Another notable measure that failed to get through was the resolution calling a constitutional convention This cannot be considered again for two years as a special session is not empowered to call a constitutional convention, many members assert, and to: can not submit amendments to the constitution.

Only two constitutional amendments were submitted. One would raise the pension tax from 5c to 7c and the other would permit highway legislation in conformity with federal aid requirements. The first is to be submitted at the general election of 1924, and the latter on the fourth Saturday of next July.

Until the last minute there was hope that an agreement would be reached on the bill to increase the crude oil tax, but this was shattered by adjournment and a similar bill is to be considered at the special session. The senate conferees refused to go above a 2 per cent tax and the house supported its 3 per cent adoption. The house offered a compromise of 21/2 per cent, but this was rejected by the senate conferees.



When our forefathers adopted the Constitution of the United States they provided that the legislative function of government should be composed of a house of representatives and a senate. The federal government in this respect was accepted as a model and was followed by all of the states of the governor can veto some of it, but only Union. The experience of more than one hundred years has demonstrated that the two-branch legislature, at least, so far as the various states are concerned, has been very unsatisfactory in its results. One of the fundamental requisites that should always

exist in any legislature where universal suffrage prevails, is to enable the all of which will be considered at the citizen to properly place responsibility, either for the success or the failure of legislation.

In every legislature composed of two branches, the finishing touches and the only thing that emerges from the conference is the final agreement. The individual legislator must then vote upon a conference report without any opportunity of expressing, by his vote, his opposition to anything that the bill in this form contains. The citizen is deprived entirely of an opportunity to pass a just and fair judgment upon the result.

A one-branch legislature would obviate all these difficulties. The citizen would be able to absolutely and without difficulty place responsibility where it properly belonged for every act of the legislature.

One of the evils of our legislatures is that they are entirely too large. Having in mind a state about like Nebraska I should say that the membership should not exceed twenty or thirty.

The members of the legislature should be elected by districts upon a non-partisan ballot. The business of the legislature of a state is in no sense partisan. If politics were eliminated, members would be elected according to their qualifications for the state legislature. The state would be similar to a gigantic corporation, and the members of the legislature would be members of the board of directors.

A state having that kind of legislature I have outlined would be able to increase the salaries of its members.

If we had the kind of legislature I have outlined, the members would stand as high as the members of our judiciary. 





Co-operating with the Department of Justice, representatives of the soil survey furnished expert testimony in a case involving the changing of state boundaries during the past year. A detailed map was made of the soils of the Red river bottoms, in the vicinity of the Burkburnett oil field, for the purpose of showing the process by which the bottoms were built up, this fact having an important bearing on the settlement of a boundary dispute between Texas and Oklahoma. Common drinking tank. Common feeding troughs or pasture. Nosing at fence lines or breaking

through fences. Poorly ventilated barns or sheds. Feeding of unpasteurized milk from infected cows to calves or hogs. Unburned dead animals eaten or

scattered by hogs or dogs. Breeding to infected bull or serving

cows outside tested herds. There are other ways in which the disease can be spread, but undoubtedly stockmen can do much to check the inroads of this disease by reducing to the minimum danger from the sources mentioned.

RAPE VALUABLE AS PASTURE

Plants Sometimes Grow More Than Three Feet High Yielding Twenty Tons of Forage.

Rape is a rank growing forage plant closely resembling the rutabaga or Swedish turnip, but with a root much like that of the cabbage. The leaves are large, smooth and spreading. The plant ordinarily reaches a height of 18 to 24 inches and yields from eight to ten tons of green forage to an acre. Under favorable conditions the plants sometimes grow more than three high, while yields of 20 tons of forage are not uncommon. The value of the crop lies in its use as a

ACID PHOSPHATE WILL HELP.

Checks Loss of Nitrogen and Adds Valuable Plant Food-Not Good as Preservative.

