Caulhen of Lampasas, Texas, representing the firm, Ryder & Brown of Boston. The sale was composed of about 112,000 pounds, which brought on an average of 59c per pound.

The selling of this mohair cleaned out the warehouse of mohair and wool. It will not be long before the ranchmen will begin shearing their goats and sheep for the Spring clip.
