STATE SENATE AND **HOUSE PROCEEDINGS**

Legislators Now Busy Making New Laws and Changing Old Ones.

Austin, Tex.-The committee on tate affairs reported favorably the Winfree house resolution calling for vestigation of the oil industry in Texas and price fixing arrangements. Governor Neff filed with the secretary of state, to become effective, the Witt bill, authorizing Beaumont and

In the short space of seven years the number of annual visitors to our national parks, which boast of some of the finest scenic treasures to be found anywhere in the world, has quadrupled. In 1921, for instance, more than one million two hundred thousand people came to the parks from all parts of the country, and one of them alone, the Rocky Mountain National park, furnished pleasure and relaxation to 273,737 visitors in a single year.

Two-thirds of these travel by automobile, bringing their own equipment. Then what about the roads

-that prime necessity of the motorist? It is well-nigh unbelievable that they have been woefully neglected, and that to date no program of any magnitude has been approved by the congress for the construction, improvement and maintenance of highways in our national parks. BALFOUR CLAIM NOT JUSTIFIED

Crosby Says Not Asked To Indorse Loans of All Allied Debts.

New York .- Oscar T. Crosby, assistant secretary of the treasury during the war, emphatically characterized Saturday as a "misapprehension" the assertion of Lord Balfour Thursday in the house of lords that the United States had demanded a British guarantee before financing other allies.

Entering the controversy in London between Lord Balfour and Ambassador Harvey, Mr. Crosby, who discussed war loans with Lord Balfour when the latter came here in 1917 as head of the British high commission and who later served in Europe as president of the inter-allied ouncil on war purchase and finance, declared he could recall one incident on which the "misapprehension" might be based.

This incident, he said, was the granting to Russia of "a relatively small loan" of \$170,000,000 upon British indorsement, at a time when Russia was represented here only by a "the Washington conference had charge d'affaires holding over from and particulars. 

Losses in Prison System Shown for Twelve Years

Austin, Tex .- The manufacturing industries of the state prison system have lost a total of \$521,927.80 from 1910 to 1922, inclusive, according to a loss and gain statement given out at Austin by Sundford J. Dean, member of the prison commission. The statement carries a notation to the effect that "the manufacturing industries do not carry the general overhead expenses of the system."

The enterprises that have lost money and the amounts lost are: Cabinet shop, 1910 to 1922, inclusive, \$4,845.10; cotton mill, burned in 1911, from 1910 to 1911, inclusive, \$7,180.91; blacksmith shop, 1910 to 1918, inclusive, \$24,842.65; Rusk box factory, sold in 1918, from 1912 to 1918, inclusive, \$54,968.13; machine shop, 1919 to 1918, inclusive, \$38,845.43; Rusk prison operating account, 1910 to 1918, inclusive, \$288,707.02; making a total of \$418,489,-.24. Charged to these industries is an item of \$108,448.56, composed of worthless accounts and loss on the sale of manufactured products by the above industries, including item of the Rusk Iron Foundry, which was discontinued prior to 1910," bringing the whole amount to \$521,937.80.

TAXES MORE THAN DOUBLED ON FARM LANDS SINCE 1914

Washington.-Taxes on farm lands have more than doubled in the eight years from 1914 to 1922.

A canvass of the department of agriculture, just completed, shows the average amount of state, county and local taxes paid by farmers in 1922 to have been 70.9c per acre. compared with 31.4c in 1914.

That was an increase of 126 per cent in the eight years. The canvass disclosed that roads and public schools were the principal causes of the increased taxes.

New Jersey farmers were paying the highest taxes in 1922, with an average of \$2,22 per acre, compared with 96c in 1914, an increase of 132 per cent. Arizona farmers were paying the lowest taxes-7c per acre, which was the same as paid in 1914.

FORM AN OPALESCENT HUE tatoes and watermelons.

Peculiarity Frequently Noticed in Globes of Electric Arc Due to Spheres of Silica.

A beautiful opalescence may sometimes be observed in the glass globes used to diffuse the light of the electric arc, particularly after such globes have penses for the schools this year. been in use for a long time.

Close examination shows that the opalescence is due to the presence on the glass of minute spheres of silica, which have evidently been formed by volatilization from the glass under the influence of the electric are. This effect is in accordance with the experiments of French scientists, whose electric furnaces have produced some surprising results.

The essential feature of the furnace is an electric arc of great intensity. When rock crystal, broken into fragments, is placed in the furnace it simply melts like so much ice, and in a few minutes the liquid thus formed be | route. gins to boll.

The vapor rising from the liquefied crystal is condensed into a little bluishwhite cloud, from which tiny spheres of silics, glimmering with opalescent hues, are deposited. These spheres, as surfaced roads of Victoria County already remarked, are similar to those found on arc-light globes. POPULARITY OF SOY BEAN IS INCREASING

Useful as Oil Plant as Well as Forage Crop in Corn Belt.

Several Factories Equipped With Machinery for the Manufacture of Various Food Products-Biloxi Variety Favored.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) really always In view of the rapidly increasing popularity of the soy bean as an oll plant as well as a forage crop in the corn belt, the bureau of plant industry, United States Department of Agriculture has extended its investigaions with these beans to meet the denand for information relative to the culture, varieties, and utilization of the crop. About 175 introductions of

soy beans were received from Manchuria, Japan, and China in 1922. Many of these appear to be of promise for northern and central conditions. Several factories have been equipped or are being equipped with machinery for the manufacture of soy bean oil and meal as well as for various food products, such as soy sauce, flour, and milk

Much progress, according to the annual report of the bureau, is being made with soy beans in the South, where in past years the crop has not been very popular because of the shattering tendencies of the varieties that were grown. The Biloxi variety, however, on account of its nonshattering characteristics, has done much to increase the popularity and acreage of the crop in the Gulf Coast states. The Laredo variety has been found to be resistant to nematodes and wilt. It has given most excellent results for forage and seed production.

tons of hay will fatten 250 lambs weighing 55 pounds each and make them weigh 80 pounds. This will make one double-deck carloan.

Four hundred and fifty bushels of corn and 2,750 pounds of tankage or fish meal will fatten 70 hogs averaging 100 pounds to 200 pounds, making one carload.

One thousand one hundred bushels of corn, 10 tons of alfalfa hay, and 5 tons of straw will fatten 20 steers averaging 850 pounds making them gain 325 pounds each in 180 days. This is an average carload.

STUDY VARIETIES OF WHEAT

Endeavoring to Determine Those Best Adapted to Various Sections of Country.

The agricultural experiment stations of some 25 states are studying varieties of wheat to determine those best adapted to the regions in which they are located, according to reports to the United States Department of Agriculture. Widely differing conditions are included-the pear-Arctic in Alaska and the semitropical in Alabama, Louisiana, and Georgia; mountain fields-in Pennsylvania and prairies of Kansas and Nebraska; lands under cultivation for many years as in Virginla and New York, and practically virgin soils in some of the Western

FEEDING POTATOES TO STOCK

When Fed to Hegs They Should Be Cooked and Only Moderate Amount Given.

Potatoes are a good succulent food when fed raw to cattle, sheep, horses or poultry. If fed to hogs they should be cooked. But only a moderate amount should be fed. 