The use of acid phosphate with manure is a help in checking the loss of nitrogen, as well as actually adding valuable plant food. Ground rock phosphate is frequently recommended for use with manure, but it does not do much good as a preservative, though it is undoubtedly of benefit as a source of phosphorus. If peat is readily available it will be good as a silp-over blouse with short sleeves, neckline high at the back and having preservative, almost as good as acid phesphate, and possibly much cheaper.

FRESH TOMATOES IN GOOD DEMAND

Rapid Growth of Industry in United States Is Shown in Bulletin by Parsons.

GAIN OF 50 PER CENT SHOWN

Becoming Increasingly Important That Producers and Shippers Use Only Most Approved Methods of Harvesting and Packing.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

"Preparation of Fresh Tomatoes for Market" is the title of Farmers' Bulletin 1291, just issued by the bureau of agricultural economics, United States Department of Agriculture. In this new bulletin the author, F. Earl Parsons, gives specific suggestions as to the best methods of getting this popular vegetable from the field to the market.

Big Gain Last Year

A 50-cent gain in tomato shipments in 1922, compared with movement of the previous year, shows the increasing demand for this product. Average shipments have been less than 18,000 cars per year, but during the past season 26,000 cars were forwarded. In view of the growth of this industry, it is becoming increasingly important that producers and shippers use only the most approved methods of harvesting, packing, grading and loading, which are described in Farmers' Bulletin 1291.

This publication points out that nal. there are three stages of maturity at which tomatoes may be picked, depending largely on the distance they must travel before being placed on sale. Mature green tomatoes, or "green-wraps," constitute the bulk of shipments from Florida and other states in the southern tier. Pink tomatoes, or those which are "turning," come chiefly from southern Illinois and sometimes from Texas and Tennessee whereas ripe tomatoes go to nearby markets in the southern sections and comprise the bulk of shipments from Missourl, Ohio and New Jersey.

The necessity for care in picking, in field handling, in sorting and in packing is emphasized in this new bulletin The author says that "the interior of the picking utensil should be inspected carefully and all sharp edges, nail points, and rough surfaces smoothed off. Small skin breaks re-

Cleaner and Healthier Fruit. sulting from rough edges are little noticed when the tomatoes are packed. but may afford an entrance for fungi that will develop rots in transit. Much unnecessary bruising results from the careless emptying of the picking baskets into the field crates. It has been pointed out that green tonatoes are easily bruised. In dumping the fruit from the basket to the field crate the latter should be tilted so that the tomatoes are permitted to roll gently down the side of the crate.

Methods of Packing.

Standard packages used in various parts of the country are fully described and illustrated, as well as the accepted methods of packing tor stoes in the crates, lugs and baskets. Pictures show specimens of defective of diseased stock which must be excluded f the tomatoes are to be properly graded so as to bring the highest cash returns to the grower.

Considerable space is devoted to a most improved central packing houses. The economy and effectiveness of running tomatoes through a wellequipped, modern packing plant is pointed out by the author. A diagram shows the most desirable sorting and packing apparatus in general use

The bulletin closes by emphasizing the importance of careful inspection of the tomatoes in the process of cars, and also calls attention to the federal inspection service available in terminal markets on arrival of these

highly perishable shipments. The publication should be of value to all growers and shippers of tomatoes. Preduce dealers and students of marketing problems likewise will find in it much helpful material. Copies of the bulletin may be obtained free upon request to the United States

Some other gains in the homeland include the better equipment and maintenance of the more than 80 academies, colleges and seminaries other than the mountain schools; in-creasing the number of Baptist hos-pitals from 18 to 20, and providing hetter equipment and maintenance for all of them; discressing the number of Baptist hospitals from 12 to 20 and beginning the erection of three others, at the same time all the older ones have been better equipped; while the number of aged ministers helped has been doubled and the stipend given each has been greatly increased.

In the realm of foreign missions the Foreign Mission Board has been enabled to send out about 250 new mis-sionaries, employ over 500 additional native workers, greatly increase the equipment in the way of church buildings, chapels, schools, hospitals, pub Bahing houses and mission residences in the older fields of China Japan.
