TRADE BALANCE IN FAVOR OF UNITED STATES

Washington-Exports from the United States during October amounted to when they do their duty. They need \$402,000,000, compared with imports of \$303,000,000, leaving a favorable trade balance of \$99,000,000.

According to the preliminary esti mates of the October foreign trade as made public Thursday by the commerce department exports from the United States were \$20,000,000 greater than during September and \$31,000,900 greater than in October, 1922.

Texas Allen Land Law.

Austin, Tex.-The Texas alien land ownership law passed in 1921 is similar to the laws of California and Wash ington, upheld Tuesday in an opinior by the United States supreme court according to the attorney general's de partment. The Texas law prohibits aliens who are not permitted to be come citizens of the United States from owning land in this state. It does not apply to ownership of land prio lo passage of the law nor to city lots





Potato Brown-Rot Is Cause of Big Losses

Bacterial Disease Occurs Especially on New Land.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture, Potato brown-rot, a bacterial disease which not only attacks potatoes. but also eggplant, pepper, tomato, tobacco, jimson weed, black nightshade, peanut, and other plants, is destructive to plants in the field and to the tubers after they have been harvested, according to Department Circular 281, "Potato Brown-Rot," by F. C. Meier and G. K. K. Link, recently published by the United States Department of "Pessimism never wins," said Jen- Agriculture to provide information on the prevention of losses in shipping and marketing the potato crop. This disease is world-wide in tropical countries and occurs especially on low land. The trouble begins in the field through infection from the soil or from leaf-eating insects. The plants wilt and die. The tubers show a ring browning, especially at the stem end. and decay rapidly. Other cut, brulsed, or injured potatoes in the same package become infected by contact.

Field control is not understood Further experiments are needed, but losses in shipping are lessened by early harvesting of diseased fields, through sorting, and immediate use. Decay in essened if the potatoes can be held at elow 55 degrees.

Destroying Foulbrood in Season Favoring Malady

The way to handle American foulrood in a season when conditions are favorable for the spread of the disease is to kill the bees after dark with sulphur or a pint of gasoline. This is the advice of C. O. Yost, secretary of the Indiana Bee Keepers' association. He suggests several plans.

"Stop the entrance tight, carry the hive inside a bee-tight inclosure, there destroy combs, etc., and scorch fixtures thoroughly. Another plan: Do all the treating under a light screen tent that may be carried around and set over the colony to be handled. Another plan: Take a sick colony a couple of miles from any bees, treat there, allow them to quiet down and move home. If gasoline is used the entrance should first be closed. Raise the hive cover and with a little smoke chase all bees down from top bar, then empty the plat of gasoline around top of frames, close hive cover tight. Fresh Corn Stover Most





Next to Yale, Harvard has placed more men on All-American teams than any other institution in the country. Some of its heroes have been chosen for as many as four years, while many were selected for three.

The name of Charley Daly, a wonderful quarter back placed on the All-American team for three years, will live in Harvard's football history as long as the game is played. During his days he was one of the respected players on the Crimson team. Then there was Cumnock, and many others, including that wonderful kicker,

Charley Brickley. But when the achievements and ability of this galaxy of stars is carefully weighed, Eddle Mahan, the full back chosen for the All-American teams of 1913, '14 and '15, is awarded the honor of being Harvard's greatest football player. MALARIA COSTS MILLIONS EACH YEAR IN TEXAS

Austin, Tex.-Malaria is costing the eople of Texas between \$10,090,000 and \$20,000,000 annually, based on a survey of the rural districts of the state, Dr. A. Caswell Ellis of the University of Texas told the delegates attending the school of instruction for health workers now in session at Austin under the auspices of the state health department.

Doctor Ellis stated that the survey disclosed that in a number of precincts in numerous counties in Tex-"mosquitoes, insanitary privies and poorly constructed wells were costing families between \$70 and \$86

a year." "In one district," Doctor Ellis stated, "95 per cent of the inhabitants of unscreened homes contracted malaria, while only 421/2 per cent less with partially screened homes were than 1 per cent of the inhabitants in the same districts contracted malaris where the homes were where the homes were thoroughly screened. Statstics based on these studies show that this disease is costing the state of Texas between \$10, 000,000 and \$20,000,000 annually."

Red Cross National Head quarters expended \$2.605.696.09. The food distributed in Greece aggregates 25,000 tons; garments, 809,000; blan kets, 48,550; new shoes, 5,000 patra medical, hospital and sanitary sup plies, 304 tons. In the feeding of the refugees there was listed upwards of 22,000 children under three years of

The disasters in the United States during the past year reported 210 per sons killed, 991 injured, 12,691 ren dered homeless. The total property loss was estimated at \$20,710,000.

Relief of suffering caused by disas ties in which they occur is fundamen tal to the charter of the American Red Cross. In addition to making ap propriations from its treasury and as signing trained personnel to relief work, the Red Cross in disaster cen tralizes and makes more effective re tief funds and supplies contributed by the country at large

Since 1881 the Red Cross has ad ministered more than \$20,000,000 for the single purpose of disaster relief. That it may continue to accept the re popsibilities which grave emergen ies place upon the American Red Cross appeal is made for a nation wide renewal of membership during the annual roll call, which opens on Armistice Day, November 11, and closes on Thanksgiving Day, Novem
