

HUGHES REFUSES TO RECOGNIZE SOVIETS

Secretary of State Says Russia Must Show Some Disposition to Pay Debts.

Washington.-Conditions on which the United States will extend diplomatic recognition to soviet Russia are:

1. Abandonment of revolutionary propaganda directed at other countries. particularly America.

2. Ability and disposition to discharge international obligations.

These two requirements were laid down officially by Secretary Hughes, and, in addressing a delegation of the women's committee for recognition of Russia, Hughes' statement constitutes the latest outline of the American government's position in view of the agitation for recognition of the soviets; which has grown strikingly in the last few weeks, especially since Senator Borah began his series of speeches attacking the Harding-Hughes Russian policy. Unlike Borah, Hughes is not convinced that Russia has changed her policy regarding the sanctity of contract. Hughes emphasized that the United States has no desire to interfere with the internal affairs of Russia; that the Russian people have a right to develop their own institutions, and that the United States is not seeking to press Russia for debt payments beyond her means.

Hughes holds that the form of Russia's government is for her people to decide. All that the United States is concerned with is the proper recognition of international obligations in ac cordance with the practice of other na

It is a fundamental difference and one that affords the soviet leaders an easy path to American recognition if they choose to take it.

GOVERNOR SIGNS SEVERAL MEASURES

All Deal With Educational Subjects \$50,000 for School Survey in Texas

Austin, Tex.-Governor Neff Friday signed the Wood senate bill passed by the recent legislature providing for an extensive survey of the entire educational system of the State. To carry on the survey \$50,000 is appropriated. The work will be done by non-resident educational experts and will include an investigation of the educational system from the primary grade to the higher educational institutions.

The survey commission will be se lected by a committee composed of the governor, State Superintendent, chairman of the legislative educational committees, presidents of the State university, A. and M. College, College of Industrial Arts and one normal school. The commission is to meet within 30 days after the measure be comes effective, which is immediately Governor Neff also signed the Stuart

bill permitting counties of over 100,-000 population to adopt the county unit system of schools. Dallas, Fort Worth, Harris, Bexar and El Paso are the only counties permitted to adopt the system.

Other school measures signed by the governor included: Limiting terms of teachers of independent school districts; appropriating \$5000 to educational department to print blanks; validating certain school districts and bonds; permitting emergency transfer of school children; authorizing school districts to issue bonds for constructing teachers' homes; raising maximum school attendance from the fourth to seventh grades; validating bonds purchased by the State board of education.





TURKEYS IN HIDDEN PLACES

Hens Often Steal Nests in Patch of Weeds or Tall Grass-Best Plan to Confine Them.

Turkey hens are wont to "steal" their nests in hidden places, such as a patch of weeds, tall grass or thick brush and often wander a half mile or more from home before they find locations that suit them. To find these stolen nests often proves to be a long and tedlous task, the usual method being to follow each turkey hen as she separates from the flock and starts toward her nest, care being taken that she does not know she is being followed. A much easier and quicker method than this is to confine the hens early some morning soon after they have come down from nest and let them out late in the afternoon. they have been holding.

If many turkeys are kept, the use of a breeding pen will be found a great convenience. This pen should cover a sufficient area to allow the turkeys some exercise, an acre for fifteen birds being none too large. A hog-tight wire fence three feet high sist in flying out, the flight feathers of one wing should be clipped. Nests should be scattered about the pen.

SHIP ONIONS LONG DISTANCE

Little Extra Care by Shepherd at This Critical Period Will Be Repaid Later On.

GRAIN FEED CAUSES TROUBLE

Use of Small Individual Pens Prevents Other Sheep From Injuring Young Animale-Prevent Chilling in Cold Weather

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

The lambing season is a busy time for the shepherd, as the percentage of lambs saved affects the profitableness of the flock, Extra work at this period will be well repaid, as a little care given at the right time will result in the saving of many lambs, and even of some of the ewes that would other vise be lost, and will often thus greaty increase the amount of profit from the flock, according to specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture.

Ewes which have been well cared for and which arrive at this season in good condition will give very little trouble during lambing. It should be remembered that only a small amount of grain, approximately one-quarter to one-half pound per head per day, should be fed to the owes just before lambing, as heavy grain feeding at this time will often cause udder trouble. Even in flocks which have received the best of care, it is usually help some of the ewes lambs. When assistance is a hands should be thoroughly cleansed and rubbed with oil to prevent infection and irritation to the ewe. Ewe in Individual Pen.

Just before or immediately after she has lambed, each ewe should be placed in a small individual pen. The use of these pens prevents the other sheep from injuring the lambs and gives the ewe a much better chance to "mother" her lamb.

As soon as the lamb is delivered the shepherd should cleanse the phlegm from the lamb's mouth and nostrils.




