan, and Grimm have their own peculiar reactions when grown out of season in the greenhouse or in the open in the fall. If started in the spring the various kinds cannot readily be distinguished until they have own to considerable size. In the

fall and winter when the hours of daylight are shorter the seedlings of these various groups develop characteristic differences in height, erectness and branching

As a result of the disc effect of the length of day on the performance of alfalfa plants, the ability of this crop to endure cold will not be the only factor to be considered in selecting varieties for the parts of the country with rigorous winters. The number of hours of daylight will have something to do with their selection. In the Southwest, Peruvian alfalfa starts earlier in the spring, and keeps going later in the fall than other va-It is able to make better growth during short days than other alfalfas, and is not particularly benefited by long periods of daylight, but the plants suffer considerable winter injury this far north. Northern varietles, on the other hand, do not adapt themselves to the short days of Arirona. This shows why varieties of one section, even though they may be hardy enough, cannot be used successfully in some other localities.

Not Suitable in North.


If you buy Argentine seed you can se sure that it is not suitable in the north. It should be grown at least no farther north than Kansas seed. Large quantities of seed are being imported from the Argentine; in fact most of the imported alfalfa now comes from that country. From July 1, 1922, to January 15, 1923, approximately 6,320,000 pounds were received from that country and only 281,600 pounds from other countries.

WOODCHUCKS DAMAGE CROPS

Unusually Large Number of Complaints Received From Many Sections Last Year.


